2023 Pledge Drive Begins

We want personally to thank you for your generosity and commitment to the life, mission and ministry of our congregation. With our church life back to normal after COVID, 2022 has been a truly blessed year!

Due to your support, we have been able to reach out with the love of Christ not only to the homeless and hungry in our area through our CROP Walk and area social ministries, but we were also able as well to extend our love to the children of the world including children of Dorogobuzh, Russia, through the Bible Camp ministry of our sister congregation.

With your support, we have been able to support our witness and worship of our Lord and Savior Jesus by offering to our community each Sunday a joyful fellowship and meaningful worship that welcomes all with the love and grace of Jesus Christ.

In other words, due to your commitment to our Lord, lives have been changed in His name.

Pledge forms and a copy of the proposed budget for 2023 will be mailed to everyone early in November. If you don't receive yours, please see Leslie Lintz, Mary Laubscher or Chris Schleter and they will see that you get yours.

Giving is our faith response to God's gifts. God wants us to give willingly and cheerfully out of hearts filled with love and gratitude for our present and eternal lives. We also give out of obedience because God's Word directs us to give.

Our budget is about \$12,000 higher than last year due to inflation, an unknown increase in our insurance premiums (we've been told to expect about a 10% to 15% increase), and unknown Per Capita assessment and salary increases for Rev. Ralph and Steve Talley. We've seen our loose offerings drop by nearly \$5,000 this year so we're asking for about \$17,500 more in pledges for 2023 to cover our expenditures.

Every pledge, no matter how big or small, puts us closer to our goal. You can make a pledge by dropping your pledge form in the offering plate on any Sunday or by returning it to the church office. No one will see your pledge other than our Financial Secretary, LaVerna Metzger.

You can also pledge online by going to our website, hovering over Stewardship in the menu and clicking Pledge Support. On the Pledge Support page, click on General Fund Pledge on the right then fill out and submit the form. LaVerna, will receive an email with your pledge.

If you have any questions, please speak with Leslie Lintz, Mary Laubscher or Chris Schleter, your Stewardship Committee.

We will dedicate our pledges during worship on December 18th.



In a sermon at Immanuel Presbyterian Church in Los Angeles Gary Wilburn said: "In 1636, amid the darkness of the Thirty Years' War, a German pastor, Martin Rinkart, is said to have buried five thousand of his parishioners in one year, an average of fifteen a day. His parish was ravaged by war, death, and economic disaster. In the heart of that darkness, with the cries of fear outside his window, he sat down and wrote this table grace for his children:

"Now thank we all our God
With heart and hands and voices;
Who wondrous things had done
In whom His world rejoices.
Who, from our mother's arms
Hath led us on our way
With countless gifts of love
And still is ours today."

Without question my favorite Thanksgiving hymn is "*Wow Thank We All Our God*", #643 in our Presbyterian Hymnal. Not only is it my favorite because of the beautiful simplicity of faith expressed in thanks to God, but, as well, the faith of its author in the God of our lives and times.

Thanksgiving, our national holiday, was set aside as a time to look back upon the blessings we have received from our bounteous Lord and God and to give thanks for the year behind, looking forward to the year ahead.

One could look back upon the past few years and give thanks these years are behind us and withhold our thanks depending on what lies ahead.

However, there is no comparison between what Pastor Rinkart and his congregation and city experienced to what we have endured, not even close!

Yet in our possible cynicism we need to understand that Pastor Rinkart found faith and thanksgiving. More likely, rather, Pastor Rinkart did not find his faith but instead leaned wholly upon it; which led him to the end of those dark days to give thanks and praise to the living God who "Hath led us on our way with countless gifts of love, and still is ours today."

May we, as we enter our season of Thanksgiving, seek to be as faithful...and thankful.

News from the Russia Mission

Annual BURM Conference

What can be said about connecting with our partners in Russia, the Christians in Ukraine who are suffering from the war, the refugees in Belarus who are being used as pawns in a political game and the authoritarian regimes that are rising to political power in Europe and elsewhere?

Lots can be said, and lots was said at the Belarus, Ukraine, Russia Mission (BURM) Network conference October 6th to 8th. The conference was held in person and virtually via live stream from the First Presbyterian Church in Green Bay, WI. Rev. Ralph attended as a member of the BURM Network Steering Committee and as Good Shepherd's representative.

The model for engagement has been "pairing" Russian and U.S. congregations. Since we cannot visit Russia now or in the near future, we will want to find other ways to engage. It is important to stay in contact with our Russian friends, but we must be very generic in our communications – messages that we're thinking about them are wonderful, but we can't ask questions that could raise their visibility. So, we need to hold them in prayer and make small talk when we communicate with them.

The conference centered on the war in Ukraine and how we can be involved in helping those who are affected. The attendees heard from several groups who are seeking to make a difference in the region. Thinking about the reasons this war began and why it continues was a significant topic at the conference. Attendees learned about the history of the region and how the borders have changed through the years. They learned about the political climate and how a poor economy can lead to the election of Fascists as well as how destructive our dependance on fossil fuels is. We fight wars over oil and as we burn it, we contribute to climate change, which is affecting agriculture in Ukraine. All these problems seem insurmountable but discussing them and understanding them helps us move toward change.

Ellen Smith will speak more about the situation in the region and how it affects our relationships when she visits on November 6th.

Congregational Growth & Care

Lunch and Learn - Via zoom on October 12th, we were privileged to have Dr. Vafa Tabatabaie, Endocrinologist, Associate Professor and Director of the "Fracture Liaison Service" at Montefiore Medical 'Center, Bronx, NY speak to us about Osteoporosis. We learned that:

- One in two women and one in four men over the age of 50 will experience a fragility fracture in their lifetime. Fracture care is costly and certain complications such as loss of quality of life, pain, impaired mobility, isolation, deformity and even death can and do occur. As a live tissue, bone undergoes a continuous process of destruction, repair and regeneration accomplished by two types of cells osteoclasts (the clean-up crew) and osteoblasts (the repair crew). Until our early 30's, these two types of cells work in balance together to maintain healthy bone. With aging or due to other medical conditions, the osteoclasts increase in number and become more active, but the osteoblasts cannot keep up resulting in more bone being removed than being restored. The bone's structure becomes more porous or honeycombed in appearance leading first to milder osteopenia and then, if untreated, to osteoporosis. The good news is we need not become statistics. Bone density test or DXA to the rescue! The US Preventive Task Force recommends that women starting at age 65 should be screened for osteoporosis, but it is never too late to have that first scan and periodically thereafter, depending on the findings. This painless Xray of hip, spine and/or wrist, is covered every 24 months by Medicare, does not require disrobing and the amount of radiation exposure is equal to 1/5 that of a chest x-ray.
- If bone fracture happens as a result of low force trauma, it is diagnostic of osteoporosis. Weakened, osteoporotic bones may be fractured merely by riding over a bumpy road or even by the simple act of sneezing. Changes in bone health may be due to aging, menopause, certain medications, sedentary lifestyle, excessive alcohol drinking, smoking, and chronic diseases such as COPD and overactive thyroid. Timely diagnosis of osteoporosis and institution of treatment will be necessary. The physician discusses treatment options and monitors progress. While any medication can have side effects, the oft cited and concerning osteonecrosis of the jaw is rare; in fact, it has been demonstrated in fewer than 1 in 10,000 to 100,000 patients.
- Maintaining good bone health includes living a healthy lifestyle, staying active and ensuring your diet includes proper amounts of both Vitamin D and Calcium. Optimally, one's daily diet choices can provide proper amounts of Calcium (1200 mg) and Vitamin D (800-1000 IU). Foods that are rich in calcium include dairy (plant or animal source), dark leafy greens, nuts, and some fortified cereals. Some might need calcium supplementation. Calcium carbonate needs stomach acid for absorption so is best taken with food. Calcium citrate is gentler on the stomach and may be taken anytime with or without food. Vitamin D can be produced in skin when exposed to sun, or may come from plant (D2) or animal (D3) sources and is found in fatty fish such as tuna, salmon, swordfish, sardines, egg yolks and in foods fortified with Vitamin D. Don't let Osteoporosis rob YOU of living your best life!!

Mission/Outreach

Two of our major Mission activities move to the top of our queue during October.

Operation Christmas Child, coordinated by Donna Beasley is in full swing. We held a packing party on October 29th and planned to pack 90 shoeboxes - which would be a record. As I write this on October 24th the results of the day are obviously not known. I'll let you know next month how many boxes we actually packed.

Each box has a suggested donation of \$10 to pay the costs involved in processing and shipping the boxes all over the world. The church pays the \$10 for each shoebox that we pack at our packing party and with a goal this year of 90 shoeboxes, the cost comes to \$900. That is money that will not be available to help our local charities at the end of the year. Please consider donating to help us cover this cost by dropping a check or an envelope with cash in the offering plate. Please mark your check or envelope "Mission - OCC."

The 13th Annual St. George CROP Walk will be held on Saturday, November 12th. As of this writing we have ten walkers signed up, but we can always accommodate more. If you would like to walk, please pick up your envelope from me after church any Sunday between now and November 6th. The six-mile walk, as always, will begin at 10:00 am at Larkspur Park in Bloomington Hills. Why six miles? Six miles is the average distance that someone in a developing country walks EACH DAY just to get food and water. There will be refreshments along the way and the mayors of both

Nominating Committee

Change in our weather is not the only thing that occurs during these months of Fall. It is also the time when your church Nominating Committee works to fill both Ruling Elder and Deacon positions known to be coming vacant in the new year. We'd like to share our progress to this point.

Our congregation recently celebrated Heritage Sunday and we were reminded that those who have gone before have, with guidance by the Holy Spirit in all things, brought us to become the church we are today. This concept has not been lost on us, and thus, as a committee, we do not take our responsibilities lightly. We are well-aware that those members we may be led to name to fill positions of leadership and compassion today will be those who will inspire us and influence our church history, presence and mission going forward. We were tasked with having to seek four members to fill Elder positions and three to become Deacons and it has been, by no means, an easy assignment. We have experienced limited success, both by re-assigning currently serving members to different positions and, also, by new members agreeing to accept the call. We most certainly respect that, for various reasons, not every person approached is able to respond in the affirmative to an invitation. However, at the time of this writing, the reality is the Building Elder and Grounds Elder positions and two Deacon positions remain unfilled. As a result, we may be forced to combine Session committees, which will require amending the By-Laws, and reduce the number of parishes to ensure that all positions are filled.

Frankly, we need your help! Your church family needs your help! Serving as an Elder or a Deacon can be rewarding. There are many who have served in these roles and continue to heed the call to serve again and again. We owe them much, but they are weary. If you feel you'd like to or are being led to take a leadership role in the mission of the church, let us know by contacting a member of the Nominating Committee. And, if you <u>are</u> asked to serve, consider saying, "I will!" Join those who have answered, "Here am I. Send me!" Don't just DO mission, BE the mission.

Session held their monthly meeting on October 9th. Here is a synopsis of the actions that were taken:

- Approved to receive M. Gayle Prentice and Dorothy (Dotty) Amland into membership of Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church. They will be introduced to and received by the congregation on October 16, 2022.
- Approved by e-vote on 9-19-2022 to modify the position of church secretary and approve Peggy Graber to share the position with Candy Hurlbut as needed.
- Approved to clean the chairs in Conklin Hall and the Sanctuary and clean the carpet in Conklin Hall at a cost not to exceed \$1,200 from the General Fund.
- Approved the purchase of a new Audio-Technica ATW-2020 wireless microphone system for the Sanctuary at a cost not to exceed \$800 to be paid from bequests.
- Approved the 2023 Draft Budget as submitted to send to members and attendees with the Stewardship Letter.

Stewardship

Another summer has passed and on we go to the holiday season! Thank you to all who have been faithful in giving pledges and offerings. As we move toward a new season of giving, please remember to prayerfully consider your future gifts and pledges. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

You will receive your annual Stewardship letter sometime in the next couple of weeks. We are holding off on sending the letters in the hope that we can get final costs on a couple of large items in the budget.

We encourage everyone to make a pledge as pledges provide us with an estimate of how much income we will have for the year. 2023 will be a challenge as, like you, the church's costs have risen with inflation and our giving has been somewhat less than we anticipated. We need about \$17,500 more in pledges next year than we received this year.

2022 has been challenging. Through September the church's expenditures for 2022 have exceeded our income by about \$10,500. About 80% of our budget is non-discretionary - the basic costs of providing our services, keeping the lights on, our buildings maintained and paying our staff. The discretionary portion of the budget provides our programs like Mission, Worship, Fellowship, Christian Education and others. These ARE our church life and mission in the community and the world. Please consider making a pledge so that we continue to be the church that God has led us to be.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we have turned our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through **October 23rd** we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$67,487** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$318,650** or about **83.0** of our **\$384,000** goal.

While we are not currently conducting a Building Fund campaign, we do need donations to the Building Fund to ensure that our buildings and grounds are kept in good condition. Please consider a donation to the Building Fund to help us reach our goal.
