



Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

And they came in a hurry and found their way to Mary and Joseph, and the baby as He lay in the manger. When they had seen Him, they made known the statement which had been told them about this Child. And all who heard it were amazed about the things which were told them by the shepherds. **But Mary treasured all these things, pondering them in her heart.** And the shepherds went back, glorifying and praising God for all that they had heard and seen, just as had been told them.

Luke 2:16-20 (NASB)



It's not a bit surprising that Mary does not respond to the shepherds' story of what they had seen and heard in the fields with either surprise or doubt. After all she had been advised of who this child is and what has happened with His coming long before the first kick was ever felt.

Now, in the accounts of the shepherds all that has been said and promised has been verified, confirmed to a degree. Luke tells us that her reaction was to keep all these ponderings of faith and amazement treasured in her heart. For then, I am sure, she was far from clear as to how this was going to all play out, what the future would hold for the babe in her arms. I don't believe I am conjecturing when I surmise that for Mary, whatever that future might be, she believed God's promise for tomorrow and trusted God with whatever that may be.

We can learn a lot from Mary. We tend to think and act more like the shepherds. We hear the ancient story and are filled with joy and amazement and we return to who we are and where we came from with a great story to tell.

If we follow Mary's example, we see Christmas as only a signpost to what is coming. Believing God's promise from the past to our future salvation, treasuring the message, promise and vision in our hearts. For in so doing we go forward in faith and anticipation. Not really knowing how all this is going to work out, but trusting our Lord with it all, including ourselves. And in so doing we leave Bethlehem and travel the road to Jerusalem and Calvary; we leave Christmas with our sights on Easter. And in so doing will never go back or be the same again.

Advent reminds me of hospitality and that reminds me of my sister. Darlene was hospitality personified; her doors were never locked. There was always coffee on the stove and room for one more at the table. People were constantly coming and going at Darlene's house. She was never too busy to listen to someone who had a story to tell or who needed a shoulder. Darlene's Christmas Eve Feast of the Seven Fishes was well known in our small town and her house was full of joyous people until well past midnight. She was at her happiest when her house was full of family and friends with plenty of good food on the table.

Genesis 18:2-5 tells us that in Abraham's day, a person's reputation was largely connected to his hospitality - the sharing of home and food. Even strangers were to be treated as highly honored guests. Meeting another's need for food or shelter was and still is one of the most immediate and practical ways to obey God. In Roman's 12:13b, the Apostle Paul tells us, "Practice hospitality." Darlene honored and obeyed God through her hospitality and was dearly loved by those who were fortunate enough to know her.

In Hebrews 13:2 the writer reminds us, "Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing, some people have entertained angels without knowing it." I am convinced that she did and that now she is one of the heavenly hosts.

1976 was the year that my parents retired and permanently moved to Florida. (We did keep two rooms at the back of our home, where they spent the summers with us in Upstate New York). The cold and snowy December after their move, Mom and Dad had driven up to spend the holidays with us. Since Mom had been the organist at our church for more than 20 years, she was asked to play the organ for Midnight Mass. Joe was unable to attend, so Dad and Mom, our three children and I left for church in time to prepare the choir and organ, around 11:00 pm. The service was beautiful, filled with heavenly music, joy, love . . . and outside, SNOW. The snow started about the time we got to church. Apparently, it snowed all thru the service. By the time we left to return home the wind was blowing and drifts were forming. Dad was confident we could make it because he had put snow tires on the station wagon before he left Florida. We got about four miles from church, but we were still four miles from home when we got stuck. On this dark back road there were no houses around. Dad tried to get us out of the drift but there was no going forward or backward. Dad got out and scouted ahead of us. To his amazement, he found the road was essentially blown bare of snow just 10 feet from the drift. Dad said he was pretty sure he could get us through, although the drift was 6 feet tall. He maneuvered the car; we moved a little, but we were still stuck. At that point, Mom, the two older kids and I got out to push. We got nowhere! I suggested for our next try, to push as hard as we could while saying the Lord's Prayer loud enough for God to hear us. He heard! God laid his hand on ours and we were able to push the car to the other side of the drift and we got home safely for Christmas. Since that time, the Lord's Prayer has been my go-to prayer; it always brings me peace and confidence that He is with us in all things.

- Approved vacation dates for Rev. Clingan December 25-31, 2021, and January 28-February 5, 2022.
- Accepted the report of the Nominating Committee of a slate of Elders, Deacons, and 2022 Nominating Committee, set the date for a Stated Congregational Meeting on December 12, 2021, at 11:30 am to act on the Report of the Nominating Committee, present the 2022 Budget, and accept the 2022 Terms of Call of the Pastor.
- Set a Joint Elder-Deacon Training for Sunday, December 5, 2021 at 11:45 am in the CE Building.

Women's Bible Study & Fellowship

Communal Lament

In our second monthly study this fall on October 25th, we learned that despite differences of our opinions regarding local, national or world problems, as Christians, lament gives us common ground. Our study's example: though there are individual disagreements about gun control, we can look past our disagreements to the pain we may share about lives lost senselessly to gun violence.

When we lament, we move from suffering to faith. A visible communal lament can take the form of a protest or march. A Christian lament addresses God, describes the injustice to God, states our trust in God, calls for Him to act, and states our assurance that God will hear our lament as we wait and see whether God will act.

The subject of a New York Times article from June, 2019, gives us an example of a contemporary lament: Christians participating in Hong Kong's protests against closer ties with mainland China. (Hong Kong's Christians have long played an important role in the politics of the semiautonomous Chinese territory, on issues like religious freedom, democracy, and human rights.) Though Catholics and Protestants make up only about one in nine people in the city of 7.5 million, the influence of Christianity in the protests was striking, providing a source of inspiration and solace.

Rather than sitting at home in air conditioning, Hong Kong Christians believed that Jesus would be out there helping people. They provided food and shelter at demonstrations and condemned efforts by police to break them up. Many protesters, even those who are not religious, embraced the teachings and messages of Christianity to denounce a proposed law to allow extraditions to mainland China.

Protesters spoke of "loving thy neighbor" and winning a battle of "good versus evil." Youth groups held prayer circles to call for peace and redemption for the police. The hymn, "Sing Hallelujah to the Lord" became an unofficial anthem of the demonstrations, echoing from bridges and makeshift shelters.

Such a communal lament no doubt brought strength to those who prayed it or sang it, as it moved them from suffering to faith.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 in order to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we have turned our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through November 21st we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$54,235** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$305,398** or about **79.4%** of our **\$384,000** goal.

While we are not currently conducting a Building Fund campaign, we do need donations to the Building Fund in order to ensure that our buildings and grounds are kept in good condition. Please consider a donation to the Building Fund to help us reach our goal.
