COVID-19 Is Not Getting Good Shepherd Down

Even as the COVID-19 crisis begins to wind down, at least a little, we continue to observe restrictions to our movement and social interactions and will continue to do so for some time to come. Although Southern Utah has been affected to a lesser degree than other places, restrictions placed on us by state, county and city officials continue to be part of our everyday lives.

Even as the state hopes to begin removing some of the current restrictions about May 1st, they will continue to recommend that we remain at home as much as possible. When we are out and about, health experts continue to urge us to wear face coverings and maintain social distancing. Stores continue to limit the number of customers inside at any one time.

With the knowledge that the virus is most virulent in those over 60 and those with underlying medical conditions (most of our congregation), we will likely be worshiping, studying the Bible and joining in fellowship remotely for some time to come. As Rev. Ralph has said each Sunday during our recorded church service, "We will resume our normal activities only when the Southwest Utah Public Health Department deems it safe to do so.

Worship

We will continue to share worship each Sunday through a recorded service that we make available on our Sermon Network site. Steve Talley provides the music and we publish both a bulletin and lyrics for the hymns sung during the service so everyone can join in from home. To access the weekly service, visit our website, gspcsg.org, and you will find a link to our Sermon Network page on the homepage where the Sunday worship schedule normally appears.

Bible Studies

With local restaurants closed and access to our own buildings restricted to groups of 10 or fewer people, the Internet allows us to gather virtually to study the Word of God. All of our regular weekday Bible Studies will be held online using Zoom Video Conferencing. To join one of our weekday Bible Studies using Zoom, please email Rev. Ralph for an invitation. The Bible Studies are a way for all of us to continue to learn about our Lord and to share time together.

Virtual Fellowship

Since we are not worshiping at church each Sunday, we also are not gathering for Fellowship after worship – at least not in person. Like our Bible Studies, Rev. Ralph hosts a "Virtual Coffee Hour" every Sunday at 11:30 am. This fun event has been well attended since our shut down in March. Attire and choice of beverage are completely up to you. To join our Virtual Fellowship using Zoom, please email Rev. Ralph for an invitation.



Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

It has been noted in a number of our Zoom Bible Studies how this year's scriptures and church season ironically speak loudly to our current situation. Such is the case, with this lesson from John being particularly so.

The scene is three days following Jesus death. The disciples, soon to be apostles, are shut in, socially distancing themselves out of fear of what may happen to them. Not knowing what to do or where to go as they wait in fear and isolation.

But then the scene changes, sorrow becomes rejoicing, and fear is replaced with peace. What brought about these wondrous changes? The presence of Jesus who has come to them changes everything.

We now find ourselves in the second month of our time of fear and social distancing; and while we may need to continue these practices for a while longer, there is a place we can go to find both joy and peace. That place is the presence of our Lord.

Can we take a little time from cleaning and organizing our closets for the third time and take the time to pray together? Can we take some time to read God's word of hope and promise and, when possible, use the modern God-given tools of our technology to worship, and share fellowship with our brothers and sisters in faith? Then we too might discover His presence with us and hear again in our hearts and lives those wonderful words, "*Peace be with you*", and also "*and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age.*" (Luke 28:20)

** Pastor's Note Regarding Hospital Visitation **

Please be advised that, due to COVID-19 restrictions, I am unable to visit anyone in any of our area medical facilities. Once things return to normal, please keep in mind that with the federal laws that govern the privacy of medical records, hospitals are no longer allowed to give out any information regarding patients to visitors, including clergy. Unless a visitor requests a specific name, the hospital desk is not allowed to give out any information, including religious affiliation.

So, if you or a family member is hospitalized please alert the Pastor, your Deacon, or the church office. Otherwise, we will not be informed of your presence there and will be unable to assist or offer pastoral care.

A Message from your Stewardship Committee

During these challenging times our faith and reliance on God help us to cope with the uncertainty of our lives and those of others in our community. The church continues to fulfill its mission both in our lives, the lives of our community and in the world at large.

As many of you have no doubt heard, our church applied for and received a Paycheck Protection Program loan of \$13,400 to be used solely for salaries and some utilities and only by the recipient of the loan. Several members have voiced objections to our having applied for this funding arguing that pledge revenue will come in, our church is in a good position financially and that other businesses needed the money more than we did. Your Stewardship Committee would like to explain the rationale for our having applied for the loan.

Our church runs on faith that donations will continue to meet our expenses. When the annual budget is approved each year by our Session and "blessed" by the congregation, this action begins our annual fiduciary responsibility to meet the promises made to our employees, contractors, and mission outreach efforts. Now that our funding sources – pledges and loose offerings – have been impacted by the need to shut our doors, the Session and Congregation needs to seriously review our financial situation.

Our reserves have been set aside and came to be by all the donations made to the church over the twenty-seven years it has been in existence. From the widows "mite" to larger donations, these monies need to remain intact to assure our church can continue to meet their financial promises. No one knows how long we will be required to shut our doors. Will it be another two months? Will this virus issue return and we are required to close during the Fall and Winter? Will we be faced with this same issue next year?

While it is true that pledges do continue to be received, both by mail and electronically, our total offering revenue for March and April was down by over \$31,000 or about 65% from last year. March pledge revenue was nearly \$5,000 below last year and April, through the week of April 19th is nearly \$18,000 below last year. Our March loose offerings were down nearly \$4,000 from last year and April is down nearly \$5,000. In addition, we have not yet received pledges, which make up about 65% of our offering revenue, that fully fund our budget. Without loose offerings, we would not be able to continue to pay our staff and keep our buildings operational. Ensuring that no employees are laid off is the purpose of the PPP loans, and we need to continue to pay our employees during this time. The loan will cover salaries and utilities for about 2 months. It should also be noted that the loose offerings that we have lost due to not having services are very unlikely to be made up during the rest of the year.

It is true that we have a reserve of just over \$45,000. With our current revenue and with fixed expenses of about \$15,000 per month, that reserve will be exhausted sometime in July. Once the reserve is exhausted, we will be forced to borrow from other funds, many of which were donated to the church for specific purposes, without the assurance that we will be able to replenish those funds in the near future.

Without the proceeds from the PPP Loan we have received, the Session either would need to stop paying some or all of our employees or put out a plea for very large donations from all of us to continue to meet our budget obligations. Could any of us stand up and donate an amount equal to this loan of \$13,400? Or donate another \$45,000 when our reserves are depleted?

We want to note that all churches in the Presbytery of Utah were encouraged by Presbytery to apply for these loans and most have done so. In addition, at the last Interfaith Council meeting, all member churches in our area that qualified to apply for a loan had done so.

We are sensitive to the fact that small businesses are hurting. But, whether we like to believe it or not we are also a small business, and our goal is to continue our mission with as little disruption as is possible during the current crisis.

We thank you for your continued support.

Buildings

While we have not been able to meet collectively in person this last month, the buildings are still there and need some love.

I shut off most of the utilities when this whole pandemic thing started, although right now is not a high period for energy consumption.

The Assistant to the Assistant Building Elder, Vicky, has continued to check the AED's weekly. Additionally, she updated the first aid kits at the church. I argued that some of the items with a 1997 expiration date could easily go another few months (or years), but I was outvoted. So there are fresh first aid items if we should need them. We have also installed simple eye-wash stations in the two buildings, in the custodial closets. These will be available for those that want to ease into Matthew 7:3, "Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye?"

Next time you see Guy Schultzman, please thank him for doing some plumbing upgrades with the supply lines for some of our sinks. As if that wasn't enough, he oversaw the installation of solar screening on the south side of the CE building. This will help us reduce air conditioning demands during our warmer months and balance the temps between the north and south sides.

Several people including me drop by the church throughout the week and I want to thank them for helping to keep an eye on things.

Impact of COVID-19: It's certainly not "new news" these days that we each find our lives as we knew them upended and impacted by the Coronavirus and all it entails. Sadly, there are always those in society, who find a way to take advantage and successfully profit from troubling times. They, and others, seize on the current unrest and uncertainty to take advantage of the fact that people sequestered at home may respond to email, text, social media, promos or phone calls when they usually might not have done so. Remember to never click on a link in an email, which is uninvited or looks unfamiliar. You could be inviting a virus into your computer.

Currently, there is no Coronavirus vaccine even though you might be enticed by amazing offers to purchase one. Bogus potions, regimens and treatments may be touted for the prevention and cure of the virus when in reality, there is no "magic bullet" that, through controlled scientific testing, has been proven to be effective. The IRS, Social Security Administration, Medicare and Health and Human Services will NEVER contact you by telephone/robocall or email to ask for personal information, such as your Social Security number or for money. Still, other scams and fraudulent sources may offer the purchase of personal test kits. The only authentic, at-home test kit is one which recently has been authorized by the FDA and may be ordered online with doctor's approval. The specimen is collected and then mailed back to LabCorp for analysis. At this time, first responders and health workers are prioritized for its use.

As always, if something sounds too good to be true, it probably isn't. Rely on reputable sources for your information; and, if you have doubt about the veracity of a message or text, "phone a friend" for advice. Protect yourself - not only your physical and mental self but also your financial self and stay safe.

Session held their monthly meeting on April 5, 2020. Here is a synopsis of their actions:

- Approved by e-vote on March 25, 2020, to continue paying Steve Tally for organist services per his contract during the Coronavirus emergency.
- Approved the observance of a virtual Sacrament of Communion on Resurrection Sunday's service, April 12, 2020, during the virtual worship service on-line. Members will be instructed to use their own bread and wine, grape juice, or water.
- Approved to apply for an SBA loan in the estimated amount of \$18,000 though the State Bank of Southern Utah using the SBA Paycheck Protection Program. The amount is to be spent during the eight weeks following the funding of our request an is to be used to pay salaries and utilities.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through February 16th we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$29,940** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$281,103** or about **73.2%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
