

Below is the sermon that I preached in Dorogobuzh on July 26th.

It has been to me almost like a dream that I am standing before you today here in this wonderful place that we have only had pictures, YouTube videos and our imaginations to inform us about you, who you are and what you and your country are like.

I have spent hours attempting to learn your language. I have studied your history. I have on many occasion gone to our display of your pictures and studied your faces, your clothing, and even tried to identify what you were preparing to eat on your tables, unsuccessfully I might add. And I have watched many times the videos of your harvest festival on YouTube.

It was in watching one of those videos that I had my breakthrough, my revelation you might say.

Pastor Sergei and his daughter turned and smiled at each other. A father's and daughter's love.

Having two daughters of my own I recognized that smile – the same smile I have shared with my own children. The love of parent and child

Instead of the differences I now saw how much the same we are. We love our children. We hope for their lives to be happy and healthy. To know the Lord. We pray for a better world for them and our grandchildren to live in.

Paul writes to the Galatians that because of our common faith in Christ, we who are Baptized in Christ are one. Old divisions are gone.

I have been preaching to my congregation that our coming to you and worshiping and living with you is bearing a visible witness to the truth of the Good News of Jesus Christ. The body of Christ knows no boundaries of nationality or language. Only the love of Christ, in that love we are one, we are family.

Paul adds in another letter if someone is in Christ the old is gone all things have become new.

Our visit with you and someday your visit with us is the creating of something new. That the growth of this fellowship we have started together with the blessing of our Lord Jesus Christ in the years ahead is an important message to our communities and the best hope for our children's and grandchildren's future.

And that is where ever we live, where ever we are from, wherever we are going, in Jesus Christ and in our shared life in him and our love for one another, we are one.

Building One Another

COUNT TO EIGHT

I love the way Dale Bruner describes the disciples when they realize Jesus has asked them to feed a huge crowd and all they have are five loaves of bread and two fish:

"The disciples think they have 'nothing here' except these seven items. But they are counting only the realities that impress them, not the Reality that should impress them the most. Disciples should always count to eight [emphasis added]."1

Are you in a situation right now where whatever your "seven" are, your equivalent of five loaves and two fish are simply not enough? "Lord, I have nothing but my energy, effort, grit, gumption, mind, resources, and my team" and it's – just – not – working. I have counted to seven but You invite me to count to eight – to trust you!"

"They [the disciples] replied, 'We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish.' And he said, 'Bring them here to me'" Matthew 14:17-18.*

Jesus works with what you bring to him beginning with your own life. In whatever situation you find yourself, be alert to your equivalent of the five loaves and two fish, offer them to Jesus, count to eight and trust him.

As Jehoshaphat with a small community prayed when they were facing a huge army, "We do not know what to do, but our eyes are on you" 2 Chronicles 20:12b. Jehoshaphat counted to eight!

TRAVEL!

Once I was in a bit of a complaining mood after traveling a lot when I received a flash of insight upon realizing my Lord was saying to me, "This is what I have you doing. Get over yourself!" Mollified, I quit being irritable about it. Soon afterward I opened the New Testament and the very first words my eyes fell on were, "Jesus traveled!"

Last week I left home and rode in a car to Dulles Airport, flew on a plane to La Guardia Airport, took a New York City yellow cab to my lodging, walked a quarter of a mile and hopped the train to a restaurant!

Five modes of transportation and all along the way I saw all sorts of people. Could I have known of their personal lives, they would have been the very kind of people Jesus saw with his "people eyes" when he, "had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd" Matthew 9:36.*

The word "harassed" has the meaning of worn down – hassled – just plain worn out. The word "helpless" carries the sense of thrown down – knocked over – in a world of hurt.

As you travel about your day, whether walking, driving or using any other mode of transportation put on the people eyes of Jesus and be aware of the people with you on the journey. Offer a quick prayer, a warm smile, be a conduit of the love of Christ through you to the world around you!

Session held their regular monthly meeting on August 11, 2015. Here is a synopsis of the actions:

- Approved the donation of our old hymnals that are in usable condition to the Moscow Protestant Chaplaincy at a cost to ship approximately 80 hymnals not to exceed \$1400. This is to be paid for using the remaining money from the Russia trip (about \$625) with the rest to come from the Memorial Fund.

Stewardship

Thank you for your generous support of our General Fund, Building Fund, and mission work! Here is an update on the second part of the building fund campaign. We have a good start with 15 pledges to date totaling \$35,020. However, this is just a start! Since our mortgage payments will total \$48,366 over the next three years, the amount pledged does not even cover our mortgage payments let alone any repairs we may need to make to the buildings. (And we already know that there are some items that do need to be fixed!). If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider doing so.

Why We Struggle in Giving

Jesus gave us all ... his one and only Son (John 3:16). Just as Jesus gave, we are enabled by God's grace to be giving people. For Christians, giving is not an option. We are to give our first fruits generously and joyfully out of gratitude for who God is and what he has done and continues to do for us. So why don't Christians give as they should?

The following are some reasons people don't give more:

1. *Spiritual problems.* People act as owners of their things rather than stewards. They readily acknowledge God as the owner with their lips but not with their hearts and actions. Those lacking an intimate relationship with Jesus do not make giving a priority.

Stewardship, continued

- 2. *Financial problems.* The average credit card debt per household is approximately \$8,000. Many don't manage their money wisely. Until we spend less money than we make, we will find that money is tight and unavailable for giving generously.
- 3. *Compartmentalization.* We compartmentalize when we divide our lives into competing parts. If we disconnect God from the managing of our money, he is not in control, and we are prone to hoard money rather than give it.
- 4. *Limited vision.* We are apt to give less than we are capable if we do not understand all that our church or other Christian organizations are doing. If we understand and relate to the vision and mission of the church or organizations seeking our contributions, we will give generously.
- 5. *Limited relationships.* People give more when they are connected to the church or Christian organization through relationships. If good relationships exist with the pastor or church leaders or even other members, people tend to be more generous.

If we are struggling in our giving, we need to seek God's strength to grow in our faith and trust in him. It is only by God's grace that we can be empowered to grow in the grace of giving.

May God help us all grow in his love and grace so we become the generous givers he wants us to be.

We own nothing. We are simply stewards of our lives, our goods, and our relationships. A basic understanding of Christian stewardship is that we are set in this world as caretakers, as stewards, not as possessors. To be wise, is, in one sense, to be a good steward. The gospel story of the talents constitutes a plea for us to use what has been entrusted to us, but it is grounded in the truth that we own nothing, not even our lives. © Copyright Parish Publishing, LLC • May not be copied without permission. • www.parishpublishing.org

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years totaling more than \$100,000 that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through August 23rd, we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling \$35,020 and additional cash donations of \$4,500 for a total of **\$140,746** or about **41.1%** of the way to our **\$342,000 goal**.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.

NEW BUILDING FUND CAMPAIGN

As our first building fund campaign ended in May and now it is time for Building Fund, Part II. As of May, the balance on our 15-year mortgage was \$161,820.62. Our goal for the 2015-2018 campaign is \$75,000. This amount includes the mortgage and other necessary building updates and repairs. Below is the breakdown for this number:
