### **Church Financial Situation Improving**

Thanks to everyone who stepped up to assist the church during our ongoing financial shortfall. We know that the economy has taken a toll on everyone's finances and appreciate everything you've been able to do to help.

During September we received, or have been told we can expect, multiple generous donations. As a result of these donations and an increase in our offerings on Sundays, we have in available funds for General Fund expenses just over \$18,000, an increase of just under \$9,650 since the end of August.

We are not out of the woods yet. We will have about one month's expenses remaining in the General Fund after paying our September bills. If our income for the rest of the year matches (or, hopefully, exceeds) our expenditures, we will be able to pay all our bills without having to make major cuts.

We are also working on next year's budget and, based on very preliminary numbers, we expect a decrease in our expenses of about \$8,000. We'll present the 2025 budget on Stewardship Sunday on November 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Again, thanks to everyone who has helped to get us through the crisis we had at the end of the summer.

### **Church Growth a Top Priority for 2025**

During the pandemic of 2020 and 2021, our Church was shut down for significant periods. Understandably, the number of members fell during this period, declining from approximately 250 to 220. We had hoped those numbers would rebound shortly after pandemic restrictions were lifted; however, they have not.

As a result, the Congregational Growth and Care (CG&C) committee is interested in developing a project for the year 2025 to promote the growth of our congregation. The CG&C committee has appointed Guy Schultzman as the lead for the project Guy is experienced in project management and has led several Building & Grounds projects, including the Memorial Garden and the Solar Electric System.

The first step in such a project is to form a subcommittee with diverse representation from across the congregation. Once the subcommittee has been formed, it will seek to understand the needs of our Congregation and to explore various ideas for marketing our Church to newcomers. When initial plans have been agreed upon, the Subcommittee will then obtain conceptual approval from the CG&C Committee and from Session.

Following conceptual approval, the Subcommittee will then develop a plan for implementation. This may require different Church and/or professional resources tailored to the details of the plan. Final approval of a resourced (people and money) plan will be requested from Session with an intention to complete implementation in 2025.



A former colleague of mine was faced with a difficult situation. In an election year both candidates for city mayor were members of his congregation. They had a unique solution to the situation. His congregation printed and distributed buttons that read; "THIS YEAR VOTE PRESBYTERIAN".

### **Congregational Growth & Care**

At our latest Lunch and Learn event on Wednesday, September 19<sup>th</sup>, we were pleased to welcome, from Renew Home Health and Hospice, Administrator Janice Millette, nurse Preston and PT Assistant/Activities Coordinator Andrew to help us discuss the topics of Caregiving and Hospice Care. Not only did they, themselves, come to present but they treated those in attendance to a delicious box lunch from Chick-fil-A. During the hour-long program, we learned what it means to be under care of a hospice provider, how the need for such services is determined, by what agencies they will be provided, and how important pre-planning care can be for not only the one in need but also for family, loved ones and those wanting to be supportive and supported during end-of-life times.

Hospice care should begin when there is the expectation that, given the usual course of a terminal disease, a person might have six months or less to live. A common misconception is that hospice care will last the six months, no more, no less. However, in certain instances, the patient could, in fact, improve after accepting hospice care from its many resources and may come off hospice for some period of time. One important fact was stressed by our speakers - the average length of time a person receives valuable hospice care is for only a week before passing away. Sadly, hospice services are often called in too late in the illness after their team of doctors, nurses, social workers, spiritual counselors, home health aides, volunteers, short term respite and caregiver support could have been providing comfort and dignity and important end-of-life care. Medical providers recommend hospice when it becomes evident that treatments focused on curing a disease are no longer beneficial and the patient's condition is not expected to improve. Hospice care costs, including medical equipment and supplies, are covered by Medicare, Medicaid and most private insurers as long as no heroic measures other than continuation of usual medications and physical care are being employed. However, Hospice does not provide room and board or ongoing, around-the-clock care.

Death is as much a part of life as is birth and choosing to receive Hospice care does not mean that you have given up. Instead, it means that you are in control and advocating for living life as fully as possible for as long as possible. You always have the option to change your mind. If you do choose to enlist the services of Hospice in the future, it will be a very personal relationship. Therefore, it will be crucial that you and your loved one's interview more than one provider to help you all decide which facility best meets your level of comfort at such a difficult time. As we have stressed during our programs this year, planning for all stages of our lives and making our wishes known to others, including thoughts about end-of life-care, can ease the burdens for those left behind.
