We thank all three of these outstanding individuals for agreeing to serve and look forward to their leadership in the future.

# Second Building Fund Campaign to Kick off

Time flies! Can you believe that it has been three years since we added the addition to the fellowship hall? It has been wonderful to have comfortable seating for everyone for our Thanksgiving and Easter luncheons and have plenty of room for buffet tables. But while we are enjoying all the benefits of a larger hall and remodeled kitchen, we still are paying for the mortgage which made this possible. As our first building fund campaign ends in May, it is time for Building Fund, Part II. As of April, the balance on our 15-year mortgage is \$163,474.91 and our goal for the 2015-2017 campaign is \$75,000. This amount includes the mortgage and other necessary building updates and repairs. Below is the breakdown for this number:





When Ellen Smith, our missionary liaison to our sister church in Derogobuzh, Russia, visited us last year she shared with us that the experience of the Russian culture is very often expressed in the stories they share.

One story from our sister congregation touched me and continues to do so.

During the 1930's at the height of the Stalinist repression of the Christian Church in the then Soviet Union, a member of that congregation accepted the call to lead as an Elder, knowing full well the peril it placed him in. As was unfortunately expected, shortly thereafter late one evening the police broke into the home, taking the father away into the dark of night.

The following morning, his wife visited the local police station as to inquire if her husband might be visited, at which time she was informed that he had been sent to Siberia as a prisoner.

Initially the family considered attempting to immigrate but the wife and mother of the exiled Elder would not go, saying that when he returned they must stay so that he could find his family. Even as war came and the Germans advanced on the city the wife and family would not leave so that their missing loved one upon his return might find them waiting.

The war ended and years came and went in silence without word or contact and yet they waited and prayed for his return.

Finally, many years later when the Soviet Union fell and secret files were opened, the family discovered that this Baptist Elder, husband, father, grandfather, for whom they had been waiting all those years for word or return, had been executed at the local police station the night of his arrest.

I look forward to hearing more stories from our brothers and sisters in Derogobuzh this summer as our mission team visits and worships our common Lord and Savior Jesus Christ with our sister family of faith in Derogobuzh.

# **Building One Another**

#### **GRANDS**

I've had the joy of seeing all four of our grandchildren in two cities within twenty-four hours!

My Dad used to say he had "patriarchal feelings" when referring to the intensity of his warm emotion when he saw his grandchildren. Now I know what he meant. I know my Mom had her own wonderful "matriarchal feelings."

Proverbs 17:6 says, "Grandchildren are the crown of the aged." While I am not feeling particularly "aged" at the moment, I do see how grandchildren are my crown and joy. You are a crown of your own grandparents!

Interestingly while the Bible says a great deal about parenting, it doesn't say much about grand parenting. One proverb does give us a clue to good grand parenting, "The good leave an inheritance to their children's children' Proverbs 13:22.

The proverb makes a great point. I remember receiving a modest inheritance from one of my grandparents while the majority of their legacy went to my parents. Nevertheless I will never forget the feelings of being valued, affirmed, and loved.

Furthermore, there is more to leave one's grandchildren than money or possessions! The time you give, the stories you share, the love you offer will last their lifetimes.

By the way, while we are no longer in a letter writing age, to write a letter of affirmation and love to each of your grandchildren, to be read and treasured now and in the future is one way to offer a continuing reminder of your love. You may do the same thing for your own grandparents!

#### **JOYFULLY**

I remember vividly after preaching a sermon based on Philippians 4:6, "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice," of going home and learning of my father's brain cancer. I found myself singing that simple worship song, "Rejoice in the Lord, always, and again I say rejoice," while weeping at the same time – and realizing the two were utterly appropriate at the same time.

I feel that way again.

A great many of us are grieving the death of Steve Hayner, President of Columbia Theological Seminary, and quite plainly one of the most authentically real Christians any of us have ever known. Our prayers for his wife, Sharol, and their family and friends continue.

When I served with Jim Tozer as an associate pastor on his staff for fifteen years, I was taken with the way Jim always signed his letters, "Joyfully, Jim."

Wanting to emulate Jim without being a copycat, I began to sign all of my letters and later my emails "With joy, Stan." Others who knew Jim followed suit in various ways.

Years later when enjoying the novels of Patrick O'Brian and his stories of Jack Aubrey and Stephen Maturin who sailed for the Royal Navy in the years following 1800, I noticed they often took leave of one another saying, "Joy to you," an expression I have loved and used ever since.

Over the many years I have known Steve Hayner he always signed his letters and emails, "Joyfully, Steve." I don't know what inspired him to do that but I do know it was the genuine expression of who he was on this earth and who he is now, face to face with Lord who loves him.

"Although you have not seen him [Jesus], you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls." I Peter 1:8-9

### **Senior Ministries**

At our last two Soup and Bread Fellowships, we've had very interesting presentations from members of our church.

On February 25, retired Rear Admiral James D. Cossey took us on a virtual tour of submarines since he was the commander of the nuclear attack submarine USS SNOOK as well as having other shipboard assignments on other subs, minesweepers and destroyers. He drew a graph explaining the different types of subs and gave us a looksee into everyday life under the ocean. Can you imagine living with 120 men for 90 days in small quarters, deep under the ocean? You can't see out. You can't shower. You can't communicate with anyone at home if you're on a secret mission. Water is in short supply and filtered and recirculated and bathing is by wash cloth. Flushing the toilet must be carefully attended to in order to prevent the contents from showering back. Food storage is under the floors of the ship. You have to run silent, without detection.

Jim reported Russian ships were detected because of their engines noise but ours were completely stealth. A secret and rather simple design change made our engines run silent but satellite pictures have revealed the adaptation. He explained hot bunking referring to the sleeping arrangements. Since there's no room for 120 bunks, 60 coffin-like bunks are shared every 12 hours by day crew and traded with night crew.

We were treated to tales of Admiral Rickover, father of the nuclear Navy and well known for his combative and deliberately provocative ways with his men. For example, he cut off two legs of a slippery leather chair to annoy and test the wits of naval officers who had interviews.

For 33 ½ years, Jim served this country with honor and distinction. Many of those years were at high level foreign country assignments. The hour with Jim Cossey was fascinating and most informative. Thank you Jim and Beth.

On April 16, author of several books, veteran and fellow member of our church Russell Estlack presented a dark and unwritten page of history during WWII in the Aleutian Island Chain. His book, The Aleut Internments of World War II: Islanders Removed from Their Homes by Japan and the United States, sheds light on the little-known story of the Aleut people and the events in war and peace that shaped their lives. In addition to his comments, Russell shared a DVD that tells the story in pictures and includes interviews with many of the Aleuts who were involved.

These peaceful, hardworking, God loving natives of this harsh land knew how to harvest the valuable seals and were the only ones allowed by law to take them. For this reason, they were cruelly enslaved first by the Russians in 1741 and then in 1867 by the US government. When the Russians first arrived 8,000 natives lived on their native grounds. In 1867, when the USA bought the land, only 2,000 remained. The inhumane treatment by Russians, then Japanese continued at the hands of the US government who continued to amass wealth from the seal trade at the expense of the Aleuts. These simple living defenseless people were removed from their islands in the guise of protecting them from the Japanese during WWII. The Aleuts were taken from their homes and placed in abandoned southeast Alaska fishing camps which were not fit for human shelter. Funter Bay was the worst place. They lived in deplorable, oppressive conditions with several families living in 8 by 10 feet rooms with no adequate sanitation, no heat, food or safe water supply or medical supplies. (Our enemy POW camps were superior to this camp.) Many died of TB, pneumonia, measles. Some Alaskan tribes heard about the conditions and brought fish and some supplies.

The internees were not fully repatriated until 1945 when they returned to their villages to find inexcusable destruction of their island homes. They had been burned, or ransacked or destroyed, windows broken and their icons stolen by the US Army stationed there. The Russian Orthodox Churches were ransacked. Restitution was accomplished when Senator Ted Stevens of Alaska added the Aleuts to a bill to provide restitution for the Japanese internees many years after the war. They asked for 6 items: restore churches, remove all debris of WWII, an apology for this travesty, a trust fund set up for the Aleuts, public awareness of this injustice and payments. 70 years later, with dignity and strength, the Aleuts are gaining political power and have a vision of a resourceful future. This is truly a sad story of an innocent people living in the wrong place at the wrong time. Russell has masterfully chronicled this story and fulfilled one of the stipulations of the Aleut repatriation demands. Please contact Russell for details and questions.

# **Email from Pastor Sergei from October, 2013**

This is the translation of the email received by Rev. Ralph from our sister congregation in Dorogobuzh in October, 2013:

The Evangelical Christian-Baptist Church of the city of Dorogobuzh, Smolensk Region (State).

We greet you, brothers and sisters in Christ of the Presbyterian Church of the Good Shepherd.

Please excuse us that our response to your letter has been so delayed. We found your email address through the website of your church.

We thank God that you wish to join with us in His heart – that you wish to be our sister church.

We pray to God that He will use our fellowship for the fulfillment of His will and for the edification of the Church of Christ in spreading His word.

Our Church has a 90 year history. It was established after the revolution in 1918, but was destroyed during the period of repression beginning in 1937. The activities of the church were renewed in 1993.

In our city, there are two Orthodox churches and two monasteries. There is a group of Jehovah's Witnesses, and a group of Seventh Day Adventists, as well as a Pentecostal rehabilitation center.

Within 7 kilometers of our city is another small city, with a population of 15000. It is also a part of our county. Dorogobuzh also has a population of about 15,000. Our city has 3 major factories and several small businesses.

We have a ministry in the neighboring small city. We visit a hospital, a nursing home, and a clinic for patients with tuberculosis and have a small group for Bible study.

In the summer, our church holds a 5 day VBS program for children. At Christmas, we visit a sanatorium/shelter for children 2-7 with a Christmas program and some material assistance. We also organize a Christmas party at church and invite children and families of non-believers.

Our young people glorify God with musical instruments.

We are glad that you have a desire to visit us, to work together to glorify our Lord! We pray that this meeting could take place.

We hope that together we will be able to join together for a VBS program in August 2014.

#### **Nepal Disaster Relief**

As you are no doubt aware, an earthquake measuring 7.9 on the Richter Scale struck west of the ancient Nepali capital of Kathmandu, Pokhara, on April 25th. It is the most powerful earthquake to hit the region in 81 years. As of Sunday afternoon, the death toll from the quake had risen to more than 2,500 and was rising further. Humanitarian staff and officials are also affected.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance's (PDA) partner ACT Alliance and ACT members on the ground will continue to coordinate with relevant government institutions, UN agencies, and International NGOs. Access to information is limited, due to the destruction of communications channels. It is expected that more concrete information on the scale of the disaster, number of people affected and the immediate needs will be available after ACT members in Nepal met on Sunday 26 April to initiate a joint rapid assessment and emergency response plan.

#### **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we hope to continue our tradition of paying off our mortgages early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also need to replenish the \$45,000 that was in the fund when we began the project meaning we need to raise almost \$287,000.

Through April 19<sup>th</sup>, we have received pledges totaling \$69,881 and cash donations of \$28,278 for a total of \$98,159 or about 34.2% of the way to the \$287,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and free funds to be used for additional improvements that we need to make.
