Plans Underway for Community Garden

We are putting together a Community Garden and would love to have you join us! In the back yard at Good Shepherd we have the dirt, we have the water, we have the sunshine, what we need is . . . Gardeners!

Have you picked a fresh, red, ripe tomato off the vine, grown by you? Do you remember the taste of a tomato like that?

Are you a gardener or have you thought of being a gardener, a community gardener? Here is your chance to be social and grow vegetables for you and yours or grow them for a charity. Bib overalls are optional.

Here is an overview of the proposed plan.

In the back of the church we have a 55ft X 55ft square in which we plan to have 13 plots. The five small plots are 4ft X 8ft. The five medium size plots are 8ft X 12ft. The three large plots are 8ft X 20ft. All will have water to them

If you are new to gardening, welcome. This is your chance to learn from people with experience. Using basic gardening methods you can grow great vegetables, flowers or fruits. If you are an experienced gardener, this is a chance to pass on some of the things you have learned to the agriculturally-challenged.

If you are in a wheel chair or disabled don't let that stop you. We are planning two of the raised beds for your access and work needs. One of the beds will be at about two feet high and another at three feet high. Call me and let's see if we can make it work.

Ash Wednesday Services





As we look forward to 2015, I believe the comments above speak to the vitality and life of our congregation and reflect a very positive year in our congregation's life and history.

Our congregation continues to experience generally across the board growth, our church life continues to grow and steadily increase with our membership and activities.

In this past year a majority of our Bible studies have grown in attendance. So have our topical class that meets Sunday morning in the CE Building and the Sunday night Bible studies that meet in our home. Currently we are in the process of developing our small group ministry under the Acts 16:5 Initiative.

We continue to greet visitors every Sunday, and we continue to hear of the welcome, love, and joy that they experienced in their visit with us. A number have continued to visit and eventually united with our congregation.

I want to thank you all for your excellent service and love for this congregation and pastor. I perceive our congregations growth and vitality as continuing to strengthen, a testament to the leading of the Holy Spirit and strong love for the Lord as evidenced by our love for Him and for one another.

Take The Adventure COMPASSION

A short moving video was in the news last summer. The Pope traveling in southern Italy noticed a bedridden girl with her family along the side of the road and had his car pull over. He kissed the girl, touched a baby held up to him and touched many others before leaving with sounds of many people crying, "Grazie (thank you)." You can view the video on YouTube

It reminds me of a story that must have been amazing to watch unfold. Jesus is walking to a town called Nain and his disciples and a large crowd were walking with him. He comes upon the funeral procession of the only son of a widow walking out from the town accompanied by a large crowd.

With these two large crowds intermingling and looking on, Jesus immediately has compassion for this mother and says, "Do not weep," walks over and says, "Young man, I say to you arise." The dead man sat up, spoke and Jesus gave him to his mother. If the people there spoke Italian, believe me you would have heard a lot people crying, "Grazie."

The verb translated, "compassion," means to move in the inward parts. In other words, Jesus saw the desperation of the mother and he felt it with her. His stomach tightened and he acted in love.

When you see a person in distress and feel your inner self tighten in identity and sorrow with that person, then find some way to insert your presence and love into that person's life. Jesus will be feeling the same thing and acting with you.

February will be a donation-centered month at Good Shepherd as we continue our tradition of collecting food and money for Dixie Care and Share on the first Sunday and start a new tradition of collecting much-needed supplies for the Community Soup Kitchen with Grace on the third Sunday.

February 1st, which is our monthly Care & Share Sunday is also Super Bowl Sunday this year and we will again participate in the Souper Bowl of Caring with all proceeds going to Dixie Care & Share. Last year we donated over 150 pounds of food and over \$900 on this special Sunday. Let's go for 200 pounds of food and \$1000 this year!

On February 15th (and the THIRD Sunday of the EVEN numbered months), we'll have Soup Kitchen Supply Sunday. We are asking you to bring supplies (paper goods, plates, bowls, latex free gloves, cups, plastic forks and spoons, etc.) to help the Soup Kitchen in their work. Plans for our trip to Russia are continuing with Ralph and me in the process of learning Russian. We know we won't be fluent but it's the thought that counts. Being a Faithful Steward

Each household has its own routine. We go to work; we help the kids with their homework and attend their events; we make the meals, clean the house, and do the laundry. Our days are full – sometimes too full. So full that time for the Lord is abbreviated or omitted altogether. Then comes Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. It's just what we need to get back on track. We gather together for worship. We hear again about Jesus' ministry, about the events that eventually lead up to his crucifixion, about his zeal for the Lord's house. We hear his prayer for his disciples and his words of comfort and preparation to them.

Our hearts are turned to Christ instead of toward ourselves. We ask for grace to love and serve as he did, sacrificing self for the good of others. "Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). Paul comments, "Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous man, though for a good man someone might possibly dare to die. But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5:7-8). God loved and chose us, the unlovely, to shed his grace upon. We are reminded that, "since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another" (1 John 4:11).

"Love one another." Not just our close friends or those who agree with us, but "one another." We can't do it, can we? Some people are just too hard to love. Some people are not deserving of our gifts and our attention. Some people aren't interested in the love we have to offer. The command remains: "Love one another."

Now is a good time to read John 15. Here we find the secret of loving and serving. Here we find the source of love, of faith, of everything we need. That source is Jesus. He is the Vine. He sustains and nurtures us, the branches. He enables us to bear fruit, to "love one another." He calls those who obey him. His friends and tells us he will give us whatever we ask in his name. So we pray, Lord, let us "love one another."

Too often we fail to understand that Christian instruction about money is one of the best opportunities we have to teach our children about God's love for us, and his ownership of all things.

The way we use money is the extension of our personal characteristics.

By teaching our children the Christian use of money, affording them control of money and the need to make decisions about money, we also confront them with the meaning of discipleship and Christian stewardship.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we hope to continue our tradition of paying off our mortgages early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also need to replenish the \$45,000 that was in the fund when we began the project meaning we need to raise almost \$287,000.

Through January 25th, we had received pledges totaling \$68,881.00 and cash donations of \$27,333 for a total of \$96,214 or about 33.5% of the way to the \$287,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and free funds to be used for additional improvements that we need to make.
