## Operation Christmas Child Kicks Off October 13th

Operation Christmas Child will kick off on October 13<sup>th</sup> and conclude on the Sunday before Thanksgiving. Now is the time to gather those items that kids either need or just can't resist, and get ready to pack those boxes.

As a reminder, you can no longer include any liquids or gels or anything that can be ingested in your boxes. This includes items like toothpaste and candy. Also, no toy guns or war toys are allowed. The reason for this change is that entire shipments of boxes can be held up at Customs if any of them include these items.

Over the summer we've collected a lot of items for shoeboxes, and we have some custom knitted goods to fill some boxes this year. We'll have a "Packing Party" sometime in late October or early November to get all of the goodies in boxes and ready to go to children all over the world. We'll give you plenty of notice, so you can join us for this fun and fulfilling event.

Boxes will be available at the Mission table during Fall Festival and in Conklin Hall until mid-November. You don't have to wait, though. If you have regular shoeboxes, you can pack them, as well. Just be sure to put a Boy/Girl sticker on each box, and indicate the most appropriate age for the child who will receive the box.

We collected only 94 boxes last year which was down about 30 from 2017 and more than 50 fewer than 2016. Let's try to get back to that magic 150 number this year.



As I mentioned in my July newsletter article, in my preparation of our August Mission trip to our sister church in Russia I was required to prepare two sermons. In that article I shared with you excerpts from my first sermon. The following are excerpts from the second sermon I gave in Dorogobuzh this past summer:

On our first visit here five years ago Pastor Sergei took us to visit the nursing home for worship. In his greeting to the residents, Pastor Sergei commented that he had with him visitors from America from a church full of "Babushka's"! The residents cheered!

This for the most part, remains true. A large number of our congregation consist of 'Babushka's and De-adushka's' (Grandmothers, Grandfathers). We do have a few young children and young families, and on more than one occasion one of our older members commented on our lack of young children. I then remind them of the bond we have with you, and tell them, "We do have children, and they speak Russian."

As written in John, "Whoever loves the Father, loves the child born of Him", and through him the world is overcome by our common victory and our common faith in Him.

As I shared with you last Sunday, in the hall way between our fellowship hall and sanctuary there is a bulletin board that has pictures of our visits to Russia as well as pictures of events and celebrations that Pastor Sergei has sent me over the years. Included are pictures of Christmas and Easter programs at the orphanage, Christmas and Easter events at your Word of Life Church with the young people and children of the congregation both singing and acting. We have been praying for your success and that the Lord would touch these young lives through your ministries. We rejoice and praise God for His answer to our common prayers.

But, we also praise God that through our common prayers, even though we are thousands of miles apart and our prayers are in Russian and English, they are one in the Lord as we are.

And, now with the new addition to your building, we anticipate that the Lord will bless your ministries and mission to your community and will grow in many and wonderful ways. Our prayers will continue to join yours daily that this may be so.

It has been my pleasure to introduce our Brother Scott to our Russian brothers and sisters. Like my first visit here five years ago, and like all those who have visited here from Good Shepherd, I know he has been touched by your faith, ministry and welcoming love. Together we will return to Good Shepherd and be your witnesses that together we are, through Him, overcoming the world by our common victory and our common faith in Him.

By nature we are uncomfortable with change. We like things to stay the way they are. However, acknowledging that we are in a constant state of change the truth is that we want things to stay the way they were.

I believe, however, that God is always calling us into a future he has prepared for us. It's a matter of trusting ourselves and our tomorrows to His care. The psalmist reminds us that we are not God and not captains of our destiny. But, we are loved creations in his hands. In other words, do not fear in the face of a changing world. But, instead have faith and live lives that reflect that faith and peace.

### **\*\* Pastor's Note Regarding Hospital Visitation \*\***

## News From the Russia Mission

As you probably remember, the Russia Mission Network held its annual conference in St. George a year ago and was quite successful but not as well attended as we would have hoped. After that conference, our Mission Co-Worker Ellen Smith decided that, for the first time, it was time to hold the conference in Russia. The conference was scheduled for September 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> outside of the city of Smolensk at the church camp of Pastor Victor Ignatenkov, the Vice President of the Baptist Union in Russia. Victor's church, Smolensk Central Baptist, is the partner church of White Memorial Presbyterian Church in Raleigh, NC.

A fire destroyed the original church camp about 15 years ago, and the new camp was built largely with funding and work provided by Presbyterian Mission and several Presbyterian churches in the United States. During mission trips to Russia, church members have helped to build the buildings and several churches' knitting and sewing groups have provided a quilt for each bed in the camp. It is a wonderful facility and was perfectly suited to hosting the conference.

We opened the conference on Friday morning. Our partners, Pastor Sergei, his wife, Nina, and son, Tima, joined us for the opening day. We were greeted by Leonid Ignatenkov, the Senior Executive Presbyter of the Smolensk region on his 60th birthday and Pastor Victor gave us a message and led us in prayer. His message was based on 2 Timothy 4:6-16, and he stressed the importance of team & partnership. He said that through this partnership God's will is done and added that we learn from Paul how to build partnerships.

There were 15 Americans partners representing five of the US partner churches. In addition, there were 23 Russians including representatives of partner churches and members of Victor's family and church who organized the conference. Each partner introduced themselves. Pastor Sergei spoke about our relationship, and he said that for them the most important thing was the sharing of faith and the breaking down of barriers. He also thanked us for helping them with the construction of their building. I said that our relationship and the depth of their faith strengthens our faith, and that we love to come and share Bible camp and pray for each other. The common thread among all of the US and the partners was the sharing of faith and ministries and giving all of us an understanding that in God's eyes we are all the same and of the global reach of the Church and of God's presence.

Ellen and Victor then spoke on their views of what partnership is. Ellen said that the things we do for one another strengthen us. Initially, the goal of partnership was to overcome cold war stereotypes. But, it has grown far beyond that. It is important for people to come and share because, among other things, we look at problems in our own communities differently because many of the problems here are the same as those in our own country. We get a new view and new ideas. We are also peacemaking when we partner with Russian churches. What we see when we visit here and what our partners see when they visit us is important, and when we come together, we inspire each other. There's nothing insignificant happening, and often the little things are as important as the big things. She closed by noting that even drinking tea together is important.

Victor said that the partnership relationship is a blessing from God that allows them to expand their ministries. He noted that they began building partnership relationships in the 1990's and many are still active today. The partnerships have allowed them to expand their ministry, and friendships have been formed that continue today. Partnership helps to form bridges between our countries. The Russian government is happy to see that the churches are building good relationships with others and that helps to keep doors open and open new doors for the Russian churches. Partnership also spurs harmony among the major churches in Russia. Victor believes that it is very valuable for Russian churches to visit partners in America noting that we learn from each other. He said that initially, they thought they would learn from us. But, we have found that we also learn from them. He also believes that it is good when a church prays for another church across the ocean.

Opening remarks were followed by a discussion of working with children in orphanages. The Russian churches badly need partner contributions to their orphanage ministries. These contributions can be craft supplies, Christian items, small gifts, knitted items (coverlets, hats, scarves, gloves), Christmas cards with handwritten messages (in Russian) for children in the orphanages (Victor can provide Russian text). There are two types of children in orphanages in Russia: true orphans whose parents have passed and social orphans whose parents simply cannot provide for them. Children of social orphans get food & teachers are paid. But, the children do not receive clothes, etc., so partner churches can help with providing those items, and clothes are the biggest need. We heard from a former orphan with special needs (visual impairment) about how much she loved having the churches come and how they helped her to be educated. She is now in college (we would call it a trade school) learning to be an artist.

The remainder of the two days was spent discussing and sharing, from both the Russian and American perspective, on how our partnerships can make a difference among Russians and how helping with those needs strengthens all of us.

## Buildings

Your Building Committee has had a busy September juggling the air conditioning usage during a hotter than normal month. Two big challenges that presented themselves like a chapter from Exodus were,

- The main CE building AC unit was failing, so we had to run it almost non-stop just to keep the building marginally cooled.
- If we turned on everything at the same time, we could create a peak demand that would require us to pay an additional "demand charge", plus risk getting put into a higher rate category as a big-time user.

This last few weeks, we took care of both of those.

We moved the relatively little-used AC unit that was added when Conklin Hall was enlarged to replace the main CE building's failing unit. This saved us the expense of new equipment. We also replaced the 20-year old AC unit that cools the offices.

Now that we have six air conditioners rather than seven, we can build snowmen in the Sanctuary in July and not exceed the demand limit set by the city.

Thanks for your patience dealing with slightly warmer weekends indoors.

Three more reminders:

- If you exit through a locked door, please check after it closes that it is actually latched.
- The Sanctuary doors, the kitchen doors and the door between the Narthex and Conklin Hall are fire doors. They can be open while a bunch of us are at church. But, please close them at the end of an activity. This will slow down the spread of a fire should one occur.
- We now have motion sensing light/fan switches in all of the bathrooms. They work so well that even Reverend Ralph's dog Freckles can turn them on. What Freckles probably doesn't know only because she is so darn sweet is that each switch has a button on it to turn the light/fan OFF when you leave. Doing so during times of light occupancy helps prevent the already warm/cool air we paid for from getting pumped out of the building.

**Emergency Contact Information:** There are at least 216 definitions of the acronym, ICE, but the one we'd like to discuss is, **IN CASE of EMERGENCY**. In a previous Newsletter article, we wrote about the importance of carrying personal contact information in your wallets and purses so that it is readily available to professionals in the event of accident or medical emergency and you have become unable to provide it. Completing an ICE form, such as the one provided online by AAA ([https://www.aaa.com/aaa/057/static/news/aaa\\_ice\\_card.pdf](https://www.aaa.com/aaa/057/static/news/aaa_ice_card.pdf)), will give first responders timely and potentially life-saving access to your pertinent and identifying information. In addition to the requested items, it would be helpful to add your blood type (if known), list of medications and whether you wish to be an organ donor. Copies of the AAA form also will be available to you in Conklin Hall.

## Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through September 22<sup>nd</sup> we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$54,100** and additional cash donations of **\$23,281** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$272,444** or about **70.9%** of our **\$384,000** goal.
