## Pentecost is Coming – Get Your Red On!

One of the many important dates on the church calendar is coming up in June. On June 5<sup>th</sup>, we will celebrate Pentecost, the birthday of the Church.

If you go back and read the Old Testament, you will discover that Pentecost was one of the Jewish feast days. Only they didn't call it Pentecost. That's the Greek name. The Jews called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks. It is mentioned in five places in the first five books—in Exodus 23, Exodus 24, Leviticus 16, Numbers 28, and Deuteronomy 16. It was the celebration of the beginning of the early weeks of harvest. In Palestine there were two harvests each year. The early harvest came during the months of May and June, and the final harvest came in the Fall. Pentecost was the celebration of the beginning of the early wheat harvest, which meant that Pentecost always fell sometime during the middle of the month of May or sometimes in early June.

There were several festivals, celebrations, or observances that took place before Pentecost. There was Passover, there was Unleavened Bread, and there was the Feast of Firstfruits. The Feast of Firstfruits was the celebration of the beginning of the barley harvest. Here's the way you figured out the date of Pentecost. According to the Old Testament, you would go to the day of the celebration of Firstfruits; and beginning with that day, you would count off 50 days. The 50<sup>th</sup> day would be the Day of Pentecost. So, Firstfruits is the beginning of the barley harvest, and Pentecost is the celebration of the beginning of the wheat harvest. Since it was always 50 days after Firstfruits, and since 50 days equals seven weeks, it always came a "week of weeks" later. Therefore, they either called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks.

Pentecost is from the Greek word 'Pentekostos', which means 'fifty'. Traditionally, the Church celebrated it as Whitsun – 'White Sunday'. It's believed that this is because it was a day for baptisms, and those being baptized would wear white. Another explanation is that it derives from the Anglo-Saxon word 'wit', which we still use for verbal cleverness, but which meant 'understanding.' Pentecost was when God poured out the wisdom of the Spirit. Hence, Pentecost is considered the day of the church's birth.

So why do we wear red for Pentecost? It symbolizes joy and the fire of the Holy Spirit. Priests, ministers, and choirs wear red vestments. In modern times the custom has extended to the lay people of the congregation wearing red clothing in celebration as well.

So put on your red blazer (you do still have your red blazer, don't you), a red tie, a red scarf, or something else red and join us in church on Sunday, June 5<sup>th</sup> as we celebrate the birth of the church.

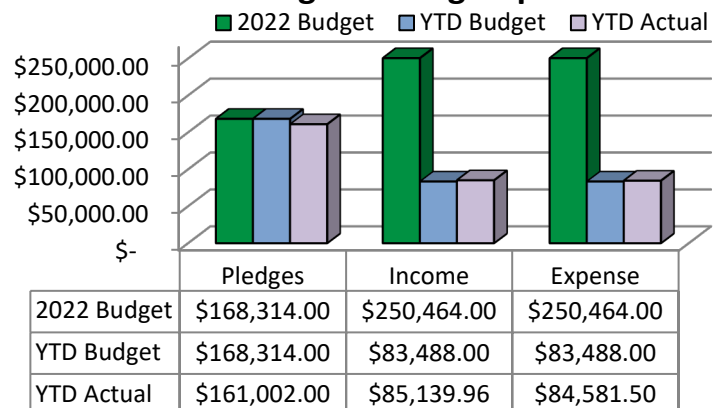

## Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

*But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law. Now those who belong to Christ Jesus crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let's follow the Spirit as well.*

*Galatians 5:22-25 NASB*



In Paul's letter to the Galatians, Paul compares and contrasts the "deeds of the flesh" to the "fruit of the Spirit". Summarizing that the fruit of the Spirit are marks of not only a Christian life but as well the life and witness of the Christian community, the Church.

For some time now I have given thought and prayer on doing a sermon series on Paul's fruit of the Spirit from Galatians. Being a Lectionary preacher for quite some time I have debated just when to do this.

Well, now I have decided that during this summer beginning on July 3<sup>rd</sup> through August 7<sup>th</sup> I will be doing exactly that. This will be a venture that I have not attempted in many years so pray for my guidance as I listen for God's word for all of us.

The Beatles declared that what the world needs is love. I agree, however, I believe the world needs the other eight fruits as well.

*Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will tribulation, or trouble, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? Just as it is written:*

*"For Your sake we are killed all day long;  
We were regarded as sheep to be slaughtered."*

*But in all these things we overwhelmingly conquer through Him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other created thing will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.*

*Romans 8:36-39 NASB*

If asked I would probably identify Romans 8 as my favorite chapter in the whole Bible. Paul's letter to the Romans probably has had the most significant effect on the life and history of the church since its inception during the first century. The reformer Dr. Martin Luther identified Romans as the source of his conversion to Christian faith. Thus, I am excited to offer a nine-week study of Paul's letter to the Romans beginning Aug. 28 and concluding Oct 24. The study will take place in the CE building on Monday evenings with a potluck supper at 6:00 pm. The study will include a student workbook so signing up for the study in Conklin Hall will be helpful in order to have the books here and in sufficient number for the study. Come join us!

## Prayer Corner

**"And all things you ask in prayer, believing, you will receive." Matthew 21:22**



The year was 1973. Our family left home to drive across the state to celebrate my sisters' birthdays. It was early Sunday morning when I became aware that our four month old son was sick. I thought it was a reaction to his DPT shot. I called our doctor, but he didn't return the call. Luckily, I was able to get him into my sister's doctor. It took him 30 seconds to tell us he had Spinal Meningitis. He suggested we put him in the hospital there. The doctor walked out of his waiting room full of patients to admit Bransby. We followed him to the hospital. It was a Catholic hospital so we immediately went to the chapel to pray. As soon as I turned him over

to God's care I experienced "the peace that passes all understanding". I knew without a doubt that he was going to be completely healed. God gave us a sure sign not to go home. There was a freak snow storm so the highway to our city was closed. Also, the labs at our home hospital are closed on Sundays. Later, our doctor told us he never would have survived a three hour drive. He was in isolation and intensive care. He was the last to be admitted to that ward and the first to be released. He was there for three full weeks. During those weeks I never had any doubt that he was not going to be totally healed even though he was too young to crawl or talk. I was with him every day from 8 to 5. I laid hands on him and prayed over him several times a day and continued to breast feed him. The doctors were amazed at his fast recovery. Our church calls him the "Miracle Baby".

### The Home Stretch

This January our son was diagnosed with Non-Hodgkins Lymphoma cancer. He is 49 years old with a wife and two children. When he called and told me I said "Bransby, God healed you once He can do it again". He said, "Yes, Mom. I know He can". He was scheduled to go to a specialist and into Hoag Hospital but he tested positive for COVID which delayed the schedule for a week. His close friend, who is on the board at U.C. Irvine Hospital was able to get him into U.C. Irvine a week earlier and with a doctor that specializes in that particular cancer. He did not lose any time. In fact, he gained a week. It is amazing what God does. Because this cancer is aggressive, he is being treated aggressively with 18 weeks of chemotherapy.

The good news is the tumor has shrunk 80%. Next week he will have his 18<sup>th</sup> week (and last) round of chemo. Let's pray that just as when he was healed as a baby, he will be healed again. I want to thank everyone for their continued prayers.

## Christian Education

Children's Sunday School is on hiatus for the summer, but Adult Sunday School is starting a new quarter of The Present Word study on Sundays at 9:00 am. The theme is "Partners in a New Creation." In June, the four lessons draw from the book of Isaiah to examine the prophetic message warning of Babylon's destruction and inspiring hope for Israel's deliverance leading to peace and prosperity. In July, five lessons from John's Gospel will explore "The Word: The Agent of Creation." Finally, in August, the book of Revelation will help participants to envision the new home and city God has prepared for the redeemed.

The Presbyterian Peacemaking Program sponsors Travel Study Seminars in partnership with World Mission staff and mission co-workers and in cooperation with our partner denominations and organizations. The 2022 Mosaic of Peace seminar to the Holy Land will be on November 6-18 with an optional visit to Jordan. More information is posted on the CE Bulletin Board or talk to me. Participants eighteen and older must apply online by July 1<sup>st</sup>. First-time visitors to the Holy Land are encouraged to attend.

The next seminar will be to the Philippines and Hong Kong on February 3-17, 2023. The seminar will look at the root causes and current challenges of forced migration and labor trafficking. With the recent election in the Philippines, it is timely to learn more about the work of the United Church of Christ in the Philippines (UCCP) supporting Indigenous peoples struggling to protect their ancestral domains, and the impact of almost 7,000 workers per day leaving the Philippines to work in land-based and sea-based jobs. Many end up in Hong Kong where the domestic worker labor force consists mostly of Indonesian and Filipina women. The application deadline is November 5, 2022.

However, the first such program in March about the Blue Zones Project, demonstrated that technical issues involved in the dual format might not be the best way of bringing an event to you. We have decided that future attendance will be in-person, only. In fact, we have renamed the event, appropriately, **Lunch and Learn**. And do we have an invitation for you! On **Thursday, June 9<sup>th</sup> at Noon**, we are excited to be hosting two guests from St. George Regional Hospital, Megan Pucci and Shawnee Snow, who are involved with Intermountain's Precision Genomics HerediGene: Population Study - Our Genes Tell a Story—because they do.

We inherit the chemical, DNA, from our parents. DNA is made up of genes and serves as our body's roadmap about how we'll function, what traits we will possess, and even how we may process or respond to various foods or medications. Sometimes, there could be a mutation in a gene, which could prove to be harmful to our overall health. The HerediGene Study is the largest study in the country whose goal is being able to map the genetic makeup, or human genome, of 500,000 participants in order to unlock more secrets about the role genes play in our overall health and the resulting implications for disease prevention and care. We are most fortunate to have this ground-breaking study, the findings of which could influence the future of healthcare for years to come, being conducted right here in Utah.

What to LEARN more? Please join us for LUNCH on June 9th at Noon to hear what promises to be a wonderfully interesting and informative talk. Bring a sandwich and a friend and, as usual, we'll provide treats and beverages.
