## **Good Shepherd Celebrates Pentecost, Memorial Day**

It's not often in the church year that we have the opportunity to observe two important days on the same Sunday. May 24<sup>th</sup> was one of those special days. We celebrated Pentecost, the birthday of the Christian church and Memorial Day, honoring those who died in service to our nation.

Pentecost is from the Greek word 'Pentekostos', which means 'fifty'. It's the 50th day after the Sabbath of Passover week and in Judaism is called the Feast of Weeks (Leviticus 23:16). Traditionally the Church celebrated it as Whitsun – 'White Sunday'. It's believed that this is because it was a day for baptisms and those being baptized would wear white. Another explanation is that it derives from the Anglo-Saxon word 'wit', which we still use for verbal cleverness but which meant 'understanding' – Pentecost was when God poured out the wisdom of the Spirit.

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in service of the United States of America. While Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it's difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day.

Regardless of the exact date or location of its origins, one thing is clear – Memorial Day was borne out of the Civil War and a desire to honor our dead. It was officially proclaimed on May 5, 1868, by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed. The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

To honor the birthday of the church, members of the congregation were encouraged to wear red (and most did). Of course, Bob McGrath's hat brought a smile to everyone's face and a comment from Elder Dick Higgins who was filling in for Rev. Ralph, even though it didn't fit the color scheme.

Ron Smith introduced Marti Bigbie, Commander of American Legion Post 90 in St. George, and commented that they had placed a flag and said a few words in the Rose Garden before the service. He asked everyone to think about the sacrifices made by those who have died for our country.

The service began with the Pledge of Allegiance and ended with the Star Spangled Banner – a fitting tribute to our great nation.

Dick Higgins spoke about Numbers and the story of Moses and the Elders of the early church. His main point was that we should "be careful what we wish for" and to take stock of what we have before we ask for more, bringing our desires into alignment with God's will. He urged everyone to be like Moses and be open to God's leading and allow ourselves to be used by God to help build up His kingdom – and that is what Pentecost is all about.



## Pastor's Page

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. <sup>2</sup> And suddenly there came from heaven a noise like a violent rushing wind, and it filled the whole house where they were sitting. <sup>3</sup> And there appeared to them tongues as of fire distributing themselves, and they rested on each one of them. <sup>4</sup> And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit was giving them utterance.

The account of Pentecost as recorded in the Acts of the Apostles is striking and powerful. For the first time the Good News of the Gospel is proclaimed in all the known languages of that time and the body of Christ becomes a living witness to the world and all nations and languages, including English and Russian.

The Union of Evangelical Christians-Baptist Church of Russia, of which our sister church in Dorogobuzh is a member, is the Russia's second largest denomination, after the Russian Orthodox Church. The church, early in its existence, adopted a covenant that was very Calvinist in form, making it theologically resemble more the PC (USA) than the Baptists of our own nation. The UECBR since its inception has adopted one aim, to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

In 2010 this denomination claimed 76,000 adherents; currently it is approaching one million.

On July 14 Elder and Mission Committee Moderator Chris Schleter and I will depart for our visit with our brothers and sisters in Dorogobuzh. I am looking forward to hearing the Good News preached by Pastor Sergei and sung by his congregation in Russian. I am praying for the gift of the Holy Spirit so that I, like those first apostles and disciples may hear the mighty acts of God in Jesus Christ, and be amazed.

#### Senior Ministries

On Wednesday, May 20<sup>th</sup>, our final Soup & Bread Fellowship of the season was given by our own retired BLM District Manager for the Arizona Strip District, Scott Florence. He worked for the BLM for 38 years in 5 states as well as at headquarters in Washington, D.C. His job of managing herds of wild horses and burros was not an easy one.

In 1971, Congress voted (believe it or not) unanimously in favor of the Free Roaming of the Wild Horses and Burros Act. At that time, there were 25,000 wild horses. Here are some facts as they relate to the horses:

- There are more than 49,000 horses which exceeds by more than 22,500 the appropriate management level to be in harmony with the land.
- Wild horses live 20 to 30 years and double their population very 4 years.
- They have no predators.
- Half of the wild horse herds are in Nevada. Utah, Wyoming and Idaho have a share.
- Some horses are being held in corrals and other holding facilities but these are at maximum capacity today.
- The cost of feeding and housing, paid by the government, aka us, \$46,000,000.
- The rate of adoption has dropped from 7,500 to 2,500 per year.
- Stringent rules exist in order to get a permit to adopt.
- Ranchers currently have a lawsuit asking that wild horses be removed from state land.
- BLM is doing all they can to try to control the herds reproduction rate; however, the needs are costly and have almost impossible time constraints with some control methods such as spaying and neutering.

Scott has a strategy that more removals and more sterilizations systematically done over a period of years may begin to show a reduction in size of herds.

#### **Session News**

Session held their regular monthly meeting on May 12, 2015. Here is a synopsis of the actions:

- Received report on church records review from the Presbytery.
- Approved combining the Thelma Fund and the Joe and Willie Luke Fund (\$1,118.15 + \$7,930.02 = \$9,048.17) and to redistribute 10% or \$904.82 to the Russian Mission Fund and 90% or \$8,143.35 to the Building Fund.
- Session Clerk to send thank you letter to George Linden for a Poinsettia Tree and all the beautiful woodwork pieces he has contributed to the church throughout the years.
- Approved accepting the Presbyterian Women's donation of \$1,000 for a new freezer and \$3,000 for installation of a handicap door button for the west side of the narthex.
- Approved moving \$700 from contingency to Churchwide Mission to fund Rev. Ralph's and Chris Schleter's attendance at this year's Russia Mission Network Conference.

He is the owner; we are the managers or caretakers of God's property. King David wrote, "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it" (Psalm 24:1). God is the landlord. We are the tenants. We possess, we occupy, we use, we manage—but we don't own.

Scripture tells us, "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth" (Genesis 1:1). Out of nothing, God created life. The world and all who live in it are gifts from God. To sustain our lives, he gives us the ability to produce wealth (Deuteronomy 8:18). He gives us strength, wisdom, knowledge to use in this life and then eternal life with him in Heaven.

#### **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we hope to continue our tradition of paying off our mortgages early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also need to replenish the \$45,000 that was in the fund when we began the project meaning we need to raise almost \$287,000.

Through May 24<sup>th</sup>, we have received pledges totaling \$69,881 and cash donations of \$31,973 for a total of \$101,854 or about 35.5% of the way to the \$287,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and free funds to be used for additional improvements that we need to make.
