Souper Bowl of Caring February 12th

The Souper Bowl of Caring takes place on the second Sunday in February. Wait! Isn't that the same Sunday as the Super Bowl? Yes, we are encouraged to take our level of passion for football and match it with our passion for giving to those in St George who are hungry. Bring your canned food donations along with you to church! Bring your money donations and place them in the donation box in the Narthex. Each donation is equal to a touchdown for those who are in need right here in our hometown.

The Presbytery's Matthew 25 Initiative group has added a twist to this year's Souper Bowl - a competition between Utah Presbyterian congregations to see who can gather the most food and raise the most money. The competition is on a per capita basis, meaning that the total amount collected is divided by the number of members of the church. We are a large church so, if we want to win, we will need to collect A LOT of food and cash.

The cash collected will go to Switchpoint for the Soup Kitchen and the food will be divided between Switchpoint and Solomon's Porch. Let's stop by our favorite grocery stores, buy many cans of food, bring them to church on Sundays between now and February 12th to fill the Narthex and score touchdowns for those who are hungry!

Lent Begins This Month

The season of Lent and our celebration of Easter are always busy times at Good Shepherd and 2023 will be no exception.

With Easter a bit earlier this year, April 9th, Lent will begin this month.

Rev. Ralph's Lenten Bible study and potluck will kick off on February 20th at 5:00 pm in the CE Building. The weekly study, focusing on the Psalms, will continue until April 3rd.

We will celebrate the Good Shepherd version of Mardi Gras on Shrove Tuesday, February 21st, with our annual Shrove Tuesday pancake dinner at 6:30 pm in Conklin Hall. Dinner will be followed by a short "Retiring the Alleluia" service in Conklin Hall. Rev. Ralph needs volunteers to help cook for this event and onsite training will be available! Our observation of Lent formally begins on February 22^{nd,} but the schedule will be a bit different this year. Ralph will be in the Sanctuary again from 6:30 pm to 7:15pm on Ash Wednesday for the Imposition of the Ashes.

Lent will continue until the first week in April as we prepare for Easter and our Risen Lord. More on what will happen then next month.



We continue to strongly support our local mission causes and our relationship with our sister church in Russia remains strong which has been challenging in the face of a one year old war between Russia and the Ukraine. Communication has been restricted but still doable. Pastor Sergei has expressed his heartfelt gratitude to God and all of you. Of course our plans to visit this past summer were impossible due to the conflict and had to be cancelled. I am planning to be part of a team from the Belorussia, Ukraine, Russian Mission network to visit Moldova in the fall, a date yet to be determined.

We have returned to our active participation and support of the Saint George Area Interfaith Council continuing to be the largest contributor to the annual CROP Walk.

The restoration continues even in the face of some challenges. Our worship attendance is significantly lower than before the Pandemic. In conversation with other clergy locally as well as nationally this appears to be a shared trend for which none of us have a complete explanation. However, we do continue to welcome visitors, many of whom have become new members and in the past few months we have welcomed some returnees. We know whose guiding hand continues to shepherd us throughout these days and times. Our Lord and Savior continues to call us into a new and bright future that we have only begun to enter. The restoration continues. The New Day awaits!

In the meantime, I want to express my great appreciation to our congregation who have remained positive, supportive, generous, faithful and hopeful with a loving Christian spirit throughout these days.

The Lord is near, and he has led us through these days. And I continue to give thanks to Him for you all.

On January 15th, *visiting* Pastor Jill Dohtery gave an inspiring message on using the power of story to share the good news of Jesus Christ. Our stories reveal the reality of His love, compassion, and care for us; the reality of His intervention in our lives and the reality of answered prayer. She encouraged us to share our stories with friends, neighbors and even strangers that we might meet in the grocery store and other public places, because this is a way we can introduce others to the One who is their salvation and who loves them in very personal ways. Her message confirmed what

I'd said during announcements just the previous week also inviting you to continue sharing your stories of God's intervention in your lives and prayers that have been answered as a means of spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Over the past several years we have published some of your stories here in the Prayer Corner. These stories speak, even to those who are believers; they build our faith.

One such sharing came from Kathryn Whitton in the Prayer Corner for June 2022. She told the story of Kathryn and John's son Bransby who had been diagnosed with Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma. He went through 18 weeks of aggressive chemotherapy. Kathryn wrote of God's intervention to "supply Bransby's needs." At the time of her writing on May 26, 2022, she offered that the tumor had shrunk 80%. Subsequently, he was declared by his doctors to be cancer free.

Today, she writes this letter to be posted here:

Dear Church Family,

I want to reiterate what Pastor Dolores said on Jan 8th in church. We, as a family, need to share our victories concerning answers to prayer. On two occasions I have shared answers to prayers regarding Bransby during coffee hour. I wanted to thank all of you for your faithfulness in your prayers. They did make a difference. I know many people feel that faith in God is a private matter and should not be discussed in public. This was especially true in the past. But today is a new day. We should not be embarrassed to talk about our faith. We want to share our sorrows and our joys. We all need the love and support of our church family throughout our journey here on earth.

However, our stories should not be contained within the walls of the church. All of us are created for a purpose, and that is to be the hands, feet and mouth for Christ. He no longer walks on the earth, but we do. We are his ambassadors. He is counting on us to spread the good news. What better news than God's intervention in our lives and answers to prayers.

The Washington County Water Conservancy District has implemented a program to provide money to those who choose to remove non-functional grass and replace it with drought-tolerant landscaping. A part of the Memorial Garden project was to replace some of the grass anyway, so we applied for money from the WCWCD program and have been tentatively approved for up to \$5,482 to complete this work. There are still a couple of legal requirements to work through but, if we get final approval, that money will help considerably with the cost of the overall project and removing the grass will help to reduce our environmental impact save us money on water. Thanks to Guy for taking the lead on this.

Congregational Growth & Care

For most of us, the Internet is our connection to the world and our loved ones but, for those operating out of malicious intent, it can serve as a connection to our identities and private lives as well. In the worst case, it's as if we have allowed strangers the use of our computers. While we may believe we are able to detect when we have been targeted, many of the familiar scams have been re-imagined and could be unrecognizable until its too late. On Thursday, February 9th at Noon in Conklin Hall, Chris Schleter will not only educate us about how we may recognize many of the scams currently "out there," but also will tell us what to do about them and answer other questions about computer use. *Computer Safety - Is This Real?* will be our first Lunch and Learn event of 2023, so bring a sandwich and plan to join us.

During the month of February, we also take note about its designation almost sixty years ago as Heart Month designed to bring awareness that there are lifestyle choices an individual can make to prevent both heart disease and stroke. Our knowledge about diagnosis and treatments of cardiovascular disease has grown exponentially in the ensuing years so that now, it is estimated that 80 - 90% of all heart disease and stroke are preventable. Certain cardiac events such as cardiac arrest (a sudden interruption in the heart's electrical conducting system - atrial or ventricular arrhythmia) can result in loss of cardiac function, breathing and consciousness and may occur despite our best intentions for prevention. Cardiac arrest is different from a heart attack. In the latter, blood flow in vessels feeding heart muscle becomes blocked and the heart tissue fed by those vessels die. The area of the heart impacted by the blockage determines the extent of loss of heart function, its ability to be rehabilitated and even survivability. If cardiac vessels are found to be narrowed or blocked, then it may be assumed that other vessels in the body may be likewise affected and could result in stroke or other disease processes.

It is not 'new news' to us that studies have shown eating a heart-healthy diet, engaging in regular exercise, abstaining from smoking, maintaining a proper weight and blood pressure provide measurable benefits in helping prevent cardiovascular disease or assist in recovery from a cardiac event. And choosing to make these lifestyle changes is certainly cost effective because the primary cost is personal resolve. As a reminder, Rev. Ralph holds his bi-weekly, non-threatening exercise classes on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 3:00 pm in Conklin Hall, healthy living tips and the recipe of the month may be found on our committee's bulletin board and we offer monthly blood pressure readings on the third Sunday of each month during Fellowship Hour in Conklin Hall. Should you wish, we are available to teach you how to take your own blood pressure at home. Your Growth and Care Committee remains committeed to partnering with you. Choose health!

The Souper Bowl of Caring began in 1990 with a simple prayer said by Reverend Brad Smith at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina: Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat. Twenty-two churches raised \$5,700 in the first year. Now the Souper Bowl of Caring is an ongoing organization in which hundreds of churches participate – donating to their local charities for those who are hungry.

We will be competing with the other churches in the Presbytery to see who can bring in the highest average amount of food or cash per member. Let's do what we do with the CROP Walk and lead all the others!

You may have noticed that this year's Change 4 Change donation will go to the Assistance League of Southern Utah. Since 2008 Assistance League has helped those students through Operation School Bell, their primary philanthropic program. The organization holds shopping events with students and their families. Volunteers read with students in schools and gift them with books to take home. Every year thousands of students in our community don't have new clothes to start the school year. New clothes boost self-esteem. In addition, many elementary students are behind their peers in literacy development. The Assistance League appreciates your donations and encourages you to become a member of the organization.

For those who are interested, all of our Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes were shipped to the Pacific Islands. Donna Beasley reports that, even though it's February, it's never too early to start gathering items to go in shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child. We have a goal of filling 90 shoeboxes in November and need your help. The featured items for February are toothbrushes and bar soap. "Bontshe Shvayg" a Jewish folktale (From Sandy Paige)

Bontshe Shvayg, or Bontshe the Silent, is a man who endures a life of injustice, mistreatment, privation, and indignity with "Not one word against God. Not one word against man." Unlike even Job, he never cries out. He was born in silence, he lived in silence, he died in silence, and he was buried in silence. No one knows what he died of—"he might have starved to death." No wine was drunk at his bar mitzvah, and even the wooden sign marking his grave is used by the gravedigger's wife for a fire to boil potatoes. His stepmother fed him moldy bread and gristle as a child "while she herself drank coffee with cream." His father is defined by what he ingests: "A drunk."

Bontshe saves a rich Jew. He is rewarded with a job and the man's mistress. She turns out to have been carrying the rich man's child, whom Bontshe takes on. The rich man fails to pay him, though, and even the boy grows up to throw Bontshe out.

You learn these things as Bontshe is welcomed into heaven, where his deeds are being judged by the heavenly tribunal. The prosecutor can find nothing to prosecute. "He kept silent. I will do the same." The judge finally is ready with his judgment. "My child . . . you have suffered all in silence. There is not an unbroken bone in your body, not a corner of your soul that has not bled. And you have kept silent. There in the world below, no one appreciated you. You yourself never knew that had you cried out but once, you could have brought down the walls of Jericho. You never knew what powers lay with you. There in the World of Deceit, your silence went unrewarded. Here, in the world of Truth, you will be given your full due. The Heavenly Tribunal can pass no judgment on you. It is not for us to determine your portion of paradise. Take what you want! It is yours, all yours!"

Bontshe looked up for the first time. His eyes were blinded by the light that streamed at him. Everything glittered, glistened, blazed with light: the walls, the angels, the judges. So many angels! He cast his dazed eyes down again. "Truly?" he asked, happy but abashed.

"Why, of course," the judge said. "Of course! I tell you, it's all yours. All heaven belongs to you. Ask for anything you wish, choose what you like."

"Truly?" asked Bontshe again. "Truly! Truly! Truly" clamored the heavenly host.

"Well then, smiled Bontshe, what I'd like most of all is a warm roll with fresh butter every morning." The judges and angels hung their heads in shame.

Building Fund Update

When we took out our mortgage, we estimated that we needed \$384,000 to pay off the mortgage and have the resources to meet our needs for maintaining and improving our facilities. Now that our mortgage has been retired, we have turned our attention to several major maintenance items and improvements that need to be addressed over the next several years. These projects, totaling more than \$145,000, need to be funded. We still need your help.

Through **January 22nd** we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$56,100** and additional cash donations of **\$68,777** giving us a total for all three campaigns of **\$319,940** or about **83.3** of our **\$384,000** goal.

While we are not currently conducting a Building Fund campaign, we do need donations to the Building Fund to ensure that our buildings and grounds are kept in good condition. Please consider a donation to the Building Fund to help us reach our goal.
