5th St. George CROP Walk November 9th

The 5th St. George CROP Hunger walk will take place at 10:00 am on November 9th. Sponsored by the St. George Interfaith Council, the walk will begin in Larkspur Park in Bloomington Hills (Corner of Fort Pierce Drive & Larkspur Road by the LDS Chapel).

CROP stands for Communities **R**esponding to **O**vercome **P**overty. CROP Hunger Walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by local volunteers to raise funds to end hunger.

What is a CROP Hunger Walk?

The CROP Hunger walk is neighbors walking together to take a stand against hunger in our world. Different ages, faiths and backgrounds - together we raise awareness and funds for international relief and development, as well as local hunger-fighting. Some 2,000 communities across the country take part each year.

Why should I walk?

Hungry people in developing countries typically walk as many as six miles a day to get food, water and fuel, and to take their goods to market. We walk to be in solidarity with their struggle for existence. We walk because we want to end hunger - one step at a time.

Where does the money go?

In the last 20 years, CROP Hunger Walks have raised more than \$294 million to help people struggling to feed their families - both around the world and around the corner. In fact, 25 percent of the funds raised by CROP Hunger Walks benefit the communities where they take place, by supporting local food banks, pantries, community gardens and other hunger-fighting initiatives.

What makes CROP Hunger Walks different?

They are community-based and interfaith. They have an impact locally and globally. And Walk donors may designate their gifts to other approved international hunger-fighting agencies. No one else does that.

I can't walk in the CROP Hunger Walk. How else can I help?

If you can't walk in the CROP Hunger Walk, you can donate by sponsoring a walker or you can help out with the operation of the walk. Good Shepherd sponsors one of the refreshment stands and Amy Craig will be manning the stand again this year. She would LOVE to have you help her!

You can walk and/or donate but however you choose to be a part of this important event, please GET INVOLVED.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full 15 year term, we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also need to replenish the \$45,000 that was in the fund when we began the project.

Through the end of October, we had received pledges totaling \$65,456.00 and cash donations of \$20,029.45 towards retiring the mortgage. We hope to maintain the tradition of paying off our mortgages early.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and free funds to be used for additional improvements that we need to make.

So, if you or a family member is hospitalized please alert the Pastor, your Deacon, or the church office. Otherwise, we will not be informed of your presence there and unable to assist or offer pastoral care.

Parish Nursing Ministry

On Wednesday, October 16th, Anita Stiens of the Alzheimer's Association of St George built on her presentation from the September Brown Bag Lunch when she spoke about "When Memory Changes Affect Your Life – Resources & Coping Strategies."

She emphasized that we shouldn't be afraid to talk about Alzheimer's as it is like any other condition. Early diagnosis is the only way to get early treatment for any diagnosis. It could be a life-threatening situation with similar symptoms such as hydrocephalus (which can be corrected) or even a heart problem due to the brain not getting an adequate blood supply. It requires a battery of tests to make a diagnosis:

Diagnosis steps

- History from the patient, family or close friends
- Physical exam including blood work for Thyroid, Vitamin D, B-12 and mental status test.
- Marital status
- Neurological exam
- Brain scans such as CT, MRI and Pet scans.

Some of the other forms of Dementia

- Vascular dementia- such as small strokes
- Frontotemporal dementia- occurs at a younger age
- Mixed dementia
- Lewy body dementia mimics Parkinson's disease more common in men

Treatment

- See your primary physician who may refer you to a Neurologist such as our new Neurosciences
- Institute at Dixie Regional, the Snow Canyon Clinic or Dr. Taj Becker
- Explore treatments to provide relief of symptoms
- Early treatment may help individuals remain independent longer
- There may be opportunities to participate in clinical trials

Medications

- Some FDA approved medications include cholinesterase inhibitors such as Aricept, Razadyne and Exelon which may give temporary improvement
- Other medications can help with mood and behavior

Plan for a Future of Diminishing Capabilities

- Seek legal advice and services
- Identify and complete legal documents
- Make plan for medical treatment and decision
- Make plan for Finances and property
- Name a person to handle decisions

Use the Alzheimer's Association

- Call 1-800-272-3900 or use web site alz.org
- Use their care consultant
- Use their support groups and education classes
- Look at their safety services such as Medic-Alert to locate wandering patients

Stewardship

Bearing Fruit for Jesus!

In the next couple of weeks, you will hear a lot about bearing fruit because our stewardship theme for this year is **Bearing Fruit for Jesus!**: **His Grace and Power at Work within You.**

Fruit trees are one of the many wonders of God's creation. To see the beauty of the tree and its fruit, to enjoy its taste, and to realize that it all came from a tiny seed is almost beyond our comprehension. An apple seed is planted in the ground, and, with water and sun as nourishment, miraculously a seedling surfaces that develops into a fruit tree. After a period of time, the apple tree fulfills its mission by bearing apples.

We, as Christians, are like that apple tree. We, too, have been fed and nourished by God so we can bear fruit. "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit—fruit that will last" (John 15:16). Jesus tells us "I am the Vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart

from me you can do nothing" (John 15:5). The life and power of any plant is found in its vine. The vine uses the branches to produce its fruit. The branch is simply a growth of the vine, produced by it and appointed to bear fruit. The branch exists only because the vine makes it possible.

Fruit characterizes the life of the Christian steward. When we stay firmly connected to Jesus, we are told that we "will bear much fruit." Christ has given us the task of ministering to the needs of others and spreading the Gospel. As we stay connected to him through his Word and Sacraments, we discover God's perfect will for us, and we are empowered to please him by bearing fruit (Colossians 1:9-10). God has created us to bear fruit (Ephesians 2:10), but only through Christ is it possible for us to do so.

"Since we live by the Spirit," Paul exhorted, "let us keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other" (Galatians 5:25-26). As children of God, we have this fruit because his Spirit lives in us, not as a result of our own efforts. We do cease to bear fruit when we give in to our sinful natures, becoming, in Paul's words, "Conceited, provoking and envying each other." We are to "Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness" (Ephesians 5:11a), but are to "Live as children of light (for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth) and find out what pleases the Lord" (Ephesians 5:8b-10).
