

Parish Health Ministry

DECEMBER BROWN BAG LUNCHEON: "Holiday Blues Make Me Sad." None of us is immune to experiencing the feelings of grief and sadness resulting from any life loss such as loss of a loved one, a job, a home, or even physical ability. There is no time limit for enduring these feelings, which can be overwhelming and impactful on our lives for only a brief time or for years or months to come. Our speaker, Rev. Ralph, led a discussion of what grieving can mean to each of us and proposed that there are certain truths that prevail about all forms of grief. But, they may not be experienced in a set order. Feeling sad is a natural reaction to loss and the grieving person will have to work through stages of denial, anger, bargaining, depression. Finally acceptance of the loss, while all the while receiving messages of condolence from others who may not know what to say or simply may avoid saying anything. There is no, "get over it" or "I've been there" that can erase the sense of emptiness, and no amount of self-soothing with overindulgence in food or alcohol will make things better. The best therapy is to allow oneself time to grieve while interacting with others, seeking sunlight, and leaning on a personal faith and the support of a faith community or professional counselor.

Knowing that others have walked and are walking the same paths of grief can be comforting, and help is available. Rev. Ralph shared a video produced by CBS on their Morning Show in November with Susan Spencer, which explores the difficult task of reconciling loss in our lives. It may be accessed by doing a search for CBS, Morning Show, November 10, 2019, "With Deepest Sympathy: The complications of coping with grief." In addition, Good Shepherd Church hosts a Grief and Loss Support Group on the first and third Wednesdays of each month at 6:30pm.

FEBRUARY BROWN BAG LUNCHEON: We have had requests to feature a discussion about living with diabetes and our February speaker is well able to be our resource person on that topic. On Wednesday, February 12th at Noon we will welcome Brent McFadden, PharmD, from Brent's Pharmacy and Diabetes Care as he speaks about "The Care and Feeding of Diabetes." He will discuss what its like to live with being a diabetic and also address the diagnosis of pre-diabetes. Plan to join us for an educational experience meant not only for those diagnosed but also for caretakers or family members of diabetics and pre-diabetics and anyone else interested in learning more about a disease, which is becoming alarmingly prevalent in our society.

The committee shall have at least three other members from the congregation at large. These members shall be nominated by the previous nominating committee or the congregation. If nominated by the previous nominating committee, the other members shall not be actively serving ruling Elders.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through December 22nd we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$25,620** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$276,783** or about **72.1%** of our **\$384,000** goal.
