### **COVID-19 Restrictions Continue**

We continue to observe restrictions to our movement and social interactions and will continue to do so for some time to come. Restrictions placed on us by state, county and city officials continue to be part of our everyday lives.

Even as businesses reopen, the state and the Southwest Utah Health Department (<u>swuhealth.org</u>) continue to recommend that we remain at home as much as possible. That is especially true for those over the age of 65 and those with underlying health conditions. When we are out and about, and with cases and hospitalizations on the rise in our area, health experts continue to urge us to wear face coverings and maintain social distancing.

Knowing that the virus is most virulent in those over 60 and those with underlying medical conditions (most of our congregation), we will continue to worship, study the Bible and join in fellowship remotely for some time to come. As Rev. Ralph has said each Sunday during our recorded church service, "We will resume our normal activities only when the Southwest Utah Public Health Department deems it safe to do so without restrictions."

#### **Worship**

We continue to share worship each Sunday through a recorded service that we make available on our Sermon Network site. We publish both a bulletin and lyrics for the hymns sung during the service so everyone can join in from home. To access the weekly service, visit our website, <a href="mailto:gspcsg.org">gspcsg.org</a>, and you will find a link to our Sermon Network page on the homepage where the Sunday worship schedule normally appears.

#### **Bible Studies**

With local restaurants closed and access to our own buildings restricted, the Internet allows us to gather virtually to study the Word of God. All of our regular weekday Bible Studies will be held online using Zoom Video Conferencing. To join one of our weekday Bible Studies using Zoom, please email Rev. Ralph for an invitation. The Bible Studies are a way for all of us to continue to learn about our Lord and to share time together.

#### **Virtual Fellowship**

Since we are not worshiping at church each Sunday, we also are not gathering for Fellowship after worship – at least not in person. Like our Bible Studies, Rev. Ralph hosts a "Virtual Coffee Hour" every Sunday at 11:30 am. This fun event has been well attended since our shut down in March. Attire and choice of beverage are completely up to you. 

# Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

Love is patient, love is kind and is not jealous; love does not brag and is not arrogant, <sup>5</sup>does not act unbecomingly; it does not seek its own, is not provoked, does not take into account a wrong suffered, <sup>6</sup>does not rejoice in unrighteousness, but rejoices with the truth; <sup>7</sup>bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. <sup>8</sup>Love never fails;

<sup>13</sup>But now faith, hope, love, abide these three; but the greatest of these is love.

1 Corinthians 13:4-8a,13 New American Standard Bible (NASB)



Well, here we are again. Another month of pandemic has come and gone, and not much has changed. We continue to wait for the day when we can come together. We continue to look forward to the day when we can pray, sing and worship in our sanctuary, in the same room. Unfortunately, the day we can do so safely has not yet arrived. I am asked almost daily to predict the day that will be and will do the moment my crystal ball comes back from the cleaners. Unfortunately, the crystal ball cleaners have never been considered an "essential business" and remains closed.

However, I can assure that day will come. Until then how are we to live out our faith in these troubling days? I believe in Paul's words to the Corinthians, and we have some very substantial clues.

To begin with Paul wrote this letter in the Greek language. In the Greek language there are several words that translate into English as "Love". The word Paul uses here is "Agape", the Greek word for "Divine Love". This is the kind of Love God has for us.

Paul begins with the many facets this kind of Love has, beginning with "patient". God is patient with us, thank God. Perhaps in getting through these days of distance and isolation we need to have patience - with ourselves and with God. Paul summarizes in verse 13 the various ways this patient love is lived out: *But now faith, hope, love, abide these three; but the greatest of these is love.* 

To live through these days, we need to live as God's people, our Lord's people, of faith. We need to Trust in the living Christ's presence and Spirit to be present with us, leading us in His way.

In living through these days, we need to be our Lord's people of Hope. Knowing that better days are coming, we will hopefully be a better, stronger and loving world, nation and body when that day comes.

And finally, we are to be our Lords embodiment of Love in and to a broken and fearful world. We are to be God's agents of faith, hope and Love to each other and to our neighbor as we make this journey together.

As Paul concludes while all are important, the most important aspect of our common lives and faith is "Agape", God's Love. In these days and the days ahead, we are called to reside and rely upon this Love, for surely it is His Love that will get us through, together.

# **Buildings**

Guy Schultzman and I are beginning to look at modifications to our HVAC systems to see what can be done to tune them for our current pandemic, rather than for maximum energy efficiency. There are several considerations:

- Saving energy means recycling the same conditioned air over and over again. That's not true just at Good Shepherd, but generally true everywhere.
- Our typical low humidity air is more effective at spreading viruses than air at a higher humidity, so we are looking at how we can add humidifiers to our system.
- Adding fresh air to the system is obviously good, so we are looking at adding equipment to increase the amount of fresh air that gets introduced before it is heated or cooled.

Whatever we do will be a compromise. More "fresh air" is always a good thing, but it means increased energy costs as it will be like air conditioning your home with some windows open.

Still, it doesn't cost us anything to educate ourselves, explore possibilities and do the calculus of risk vs. cost. Of course, nothing exists at this time to insure 100% removal of viruses from the air, but a reduction could be part of a solution.

### **Christian Education**

Halfway through 2020, Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church members continue to participate in Bible studies while we await a safe reopening of our church. Even in the face of the pandemic, the PC(USA) carries on with its life and mission in creative ways. The General Assembly scheduled to be held in Baltimore at the end of June became the first "virtual" General Assembly in the church's history.

Significantly, the Co-Moderators elected for the next two years broke new ground. Ms. Elona Street-Stewart, the executive of the Synod of Lakes and Prairies, and a descendant of the Delaware Nanticoke tribe, is the first Native American to serve as a General Assembly moderator. Previously, she had been the Associate for Racial Ethnic Ministries and Community Empowerment beginning in 1994. Her Co-Moderator is the Rev. Gregory Bentley, pastor of Fellowship Presbyterian Church in Huntsville, AL. Rev. Bentley is African-American making this the first team where both Co-Moderators are people of color. Fellowship Presbyterian Church was very active in the civil rights movement of the late 1950's and in the 1960's. It is an Earth Care congregation, and follows five Core Principles: Passionate Worship, Radical Hospitality, Intentional Faith Development, Risk-Taking Witness and Service, and Extravagant Generosity. Both are looking forward to serving the church at this critical time.

On other fronts, the PC(USA) is active in facing the challenges of the pandemic. Here are some highlights:

- Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Grants (PDA): \$2.7 million has been committed to international response (\$1 million), and grants to synods and presbyteries and their congregations to support work in response to the COVID-19 outbreak.
- Focus on the Navajo Nation: In response to the horrible impact of the virus on the Navajo residents, the Synod of the Southwest and PDA have raised \$275,000 for pandemic relief. The Synod and its presbyteries have a goal of raising \$372,000. Anyone wanting to contribute can do so through the Presbytery of the Grand Canyon.
- Supplies of fabric were purchased for Navajo churches to make masks. Food and essentials are distributed to isolated
  elderly who cannot travel to stores. In addition, outreach and assistance occurs on other reservations that have not
  been impacted by the pandemic as much as the Navaho nation. This includes the Gila River Indian Reservation, for
  example.
- Outreach in Haiti: The pandemic has had serious impacts on Haiti where 80% of the people live on less that \$2 per day, lack clean water and struggle to feed themselves and their families. The PC(USA) Joining Hands network in Haiti, known as FONDAMA, is working to educate Haitians about the virus, particularly in remote rural areas where people lack electricity or radios. Here FONDAMA set up hand-washing stations in three different communities. In urban areas, food kits of rice, beans and oil were distributed to very vulnerable families.
- One Great Hour of Sharing Offering (OGHS): All Presbyterians who contribute to the OGHS offering participate in these ministries of assistance and aid. The three main programs supported by the OGHS are Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program and Self-Development of People.

#### **Deacons**

The Deacons are happy to share with you our new ministry for our Parish members. Tom Noble is chair of this new ministry with Mona Johnson assisting. It will be a Deacon's fund to help any member in emergency financial need. Such emergencies as prescription costs, medical bills, family member travel needs and so on, are eligible.

The requests can come through Rev. Ralph or your Deacon. Every request will be handled confidentially and the member will be asked to fill out an application form. All requests will be prayerfully considered based on each specific need.

We will be learning as we proceed with this added ministry. Please let your Deacon know any questions you may have.

We want to thank John and Peggy Graber for volunteering to be our new contacts for the Deacon Shed. Our Deacon Shed is full of items you may need. We have everything from walkers to crutches to wheelchairs to raised toilet seats. If you need anything from the shed, please give John a call at 801-541-7444, and he'll work with you get you what you need.

# **Parish Health Ministry**

As COVID-19 continues to affect all of us, accurate information is a vital part of helping us to cope. I have a friend who forwards to me communications by a California physician, who periodically sends such letters about COVID to her patients. I find them interesting and very informative and wanted to share part of the most recent email with you.

As you are likely aware, the US has an "upsloping plateau" of newly diagnosed cases, with about 20,000 to 30,000 new cases each day.

We tend to focus on the infection fatality rate (IFR) when discussing COVID-19, and this range is likely in the 0.5-1% in the US when hospitals are not overwhelmed. Of course, the number varies dramatically based on age and risk factors.

In addition to the mortality figures, it is helpful to understand persistent symptoms after infection. I have previously described how severe infection can lead to subsequent long-term kidney failure, cardiac dysfunction, pulmonary damage, and neurological effects. UCSF had a Grand Rounds yesterday with a focus on patients with persistent symptoms, even after more seemingly mild COVID-19 infection treated out of the hospital.

#### Parish Health Ministry, continued

There are a minority of patients who are presenting with symptoms persisting months after initial infection, including extreme fatigue, decreased mental processing, bone pain, abnormalities of smell (lacking smell or smelling substances that are not present such as smoke), and diarrhea/nausea. The patients who develop this "COVID-19 post-infectious syndrome" are not necessarily people with predisposing conditions or who had more severe infection. The symptoms likely do not represent prolonged viral infection, but are more likely the result of direct damage from virus and/or immune-mediated responses.

It is interesting that even in asymptomatic patients who do not develop symptoms, approximately one-third of them have "ground glass opacities" demonstrated on chest CT. Despite lack of symptoms, these individuals do have an immune response and could potentially develop subsequent immune-mediated symptoms.

There was a confusing message from the WHO a few weeks ago regarding asymptomatic transmission as "very rare." This has since been walked back and clarified. To be clear, the data suggest that approximately 40% of infections are from asymptomatic spread. In this definition, asymptomatic spread includes those who are "pre-symptomatic" and those who are persistently asymptomatic. An asymptomatic individual might be less likely to transmit, as s/he might not be sneezing and coughing. However, we would hope that the coughing and sick individuals are isolating at home. We are much more likely to come in contact with the asymptomatic individuals who are still out and about shedding virus. A small study in Nature published this week suggested that asymptomatic individuals may actually shed virus for longer periods than those without symptoms. Please wear your mask when you are in enclosed spaces or in public, practice distancing, keep social activities outdoors, wash hands frequently, avoid touching public surfaces, avoid singing and shouting, and keep high risk activities short. Bathrooms are considered high risk locations, as a flush can aerosolize particles, and SARS-CoV-2 is present in feces. Do try to avoid public bathrooms, wear a mask if unavoidable, and close the lid before flushing when possible.

Finally, there are over 100 vaccines in development, 18 of which are currently in human trials. Moderna is scheduled to start a phase 3 large scale efficacy trial with their RNA vaccine next month, enrolling 30,000 people. If all goes according to plan, there is hope that we could have a vaccine available for widespread use possibly by the first half of 2021. Early data suggest that some of these vaccines may decrease severity of disease, but not prevent infection (and onward transmission).

As always, stay safe, stay home if you are sick, practice social distancing and WEAR YOUR MASK when you are in an enclosed space or in public. COVID-19 will be with us for the foreseeable future and it is up to each of us to protect not only ourselves, but others, as well.

# **Soup Kitchen**

Our church "crew" participates in the Soup Kitchen the first Monday of each month. This month our church donations included 150 pounds of ham/supplies and \$350 in cash. During the month of June volunteers included Marge Linn, Eliza Elwood, Rayanne Bartlett, Vicky Westland, Josie Kellejan, and Ruth Ann Horvath. Serving over 100 hungry folks is always just as much a blessing to the volunteers as it is to those who enjoy their lunch. A menu of Beef & Barley stew, cornbread, coleslaw, fruit and dessert was served. Those who are hungry in St George continue to come to the Soup Kitchen for our "to go" meals. Many positive comments were received — especially for our famous "Presbyterian" coleslaw. Questions about the Soup Kitchen experience? Contact Carolynn Thomas 435-817-8288.

On June 15<sup>th</sup>, the Soup Kitchen moved from Grace Episcopal Church, where it has been located for the last seven years, to the outdoor pavilion at the Switchpoint complex. Although Grace had been closed to the public since the beginning of COVID-19, meals were served in a takeout, curbside fashion instead of in the church's cafeteria. The church felt that, as temperatures rise, it was not conducive for senior citizens and others who depend on the hot meal provided to wait outside the church for mealtime.

On June 18<sup>th</sup>, Ruth Ann Horvath and I visited the kitchen facilities at Switchpoint to "check out the new digs". We were favorably impressed with the way the kitchen and dining areas are set up. As the cooks, we will not have any contact with the folks who enjoy the meals. This was of concern only because of the COVID-19 issues - especially the ages of our church cooking crew. Everyone working at Switchpoint wears masks, uses hand sanitizer, and keeps all surfaces clean. Sheila Broadhead who runs the kitchen crews and facility for Switchpoint, needs a maximum of six volunteers for each lunch meal prep. At times we have about ten Presbyterian workers at the Soup Kitchen so in order to utilize all of our church volunteers we will need to take turns each month.

One of the biggest changes for us will be that we no longer make up our own menu and cook with ingredients that the Soup Kitchen would provide. Now we will cook or heat up whatever food donations Sheila has received from local restaurants that donate to Switchpoint.

Even with these changes we will continue to support the Soup Kitchen with our monthly donations of food and money, as we always have.

While change is inevitable, this change is a bit like the end of an era (no more Presbyterian coleslaw!) but we can and will make it work as we continue to care for the less fortunate in our community.

# **Building Fund Update**

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through June 21<sup>st</sup> we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$32,095** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$283,258** or about **73.8%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
