Session Approves Return to Live Worship

When the pandemic began last spring and we had to suspend live worship, Rev. Ralph promised that our first service back would be an Easter service. He missed by exactly one week.

At its meeting on Sunday, February 14th, Session approved our return to live worship on Palm Sunday, March 28th. Worship will be held in the west parking lot (behind the main building - see Page 8) and will begin at the usual time, 10:30 am. Please park on the north side of the parking lot in order to keep the area of the parking lot behind the main building clear for seating. Please see the diagram on page 8 for an overview of the plan.

In the event of inclement weather, we will attempt to notify everyone that the live service will be canceled and a recorded service will be provided as early on Sunday morning as possible. We will also post cancellation information on the homepage of the church website gspcsg.org.

For those who cannot or do not wish to join us at the outdoor service, we hope to host a live stream of the service on Zoom, as well. As usual, you will need an invitation. Please email Rev. Ralph if you would like to join via Zoom.

In order to protect each other, we will place approximately 50-70 markers in the parking lot with appropriate spacing to maintain social distancing. Each marker will indicate a location where a person, couple or family group will be permitted to sit. Please bring lawn chairs to sit in and confine your family group to the area immediately around your marker. For communion you will need to bring your own elements. Please continue to follow social distancing guidelines and wear a mask when you are unable to do so. Rest room facilities inside the building will be available but we will monitor and restrict the number of people allowed in the building at any one time. We will place offering plates near the entrance to the Narthex for you to drop off your donations.

We will provide printed bulletins and hymn lyrics but if you have a hymnal and/or Bible that you would like to bring with you, feel free to do so but please do not share it with others.

We expect that services will continue outdoors for the foreseeable future. Once the Southern Utah Public Health Department removes all restrictions on indoor meetings, we will move back into the Sanctuary. Should the need to meet outside continue into late spring and summer, we will adjust service times to worship during the coolest part of the day.

We look forward to Palm Sunday when we can once again come together to worship our Lord and Savior.

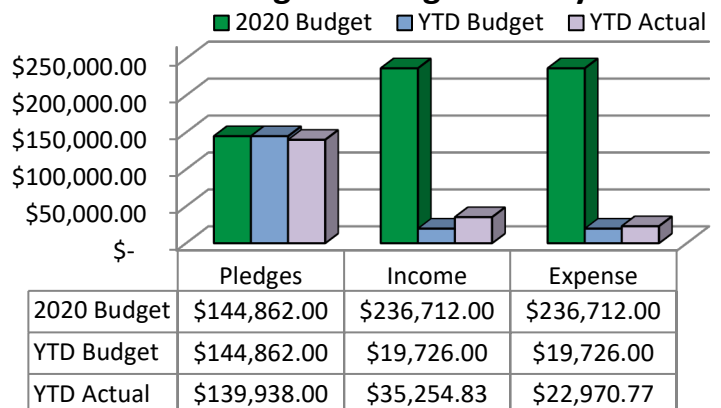

In just about a month it will have been one year since our lives were drastically changed, including and especially our life as a Christian community, as due to the pandemic the doors to our facility and Sanctuary were closed.

On the last Sunday of this month, on Palm Sunday, for the first time in nearly a year we will gather together to worship and celebrate our Lord's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, the beginning of Holy Week and the joyous news of Resurrection Sunday one week later! I can't wait!!

Maundy Thursday Service, April 1st

Because we cannot use Conklin Hall for our traditional Maundy Thursday Agape Dinner our service this year will be a traditional Maundy Thursday service including Communion and Tenebrae.

The service will be at 6:00 pm and will be in the church's west parking lot. Participants are asked to provide lawn chairs for seating and their own elements for the Sacrament of Communion.

Maundy comes from the Latin "man datum" meaning "Do This" and is the service remembering Jesus's last supper before his crucifixion the next day on Good Friday.

Tenebrae comes from the Latin meaning "Shadows" or "Darkness" and transitions us into Good Friday.

Prayer Corner

I was raised in the Baptist Church (General Conference), grew up in western Washington state and came to know Jesus as my personal savior at an early age. As many young people do, I drifted away from the church during my college and early adult years. I met my wife, Melanie, in Ely, Nevada (of all places as she grew up in Denver), which was the first of my seven duty stations throughout a 38-year career with the Bureau of Land Management that took us all over the western United States (in Nevada, California, New Mexico, Oregon and Utah) and Washington, DC.

I joined my first Presbyterian Church when I was about 40 years old when we were looking for a church home for our young family. Coincidentally (or ironically), that was First Presbyterian Church in Lakeview, Oregon. Later when we moved to the Washington D.C. area, I joined Christ Presbyterian Church in Fairfax, Virginia. When we moved to St. George in 2005, I started attending Good Shepherd and joined in 2009. I served two terms as the Grounds Elder from 2014-2019.

Just before the end of my second term as Elder, I accompanied Pastor Ralph on a mission trip to visit our sister church in Dorogobuzh, Russia. That was certainly a very spiritually and culturally enriching experience! While there, I preached my first and only sermon to date. One of the things I shared with them was the influence of my mother in my faith journey.

My mother (who died almost 10 years ago in her early 90s) was a very devout Christian and she prayed constantly for her children as they became adults and one by one, left their faiths behind. My mother - her witness and her constant prayer is the main reason I am where I am today in my faith journey.

In her later years, especially after my father died, she remained steadfast in her faith and was one of the oldest and longest attending members of her church. No matter where we lived, I would make it a point to visit her regularly. I enjoyed the quiet times we shared together. One of the things I remember is she always had a King James Bible sitting next to her living room chair. It was well used with a number of hand-written notes in the margins and many pages well-worn and almost falling out. That Bible and her strong faith carried her to the very end as the last 6 months of her life were a struggle, but she died peacefully knowing she would be united with her Savior and re-united with her husband of 55 years.

I took that very same Bible with me all the way to Russia and held it up for the congregation there to see as I described my mother's influence in my life.

Other than my mother's influence, the outdoors has always been a place of spiritual inspiration for me. In closing, I leave you with the words of Psalm 121 (the King James version of course):

I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord, which made heaven and earth.

Parish Health Ministry

Who knew that our March, 2020, newsletter article would be the last one published in which there was no mention words such as 'coronavirus' or 'pandemic' or 'COVID 19 vaccines' - to name only a few? One year later, we're excited to learn we'll be meeting again for in-person communal worship in our new venue, God's Great Outdoors! As directed, we'll still have to distance and wear masks. For those not able or not planning to attend in-person, please consult Page 1 of this Newsletter to find out how you can participate in the service.

Many in our congregation now have received at least their first and possibly their second COVID-19 vaccinations. If you need assistance in knowing how to secure an appointment and whether you qualify within a currently approved priority group, please call the church office at (435) 628-9158 or email akit5@me.com. It's a personal choice whether to receive the vaccine but it has been found that there is great benefit to both the individual and to society as a whole for as many as possible to be vaccinated. Studies do show those vaccinated can still become infected, but, because they carry a lower viral load (the strength of the virus in one's body), the severity of their disease is much less as is their ability to transmit it to others. As more is learned about the nature of COVID-19 and a greater percentage of the population become vaccinated, the virulent pervasiveness of the virus will be lessened. Fewer people will become desperately ill and we can once again begin to feel increasingly hopeful as now when we are able to say to one another -"SEE you on Palm Sunday."

Wellness Concern of the Month - COLORECTAL CANCER

One in twenty individuals will develop colorectal cancer so chances are rather good that you know of someone, perhaps in your own family, who has suffered from what is the third most common cancer among both women and men. The good news is that, in most cases, with proper screening it can be discovered and prevented.

Colorectal cancer usually begins with formation of a polyp or adenoma - an abnormal growth within the colon (large intestine). Most polyps are benign, usually slow growing and only 5% progress to become malignant. It is recommended that screening colonoscopies begin at age 45 when "polyp formers" can be identified, have polyps removed and then be followed at appropriate intervals. Family history of colon cancer will also dictate how often you should be screened and your doctor will advise the best schedule for you to follow. Other screening procedures are: CT colonoscopy, flexible sigmoidoscopy, and either testing the stool for hidden blood or the more involved study of DNA makeup of stool contents. Regardless, any polyps discovered will be removed by performing a traditional colonoscopy.

We talk about the importance of maintaining personal wellness. Commonsense health principles also apply to prevention of colorectal cancer and should include having a plan for moderately intense exercise, eating at least 10 grams of natural fiber per day as found in fruits and vegetables and grains, enjoying dairy products but reducing red meat consumption, and reducing smoking and alcohol consumption. Aspirin and anti-inflammatories can lower your risk of polyp formation but taking these medications on a regular basis can have other undesired effects such as GI ulceration and interference with blood clotting. As always, it is best to consult your medical provider regarding whether you should be taking these meds.

The colonoscopy procedure, itself, is not too terrible an experience and you will be pleasantly dozing and oblivious to the 'finer details' of the event. The big blocker to the whole thing is the dreaded PREP. However, if it has been a while since you have dared make that appointment, there are alternatives to having to consume what seemed like the contents of Lake Superior! Don't forget to ask about the options when you MAKE YOUR APPOINTMENT.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we have turned our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through February 14th we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$47,095** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$298,258** or about **77.7%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
