COVID-19 Restrictions Updated

We continue to observe restrictions to our movement and social interactions and will continue to do so for some time to come. Restrictions placed on us by state, county and city officials continue to be part of our everyday lives.

Even as businesses reopen, the state and the Southwest Utah Health Department (swuhealth.org) continue to recommend that we remain at home as much as possible. That is especially true for those over the age of 65 and those with underlying health conditions. When we are out and about, and with cases and hospitalizations on the rise in our area, health experts continue to urge us to wear face coverings and maintain social distancing.

Knowing that the virus is most virulent in those over 60 and those with underlying medical conditions (most of our congregation), we will continue to worship, study the Bible and join in fellowship remotely for some time to come. As Rev. Ralph has said each Sunday during our recorded church service, "We will resume our normal activities only when the Southwest Utah Public Health Department deems it safe to do so without restrictions."

Worship

We continue to share worship each Sunday through a recorded service that we make available on our Sermon Network site. We publish both a bulletin and lyrics for the hymns sung during the service so everyone can join in from home. To access the weekly service, visit our website, gspscs.org, and you will find a link to our Sermon Network page on the homepage where the Sunday worship schedule normally appears.

Bible Studies

While we can't meet in person due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Internet allows us to gather virtually to study the Word of God. All of our regular weekday Bible Studies will be held online using Zoom Video Conferencing. To join one of our weekday Bible Studies using Zoom, please email Rev. Ralph for an invitation. The Bible Studies are a way for all of us to continue to learn about our Lord and to share time together.

Virtual Fellowship

Since we are not worshipping at church each Sunday, we also are not gathering for Fellowship after worship – at least not in person. Like our Bible Studies, Rev. Ralph hosts a "Virtual Coffee Hour" every Sunday at 11:30 am. This fun event has been well attended since our shut down in March. Attire and choice of beverage are completely up to you. 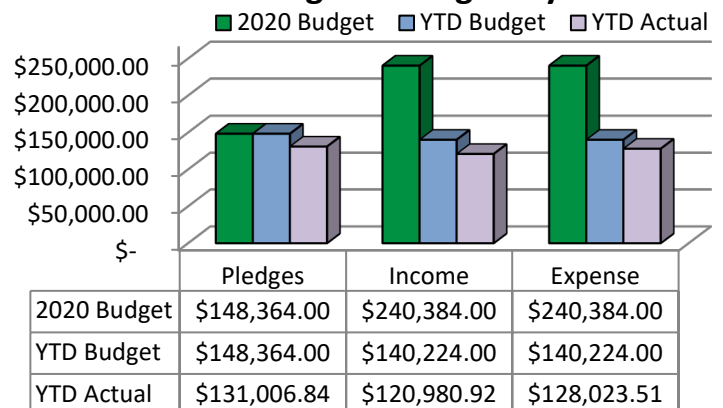

I Don't Want to Die! The cardiologist, coming from a patient's room spied me in the hallway and moved quickly to my side. His face was ashen. "I've just had to tell Jamil, that he is dying. He's not taking it well; can you go in and talk with him?" I knew 32-year-old, Jamil quite well from his many hospitalizations for congestive heart failure. He valued my prayers, but his New Age theology was all over the map. Jamil did not qualify for a heart transplant and a previous experimental surgery had failed. While assuming that he would be grieving, nothing could have prepared me for the sight and sounds I saw and heard as I entered the room. Jamil, curled up in a fetal position was whining, "I don't want to die, I don't want to die; it's so cold and clammy and dark, I don't want to die." I took Jamil's hand and looked into eyes filled with stark terror. When he realized my presence, he repeated, "I don't want to die, I know what it's like to die." He went on to tell how during his surgery, one year ago, his heart had stopped on the table. He described leaving his body, hovering above himself and then being compelled down a long, dark tunnel into another place. Jamil repeated, "It's so cold and clammy and dark." "Jamil," I asked, "Do you know Jesus?" "Yes, but I don't want to die!" "Jamil, do you know that Jesus is the light of the world? Do you know that in His light, darkness is dispelled?" Jamil looked at me with interest, now. I went on, "Do you know that You can invite Jesus into your heart, and he will flood you with light so that you will never be in darkness?" Jamil shook his head. "Would you like to invite light into your darkness?" Jamil said that he wanted this, but he didn't know how. With my help, Jamil prayed confessing his sins and need for a Savior; he invited Jesus into his heart and asked to be filled with light. A transformation occurred before my very eyes. Jamil's eyes were shining, his face filled with light and peace and joy, his relaxed body stretched out on the bed. He lay there for quite a while and then he said softly, "I'll be all right now. I'll be just fine." Twenty-four hours later, Jamil died peacefully.

The first conference for BURM partners is also a first in the history of our relationships -- it will be a VIRTUAL conference. Christian Education

The Adult class will use the Fall 2020 edition of the widely popular curriculum *The Present Word*. The theme for September through November is "Loving for One Another." Throughout the whole quarter, we are reminded that we are to love one another as God loves us. The first month focuses on the struggles of love to prevail despite harsh and negative circumstances. In October, lessons will center on love for the stranger, the poor and enemies. Finally, the last segment explores how believers love by serving, looks at the abiding love of God through the Holy Spirit, reveals the expression of God's love in the formation of the early Christian community, and tells of the love of neighbor as fulfillment of the law of God. All sessions involve thoughtful exploration of Scripture and prayer. In addition, resources for personal meditation and reflection will be distributed to participants.

September traditionally starts the programmatic year for congregations. But we know all too well that 2020 is not an ordinary year. Even so, September on the church calendar is full of special themes. Many are centered on education and literacy. Others celebrate the gifts of Native Americans, people living with disabilities, caretakers of God's creation, new immigrants and new believers. We have much to celebrate in this year like no other.

Parish Health Ministry

In recent months, you have heard, and we have written at length, about all things COVID-19; and, in this article we'll stray a bit from that topic, but not too far, so don't remove your lab coats just yet! It's time for the newly discovered scientist in you to be turning your thoughts toward a more familiar subject - Flu Season! Who knew thinking about Seasonal Influenza would seem like recalling a previous visit to an old friend? However, as you are aware, one of the great unknowns is how we might be affected in the upcoming flu season because it most certainly will coincide with the continuing or recurrent presence of SARS-CoV2. It is hoped, as it appears might be the case in Australia already in their flu season, that our current mitigation procedures of sanitizing, distancing and wearing masks will contribute to reducing our number of cases of flu. Of crucial importance, will be for anyone over six months of age, and barring contraindications, to have the flu vaccine.

The standard vaccines this year are either Trivalent - derived from two Influenza A viruses and one Influenza B virus, or Quadrivalent - derived from two Influenza A viruses and two Influenza B viruses, which might offer an extra level of protection. Only the vaccine given nasally is made from live viruses. While you could have what appear to be symptoms of the flu after having the vaccine (fever, soreness, aches or nausea), it is merely your body hard at work making antibodies to the virus and will pass in a couple of days. The injectable A and B vaccines are made from dead viruses and cannot cause flu. The CDC does not express a preference for either injectable; and, while most prevalent will be the Quadrivalent, what you receive will depend on what your provider has chosen to give. Both have been licensed for people over 65. While having the vaccine may not convey complete immunity from the flu, it can reduce its severity should you fall victim. Because the Influenza virus is totally different from the SARS-CoV-2 virus, administration of the flu vaccine will help reduce the prevalence of illness caused by flu viruses and will assist in differentiating between the two. The overriding benefit of vaccinating the population against flu will be to reduce hospital and ICU visits and stress already experienced by our overworked healthcare systems.

The usual onset of flu season can be as early as the beginning of October, peaking in January and lasting through March. It takes at least two weeks after having the vaccine to attain protection, but antibody production may continue for an additional two weeks until it begins to wane at around three months post injection, thus the need for an annual vaccine. While we are unable to predict when we might experience flu season in St George, as long as there are flu shots available, they may be given anytime during that season. This year, because of the possible impact of COVID-19

during the Fall months, it is recommended that vaccination occur during September until the end of October. According to COVID-19 guidelines, it will be safe to get your shot. But, to minimize contact time, it is advised that you make an appointment for wherever you plan to receive it. If you should contract the flu, or worst case be diagnosed with COVID before having your flu vaccine, it is recommended that you still get the shot when your provider has declared you recovered because it will offer protection from circulating flu viruses you might not yet have experienced.

It seems lately that we just haven't been able to catch a break regarding the ways our lives have been rearranged and impacted and brought to a standstill. So, something as basic as deciding to have an annual flu shot offers a kind of welcome and hopeful opportunity to be pro-active. You may have read or hold conflicting opinions about the value or safety or efficacy of having the flu vaccine, and we respect that. Ultimately, after consulting with your health care provider, the decision about which path to wellness you choose to follow is yours, alone, to make.

Stewardship

September is here already, and fall is just around the corner! It will be nice to have some cooler temperatures! I would like to share an excerpt of a great article I read: "6 Stories about Giving in the Bible" by Tod MicMichen (the full article can be found at <https://pushpay.com/blog/6-giving-stories-in-the-bible/>).

"Sharing stories of people doing both good and great things inspires others. When it comes to giving, people can often feel shame and inadequacy. However, the Bible reveals great nuggets from people who lived attainable, generous lives on a daily basis. I recently read through the Gospel of Luke and was captured by these stories of generosity. Jesus introduces us to men and women, both mature and immature in their faith. He describes both real and fictional characters engaged in very normal activities; still, they manage to live abundantly generous lives. Some of these characters are expected, while others are rather unexpected. Here are some giving stories from the Bible about people that Jesus knew and wants us to know."

THE CALLED GIVER (LUKE 9:3, 10:4)

Luke 9:3 and 10:4 introduces us to an extreme giving request of Jesus. He called His early disciples, over 80 of them, to give up everything for the sake of a short-term mission trip. He sent them all out into the harvest, to share the good news and help people with their needs. Jesus called them to go, take nothing, not a dime or a change of clothes, not even a snack. We are called to support Jesus both out of our means and at times by giving up all that we have.

Don't worry, you won't be the first or last person Jesus asks or sends out—just one of many who have learned to enjoy the adventure.

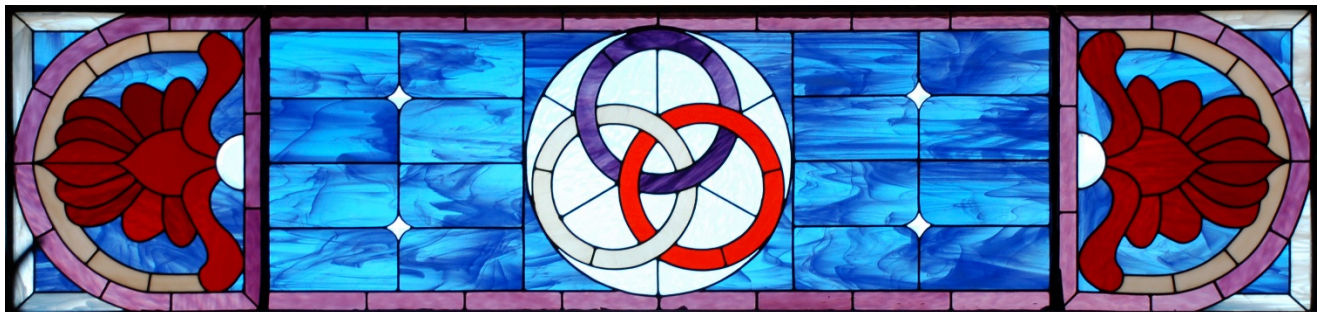

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we can turn our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through August 23rd we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$35,304** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$286,468** or about **74.6%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
