Souper Bowl of Caring Goes Virtual

On February 8th, the Kansas City Chiefs (sorry Bills fans) and Tampa Bay Buccaneers will take to the field in Tampa for Super Bowl LV. Normally that would mean that we would be bringing our food and cash donations to church for the Souper Bowl of Caring. With no live worship, we needed to find another way to participate in this annual event.

For 2021, Good Shepherd's Souper Bowl of Caring is going virtual and we've extended the dates until February 19th in order to give everyone a chance to participate. Here's how it will work:

- We have set up a food drive through yougivegoods.com that allows you to purchase items for the Soup Kitchen at Switchpoint and have them delivered directly to the Soup Kitchen. Most of the items we have had donated over the years are available for purchase and, although prices are a bit higher than purchasing in the grocery store or at Costco, delivery is included. To use this option, just visit yougivegoods.com/gspcsg, scroll to the bottom and click Shop Now. When you have finished adding items to your cart, click on the shopping cart icon in the bottom right corner to check out.
- If you prefer to shop in person, we can make that work, as well. You can drop off your donations in the large storage tote outside the door to the CE Building at any time. If you have more than a few items, you can give Chris Schleiter (435-619-2843) orCarolynn Thomas (435-817-8288) a call and we'll make arrangements to meet you at church to collect your donations. Carolynn has even offered to come to your house to pick up donations if that is more convenient for you.
- Cash donations can be made through our Vanco donation page by entering the amount of your donation in the Community Soup Kitchen box. You can give by credit card or from your bank account. If you donate by credit card, please consider checking the box on the checkout page indicating that you would like to add 3% to help cover the credit card service fees that the church pays.
- Cash donations may also be made using your bank's Bill Pay service or by mailing or dropping off a check. Be sure to use PO Box 1499, St. George UT 84771-1499 as the payment/ mailing address. Please make your checks payable to the church and include "Souper Bowl of Caring" on the memo line. We'll consolidate all of the cash donations and deliver them to the Soup Kitchen.

With the generosity that all of you show, we expect another banner year and look forward to the 2022 Souper Bowl of Caring when we will be able to come together to help those in our area who need so much.

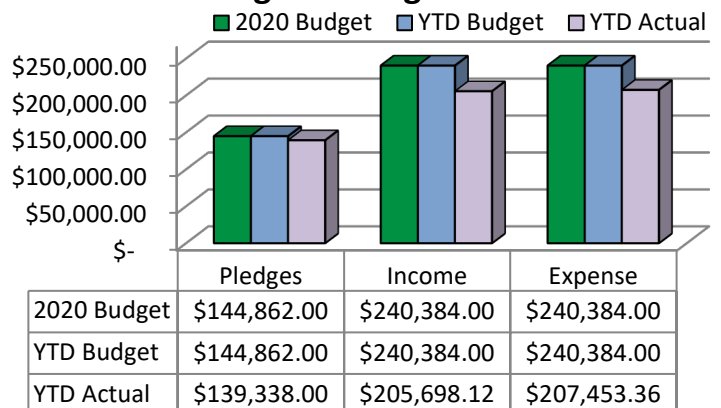

Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

Blow a trumpet in Zion, And sound an alarm on My holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, For the day of the Lord is coming; Indeed, it is near, A day of darkness and gloom, A day of clouds and thick darkness.

Regarding the church year and its seasons, for us the season of Lent, which leads to Holy Week and the Resurrection, begins with Ash Wednesday. This year Ash Wednesday falls on February 17th and, in the tradition of the 20-21 pandemic, more than likely will be virtual.

The observance of Ash Wednesday has been a tradition that comes from the earliest days of the Christian Church. For us as Presbyterians the service was a casualty of the Protestant Reformation and began to find a home again with us in the last half of the last century as Presbyterians, along with our other Protestant families began to observe church seasons, including Lent.

The ashes used are the burnt remains of the palms left over from Palm Sunday's preceding year. A colleague of mine quipped that as Presbyterians we should use the ashes from the preceding year's annual report!

One of the texts that traditionally has always been used on Ash Wednesday is the text from the Prophet Joel.

The words are powerful, a cry to prepare for God's coming day. A day of judgement for God's people, a day to fear in knowledge of who we are and where we have failed to be and live as God has called us to. A day of honesty with ourselves and be fearful of the judgment we deserve. All is lost.

And in the midst of that day's arrival God declares; "Even now draw near to me."

Even now, God holds grace, compassion and forgiveness for us! Even now.

On Ash Wednesday, that is exactly what we are doing and how we begin the journey of Lent. We accept the invitation, we draw near, and begin to prepare our lives for the coming Resurrection morning, our Lords, and our own.

Prayer Corner

I was raised in the Episcopal Church, and two of my earliest memories are sitting on a woman's lap (I think, my Sunday School teacher) as we sang "Jesus Loves Me" and being a little angel in the Christmas play in church. I was 4 or 5 at the time, certainly pre-kindergarten age. I attended Sunday School through the 9th grade, at the end of which I was confirmed by the Bishop along with my classmates. I remember thinking as I left the railing before the altar (sorry, Ralph!) that I had expected to feel different after being confirmed, and I was disappointed that everything seemed the same. After being confirmed, I stayed in the church for the full morning service instead of

leaving half-way through for Sunday School class. Once I graduated from high school, I was allowed not to attend church if I so chose, and I DID so choose, with the occasional exception of Christmas Eve. I didn't look back for years.

What I remember most is that no one ever really talked to me about what Christianity was all about, what faith and Grace are. My parents went to church religiously (😊) but they never talked about Jesus, His message, or why we even went to church. We just did. And I had to wear a dress-up dress and a light veil (which I hated). I was never encouraged to read the Bible, although I had been given one by my grandmother, but unfortunately, as a very young child, I made scribbles in it (with a pen!), and it was taken away from me. I do still have this Bible, but it is the King James version so I seldom read it. These days I prefer a more accurate, modern translation.

But surprise! God had other plans for me! Around my 40th birthday, Dave told me he wanted to start going to church. He was raised in the Presbyterian Church in American Fork, and he said he missed church. I was astounded and (of course) reluctant, but we found a Presbyterian Church in Saratoga Springs, New York, and began attending. I found I really liked it a lot more than the more formal Episcopal Church. Before we could really become fully involved in that church's activities, we moved to the Montgomery, Alabama, area, although we did a few things like chaperoning a junior high dance in the church hall—THAT was an experience! Those kids were tough! We joined another Presbyterian Church in Montgomery, and it was there that we finally became active Christians, both of us serving on the Session, Dave did the accounts payable, I sang in the choir and participated in the Logos program. Through adult Sunday School there, I began to understand what it meant to be a Christian, and I loved my church community. I cried when I left choir practice there for the last time. I never dreamed that God had an even more loving church family for me here in St. George, where I would read the Bible (willingly!), attend all sorts of interesting classes, become a Stephen Minister and Leader, help with the Parish Health Ministry, serve on Session and as a Deacon, and sing in the choir. If I had been told when I was 25 that all this would happen, I would have laughed myself silly. I bet God smiled, knowing what plans He had for me! My church family IS my family, and I thank God for them every day. I know that all my life God was with me, loving me even though I was so resistant and rejecting. He never gave up on me, although I ignored Him for years. What a blessing He is to me! May I in turn be a blessing to others.

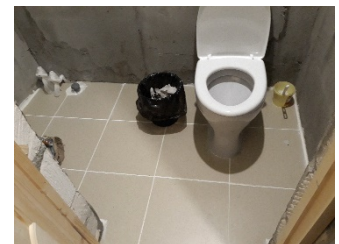

Parish Health Ministry

The first case of SARS-CoV-2, (COVID-19) in the United States was confirmed on January 25, 2020. At that time we never could have predicted that one year later we'd be marking one year of living with its reality. Our lives have been controlled by its mysteries and no one has been left untouched by its reach. Our congregation has rejoiced when hearing stories of recovery from the virus and experienced great sadness upon learning that it claimed beloved member, Dick Higgins. Scientists have labored to unlock its secrets and our good news is that reliable vaccines are now available. In our area, many have already received at least one dose of the two vaccines that are currently approved.

If you are 70 or over and are waiting your turn to receive the vaccine, it is important to keep informed of scheduling availability through sources as the Southwest Utah Public Health Department or the St George News so you may register. Please visit the Health Department's website, swuhealth.org/covid, and click on the "Vaccine Information for Southwest Utah" link just under the banner at the top of the page for more information or to schedule an appointment.

People have reported little reaction to the first shot but may experience some reaction to the second. The CDC recommends that you not pre-medicate with Tylenol or Ibuprofen but these medications may be taken should you experience post-vaccine symptoms (fever, fatigue, headache, muscle ache, chills, or joint pain). To achieve maximum efficacy, it is recommended that the shot be administered into the triangular, deltoid muscle at the top of the outer aspect of your upper arm. The arm skin should not be "bunched" up which could prevent the needle from reaching the muscle instead of only fatty tissue. Studies have shown that the full effect of the Pfizer vaccine occurs about seven days after the second shot and the Moderna vaccine within ten to fourteen days. While receiving the vaccine is enormously beneficial for the individual, vaccination of the general public is key to being able to relax our current preventive measures. We will still need to wear masks, wash/sanitize hands, distance and be prudent about our person-to-person contact until such time as more are vaccinated and our case incidence is reduced. To keep informed about the latest directives and answer questions you may have about vaccines, please consult the CDC COVID-19 site for current guidelines.

Wellness Concern of the Month - HEART HEALTH

While our world is being filled with all things COVID, maintaining personal health habits should not be neglected. Nurturing our heart's health should become a routine part of our self care. Coronary heart disease is the most common form of heart disease and the choices we make will affect whether our hearts are given the chance to function at peak

performance. Having poor cardiovascular health puts one at increased risk for other severe illness including type 2 diabetes, hypertension, obesity, certain cancers and even COVID complications. The following risk factors for heart disease have been identified and, in partnership with your healthcare provider, its never too late to modify and mediate their impact:

- High Blood Pressure - A pressure reading over 140/90 is considered hypertension.
- High Cholesterol - Medical consultation will determine expectations of blood levels to be maintained and can be reached with life-style modification and medication.
- Stress - Training in meditation and relaxation techniques, exercise, counseling and interaction with friends and family can be beneficial.
- Smoking - Programs, medications and counseling can assist in helping a smoker to quit.
- Poor Sleep Patterns - During proper sleep, the body repairs and works to maintain good brain, cardiac and physical health. Chronic sleep deprivation can lead to development of disease, including heart disease, diabetes and stroke. Better sleep may be realized through exercise, dietary modification, environmental measures, and practicing pre-sleep quiet time.
- Poor Dietary Habits - Hippocrates said, "let food be thy medicine," and we also have heard, "we are what we eat." Adherence to an Eating or Dietary Plan rather than a DIET is easier to achieve. The DASH diet plan is a good place to start and information about it can be found online or through your doctor's office.

Session held their monthly meeting on January 10th via Zoom, as well. Here is a synopsis of the actions taken in January:

- Session Members agreed that since all the same conditions regarding the pandemic still exist, there will be no changes at this time to the present scheduled activities.
- Approved the adoption of a resolution stating that a portion (\$4,000) of the Pastor's Reimbursable Expenses be covered within the Health Reimbursement Arrangement Plan for the year 2021.
- Authorized Alan Paige to obtain contracts for annual tree and pampas grass trimmings.
- Approved, as per the approved 2021 General Fund Budget, to distribute the following: \$3,000 to Ellen Smith, \$1,000 to support the Moscow Protestant Chaplaincy's programs for drug and alcohol rehabilitation, and \$1,500 to Presbytery for general Churchwide Mission.
- Appointed Carolynn Thomas as Treasurer for 2021.
- Appointed Ruth Ann Horvath as Session Clerk for 2021.
- Appointed Gloria McGilloway as Commissioner to the Presbytery for 2021.
- Approved the dates of Stated Session Meetings on the second Sunday of each month following worship service in the Christian Education Building or via Zoom Webcast in 2021 and January 2022.
- Approved the following Communion dates: the first Sunday of each month during 2021 and January 2022, Early Prayer/Communion Services each week during 2021 and January 2022, Maundy Thursday Agape Service, and to authorize the Visitation Elder to distribute communion to the shut-ins in 2021 and January 2022.
- Organizational meeting of the Corporation was held on January 10, 2021. Election of 2021 Corporate Officers were as follows: Chris Schleiter was elected as Chairperson, Eric Westland was elected as Vice-Chairperson, Ruth Ann Horvath was elected as Secretary, and Carolynn Thomas was elected as Treasurer.

The next meeting of the Session will be Sunday, February 14, 2021 at 12:15 pm via Zoom.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we have turned our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through December 27th we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$44,810** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$295,973** or about **77.1%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
