NEW BIBLES IN THE SANCTUARY

The old blue Bibles are gone. While we started back in the '90's with a Bible for every seat in the Sanctuary, over time the supply of Bibles had dwindled to the point that we had 196 seats but just 99 Bibles. We would like to have been able to order more of the blue Bibles but that edition has been out of print for more than a decade. We could have ordered new Bibles to fill in the blanks but that would have meant that the page numbers would have been different in the two editions, making for confusion for everyone.

After discussion and research, we found a new edition of the New Revised Standard Version Bible that was a good solution to our dilemma. Using a portion of the bequest we received our late secretary, Dawn Angarone, we purchased a full set of new Bibles for the Sanctuary. There is now one Hymnal and one Bible for each seat! We also bought enough Bibles so that we should not face the same issue for a long time.

The old Bibles will not be discarded. We have asked Presbytery to see if any other churches are in the same situation we were in. If any come forward, we will provide the old Bibles to them. If you would like one of the old Bibles for personal use, please see Chris Schleter.

We want to thank Carolynn Thomas and Chris Schleter for working to make the new Bibles a reality and hope that the new Bibles will fill all of us with the Holy Spirit for many years to come.



News From the Russia Mission

Scott Florence joined Rev. Ralph for this year's trip to Dorogobuzh. We asked him to keep a journal during the trip and what follows are excerpts from that journal.

Our flights from Las Vegas to Moscow went without a hitch. On our arrival in Moscow, things got interesting. Our interpreter/guide, Olga, who was filling in for Al Smith while we were in Moscow, thought she wasn't meeting us until after we got back from Dorogobuzh. We arranged to meet Olga the next morning and took a wild taxi ride to the Warsaw Hotel where we arrived about 3:00 pm.

The next morning we met Olga at the hotel after breakfast and took the Metro to a stop near Christ the Savior Cathedral where we got off and walked to the cathedral. It was very ornate and beautiful. It's hard to believe that it was completely rebuilt after Stalin had it torn down. From there we walked up to the Kremlin and Red Square. We also walked through the "Gum" shopping mall. From there we went to St. Basil's Cathedral which was spared from being torn down (thankfully). Ralph had to have lunch at Mu Mu Café, despite Olga's protestations to go somewhere else.

On Saturday, Olga took us to the train station and made sure we got on the right train (the express train to Smolensk at 11:30, a very modern train). After 3 stops (2 in "cities of military glory" and another in Gagarin which is named after the famous Russian cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin) we arrived in Safovono at 2:30 where we were met by pastor Sergei. We arrived at Sergei's house around 3:15 where we met his wife Nina and his children (Kostya and his wife Katya, Tima, Lena and Rita) and Lena's friend Sergei and Katya's sister Masha.

After dinner, we went to the church for the prayer service where we met assistant pastor Volodya who preached, then we broke into small groups of 4 to pray while standing (they always pray standing), a very moving experience despite the language barriers. Another light meal and tea (chai) were served after the service when we got back to Sergei's house.

Ralph presented Sergei with a pair of cowboy boots. I'm not sure Sergei knew what to make of them but we joked that now he needs a cowboy hat and horse.

Masha and Larissa, both from Moscow, arrived very late. They come from Novogireyevo Baptist Church to help with camp every summer (Masha with the teens and Larissa with the pre-teens). Masha also served as our interpreter while in Dorogobuzh. Masha is a PhD microbiologist and Larissa is a school teacher.

After a short bible reading and prayers while standing in a circle (a nightly ritual), we retired for the night around 11:30. This time there were only about 12 of us staying at the house so a few less than in the past. I avoided the morning competition for the only tub/shower by using it in the evening (thankfully there were 2 toilets).

After a Sunday breakfast of kasha (porridge which is served every morning with variations from oatmeal to corn meal mush) and chai, we went up to the church for the worship service at which both Ralph and I gave sermons (my very first, he was more long-winded than me [Ed. Note: Ralph disputes that]. After the service, the church ladies served a wonderful lunch and of course chai.

Before going up to the church on Monday for camp, Ralph and I had to get "registered" at what appeared to be like a county clerk's office (or DMV). That took about an hour and there was some going back and forth rather animatedly between Sergei, Masha and the clerk but in the end, we got through it and got "registered."

At camp (day 1) we met all the kids (about 15) and all the helpers including a young man (Ilya) and a young woman (Dasha) who both spoke fairly fluent English. The theme of this year's camp was the book of Genesis and creation. Ralph and I both got on the bounce house twice and played volleyball and other games (the first serve, I took a dive and got grass stains on my knees but managed not to break anything). We rotated among the 2 groups of kids throughout the day and rest of the week. At 2:00 pm (every day) a wonderful lunch was served prepared by the ladies who were there since early morning. We noted that they use only plates, cups and silverware that are washed by hand, nothing is disposable. Even though it was served every day, I could not develop a taste for Kompot which is a very sweet fruit juice mix. Everything else though was freshly prepared and very good with lots of local fresh vegetables and fruit. We also noted that they like to put ketchup on their pasta (Italians would be horrified).

At the end of the first day, they shot off confetti and Ralph and I "cut the ribbon" to officially open camp.

After camp, Sergei, Masha, Kostya, Katya and I went to the Boldino Russian Orthodox Monastery east of Dorogobuzh. As we arrived in the main church, there were 6-8 monks singing/chanting from a balcony. It was very beautiful and almost other worldly.

Flavel and his daughter (who live in Vjaz'ma and have a children's entertainment business) came to do a "dinosaur hunt" which was great fun to watch. They served borsch for the first time for lunch (we had it again later in the week). I played dodgeball and other kid's games, reverting back to my youth! At the end of the day, we drew the name of a "secret friend" who we were to bring a wrapped gift (or gifts) for the next day.

That evening, Ralph broke out the chips and mild salsa he brought which were a big hit (Kostya was later putting salsa on pasta instead of ketchup).

Thursday there were more games, bible studies and craft making plus another wonderful lunch. I turned out to be Ilya's secret friend. He gave me an assortment of Russian chocolates, candy, a bag of something like very small bagels that are popular to have with tea and Kvass (a popular Slavic fermented but mostly non-alcoholic beverage made from rye bread).

After camp, Sergei, Masha, Ralph and I went to look at the ruins of an old estate and orthodox church south of Dorogobuzh then the WWII memorial on the hill above town (to commemorate the 1,827 killed in the battle of Dorogobuzh).

After lunch on Friday, the last day of camp, we took a bus to Safavono to see the new Lion King movie (which was all in Russian). Ralph and I caught up a little on our sleep deprivation during the movie.

On Saturday morning, Sergei took Masha and Larissa to Safovono to catch the 10:00 am train to Smolensk where they were going to spend the weekend. Before we left, Lena (who is an art student at a college in Smolensk) offered us any two of her paintings we wished to take. After goodbyes, Sergei took us to catch the train back to Moscow at 2:00 pm and helped us board. We arrived there at 5:00 pm where Olga met us at the train station and took us back to the Warsaw Hotel.

On Sunday, with Olga as our guide/interpreter, we attended services at the Novogireyevo Baptist Church in the morning (where we were warmly received and Ralph was invited to share our experience in Dorogobuzh before the congregation, probably at great potential peril to the church because of the Russian "anti-terrorism" laws) and then the Moscow Protestant Chaplaincy in the afternoon (where a Catholic priest from Germany who was filling in gave an excellent sermon). We had a late lunch/early dinner at the Grabli Café on Arbat Street (the Grabli and Mu Mu are what I would call Russian style cafeterias).

Monday was a sightseeing day. We went to the State Historic Museum where I got separated from Ralph and Olga and in spite of what Ralph might say, I was not lost, I knew where I was at all times, I just didn't know where they were. But we finally found each other as I was waiting right by the main entrance. From there, we walked back to Arbat Street and had lunch at a Georgian Restaurant. After lunch we took the metro to the Ismailovsky Flea Market where we bought gifts and souvenirs.

Ralph and I had dinner with a Rotarian from the Moscow East Rotary Club (a past-president and current club secretary). They weren't having their regular club meeting that night so we met with her to exchange club banners and take photos.

On our last day in Moscow we went to Victory Park (dedicated to the "Great Patriotic War" aka WWII) and through the museum there, then back to Arbat Street for Ralph to look for one more gift. Then we took the metro back to the hotel and walked to Gorky Park and along the Moscow River across from the memorial to Peter the Great.

Departure day arrived and Olga took us to the airport where we said our thanks and goodbyes. We boarded our flight to Helsinki at 10:00 am. The flight was slightly delayed so we had a tight connection with the flight to JFK. As a result my bag made it to JFK but Ralph's didn't. We waited too long for his bag and missed our 4:00 pm flight to Las Vegas so we got put on a later flight that was supposed to leave at 6:00 pm but didn't take off until 8:00 pm. When we arrived in Las Vegas, Ralph's bag was there but mine was not. We took the midnight shuttle back to St. George and arrived home at almost 4:00 am August 15th after 30+ hours of traveling. My bag was delivered to the house the next day.

All in all it was a great trip, very enlightening and enriching both spiritually and culturally. As Chris has said before, we profess our faith while the folks in Dorogobuzh live their faith. Sergei and Nina are gracious hosts. They don't have a lot materially (but are rich in spirit). What they have, they share freely.

Buildings

It has been a relatively quiet summer, building-wise, but there are a few items to share with the congregation.

A huge thank-you to Guy Schultzman who did some awesome work (again) in our kitchen. Guy removed the commercial dishwasher that we never used and installed new cabinetry with a butcher block cutting board in its place. That alone is impressive, but he then took the 20-amp circuit and ran a ground-fault protected outlet into the main room of Conklin Hall, near the kitchen door. This "new" circuit will be available for plugging in crock pots, warming plates, and amplifiers should we ever decide to host a KISS concert. Thanks, Guy!

- Our new smart thermostats are already paying dividends, and not just with saving energy. When Bike and Build was using the CE building in July, I received a phone call that the CE building was not cooling. I received that call in Brussels, Belgium. Upon opening my laptop, I could see the AC was running, but not keeping up with the 100+ degree temps. We called in our HVAC technician and he determined that refrigerant had leaked out of the system and added some more. The stuff is expensive as it is not made anymore in the USA, but it did the trick. Unfortunately, after a few weeks, the new coolant leaked out again, so this time we added more coolant and some magic goo in the line to hopefully plug up any leaks. Sometimes it works, sometimes it doesn't. This time it didn't, so it's time for a new AC system for the CE building. We got 20 years out of the current system which is above average. That's the bad news.
- The good news is that we have been analyzing the data from our smart thermostats and can now accurately replace the old equipment with properly-sized modern equipment that will make the CE building just as comfortable, but for less money each month. We are also going to make some other changes that will partition the CE building into two separate climate zones that match our weekly use, helping to keep building users efficiently warm in the winter and cool in the summer, for less money.

The Building Committee, comprised of the hardest working and most-brilliant minds in the congregation other than all the other ministries, is meeting on Sept. 4th at 10:00 am. If you would like to join this group, or just want to complain about the leaking drinking fountain (again), we welcome any attendees and new members. There is a test, but if you can bring donuts, you'll pass easily. We'll be in Conklin Hall.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through August 25th we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$54,100** and additional cash donations of **\$22.056** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$271,219** or about **70.6%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
