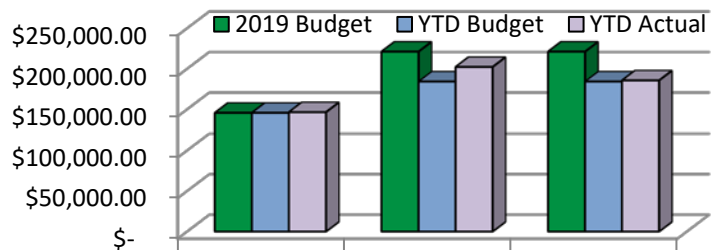

Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

*And an angel of the Lord suddenly stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them; and they were terribly frightened. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of great joy which will be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger." And suddenly there appeared with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying,
"Glory to God in the highest,
And on earth peace among men with whom He is pleased."

It couldn't possibly have anything to do with my advancing years that I neither remember the professor or the class from my seminary days. But, what I do remember is his invaluable advice which I have followed throughout my career. That advice was "If you fight Christmas you will lose!"

In a previous community that I served as a pastor, a colleague from another church and denomination decided one year to ignore such wise advice, and he decided to forbid any decorating or decorations until Christmas day itself. I am positive his name continues to be mentioned this time every year. But, now mentioned by only a few since his tenure was very short.

Let's face it, Christmas has in our world taken on a life of its own. In today's world the first carols and snowmen appear now in a local stores before Halloween. The holiday is celebrated by almost everyone everywhere with Santa being ever more prominent; and, with time, overwhelming both manger and child.

However, to a degree my former colleague was correct in trying to keep the two church seasons Advent (the 23 days before Christmas) and Christmas itself with a different focus. Advent remembers the first coming and looks forward to the second coming of Christ. While Christmas celebrates the birth itself.

There is the old familiar saying, "If you can't beat them, join them." If we can't find Jesus in the popular and secular Christmas season, perhaps we should bring him with us by joining the season and enjoying the season while looking far beyond December 25th to God's promised coming day. Let that hope fill our hearts with cheer that will last 365 days a year.

I have argued that for the body of Christ the true Biblical text for Christmas is found in neither Matthew or Luke, but instead in John:

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His [a]only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life. 17 For God did not send the Son into the world to judge the world, but that the world might be saved through Him.

As I wrote to Olga when I sent the cards, "our Russian cursive may not be readable but it should express our love for the children and, in any case, give them a good laugh". We sent 40 cards to Pastor Sergei and 54 to Pastor Victor for the orphans in the Smolensk area. Start practicing writing in Russian – we're going to do it again next year.

Beginning on December 1st and continuing until the 22nd, there will be a card in Conklin Hall for everyone to sign wishing Pastor Sergei, his family and congregation a Merry Christmas. Since they use the Orthodox calendar, they will celebrate Christmas on January 6th, so we have plenty of time to get the card to them before "their" Christmas.

During the last month, our aging AEDs (Automatic Electronic Defibrillators) were replaced with new ones. A big thank you to the Parish Health Ministry for looking into finding the units that will best serve us. If you don't already know, one AED is located in the CE Building and the other is in the Chapel, adjacent to the Narthex. They are designed to be as easy as possible to operate and will walk the user through each step.

I have been working my way cleaning and reorganizing stored items in Conklin Hall and our outside storage building. So far, so good with several new storage racks put to good use. During December, I hope to continue by sorting and organizing the Christmas decorations.

You may also notice in the coming month that we have some new door sensors and Wi-Fi cameras installed to help monitor unlatched doors. The equipment is neither sophisticated or expensive. But, it will help us keep the building secure when unoccupied.

Operation Christmas Child: Many thanks to everyone who filled the 110 Christmas Child shoeboxes during our annual support of this amazing project. Parish Health Ministry

December Brown Bag Luncheon: *Holiday Blues Make Me Sad.* We encourage you to attend our last Brown Bag Luncheon of 2019 when we will be discussing how to cope with feelings of sadness or grief that you or someone you know may be experiencing during this festive holiday time. Grief experiences may be in our past or perhaps be more recent but the result is the same – at what should be a joyous time of year, we just can't bring ourselves to relate to that joy. Join us on Wednesday, December 4th, at Noon. Reverend Ralph will be our presenter, and we will think about and discuss this important topic.

We will have beverages and dessert for you and look forward to seeing you and your friends.

New AED Equipment: Thanks to a member of our committee, Vicky Westland and approved by Session, we now have two new AED (Automated External Defibrillator) devices. Vicky researched AED's and those purchased were selected because their operating systems seemed to be particularly easy to be used by a non-professional. Information about vital signs during an event is recorded, saved, and available to treating physicians. One AED device is located in a box on the right wall in the Chapel in the sanctuary building. The second device can be found in a box in the Christian Education building on the right hand wall just past Rev. Ralph's office. The AED emergency boxes also contain blood pressure monitors and Narcan Nasal Spray that anyone may administer to counteract the life-threatening effects of a suspected opioid overdose. Don't wait until an emergency occurs and knowing where to retrieve the

equipment might help save a life. Take a moment to check out the exact location of the AED boxes and their contents. And should you be involved in such an emergency – don't forget to CALL 911!

Flu Shots: It's not too late to get your FLU SHOT if you have not already done so.

Statistics show that reported cases of flu are increasing. The shot IS effective and if you are 65 or older, ask for the high dose shot, which is formulated to better trigger your immune system. In addition to Tamiflu and Relenza; there is a new anti-viral med, Xofluza, and if it is given within the first 48 hours of diagnosis, may shorten the severity and length of flu illness. It goes without saying that any treatment sought should be with the approval of your medical provider.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through October 20th we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$54,100** and additional cash donations of **\$24,785** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$273,948** or about **71.3%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
