

Brown Bag Lunch – April 30

At our Brown Bag Lunch On Wednesday, April 30, Dr. Ryan Whitaker from Hearing and Balance Doctors of Utah talked about Tinnitus - what it is, what causes it and what some available treatments.

Tinnitus can take many different forms but it is a sound that you hear in your ears but no one else hears it. It can be a ringing, chirping, or pulsating sound and can be continuous, sudden or intermittent.

The most common cause is hearing loss. In the absence of aural stimulation, the brain will invent a phantom sound to fill in. Tinnitus can be caused by medications such as very high doses of Aspirin. It can be the result of disorders of the central nervous system such as MS, a Stroke or Fibromyalgia. The cause may be unknown or tinnitus could even be triggered by environmental changes in sound such as being very quiet, overall health, anxiety, stress or diet. It can also have a psychological component in that a negative reaction to it can cause patients to assign their tinnitus a high priority which can lead to a vicious cycle.

There are several treatments for tinnitus. One is sound therapy in which you decrease the perceived strength of the tinnitus by refocusing attention using alternate sounds or "pink noise". This can be administered by a device that looks like a hearing aid and in fact can be combined with a hearing aid. Sound therapy breaks the vicious cycle of tinnitus by educating the brain. Hearing aids can often correct Tinnitus. Also a small percentage of patients are helped with the use of multi vitamins. We are fortunate to have a local resource that will work with your family doctor to help find a solution.

The first Brown Bag Lunch for the fall has been scheduled. On Wednesday, September 17, Attorney Katie Woods will discuss legal aspects of medical POAs and medical directives. Please come to the Brown Bag Lunches even if you forget to bring your lunch – there's always food available. If nothing else, come and have some dessert.

Also remember that we will be happy to check your blood pressure monthly. Stop by our table in Conklin Hall after worship on July 13 and August 17 and we'll give you a quick BP check!

Giving to God and Country

The Pharisees, who were trying to discredit and intimidate Jesus, asked him a loaded question about whether or not it was proper to pay taxes to Caesar. Responding to the Pharisees, Jesus said, "*You hypocrites, why are you trying to trap me? Show me the coin used for paying the tax.*"

After receiving the coin he said, "Whose portrait is this? And whose inscription? Give to Caesar what is Caesar's, and to God what is God's." (Matthew 22:18-21).

In his response, Jesus conveys to us our dual responsibilities to our country and to our God. We are to give to our country what belongs to our nation and give to God what belongs to him.

What belongs to our country? What are our responsibilities to our country? Certainly, we are to support our nation with our words and deeds. If need be, we are to serve in the military. We are to pay our fair share of the cost to run our country through our taxes. We need to be obedient to its laws.

What belongs to God? As Christians, we know that it all belongs to him. Everyone and everything is his. Our first responsibility to God is to love him above everything else. We are to serve and obey him. We are to obey his commands, and we are to return a portion of our money to him.

Unfortunately, it seems that our nation gets a better shake than our God does. Our nation threatens, and we obey. God commands our obedience, but we often ignore his commands. Our country forces us to pay our taxes, and so, by April 15 of each year, we submit our 1040 tax returns. God wants us to give generously to him; however, we often neglect to give our offerings to our church. Because our offerings are voluntary, they can be seen to be less important than our taxes.

As Christians, our commitment to our Lord must be even stronger than to our country. God has a claim on our lives, and we need to respond to that claim by giving to and serving him with our time, our abilities, and our money. ^{© Copyright Parish Publishing, LLC}

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we hope to continue our tradition of paying off our mortgages early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also need to replenish the \$45,000 that was in the fund when we began the project meaning we need to raise almost \$287,000.

Through June 15, we had received pledges totaling \$68,881.00 and cash donations of \$25,242.90 for a total of \$94,123.90 or about 32.8% of the way to the \$287,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and free funds to be used for additional improvements that we need to make.
