COVID-19 Restrictions Continue

We continue to observe restrictions to our movement and social interactions and will continue to do so for some time to come. Restrictions placed on us by state, county and city officials continue to be part of our everyday lives.

Even as businesses reopen, the state and the Southwest Utah Health Department (<u>swuhealth.org</u>) continue to recommend that we remain at home as much as possible. That is especially true for those over the age of 65 and those with underlying health conditions. When we are out and about, and with cases and hospitalizations on the rise in our area, health experts continue to urge us to wear face coverings and maintain social distancing.

Knowing that the virus is most virulent in those over 60 and those with underlying medical conditions (most of our congregation), we will continue to worship, study the Bible and join in fellowship remotely for some time to come. As Rev. Ralph has said each Sunday during our recorded church service, "We will resume our normal activities only when the Southwest Utah Public Health Department deems it safe to do so without restrictions."

Worship

We continue to share worship each Sunday through a recorded service that we make available on our Sermon Network site. We publish both a bulletin and lyrics for the hymns sung during the service so everyone can join in from home. To access the weekly service, visit our website, gspcsg.org, and you will find a link to our Sermon Network page on the homepage where the Sunday worship schedule normally appears.

Bible Studies

With local restaurants closed and access to our own buildings restricted, the Internet allows us to gather virtually to study the Word of God. All of our regular weekday Bible Studies will be held online using Zoom Video Conferencing. To join one of our weekday Bible Studies using Zoom, please email Rev. Ralph for an invitation. The Bible Studies are a way for all of us to continue to learn about our Lord and to share time together.

Virtual Fellowship

Since we are not worshiping at church each Sunday, we also are not gathering for Fellowship after worship – at least not in person. Like our Bible Studies, Rev. Ralph hosts a "Virtual Coffee Hour" every Sunday at 11:30 am. This fun event has been well attended since our shut down in March. Attire and choice of beverage are completely up to you. To join our Virtual Fellowship using Zoom, please email Rev. Ralph for an invitation.



This the day that the Lord has made; Let us rejoice and be glad in it Psalm 118:24 New American Standard Bible (NASB)

** Pastor's Note Regarding Hospital Visitation **

Please be advised that, due to COVID-19 restrictions, I am unable to visit anyone in any of our area medical facilities. Once things return to normal, please keep in mind that with the federal laws that govern the privacy of medical records, hospitals are no longer allowed to give out any information regarding patients to visitors, including clergy. Unless a visitor requests a specific name, the hospital desk is not allowed to give out any information, including religious affiliation.

If you or a family member is hospitalized please alert the Pastor, your Deacon or the church office. Otherwise, we will not be informed of your presence in the hospital and will be unable to assist or offer pastoral care.

Parish Health Ministry

Are we there yet? ARE WE THERE YET??? It's a question asked perhaps by us, or others with whom we have journeyed in the past. It is most definitely being asked by us now as we travel this road to who knows where. Given the current reality and changes to our world as we knew it, this road appears endless. We hear, "we are in this together". Although that is true, we must cope as individuals, each in our own way, according to our personal circumstance and abilities. You may find it becomes increasingly difficult not to feel discouraged or just plain sick of the whole thing (including not being able to meet in communal worship), and that's really OK. In that respect, you are not alone, as countless others feel as you do. In the past months, we have joined the world in uncovering the secrets of the aptly named NOVEL coronavirus. Scientists have united in a desperate search to learn what must be done to disable and eradicate this menace and each new finding brings us one step closer to reaching our destination. There has been great loss of life and livelihood since this all began. But, there is HOPE on the horizon as we build on what thus far has been revealed.

Although you may have read of various therapeutic regimens for prevention or early treatment or cure of COVID, at this point the only treatments found to have some proven effect are the administration of dexamethasone (a steroid) or remdesivir (an anti-viral) to patients in the later stages of the disease. Trials have demonstrated that the use of monoclonal antibodies (created from the DNA of live antibodies) shows promise for treating COVID in the early virus stages and may be available by this fall. Monoclonal antibodies prevent the development of infection by blocking the ability of the virus to attach to our cells and by helping prevent serious disease complications. The antibodies may best benefit health care workers, the elderly and those with preexisting conditions by supplementing their own antibody production and also serve as a kind of short-term vaccine until a reliable, safe and longer lasting vaccine is made available. Hopefully, that will happen by early 2021. Testing for the virus has played a crucial role in the diagnosis, treatment and tracking of SARS-CoV-2. However, the current wait times for results of some tests can be as long as 16 days, which will render the test useless. It is acknowledged that developing reliable tests which have shorter turnaround times must be found. Encouragingly, on the horizon and available possibly later this year, is a game-changer test which can be performed at home and would produce results in 20 to 30 minutes. It is mind-boggling to realize how far in "science years" we have come in so brief a time to have amassed what is known about the virus. We are indebted to the tireless health care workers, the scientists, the folks who just keep "keeping on" and to those we know and love and move in our lives who are intent on helping us stay and feel safe. We, as individuals are also important players, doing what we can do: wearing our masks, washing our hands, sanitizing and maintaining distance. We must remember that this whole thing is a work in progress, and there is a difference between science and opinion. New knowledge brings new directives and advice and the only certainty we have is "we don't know what we don't know!"

Take loving care of yourselves and others as you live your Faith.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through July 26th we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$34,390** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$286,003** or about **74.5%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
