Changes Come to GSPC's Music Program

By now everyone knows that Barbara McConnell retired as Director of Music effective on August 28th. We thank Barbara for being an integral part in our church for 16 years and, in recognition of her service in leading our music programs, Session voted to name her Director of Music Emerita and her photo now hangs in the Narthex.

Paul Wiens has agreed to assume the Director of Music role on an interim basis through the end of 2024. He has exciting plans for the direction of our music program, and you can read about those plans in his Music column on page 6 of this month's newsletter.

With Steve Talley's retirement as our organist at the end of May, we have engaged Aaron Lund to be our new Pianist. While Steve will not be playing for us, he will still have a hand in our music program: he has agreed to teach Aaron to play the organ! Learning the organ is a long-term process but we look forward, down the road, to Aaron at the keyboard of our organ, adding stirring music to our worship.

Solar Electric System Up and Running

Thanks to funding provided by the estate of Paul and Gloria Reynolds, Good Shepherd now has a fully functional Solar Electric System (SES) installed behind the shed at the back of our property. Thanks to Guy Schultzman and the committee (Scott Florence, Tom Contreras and Chris Schleter) for their hard work to make the system a reality.

The system consists of 39 solar panels that have a combined rated output of just over 23 kilowatts. The system was sized so that our net electric usage each year will be close to zero.

The system has been up and running for just over a month and, when the sun is shining, produces about 150 kWh per day. We haven't had an electric bill with a full month of solar output yet, but we expect to see a substantial reduction in our electric bill going forward.

One reason we decided to pursue an SES in 2024 is that the Inflation Reduction Act provides for a 30% tax credit of the total cost of the system and, for the first time, non-profits like Good Shepherd are eligible to receive the credit. The total cost of the system was around \$113,200 so we will get a check from the IRS for almost \$34,000 once the paperwork is complete.

A side benefit of installing the SES is that we had to clear all of the brush and debris from the area where the SES was to be installed before we could begin construction. After some discussion, we decided that we would clear not only the SES area, but the entire back of the property. That area had been a hangout for people over the years (we found burned wood, balls and enough beer cans to start our own recycling company). All of the plants and debris were also a major fire hazard.



As many, if not all, of you may know, it was my honor to serve the Presbytery of Utah as its Teaching Elder Commissioner to the 226th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) which met in Salt Lake at the end of June and beginning of July.

Along with my duties as a commissioner I was a vice-moderator of the one of the Assembly's standing committees, which necessitated my spending close to two weeks in Salt Lake. The first week was the committee meetings preparing for the full General Assembly which would take place the following week.

I've been asked what items of great import we accomplished; this is difficult to answer. We accomplished a lot of little things, some of which you may never know and in some cases you will.

If I can bring this same Holy Spirit to our church, and community, then just perhaps this has been one of the most successful GA's we have ever come to know!

Prayer Corner

Why Bless?



God directs us to bless one another; blessing others is powerful!

In the Oasis of Blessing, we have discovered a profound truth; offering blessing in the Name of Jesus is a directive of God, our Father in Scripture, and it is powerful in its effect. The directive immediately follows the blessing Abraham and his sons were to give to the children of Israel, the one that is beloved by all, "*The Lord bless you and keep you . . ."* (Numbers 6:22-

26). The directive is found in verse 27: "So they will put my name on the Israelites, and I will bless them." This verse speaks to the profound impact of invoking a divine blessing, highlighting that when God's name is placed upon the people, He Himself bestows His blessings upon them. This passage underscores the intimate connection between God and His children, where the act of blessing is not just a ritual but a conduit for divine grace and favor. Blessings send God's presence, protection, and peace into the lives of those who receive it. Blessing someone can transform their circumstances, and reinforce a sense of belonging to a community under divine care. By placing God's name upon the people, the blessing becomes a powerful affirmation of His enduring covenant and love, ensuring that they are remembered, cherished, and guided by His everlasting care.

Does this excite you? But perhaps you wonder how **you** can become God's conduits of blessing to those around you? You can easily learn by joining us for our study of the Blessing Course in the CE building beginning Monday, September 9th, every other week, ending on December 2nd. (Yes, the books are being ordered, but I have found that pdf's of the material can be downloaded right up until the day before the course begins).

During the course you will find that understanding and experience flourish together. Working in a group session enables you to learn better, laugh together and rejoice together, practice together, make friends and deepen fellowship. Doesn't that sound inviting?

The course is intensely practical. Key subjects include:

- THE GOD WHO BLESSES / Grasping the goodness of God
- BEING BLESSED / Our Personal Discovery of Foundational Truth
- CALLED TO BLESS / The Priestly Role of Every Christian
- BLESSING / The Person in Front of Me
- BLESSING / The Land
- BLESSING / Areas, Regions, Nations
- BLESSING / A New Life and a New Community

A typical session would involve:

- A welcome
- A Scripture
- A written prayer read together reflectively
- Introduction to the video
- A video of around 15 minutes
- Opportunity to respond to the video
- A question to consider
- Some additional insights
- Prayer, with opportunity to hear God speaking to you
- A practical Plan of Action for the coming week

By the end of the course, you should expect to be more confident in your personal relationship with the Lord; enjoying the experience of his blessing on your life; and being effective at blessing others through words as well as deeds.

Congregational Growth & Care

We hope you've had a great summer. There has been a change in our Lunch and Learn schedule. Our next program, to be held on Wednesday, September 18th, will feature the topics of Hospice and Caregiving and our Wednesday, November 9th program will be a discussion of De-cluttering and Downsizing. Both events will complete our year of helping you plan for your future, and we hope you will plan to attend each program and - Bring a Friend!! (More about our September 18th program in our next newsletter article but here's a hint - we won't be recommending that you bring your lunch!!

We already have endured our share of hot, summer days but, sadly, given that cooler days are probably not in our immediate futures, it is important to consider the effect these hot days can have on our bodies. According to an AARP publication, although older adults are the most vulnerable to the dangers of excessive heat, we know it can be detrimental to those of any age. Physiologically, we each are programmed to deal with excessive heat in the same way - we perspire, and moisture is given off to the skin's surface which evaporates into the atmosphere, and we experience a cooling of our bodies. However, other factors, such as which medications we take, can interfere with this process and influence how our bodies respond to this cooling process. Medications themselves can be affected by heat so it's a good idea to be familiar with special instructions about your medication found on the package insert or printed on instructions your pharmacist includes with each filled prescription. It is generally advised to store a medication in a cool, dry place and some, like insulin, are to be kept below 30 degrees. Although medications aren't prescribed based on possible seasonal variances, some physicians may choose to reduce the dose or substitute medications during the hotter summer months.

Below are some classes of medications and examples of those which may influence how our bodies handle heat:

- HEART MEDICATIONS Diuretics or water pills (Lasix, HCTZ, HydroDiuril), Beta Blockers (Toprol, Tenormin, Inderal), ACE inhibitors (Lisinopril, Zestril, Prinivil)
- ARB'S Angiotensin II receptor blockers (Losartan, Valsartan, Antiplatelets 9Plavix)
- ANTIDEPRESSENTS (Prozac, Paxil, Zoloft, Cymbalta, Elavil)
- ANTIPSYCHOTICS (Risperdal, Seroquel, Haldol)
- ANTICHOLINERGICS (Cogentin, Ditropan XL, Detrol)
- ANTIHISTAMINES (Benadryl)
- DECONGESTANTS (Sudafed, Afrin spray, Zicam, Dristan, Mucinex)
- DOPAMINERGICS (Sinemet, Adderall, Desoxyn, Ritalin)

If you are unsure about how your medication may be affecting you, do not summarily stop the medication but consult your physician with your concerns. Additionally, we each should be proactive in following lifestyle measures that lessen the hot weather's impact. Wear hats, loose-fitting clothing and sunscreen which offer protection against the sun. Keep your home as cool as possible with air conditioning, fans and window shading against the sun's rays. Stay wellhydrated, avoid engaging in outdoor projects and activities during the hottest time of the day and consider the fact that in a few months, we most likely will be complaining about the cold temperatures we are experiencing!

Session held their monthly meeting on June 1st. The following actions were taken:

- The clerk reported that a thank you letter was sent to an LDS young men's group who cleared weeds from the community garden.
- Agreed to support the Worship Committee in details regarding the retirement of the Music Director.
- Approved vacation time of. August 2-4 to Rev. Clingan.
- Approved to accept the bid of Desert Falls for replacement of four valves plus installation at a cost of \$610.00.
- Approved to purchase two Panasonic AW-UE50 PTZ cameras, a Panasonic AVHSW10 switcher and required support equipment from MediaRight plus installation supplies at a total cost not to exceed \$15,000 to be paid from Bequests.

A called meeting of Session was held on June 16th. The following actions were taken:

- Approved to name Barbara McConnell as Music Director Emerita of GSPC.
- Approved to hire Paul Wiens as Interim Music Director at \$1,000 per month for a term July 1 through December 31, 2024, including responsibilities as specified in a contract.
- Approved donations of half of our annual amount to each of our local charities for the total of \$6,000.
- Approved a donation of \$500 each to Friends of Moldova and YMCA Moldova from mission set aside fund.
- Approved a donation of \$1,000 to the church in Dorogobuzh for Bible Camp from Mission Set-Aside Fund.
- Approved the expenditure of up to \$5,000 to be taken from the Reynolds's Family Bequest to mitigate the effects of the Solar Electric System on our neighbor. Also to give authority to Chris Schleter to conduct future negotiations with the property owner.

The next meeting of the Session will be Sunday, August 11, 2024, at 12:00 Noon in the CE Building.


It has been a pleasure to work under the leadership of Barbara McConnell and Rev. Ralph Clingan. I wish you all the best in your music and community ministries.
