# Ellen Smith Visits Good Shepherd Brings Greetings from Dorogobuzh



We had a wonderful visit with Ellen Smith from Presbyterian Mission Agency from January 11 to 13. I picked her up at McCarran on Saturday and we were joined for dinner by Rev. Ralph and Cindy on Saturday night. We had a wideranging discussion on many topics and we all came away feeling blessed by our decision to enter into a relationship with our brothers and sisters in Russia.

On Sunday, Ellen covered Rev. Ralph's Adult Ed class, discussing what it is like now and what it was like under the old Soviet state to be a Christian. The class was the best attended in recent memory with nearly 30 members in attendance. Ellen also met with the Session and delivered a Minute for Mission in which she shared greetings from Pastor Sergei and his congregation and told us a bit more about their activities and congregation.

Ellen had never been in Utah so, on Sunday afternoon, we drove to Pipe Spring National Monument to give her a bit of an introduction to the LDS pioneers and culture. She thoroughly enjoyed the day although she was a bit disconcerted by the conditions in Colorado City and Hilldale as we drove through.

On Monday, we did a bit of sightseeing, visiting Kolob Canyon then driving across Utah 14 past Cedar Breaks (it was Ellen's first time above 10,000 feet in a car) and on through Zion before I dropped her at McCarran for a flight to Pasco, Washington, where she is meeting with another church. The most often heard phrase that day was "Wow! That's amazing!"

Ellen was particularly pleased with the reaction of the congregation to her visit. Several members spoke to her during Fellowship about how important they believe our partnership is going to be for both of our congregations.

Ellen stressed that the most important thing we can do at this point to continue developing our relationship is to visit Dorogobuzh. We are planning to do that with a small group in 2015. In addition, we discussed the possibility of hosting the Russian Mission Network conference at our church in October of 2016. She was very enthusiastic about that since many of the partner churches in the western US complain that the conference is always held in the East. If we host the conference, we hope to bring Pastor Sergei and his wife, Nina, to St. George.

We look forward to having Ellen back with us soon!



## The Acts 16:5 Initiative

#### "So the churches were strengthened in the faith and increased in numbers daily." Acts 16:5

Growing a vital church is always the work of God in our midst. It is a challenging task for we who are the people of God. However, we know what the alternative is – a church without vision or vitality with little mission engagement with its world.

God has a transformational future for our congregation and ministry – and for each of us personally. The Acts 16:5 Initiative is designed to stimulate conversation, imagination, and new directions in the vitality of the shared Christian experience.

Understand the truth of the words spoken by W. Edward Deming, renowned management consultant: "**Every system is perfectly designed to achieve the results it gets.**" If we are fully satisfied with the life of our congregation as it is, there is no need to think about a transformational future. However, to grow in the vitality of our worship, fellowship, and discipleship, as well as in our mission impact on the surrounding community, we need to ask – how do we transition from the work of our present ministries and members while creating the new to reach the present and next generations? How may we lead a transition such that our past ministries and present participants are valued and honored as we move into God's new future?

#### GPS and the Acts 16:5 Initiative's Principles

Not too long ago, I was driving somewhere I'd never been before. I did not have a GPS, but I did have directions courtesy of Google Maps. I was doing fine for a while, but then, even though I was following the directions, I began to get the feeling that I had missed something. That something wasn't right. Maybe there was a mistake in the directions I had. Maybe I had missed a turn. I kept checking the directions and I seemed to be following them, but I still had the feeling I was off-track. The road I was on just didn't look like I thought it should look. It didn't feel like I was making progress toward my destination. It seemed to be taking longer than it should. I was tempted to turn off on a road that seemed like it would get me where I was going faster. But I resisted that urge and kept on following the directions I had. And just shortly after that, it became clear that the way I was going *was* the right way. The directions I had *were correct.* I just had to keep going, keep following them, even though it felt like maybe I wasn't going the right way.

I think this happens sometimes when we are in the midst of engaging the principles and practices of *Acts 16:5*. We have good directions. The gatherings and manuals provide a GPS of sorts for the journey we embark upon when we begin the adventure of the *Acts 16:5 Initiative*. But then we start to dream about what God wants to do in our church. We get excited about the vision God gives us, and we begin to map out directions towards that vision. We get a few Action Learning Teams working on opportunities and challenges we see around us.

And then it happens: we don't feel like we are making progress toward the vision. The way we are heading doesn't look right, doesn't *feel* right. Maybe we had missed a turn. Maybe our directions weren't good. And we begin to second-guess the directions and either turn back the way we came or turn onto another route.

When you get to this place—and you surely will get here at some point—let me offer you some advice: *Keep going!* Trust the directions—the principles and practices detailed for you in the manuals and the gatherings. They have worked for many, many churches as tools for vitality and growth.

Sometimes God does have to 'recalculate' our directions because we're working with a faulty map. But very often we have a good map, but we fail to trust that map, a map that—if we continue to follow it, in spite of how it looks or how we feel or how difficult the route—will get us to where God wants us to go.

So take the adventure God has for you! And trust the directions. They will lead to vitality and renewal and new possibilities in your church and community.

# **Parish Nursing Ministry**

#### Brown Bag Lunch – January 21

On January 21, Doctors Leukenga and Whitaker of Hearing and Balance Doctors of Utah spoke to us about balance and how our hearing affects our balance.

They explained that their primary role is to do diagnostic testing for balance which includes dizziness, vertigo and trauma induced imbalance. They use a team approach working with primary physicians, cardiologists, neurologists and other referrals.

#### Parish Nursing Ministry, continued

Dizziness is the number one problem of patients over 65 that they see. This is often accompanied by vertigo, imbalance and general unsteadiness causing a lack of confidence on your feet. Dizziness causes a feeling of light headedness and vertigo causes a spinning sensation and objects seem to move.

Balance related falls account for more than half of accidental deaths among the elderly. Fifty to sixty percent of reported dizziness in people 65 and older is due to inner ear problems. There are 4 key systems that are involved in balance sensors which are the inner ear, eyes for vision, brain, and joint, muscle and sense of touch. The inner ear has a vestibular system that helps control the eye motion and the postural muscles in the neck and back.

Some of the common disorders that can cause these symptoms are Benign Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo (BPPV) where tiny crystals of calcium carbonate that are a normal part of the inner ear's anatomy, become dislodged and collect in one of the semicircular canals, vestibular neuritis, acoustic neuroma, Meniere's disease and migraine related dizziness.

They stressed that if you have any issues with balance or vertigo you should talk with your doctor. Self-diagnosis and treatment are not a good idea when dealing with these issues. Dr. Luekenga pointed out that 90% of cases where a proper diagnosis is made are treated successfully.

On February 19 our Brown Bag Lunch will feature Mark Heimer of Heideman Hughes Mortuary speaking about "Pre-Planning, Making sure Your (Final) Wishes are Carried Out" and on March 26, Drs. Leukenga and Whitaker will return to speak on Tinnitus and how it can be treated.

We hope you'll bring your lunch and join us for these enlightening programs.

### **Stewardship**

#### Pledge Update

Thank you so much to all of you who have pledged. Through January 19<sup>th</sup>, we had 43 pledges totaling \$101,522. With a budget of \$216,636 we do have a ways to go. Please be in prayer for how God wants you to support the ministry of this congregation.

#### Setting Goals

It is a common and helpful practice to use the start of a new year as motivation to set goals and make plans to attain those goals. As Christians, what is our ultimate goal? What did Jesus tell us in Matthew 6:33? *"But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."* Certainly this is a worthy and all-encompassing goal for us as Christians.

We're also told that goals should be detailed and specific and measurable. How do we satisfy that criteria in light of our main goal to seek God's kingdom?

Let us remember that all we say and do and are should strain toward seeking God's kingdom. That means we'll be busy in the study of his Word and in regular attendance in church where we can hear his Word and receive his sacraments. It means that we'll be busy about his work of seeking and saving the lost. How is that accomplished?

The Apostle Paul wrote, "You show that you are a letter from Christ . . . written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts" (2 Corinthians 3:3). Jesus put it this way, "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in Heaven" (Matthew 5:16). This is what we are – God's letters who reflect the light of Jesus to a world trying to find its way in darkness.

#### Stewardship, continued

The psalmist commanded, "Sing to the Lord, praise his name; proclaim his salvation day after day. Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples. For great is the Lord and most worthy of praise" (Psalm 96:2-4). In all our words, this should be our goal: to proclaim the goodness, the glory, the greatness of our God.

Then our acts should follow up our attitudes and words. Again Paul's words speak to us: *"Bless those who persecute you; Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn. Live in harmony . . . Do not repay anyone evil for evil . . . If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone . . . " (Romans 12:14ff.). Throughout his letters, Paul urges us to share with those in need, to support those who preach and teach the Word, and to give as we have received.* 

These are goals worthy of setting and ones we can carry out by "the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, [who] though he was rich, yet for [our] sakes he became poor, so that [we] through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9). <u>www.parishpublishing.org</u>

Greetings from Princeton Theological Seminary where I am now beginning the second half of my seminary experience.

When I was in the third grade at Horace Mann Elementary School in Virginia, Minnesota, my Sunday school teacher at the First Presbyterian Church asked us all to memorize Psalm 100:

<sup>1</sup>Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth.
<sup>2</sup>Worship the Lord with gladness; come into his presence with singing.
<sup>3</sup>Know that the Lord is God. It is he that made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.
<sup>4</sup>Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him, bless his name.
<sup>5</sup>For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations.

I have loved the Psalms ever since that time.

This semester I am taking a course called *The Psalms in Christian Worship*. It is a wonderful class in which we are exploring ways in which the Psalms can be used in corporate worship, daily prayer, personal and family devotion and Bible study. We are using a great new Psalter published in 2012 by the Calvin Institute of Christian worship and Faith Alive Christian Resources called *Psalms for All Seasons: A Complete Psalter for Worship*. My other classes include Introduction to Preaching, PCUSA Polity, Missional Theology and Practice, Chapel Choir and Field Education at The Brick Presbyterian Church in New York City.

### **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we hope to continue our tradition of paying off our mortgages early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also need to replenish the \$45,000 that was in the fund when we began the project meaning we need to raise almost \$287,000.

Through the middle of January, we had received pledges totaling \$66,456.00 and cash donations of \$21,169.45 for a total of \$87,625.45 or about 30% of the way to the \$287,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and free funds to be used for additional improvements that we need to make.
