

For much of the Christian world the church season of Lent will begin this month on February 26th, and end on April 12th. I will say more about that in my newsletter article next month.

What you may not be aware of that the season of Lent is one of the oldest traditions of the Christian Church, a season of 40 days, symbolic of Jesus forty days in the wilderness in spiritual preparation for his mission that comes to its fulfilment with the dawn of Resurrection Sunday, Easter Morning. Church seasons are primarily twofold in purpose, for our spiritual growth and education. Our time of preparation to hear again those wondrous words, "He is Risen, He is Risen indeed!", and experience the renewal of our own life, faith and hope, not only as individuals but as well as the body of Christ, His Church.

The question then for us now as we approach this time is just how? While some traditions encourage a temporary sacrifice of something we love to eat or do, I tend to believe a far better approach is to add to our lives and routines some activity that will lead to growth such as a Bible study or class, attend a service that you have not attended before, and of course follow those traditions and activities that lead you closer to Christ but as well closer to your brother and sister in the Lord.

Throughout this month's newsletter you will find many opportunities to do just that. I invite you to prayerfully look and see prayerfully what different you may take through this year's journey of Lent. It is my hope and prayer you will be led to join with me on this journey of preparation and celebration.


Buildings

In between putting up Christmas decorations and taking them down, I reorganized the west storage building. During this same time, I engaged in a father-son bonding activity with my son by building new shelving to help organize the available space.

I made a big shopping trip to Costco to resupply cleaning items, paper products, etc. I placed a few of each item in the Conklin Hall closets and placed the rest out on the new shelving. I'll restock as needed.

I believe I finally have the heat programming figured out with the new smart system. The primary problem has been the sanctuary as it is such a big room to heat. The smart thermostats will definitely have it warmed up by the start of worship, but the room definitely feels hot during that warmup time as the furnaces are blasting hot air into the room. The simple solution was to get the sanctuary up to temperature for about 1 hour before the first occupancy. That seems to do the trick and heat is relatively inexpensive for the extra hour.

We just received our electric bill for the month and I thought I would share this graph showing how our energy usage dropped last summer after the investments we made last spring.

Christian Education

Lent is fast approaching so two reminders. First, Rev. Ralph will be leading the annual Lenten Study beginning Monday, March 2nd at 5:45 PM in the Christian Education building. This year's theme is Galatians.

Second, look for your personal copy of the Lenten devotional. The theme for 2020 is Becoming a Beloved Community: A Matthew 25 Journey to the Cross. Your personal Lenten reflection will feature "beautiful ancient Christian mosaics throughout the devotional. Just the way mosaics are constructed, we are invited to reflect on how our little tile piece could be added to the beloved community where we live." The devotional features prayers and reflections by 19 ordained ministers, chaplains, lay pastors and ruling elders from the Presbytery of the Pacific, all of whom share a common passion for following Jesus.

Special Sundays include February 2nd when we celebrate the service of over 150 Presbyterian chaplains who provide spiritual ministry to those standing duty and enduring hardships for our nation. On February 9th, we will lift up the PCUSA health ministries including our own Parish Health Ministry here at Good Shepherd. And February 16th is one of our oldest ecumenical days of prayer when we join in prayer for students across the world and for those who aspire to be students.

Finally, on Sundays February 23rd and March 1st, those who are interested in learning more about what is being done to address global climate change are invited to join me in the Christian Ed building following coffee hour. I will report on the involvement of faith groups at the UN Climate Change Negotiations in Madrid, Spain. In December, I was fortunate to attend along as part of the World Council of Churches delegation.

Brown Bag Luncheon: We invite you to attend the first Luncheon of the year when our speaker, Brent McFadden, PharmD, of Brent's Pharmacy and Diabetes Care will discuss "The Care and Feeding of Diabetes." Returns on the recent questionnaire distributed to the congregation showed that there is an interest in exploration of the diagnosis of diabetes. Brent is qualified to speak about what it means to live with Types 1 and 2 Diabetes and Prediabetes. The Southwest Utah Public Health Department states that nearly 55,000 adults in Southwest Utah are unaware they have prediabetes and could be at risk for becoming diabetic in the future. If you have questions about what this all too frequent diagnosis could mean to you or someone you know, please join us at Noon on Wednesday, February 19th in Conklin Hall. Senior Ministries

Soup and Fellowship: Our January event focused on Ann McLuckie who is a Wildlife Biologist working out of the Washington County Hurricane Fish and Game office. Her presentation was most informative and interesting with slides and graphs to explain the desert tortoise, her area of care. A few brief highlights are: 12,000 acres around us are dedicated to these animals, some have radio tracking devices. Many events have led to their decline in numbers since 2002, such as drought, fires, and disease due to lack of food and shell trauma. They have a high mortality rate of their eggs and they don't produce many in the first place. Maturity is 25 years before they can reproduce. Work is in place to restore the habitat lost to drought and fire with exotic plants and grasses. 508 tortoises have been translocated successfully over the years. It is estimated there are 13 tortoises per square kilometer. Currently, we have a local issue concerning the land to the north of us, dedicated to the tortoise, but being sought by developers. If you care about this, ask Ann what you can do to preserve this land. Bottom line: DON'T HANDLE THE TORTOISE. It can be a death sentence for the tortoise. Thank you, Ann, for this engrossing and fascinating hour of "getting to know you." Delicious soups, salads and "turtles" were offered by the committee.

At Noon on February 12th in Conklin Hall, our Soup and Fellowship will feature Tom and Vici Noble. This will be yet another worthwhile presentation for your enlightenment. Their title is "Stans by Us: Impressions of Central Asia": a little history, a little culture, little religion and a little geography. Typical food from the region will be served and, as always, lunch is free. This is not a travel log.

Card Party: Our monthly card party is the third Wednesday of each month at 1:00 pm in Conklin Hall. In February the date is the 19th. We continue to offer the opportunity to play cards, backgammon, rummikub and bridge if we can get four players to participate. We like new card games but usually play hearts or rummy of some kind. Session News

Session held their monthly meeting on January 19, 2020. Here is a synopsis of their actions:

- Approved, at a special meeting on December 22, 2019, Marjorie Bayle as a nominee for Deacon.
- Accepted Paul Wiens as a new member to be received into membership on January 26, 2020.
- Approved the adoption of a resolution stating that a portion (\$3,000) of the Pastor's Reimbursable Expenses be allocated to the Health Reimbursement Arrangement for the year 2020.
- Established a Deacon Fellowship Fund and to set aside \$1,000 from the Mission-Outreach Set Aside Fund for said fund.
- Approved to modify the previously approved 2020 Budget to increase Christian Education Budget by \$1,500 and to increase the Building Budget by \$400 for total increase of \$1,900. These amounts will be included in the 2020 Budget as presented in the Annual Congregational Meeting on January 26, 2020.
- Approved a contract for annual tree and shrub trimming at a cost not to exceed \$500.
- Approved, as per the approved 2020 General Fund Budget, to move \$5,000 from General Fund to Russia Mission Fund and approved the Churchwide Mission Donations as follows: \$3,000 to Ellen and Al Smith, \$1,000 to support the Moscow Protestant Chaplaincy's programs for drug and alcohol rehabilitation, and \$1,500 to Presbytery for general Churchwide Mission.
- Appointed Carolynn Thomas as Treasurer for 2020.
- Appointed Ruth Ann Horvath as Session Clerk for 2020.
- Appointed Gloria McGilloway as Commissioner to the Presbytery for 2020.
- Approved the dates of Stated Session Meetings on the second Sunday of each month following worship service in the Christian Education Building in 2020 and January 2021.
- Approved the following Communion dates: the first Sunday of each month during 2020 and January 2021, Early Prayer/Communion Services each week during 2020 and January 2021, Maundy Thursday Agape Service, and to authorize the Visitation Elder to distribute communion to the shut-ins in 2020 and January 2021.
- A Meeting of the Corporation was held on January 19, 2020. Election of 2020 Corporate Officers were as follows: Chris Schleter was elected as President, Gloria McGilloway was elected as Vice President, Ruth Ann Horvath was elected as Secretary, and Carolynn Thomas was elected as Treasurer.
- The Board of the Corporation voted to submit to the Congregation an amendment to the By-Laws to bring them into conformance with the Book of Order as follows: ARTICLE 6 Nominating Committee: The committee shall have at least three other members from the congregation at large. These members shall be nominated by the previous nominating committee or the congregation. If nominated by the previous nominating committee, the other members shall not be actively serving ruling Elders.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through January 26th we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$26,905** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$278,068** or about **72.4%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
