

Buildings & Grounds

The new windows in the CE Building have been installed. We saved \$1,000 by using the contractor we chose compared to the other two bids. By installing these energy efficient windows, we have potential energy savings of 25%.

Comfort temperatures have been reset at all church buildings from 70 to 72 degrees.

Guy Schultzman finalized the criteria developed by Guy and the Solar Electric System committee for contractors to bid on landscaping for construction of the solar electric system at the northwest corner of the church property. All bids were to be submitted by December 31st for evaluation and awarding of the contract.

A second proposal for bids for was developed by Guy and the committee for the construction of the actual solar electric system. We expect to put this out to bid in the next couple of months and hope to have the system installed and providing power by the start of air conditioning season this year.

Water sprinklers have been turned off for the season on church property.

Mary and I have donated a sandstone bench made and installed it in the Memorial Garden in honor of our daughter Lindsey.

Congregational Growth & Care

LUNCH & LEARN programs to be offered by our committee in the new year will focus on "Planning Today for Tomorrow," and will address how we might think about topics like aging, the place of material goods in our lives, creating legal, financial and medical surrogacies and planning for our futures including possible need for caregivers and palliative or hospice services. It may seem that these topics would be of interest to only the "older folk" in the congregation but it is never too early to plan for a future which guarantees your life decisions will prevail.

Our first **LUNCH & LEARN** event in 2024 will be held on Thursday, February 22nd from 12:00 Noon to 1:00 pm in Conklin Hall and we are excited to have rescheduled the talk about "Successful Aging" by Good Shepherd member, Daniel Flores, M.Div. M.A. As Daniel has said, "we all age but don't age the same due to genetics, life-style habits, thoughts, emotions and attitudes." Come with your lunch and a friend to hear him discuss what we can learn about aging from both the latest research and, also, ancient wisdom.

Our speaker at the final **Lunch and Learn** program for 2023 was Dr. Kirk Watkins, MD and sleep specialist in charge of the Sleep Center at St. George Regional Hospital. Dr. Watkins spoke to various questions and comments posed by the attendees and the first topic addressed was the pervasive problem - Insomnia. We were surprised to be told that insomnia is a learned behavior which can be unlearned. After experiencing either a negative or positive life event, we may suffer sleep loss, which is then perpetuated because non-wakeful sleep patterns have been formed. Dr. Watkins suggested that if we are unable to sleep within thirty minutes of going to bed, we should get up and engage in some quiet, relaxing activity, free of lights or screen time. Various sleep aids and suggestions for curing insomnia are commonly touted in the media, but the most effective treatment is cognitive therapy conducted by a certified sleep psychologist. There are educational phone Apps dealing with the subject, which may be downloaded, with one of the best having been developed by the VA. It is free and titled, "Insomnia Coach." Other strategies which may promote better sleep are wearing ear plugs, listening to white noise, meditating, and using red bulbs in nights lights because our wake centers are not sensitive to red light.

We explored the diagnosis of restless leg syndrome, which can result in irregular sleep patterns and is known to have a genetic component as its cause. Dr Watkins shared that recent and important findings show RLS actually might be a brain iron deficiency syndrome because those affected have been found to be deficient in the glutamate receptors responsible for extracting iron from the blood in the brain.

We also discussed the use of over-the-counter medications for sleep:

- Benadryl antihistamine, longer-lasting sedation resulting in next day sleepiness and its anti-cholinergic properties may make dementia worse over time.
- Allegra safest as only antihistamine that is non-sedating and not anti-cholinergic.
- Melatonin OTC unsafe over long term and studies show actual dose may be considerably stronger than that shown on the label. Medical grade melatonin by prescription can be therapeutic.

We all know about the condition of sleep apnea, and while even babies and toddlers can be diagnosed as having the problem, it is imperative at any age to investigate any suspected lack of proper oxygenation during sleep because it could be a matter of life or death - high blood pressure, strokes and heart issues may result from poor oxygenation. Currently, most sleep studies are conducted as home tests. If treatment is indicated, there are a range of styles of CPAP masks from which you may choose, or an oral appliance may be effective in certain circumstances. Available also, at significant cost and requiring intervention, is an implantable nerve stimulating device, Inspire.

To hear the entire talk by Dr., Watkins, go to the church website, <u>gspcsg.org</u>, select Activities, scroll to Health and Wellness and choose "Sleep" from the list to the right. Also, take the time to check out any of our previous, informative Lunch and Learn program recordings.

Starting in January, your Growth and Care Committee is launching a wellness series, **Full Plate Living for a Fuller Life**, following the Ardmore Institute's Full Plate Living Core Program. Recommended by the prestigious National Institutes of Health (NIH), the Full Plate Living Core Program is science-based and has a proven history of success. This is not a diet program but a lifestyle program you can stick with! You will eat in abundance and still enjoy your favorite foods. No deprivation. No hunger. It's all about making tweaks to what you already eat. Common results are lower blood pressure, blood sugar, and cholesterol levels, weight loss, reduced chronic pain, and improved energy, mobility and longevity.

You will work on a computer, tablet or mobile phone to access the FREE online lessons and workbook, be a part of a support group facilitated by Donna Flores and Virginia Hunt, coming together for discussion once every two weeks from January 23rd through April 30th. For those interested in learning more about the program, information sessions will be offered in Conklin Hall after church on January 7th and 14th, where you may also sign up for the program.
