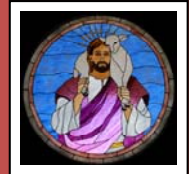

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we hope to continue our tradition of paying off our mortgages early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also need to replenish the \$45,000 that was in the fund when we began the project meaning we need to raise almost \$287,000.

Through the middle of December, we had received pledges totaling \$65,456.00 and cash donations of \$21,169.45 for a total of \$86,625.45 or about 30% of the way to the \$287,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and free funds to be used for additional improvements that we need to make.

****Pastor Note Regarding Hospital Visitation: ****

Please keep in mind that with the federal laws that went into force a number of years ago, hospitals are no longer allowed to give out any information in regards to patients to visitors, including clergy. Unless a visitor requests a specific name, the hospital desk is not allowed to give out any information, including religious affiliation.

The Acts 16:5 Initiative

Renewal, Revitalization, Transformation for Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church!

"Day after day the congregations became stronger in faith and larger in size." (Acts 16:5)

Just as the passage reads, the Acts 16:5 Initiative is a program intended to renew churches (like Good Shepherd) and to help them grow in faith and numbers!

Acts 16:5 is an initiative designed and produced by the Vital Churches Institute (www.vitalchurchesinstitute.com), which is an educational and consulting organization devoted to renewal and revitalization for Christ's church.

Here's what Acts 16:5 is all about, in the organization's own words:

The Acts 16:5 Initiative...

- Invites congregations in denominational regions to engage in a deliberate process of transformation.
- Assists denominational regions and congregations in developing a coherent, biblically-grounded, approach to transformational vitality and mission impact.
- Assists congregations in the design of specific transformational and mission ministries. Rather than offering a set "program," this initiative supports the design of ministry appropriate to a given situation.
- Enables denominational regional staff the ability to offer direct coaching, leadership development and resourcing of pastors and congregational leaders seeking to move their congregations forward.
- Offers a means of validating congregational change.
- Offers an opportunity to apply the principles of transformation and mission engagement to the life of the denominational region itself.

Over the past year the Presbytery of Utah has been carefully and prayerfully considering participation in Acts 16:5, especially since participation requires a financial commitment from Presbytery and from the participating churches. On October 12, 2013 Presbytery formally voted to engage the services of the Vital Churches Institute in order to provide the Acts 16:5 Initiative for ten participating churches in our Presbytery, one of which is Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church. The Session had previously endorsed the participation of our church.

The Acts 16:5 Initiative requires a three-year commitment on the part of each participating church, and the Presbytery. After three years the leadership of each church carries forward the momentum gained by participation in the initiative.

What will participation in Acts 16:5 mean for us? Look for intentional efforts to...

- Increase the depth of commitment to Jesus for every member and friend, that is, to grow vibrant, enthusiastic, completely dedicated disciples of Jesus;
- Strengthen and develop existing and new leaders in our congregation;
- Demonstrate hospitality, not just friendliness, to visitors;
- Develop new worship experiences;
- Engage new small groups designed to facilitate the spiritual growth of participating members;
- Spread ministry among a larger cross-section of our congregation;
- Make our church more mission centric, that is, more outwardly-focused on the needs of our community and the world.

Change in all of these aspects of church life requires considerable work and dedication on the part of the members and friends of our congregation. Even so, in the view of the Session, the time is now for us to begin these kinds of transformational ministries. The pastor and Session envision a long and exciting period of spiritual and numerical growth, in concert with the renewing power of the Holy Spirit.

As has been our custom, we made several donations to local charities in December. We also made donations to Habitat for Humanity, the Dixie Care and Share Soup Kitchen, the Doctors' Volunteer Clinic and the Washington County Children's Justice Center.

We will also continue to serve food at the Soup Kitchen each month. Thanks to Gloria Reynolds and her crew for making our Soup Kitchen service a tremendous success.

For 2014, we will continue many of the mission activities we have done this year and in the past.

We will kick off the year with the Souper Bowl of Caring to benefit Dixie Care and Share on February 2. Later in the year, we will likely host Bike and Build again during the summer. We will, of course, be involved in the CROP Walk and Soles 4 Souls and Operation Christmas Child will return next year. Of course, the Soup Kitchen crew will be providing their culinary magic each month to those in our community who need our help and, as usual, we will be collecting special offerings for One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Peacemaking and the Christmas Joy offering. We will designate a charity to receive our Change for Change donations during January.

Session held their regular monthly meeting on December 10, 2013. Here is a synopsis of the actions

- Darlene Baxter met with the Session and was received as new member on December 29, 2013.
- The annual Christmas Party was cancelled due to lack of interest. The Fellowship Committee will begin a process to determine a plan for future Christmas Parties.
- Unclaimed items in the refrigerator, pantry and freezer will be disposed of after the first Sunday of each month.
- The Stewardship Campaign is still accepting pledges for 2014.
- The old incandescent bulbs in the Sanctuary candelabra were changed to LED bulbs. This will save us approximately \$75 per month and the bulbs will pay for themselves in just over a year and a half.

Thank you so much to all of you who have pledged. To date we have 35 pledges totaling \$78,182. With a budget of \$216,636 we do have a ways to go. Please be in prayer for how God wants you to support the ministry of this congregation.

In Matthew 2, we read about the visit of the Magi. Following the star, inquiring at the king's palace, informed by the priests where to find the Child, they trudged with determination to Bethlehem, bringing with them the gifts they planned to present as they worshiped him.

"When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh" (Matthew 2:10-11).

What did the Wise Men from the East know about this Baby or his family? Not much. Yet they came in faith, bringing gifts with them to honor him. How far did they travel? How long was their trip? We can surmise, but what's important to know is that, for them, the trip with all its drudgery was worth it. "They were overjoyed."

How long a trip are we prepared to make this Christmas to worship the Christ Child? Are we willing to put up with inconvenience and sacrifice in order that we might come before him with our gifts, offering them in faith, as the Wise Men did?

What causes our joy this Christmas season? Is it seeing the eyes of little children light up when they open their presents? That's good. Is it finding exactly the right gift for someone special? That's good, too. But are we "overjoyed" when we see the star? Contrary to the messages we hear in the commercials and even the seasonal songs, the only thing Christmas is about is the birth of Jesus, the Savior of the world.

Along with doing all the wonderful things that are good to do at this time of the year, including the visiting of sick and the shut-in, the baking of goodies for food banks, the sharing of financial resources with those in need, and all the shopping and caroling and everything else, let's find our joy in seeing the star. That star points us to Jesus and leads us to the Cross. Let us "open our treasures" and worship him with our best and most precious gifts as the Wise Men did.

Perhaps the real significance of giving is what it does to the steward. What matters to God is not the gift, but the giver. Stewardship is God's invitation to a way of life. It helps us to overcome our selfishness and love of things. What we do with what we have been given is a sign to God and to the world of the depth and meaning of our commitment.
