Operation Christmas Child Rolls On

Operation Christmas Child is in full swing. What, exactly, is Operation Christmas Child?

The Samaritan's Purse project Operation Christmas Child collects shoebox gifts - filled with fun toys, school supplies and hygiene items - and delivers them to children in need around the world to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way. For many of these children, the gift-filled shoebox is the first gift they have ever received.

Shoebox gifts are collected in Australia, Austria, Canada, Finland, Germany, New Zealand, South Korea, Spain, Switzerland, United Kingdom, and the United States. Nearly 575,000 volunteers worldwide - with more than 270,000 of those in the U.S. - are involved in collecting, shipping and distributing shoebox gifts.

Delivered into the hands of children through local churches, every shoebox gift is an opportunity to share about Jesus Christ and God's love.

Good Shepherd's goal for 2021 is 150 shoeboxes so grab one (or several) red and green shoeboxes from Conklin Hall, fill them up and bring them back to Church on November 21st. We'll dedicate our shoeboxes and deliver them to the collection point on November 22nd.

Please mark your calendars and plan to participate in the annual C.R.O.P. Hunger Walk that will take place on Saturday, November 13th at 10:00 am. Twenty-five percent of the money raised by our walk stays in St. George and benefits Solomon's Porch.

We hope to see you at the walk. Together we can work to eliminate hunger in St. George and around the world.



Many years ago, when I was a young teenager, I was having the time of my life attending a church camp in Siloam Springs, Arkansas. Three nights before returning home, I awakened with a strong sense of foreboding. Looking at a clock, I noted that it was 1:00 am. Someone was in serious trouble, and I felt strongly urged to pray. Praying as fervently as a 14-year-old knew how, I explained to God that someone needed His help. Would He please come to that person's aid? The sense of foreboding lifted, and I went back to sleep.

I awoke the next morning feeling excited about what was planned for us at camp that day and thought no more about my prayer. That is, until getting back home. My mom wanted to hear about camp, but first, she said she had an amazing story to tell me.

That summer, my 20-year-old brother, Joe, had been on a crew, following the wheat harvest from Texas all the way up into Montana. My mother told me that just 3 nights earlier, he had been driving a truck carrying a combine, down a steep mountain descent when the brakes on the truck failed. He was careening down that mountainside pumping the brakes, to no avail. Then just when he thought all was lost, he felt the truck slowing and it slowed to the degree that he could edge it into the side of the mountain and bring it to a standstill. "Mom," Joe told her, "With the weight of that combine on my truck bed, there was no way that I could have slowed it; I was totally out of control."

At that point, my eyes were big as saucers and I gasped, "Mom, do you have any idea what time it was when this happened?" "Why yes," she replied, "Joe said they were driving late; it was just after 1 a.m.

Then I had a story to tell! We laughed and we cried, and we thanked the Lord from the depth of our hearts.

We have had a part in planning for the "Catch the Spirit" church service to be held on October 24th and have enlisted the involvement of other Good Shepherd committees and groups. We all have come through a long period of feeling alone and uncertain and this service will celebrate our regathering and encourage us to rethink what it means to be a part of the congregation of Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church. Growth and Care will once again host a CPR Course for the Non Professional on Wednesday, November 17th, beginning at 9:00 am and continuing until about 11:30 am. The course is open to both those needing recertification or anyone wanting to be certified for the first time. Instruction will include basic CPR procedures and also use of AED (Automated External Defibrillator) equipment. The cost is \$25 per person. As a part of our committee's mission, we want to be able to offer information featuring health and wellness and plan to bring such information to you through our new "Zoom at Noon" programs beginning late this Winter. Our speakers will take part either in person or by Zoom and may be located not only in our immediate St George area, but also anywhere in the country. Likewise, attendees may participate in person or take part from the comfort of home. We will record the events so, if you miss the live gathering, you will be able to catch up, at your convenience.

We continue to be concerned about the omni-present intruder, COVID-19. Scientists publish knowledge, modified and redirected seemingly by the hour, as the virus, often through mutation, presents in new ways with capabilities for causing different forms of the disease. There can be confusion and uncertainty about what we are supposed to believe and how we are to behave. No matter the source of media information, if you have questions about your personal path of action, it is best to seek the counsel and advice of your educated medical professional.

One sure recommendation is that it is time to consider having your flu shot, if you have not already had it. According to the CDC, you may get the COVID-19 vaccine and other vaccines, including the flu vaccine at the same visit. Latest advice is to have received your flu shot before the end of October so as to benefit from the greatest amount of immunity through the typical months of highest incidence of disease. Although cases of flu were greatly reduced worldwide last year because of the COVID protocols in place, scientists are convinced that they were able to accumulate enough data to formulate a vaccine which adequately covers this flu season. No vaccine promises to be 100% effective but conveys the expectation that we will experience less severe illness should we fall ill to a covered disease.

- Approved a proposed 2022 Budget.

Our church "crew" participates in the Soup Kitchen the first Monday of each month. During September our church donations included 50 pounds of food and supplies plus a \$325 donation. Cooking in the Switchpoint kitchen we serve over 100 hungry folks each month which is always just as much a blessing to the volunteers as it is to those who enjoy their lunch. Stewardship

Welcome to the cooler temperatures of Fall! I hope you are all enjoying the more pleasant mornings and some relief from the summer's heat. The church is doing pretty well financially, and I thank everyone who has submitted pledges and offerings. Your continued generosity is greatly appreciated. We are blessed to be able to continue to worship in person together, and it has been so good to see everyone after we had been separated for so long. Our church is truly a family. I pray that everyone will stay safe and healthy as we enter this new season.

We will be kicking off our annual Pledge Campaign during October. You will receive a letter with a copy of our proposed budget for next year as well as information on how to make a pledge. Next year's finances are challenging to say the least and we will need about \$23,000 more in pledges in order to maintain our current operations. There are a number of factors that make additional pledges necessary:

- Our loose offerings for 2021 are projected to be more than \$10,000 lower than our budget. Some of this is due to our not having met for live worship for the first quarter of 2021 but some is due to a simple reduction in giving. Since we cannot know how much we can expect to receive next year we have reduced the loose offerings budget and increased the amount we need in pledges. Your pledges help us to plan for how much income we can expect and are an important part of our financial processes.
- Due to increased underwriting costs from hurricanes, floods and fires we have been told by our insurance company
 to expect a substantial premium increase for 2022. We have budgeted a 25% increase but the actual increase could
 be higher or lower.
- Our Grounds Elder, Alan Paige, has pointed out that it simply is not possible for one person to do all of the work required to maintain our grounds. In order to ensure that our property is properly maintained we will be contracting with a landscaping service beginning in January at a cost of around \$5,000 for the year.
- Salary and benefit increases will add about \$3,500 to the budget. Presbytery is expected to recommend a 6% increase for Rev. Ralph but we have agreed that we will plan for a 3% increase and if our financial situation is better than we expect we will consider a larger increase at mid-year.
- Per Capita is expected to rise by about \$2 per member adding about \$500 to our expenditures.

When you receive your letter we ask that you review the budget and prayerfully consider whether you can make a pledge or increase your pledge. Only with your financial support can we continue to do the work that God is calling us to do.

The Women's Guild held their Italian Pasta Buffet on Saturday, September 18th. It was a good turn out, and I think it was well received. We grossed \$675.00 after expenses we will have around \$400.00 to put towards our charities at the end of the year. The board has decided to cancel all further activities until Covid numbers drop dramatically.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we have turned our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through June 20th we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling \$56,100 and additional cash donations of \$53,080 giving us a total for all three campaigns of \$304,243 or about 79,2% of our \$384,000 goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us ensure that our facilities remain in top notch condition and to allow us to make some needed improvements.
