Pentecost is Coming - Get Your Red On!

One of the many important dates on the church calendar is coming up in May. On June 19th, we will celebrate Pentecost, the birthday of the Church.

If you go back and read the Old Testament, you will discover that Pentecost was one of the Jewish feast days. Only they didn't call it Pentecost. That's the Greek name. The Jews called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks. It is mentioned in five places in the first five books—in Exodus 23, Exodus 24, Leviticus 16, Numbers 28, and Deuteronomy 16. It was the celebration of the beginning of the early weeks of harvest. In Palestine there were two harvests each year. The early harvest came during May and June, and the final harvest came in the Fall. Pentecost was the celebration of the beginning of the early wheat harvest, which meant that Pentecost always fell sometime during the middle of May or sometimes in early June.

There were several festivals, celebrations, or observances that took place before Pentecost. There was Passover, there was Unleavened Bread, and there was the Feast of Firstfruits. The Feast of Firstfruits was the celebration of the beginning of the barley harvest. Here's the way you figured out the date of Pentecost. According to the Old Testament, you would go to the day of the celebration of Firstfruits; and beginning with that day, you would count off 50 days. The 50th day would be the Day of Pentecost. So, Firstfruits is the beginning of the barley harvest, and Pentecost is the celebration of the beginning of the wheat harvest. Since it was always 50 days after Firstfruits and, since 50 days equals seven weeks, it always came a "week of weeks" later. Therefore, they either called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks.

Pentecost is from the Greek word "Pentekostos", which means "fifty". Traditionally, the Church celebrated it as Whitsun – "White Sunday". It's believed that this is because it was a day for baptisms, and those being baptized would wear white. Another explanation is that it derives from the Anglo-Saxon word 'wit', which we still use for verbal cleverness, but which meant 'understanding.' Pentecost was when God poured out the wisdom of the Spirit. Hence, Pentecost is considered the day of the church's birth.

So why do we wear red for Pentecost? It symbolizes joy and the fire of the Holy Spirit. Priests, ministers, and choirs wear red vestments. In modern times the custom has extended to the lay people of the congregation wearing red clothing in celebration as well.

On May 5th, 12th and 19th, we will collect monies for the annual Pentecost Offering. A gift to the Pentecost Offering helps the church encourage, develop, and support its young people, and address the needs of at-risk children. Forty percent of the Pentecost offering is kept by Good Shepherd and used to impact in the lives of young people within our community. The remaining sixty percent is used to support ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency. Please prayerfully consider supporting our youth through your donations.

So put on your red blazer (you do still have your red blazer, don't you), a red tie, a red scarf, or something else red and join us in church on Sunday, May 19th as we celebrate the birth of the church.



Live Into Hope is the theme of the 226th meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church USA. That's us folks! All of our 133 Presbyteries from across the nation will be sending their commissioners to this, the highest governing body of our church. In fact, I am the Presbytery of Utah's Commissioner to this meeting. With advisory delegates and guests from around the world the General Assembly will meet for ten days to confer and debate but, most importantly, to seek to discern the will of Christ for the future of the Presbyterian Church USA. And guess what, they are meeting this June in Salt Lake City. Thus, the announcement from our Presbytery office that I share with you below:

GA 2026 is fewer than 75 days away.

From June 24 to July 4, we will welcome and host over 1,000 delegates from over all over the United States and the world. The Presbyterian world is coming to Utah and we want them to feel welcomed and appreciated.

There are opportunities to volunteer to greet and direct arriving delegates at the airport, help them ride TRAX downtown and get to their hotels near the Salt Palace, help host our opening reception Saturday evening June 29th, bring them to our local congregations for Sunday worship and a light lunch, welcome and direct attendees and visitors at the Salt Palace and finally help them return to the airport. To accomplish all of this, we expect to need over 125 volunteers each day.

There will be two volunteer virtual orientation and training sessions, Wednesday June 12th at 7:30 pm and Saturday June 15th at 9:30 am. More information on these will follow once people have signed up.

There will also be opportunities to host volunteers in your homes, those from outside the Wasatch Front, from other parts of Utah, and the Synod of the Rocky Mountains. More information on this later.

Finally, we will be inviting GA commissioners from across the country to donate money or certain items for local charitable programs. This donation opportunity will also be available to our local Presbyterians. We will share this in another email.

Walking the Labyrinth

Prayer takes many forms. For many of us, the prayer we practice most is Intercession; we pray for one another and for those we love. Intercession is essential to our spiritual life as commanded In scripture. However, opening oneself to new ways to pray will deepen our spiritual lives and enhance our relationship with the Lord.

Deacon Jessie Henderson and his Boy Scout Troup have created a Labyrinth on the South Side of the church between the parking lot and the Memorial Garden. Thanks to their gift, we have a new way to commune with our Lord and deepen our spiritual lives by "Walking the Labyrinth!"

What is a Labyrinth and How Do You Walk it?

Walking a labyrinth is a profound and ancient practice that invites individuals into a space of deep contemplation and meditation. Labyrinths have served as tools for spiritual exploration and connection for centuries, offering seekers a sacred path for prayer, reflection, and inner journeying.

Before embarking on the labyrinth walk, it's essential to prepare oneself mentally and spiritually. This involves taking a moment to center oneself, perhaps through deep breathing or meditation, and setting clear intentions for the walk. These intentions could range from seeking guidance and clarity to simply fostering a deeper connection with the divine.

Approaching the labyrinth with reverence is crucial. It's a time to disconnect from external distractions, such as phones or other devices, and cultivate an attitude of openness and respect for the sacred space ahead.

As one steps onto the labyrinth path, there's an opportunity to pause and take a moment to breathe deeply, anchoring oneself in the present moment. Some may choose to offer a prayer or invocation, setting the tone for the journey ahead.

Unlike a maze, where one seeks to find the way out, there is no "right" or "wrong" way to walk a labyrinth. Each person is encouraged to trust their intuition and walk at their own pace, allowing the journey to unfold organically. Whether one chooses to move slowly and deliberately or at a quicker pace, the labyrinth's path will eventually lead to the center.

Upon reaching the center, it's important to take time for reflection, prayer, or meditation. The center of the labyrinth is a sacred space, offering an opportunity for deep introspection and communion with the divine. Here, individuals may choose to engage in silent contemplation, journaling, or offering prayers of gratitude or supplication.

Exiting the labyrinth is a continuation of the journey, following the same path back out. It's a time to remain present in the moment, trusting the process and allowing any insights or feelings that arose during the walk to settle and integrate.

Once outside the labyrinth, it's customary to take a moment to give thanks for the experience and reflect on any insights gained. The walk serves as a powerful reminder of the interconnectedness of all things and offers valuable lessons that can be applied to daily life. You may find it useful to journal your experience.

Finally, integrating the experience into daily life is essential. This involves reflecting on how the insights and feelings from the labyrinth walk can be carried forward into relationships, work, and spiritual practice, enriching one's overall journey.

In essence, walking a labyrinth is a deeply personal and transformative experience, inviting individuals to trust their intuition, embrace the journey, and connect with the sacredness within and around them.

Congregational Growth & Care

Our speaker for our April 3rd Lunch and Learn program, Katie Woods, is a St George native and Lawyer specializing in Elder Care Services, Estate Planning and Guardianship. As we had learned during Katie's two previous visits to Good Shepherd, she is more than qualified to help us unlock the mysteries about which end-of-life documents are necessary for proper and legal Estate Planning.

As Katie emphasized, because we never know when an accident or tragedy might befall us, it is important to have legal documents in place which we have created and which reflect, without question, our personal wishes.

Important to have in place are an Advance Health Care Directive, through which we name someone as our Agent with the power to make health care decisions if we are unable, a Living Will, which indicates our wishes about care measures to be undertaken and a POLST or Provider Order for Life-Sustaining Treatment document, which is a medical order

containing our DNR wishes. The POLST does not replace, but serves as an important companion document to the Advance Directive. The Utah Advance Health Care Directive, which includes a Living Will, can be created without need for a Notary but the POLST must be completed by a medical professional. All three documents may be accessed online at no charge and once created, are active only while we are alive. A copy of each should be kept available in your home and should be conveyed to your medical provider and local hospital so there will be no uncertainty about your wishes in case of emergency.

Other important legal documents to have on record which convey your personal wishes are:

- 1. Attorney-in-Fact (POA) A person with whom you share a basic philosophy of life and mutual respect and to whom you grant permission to act on your behalf in consideration of your best interests to make critical personal property and financial decisions for you in the event you are unable to act for yourself.
- Will or Trust A document which, upon the event of your passing, stipulates unequivocally, YOUR wishes and directives about distribution of personal property. Funds or property undesignated by the tenants of a Will become property of the State of Utah.

Because our thoughts about inheritance or assignment of property may change or a state may alter its Health Directives forms, it is advised that we review our documents once a year. Once created, Estate Planning documents from other states are most likely valid but to avoid any opportunity for dispute, it is advisable to have updated forms in place which are provided and approved by one's current state of residence.

In summary, Katie said that the job of Estate Planning is to help us Plan for a worst-case scenario while Hoping for the best.
