



Present Demand

"Martha was distracted by her many tasks; so she came to him and asked, 'Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her then to help me. '" Luke 10:40*

For Martha it's all about the to-do list. She reminds me of the White Rabbit with his giant watch running away from Alice in Wonderland crying, "I'm late! I'm late! For a very important date. No time to say hello goodbye I'm late I'm late! Ever feel like that? I bet you do all the time!

I like to call our over busyness, "The Law of Present Demand." It sure was the White Rabbit's problem! Present demand includes all of the things coming at you, demanding you right now. It's what Jim Dobson calls the "sustained panic," what John Ortberg calls "hurry sickness" and what Brigid Schulte calls "time confetti" in the book Overwhelmed on being too busy to live.

The Law of Present Demand regulates our lives in three ways. The pressure of present demand moves any non-pressing item to the bottom of the list. The routine of present demand convinces us that everything we are doing is necessary. The comfort of present demand lulls us into thinking that while we complain about our busyness, we actually like it.

Some years ago the pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Boulder, Colorado, Bob Oerter, led a retreat with a bunch of us all being crushed by the Law of Present Demand. He offered this amazing word, "Learn to live with the load of the unfinished!" That has stuck with me ever since.

In a society where we have to "get all of this stuff done," our sense of "present demand" overwhelms our priorities and easily diverts us from loving our Lord, loving ourselves, loving our neighbors. Learn to live with the load of the unfinished so that like Mary you take time for Jesus, you take time for your neighbors, you take time for yourself and those you love.

Wendy's Window



Greetings to you all! As I write this, I have been in Kodaikanal, Tamil Nadu, India for 8 days. What a unique and interesting place this is! Initially, I experienced jet lag, altitude adjustment and culture shock. I am still experiencing elements of all three but they are not as bad. I think I can do this for 8 months. I pray daily for safety and sanity.

Here's a little update on some of the things I'm dealing with in my "new" life:

I have a cute little cottage that is part of a three-plex located on what is called the Ganga Campus. It is about a 15 minute walk (uphill) to the main campus where I will do most of my work. I have two large furnished rooms with a bathroom that has a toilet, shower and hot running water. There is a woodburning stove in my bedroom which I will need in a month or so. I have a two burner gas stove and a working refrigerator. All laundry is done by hand so I have hired an AYA (maid) to come to my house once a week to clean, do laundry and cut firewood. I have to pay her 150 rupees a week which is less than \$3.00. I live at 7000 feet in the mountains, surrounded by forest. Last night there were 3 huge bison in my yard eating everything. They can be quite dangerous so I was cautious.

I can eat all my meals at one of two cafeterias. The food has been excellent and safe. Only today am I experiencing GI distress but I think it is because I was asked to travel to another location callled Dindugul yesterday to have my visa approved by the Indian government. It was a 3 hour trip one way in an uncomfortable van into the very hot plains. They took us out to eat at a restaurant and I think I was not as careful as I needed to be. At least I do not have nausea and vomitting. That would be much worse. Indian food is FABULOUS. The way the vegetables are spiced is so unique - so much better than any Indian food I have had in the US.

My job entails volunteering with the chaplain, religious education department and social experiences department. I will be involved in Sunday worship, church youth activities, dorm devotions, teaching Grade 5 Religious Education, and co-teaching Grade 11 Religious Education with a Lutheran pastor from Wisconsin who has been in India for 14 years. My supervisor is named Raja Krishnamoorthy. He is an ordained pastor in the Indian Presbyterian church with 30 years of experience. He is a great guy and very funny!!

This is India. Crazy drivers honking their horns, cows in the street, poverty, food smells, ugly smells, pollution, little shops all over, a variety of religions (Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, Christian, etc.), temples, garbage all over the place, tons of people. The school is a sancuary within the busy city. I like that. I like going out to the shops and coming back to the serenity of the school campuses. The Kodaikanal International School website is www.kis.in.

Thank you for your encouragement and support. You are all in my thoughts and prayers.

Parish Nursing Ministry

At our first Brown Bag Lunch of the year on September, Elder Law attorney Katie Woods made an excellent presentation on all of the documents that you should have in place NOW to be prepared when you are no longer able to handle your financial or health care decisions. A study done in 2010 showed that over \$77 million per year is taken from seniors through exploitation. Over 50% of the perpetrators of these crimes are relatives of the victims.

WHAT YOU CAN DO NOW

- Plan early Do your estate planning. Determine how your assets will be distributed. Write a Will. Consider creating a trust Wills do not eliminate the need for probate. Trusts can help avoid probate. To be effective all assets must be properly transferred to the trust.
- Protect yourself when you can no longer manage your own affairs. Don't worry about hurting feelings.
 - Appoint an agent to make financial decisions for you through a Power of Attorney document.
 - Select someone you trust to give your Health Power of Attorney (Directives to Physician; Living will); declare end of life preferences such as life support, organ donating, etc.
 - Give a copy of your Living Will to your Physician and place in medical records in the hospital

Because of various legal requirements it is advisable to seek professional assistance for all these documents.

The audio from Katie's presentation and copies of the handouts are available on our website <u>gspcsg.org</u>. We urge you to listen to Katie's presentation, download the attachments and fill out your Utah Advance Healthcare Directive.

Also remember that we will be happy to check your blood pressure monthly. Stop by our table in Conklin Hall after worship on October 17th and we'll give you a quick BP check!

There will be a paid staff in attendance but the number of hours and content of the daily program will be determined under the direction of an experienced senior care professional.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we hope to continue our tradition of paying off our mortgages early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also need to replenish the \$45,000 that was in the fund when we began the project meaning we need to raise almost \$287,000.

Through September 21, we had received pledges totaling \$68,881.00 and cash donations of \$25,662 for a total of \$94,543 or about 32.9% of the way to the \$287,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and free funds to be used for additional improvements that we need to make.
