Electronic Giving Comes to Good Shepherd

As we launch the drive to fund the expansion of our church building, we are happy to be able to offer our congregation a new method of giving to support church activities.

Beginning on July 15, you will be able to make electronic donations by bank draft or credit card through our partner Vanco Services. You will be able to make donations to the

- General Fund (Pledges)
- Building Fund
- Memorial Fund

In addition, you will be able to

- Sign up for and pay for flowers for the sanctuary
- Donate to our missions
- Donate to the seasonal offerings as they come up
- Donate to support our fellowship activities
- Make cash donations to Dixie Care and Share

Electronic giving has benefits both to you and to the church:

- No more missed pledge payments your gift can be automatically made monthly, even if you are out of town or can't make it to church
- No more remembering to write a check and bring it to church
- Credit card rewards if your card offers them
- Less work for our church treasurer since your donation is deposited directly into the church's bank account and reported directly to our church management system

All donations can be set up to be one-time or recurring and you will receive your annual giving statement as you always have.

To donate online, please visit our Web page, www.gspcsg.org, and click on the Giving tab on the left then click on the blue Give Online button and follow the directions on the screen.

Please note that the church does incur a small processing fee for each online donation. If using a credit card, we ask that you consider adding add 3% to your donation to help cover our processing costs. For donations by bank draft, we request that you add \$0.50 to your gift.

Building Construction Update

We expect to have the building fund loan approved the week of July 8. Construction should begin a couple of weeks after.

During construction, <u>only</u> the west door directly into the sanctuary and the main doors on the east side may be used. The north door into the fellowship hall will not be available. We hope that the inconvenience will not deter you from worshiping with us.

Rev. Ralph's Reflections

These are indeed exciting times in the life of our congregation. In April, our congregation voted to approve our Session's plans to:

- Extend our fellowship hall and add additional storage spaces
- Create a west entry to the narthex that is easily handicap accessible.
- Increase the size of our kitchen.
- Replace the original heating/cooling condensers.

The cost of this construction and updates is estimated not to exceed \$300,000. (\$250,000 for construction and \$50,000 for condenser replacement).

These enhancements will provide needed space and opportunities for our growing congregation and ministries. They will be paid for by a mortgage through the Presbyterian Foundation, our building fund, and gifts and pledges by our congregation and friends.

On the last page of this newsletter, you will find a form you can use to indicate your level of participation in the campaign to fund this exciting project. We are asking that you prayerfully consider supporting this campaign over and above your regular giving by making an outright gift and/or a pledge of up to three years in its support. On that same page is an authorization form for you to request that we charge your donation to your credit card or bank account. While using a credit card or bank draft is completely optional, we encourage you to use this new service.

Our Lord continues to bless the life and ministries of our congregation richly; we have much to rejoice in. Please prayerfully and joyfully join us in our efforts to enhance and advance the work and ministry of OUR congregation by filling out the enclosed form and returning it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office, at your earliest convenience.

Finally, the Session has decided, upon completion, the new fellowship hall will be dedicated and named to the memory of Sarah Louise Conklin, the Presbyterian missionary who served as the lone Presbyterian presence in Saint George for most of her life until her passing in 1949, and for many remains endeared to the life and memory of the Saint George Community.

The Lord continues to lead us into the future, the excitement continues.

Churchwide pastoral letter from the 220th General Assembly (2012)

Pittsburgh

Grace and peace to you in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Earlier today, the 220th General Assembly (2012) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) adjourned after a week of worship and work as the highest council of the denomination. Just under 900 elected commissioners and advisory delegates from every presbytery came from north, south, east, and west to discern together the mind of Christ for the PC(USA).

This assembly's theme, "walking, running, soaring into hope" (Isaiah 40:31) was a fitting description of the assembly in many ways. At one level, the commissioners worked tirelessly—meeting literally well into the early morning hours today to complete their work—and doing so with much energy and passion. At a deeper level, the deliberations and discernment of this assembly reflect a church that is endeavoring to know how to demonstrate faithfully and effectively the gospel of Jesus Christ in the 21st century.

Some of the highlights:

Worship – The assembly paused daily in the midst of its business, in the same space, to worship. Each of the preachers used the same text, Mark 2:1-12, chosen by outgoing GA Moderator, Cindy Bolbach. Commissioners and advisory delegates prayed and sang often, using selections from the upcoming new hymnal from the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation, Glory to God, which the assembly voted to commend to the church (available in 2013; www.presbyterianhymnal.org).

Community – Those who have experienced a General Assembly speak overwhelmingly of the sense of connectedness that develops over the course of the assembly, and this one was no exception. Group meals, committee work, mission tours, exhibit hall, and more provided opportunities to make new friends and reconnect with those for whom an assembly is a "family reunion." You can get a sense of that community through the photo and video gallery and more at www.pcusa.org/ga220. The community extended beyond Pittsburgh, as well—thousands gathered in this country and around the world through social media to watch the proceedings (www.twitter.com/search/ga220).

- Business The assembly addressed roughly 800 items of business in the form of overtures, reports, commissioner resolutions and more. We commend to you PC-biz (www.pc-biz.org), the online site where you can read about each item of business. Some topics that were before the assembly are likely to draw media attention—perhaps they already have where you live. We want to highlight some of them, sharing with you the actions taken by the assembly:
- Definition of marriage The assembly chose not to change the current definition of marriage that is in the PC(USA) constitution, namely, that marriage is a civil contract "between a man and a woman." Rather, through its action to approve a two-year study, the assembly is inviting the entire church to engage in serious, deliberate conversation on this issue.
- Middle East The assembly chose not to divest from three companies participating in "non-peaceful pursuits" in the West Bank, East Jerusalem and Gaza. Rather, the assembly voted "to pursue a positive and creative course of action with respect to the current Palestinian/Israeli conflict," and to "devise a plan of active engagement and projects that will support collaboration among Christians, Jews, and Muslims." The assembly also approved a boycott on "all Israeli products coming from the occupied Palestinian territories."
- 1001 Movement The assembly overwhelming supported a movement to create 1001 worshiping communities (www.onethousandone.org). Those communities of faith will perhaps look much different from traditional congregations, but those that are already underway—in coffee shops, shopping malls, even on bicycles—are changing the world and the church for the sake of the gospel.

Commissioners and advisory delegates wrestled passionately together in heart, mind, and prayer, yet did so respectfully and graciously. Rarely were votes taken that had a wider margin than 60%-40%. On marriage and the Middle East issues, the voting results were extremely close. More than once, commissioners rose with requests to reconsider items already approved.

Obviously, we are working through difficult issues that do not get easily resolved by one or two votes, or even within one or two years. Nevertheless, we stand firmly in the conviction and hope that God is present with us – behind, before, and beside us.

Each assembly committee opened its meeting with prayer and reflection on Paul's encouragement to the church in Ephesus: "...making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (4:3). This is our prayer, as well.

We pray that every effort will be made to continue conversation at every level of the church—from congregations to presbyteries to synods to the General Assembly—encouraging and engaging one another, maintaining the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

May the good and faithful work begun in Pittsburgh continue, remembering that "those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not faint" (Isaiah 40:31).

Parish Nursing Ministry

Brown Bag Lunch May 23rd

On Wednesday, May 23rd, the Parish Nursing Ministry hosted a Brown Bag Lunch, featuring Dr. Jeff Stewart, Podiatrist, as our guest speaker. Dr. Stewart emphasized that he does everything possible before considering surgery for foot problems. Life is good, he said, until our feet start hurting, and this pain leads to lack of activity, impacting our overall well-being. Dr. Stewart spoke mainly on two of the most common foot problems: neuropathy and plantar fasciitis.

NEUROPATHY symptoms include burning, tingling and/or numbness in the feet. Balance and sensation are affected. Usually the long peripheral nerves are affected first, and symptoms begin in the toes. People tend to widen their stance (walk or stand with legs farther apart than normal) for stability. This condition is very common in diabetics, in which the nerve endings tend to deteriorate, leading to lack of feeling, which can lead to rubbing, sores, infection and even amputation. This is also seen in alcoholics, people who work for long periods with chemicals, and people undergoing chemotherapy. In some cases, the cause is unknown ("idiopathic"). While this cannot be cured, the symptoms can be treated with Vitamin B-12 supplements, physical therapy modalities, and controlling diabetes with personal doctor participation.

<u>PLANTAR FASCIITIS</u> is a common injury for runners. The first symptom is often one's first step in the morning, causing severe pain in the foot. The ligament tightens overnight during sleep; you step on the foot upon getting out of bed, and the ligament stretches and hurts. Development of a heel spur (abnormal bone growth) is a sign that there is a lot of tension in the plantar ligament. Treatment includes stretching, ice, cortisone injections, orthotics for arch support in shoes. In extreme cases, endoscopic (through a scope) surgery can be done to cut the ligament.

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Bone spurs can usually be left alone as long as they do not point downward. Exercise is good to increase blood flow, and therefore nutrition, to the foot.

THICK RIDGED TOENAILS are usually the result of a fungal infection. Topical creams can be used as well as oral medication, to get rid of this problem. Liver function blood tests must be done regularly if one takes the medication.

FOOT SWELLING can be associated with damaged and decreased venous blood flow in the legs. The valves in the veins wear out or are injured, so they function poorly and blood is not moved efficiently out of the legs. Swelling typically worsens over the course of the day. Treatment includes elevation of the legs, compression hose, and diuretics.

Brown Bag Lunch June 27th

MEDICAID ELIGIBILITY

Lorie Profitt RN and Becky McCray, Social Worker of Utah Hospice, made an informative presentation at our Brown Bag lunch on 27th. They stated that Medicaid is a state run organization and application can be made through Work Force Services, SW Public Health Service and Five County Area Agency on Aging or by a Social Worker at admission to a nursing home.

Needed documents for Medicaid Eligibility

- Proof of age and citizenship
- Proof of social Security Number
- Liquid assets including checking and savings account statements(past 3 months, but may request past 5 years)
- Proof of vehicle ownership
- Other assets such as buildings and land other than the homestead
- Trusts
- Life and health insurance policies, and burial plans including deed to cemetery plot
- Proof of all income
- Proof of medical expenses such as health insurance premiums and medical bills. Include any unpaid bills on which payment is owed if the applicant chooses to use these as a deduction

Additional information included that your house and car are exempt as assets as well as \$2000 for a single and \$3000 if married in bank accounts. To be eligible your annual income limit as a single person is \$11,170 and \$15,000 if married. There is a new Medicaid sponsored program called New Choices Waiver designed to provide recipients residing in a nursing home the option of receiving long term care services in home and community based settings rather than institutional setups.

Hospice Care

Medicare benefits from Part A cover Hospice care 100% with 24 hour home assistance and nurses on call. This requires a MD's order and includes social worker, spiritual chaplain, certified aide care, music therapy and bereavement counseling.
