Operation Christmas Child Underway

Operation Christmas Child kicked off on October 4th and we'll collect filled shoeboxes on November 15th and 22nd. Please consider taking a shoe box (or three) and filling it with goodies for a needy child. In addition to all of the fun that the kids have opening their box, they also learn about Jesus and His plan for us.

Last year we filled 99 shoeboxes (actually 100 but one didn't arrive before the deadline) and this year we want to fill at least 125 shoeboxes! As of October 25th, we had distributed nearly 100 shoeboxes so we're well on the way to our goal.

Here's one story of a life changed by an Operation Christmas Child shoebox:

Shayal received an Operation Christmas Child shoebox gift as a teenager in her Hindu village of Vunika. She accepted the invitation to participate in The Greatest Journey, the follow-up discipleship course for children who receive shoebox gifts, and soon accepted Christ as her Savior. The class began to grow to include parents and siblings until a church opened in the village for the very first time. Shayal brought her mother and brother to church where they also became believers. Today she is sharing Christ boldly with her friends at school. She said, "My duty as a child of God is to save lives."

Three times a week, Pastor "Waisea" Liwaiono walks up to 10 miles one way to villages like Shayal's to teach The Greatest Journey. He said, "Operation Christmas Child has taken me into rural areas where people haven't heard the Gospel. We're talking about Hindus. We're talking about Muslims. Operation Christmas Child has begun building up churches in these communities." Because caring people take the time to pack shoebox gifts every year, Pastor Waisea said, "Many lives have changed. Families have gotten back together, churches have worked together, and pastors have forgiven each other through Operation Christmas Child."

CROP Hunger Walk November 14

The sixth annual CROP Hunger Walk will be held on November 14th. We'll begin the walk at 10:00 am in Larkspur Park at the corner of Fort Pierce Drive and Larkspur Road in Bloomington Hills. St. George Mayor Jon Pike and Washington City Mayor Ken Neilson will be there to send the walkers on their way.

You can walk or you can make a donation to support one of our walkers and a portion of the money raised stays here in our area and supports the Soup Kitchen and Solomon's Porch. In the five previous walks, we've raised more than \$30,000 to end hunger and look forward to 2015 being a recordsetting year.

Walkers can sign up through November 8th and we'll set out all of our walkers' envelopes on tables in Conklin Hall during Fellowship on the 8th for anyone who is unable to walk but would like to make a contribution.

Please join us in helping to end hunger both in our community and in the world at large.

Ruling Elders Monthly Scriptures



Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought



Whenever I reflect upon our great national holiday, Thanksgiving, the words of this familiar Thanksgiving hymn come to my mind. Even though it was written in a time and land far away from our Pilgrims in Plymouth it continues to summarize our national and religious purpose in coming together annually on that November Thursday to give thanks.

What I find so humbling about this hymn even beyond its words are the circumstances from which it was penned. Pastor Martin Rinkart wrote these words as a family table blessing at the conclusion of the Thirty Years War. A war that saw the devastation of siege, death and plague decimate not only this congregation's city but as well over fifty percent of the members of his congregation. At one point Pastor Rinkart was the only protestant pastor alive in the city and left with his doing over 40 funerals a day. The Rinkart home

itself on occasion became a makeshift refugee center. It must have been for all in that city and congregation a terrible and dark experience, if not faith shaking.

Yet Pastor Rinkart begins his famous hymn with the words "Now Thank We All Our God." In the face of such great adversity these reflect a deep and wonderful faith that looks beyond the present to the love of God which is timeless. The same Christian love we celebrate every day of the year.

I would imagine that the present state of our nation and world might leave us with a feeling of discouragement, if not fear. In many ways the present world might seem to us to be a frightening place.

Like Martin, we too are called to look beyond and to our Christian faith. To trust the one who continues to love us and shower gifts each day if we are willing to see them, and that indeed takes faith. And in so doing, along with Martin then, and as now together we may sing boldly on Thanksgiving Day and all other days, "thank we all our God"!

At Princeton Theological Seminary, the first week in November means that we are half way through the semester. Among my classes this semester is a Reformation History class taught by Dr. Elsie McKee titled "Theology of John Calvin". In the class, I have come to appreciate John Calvin as one of the great theologians of the Protestant Reformation and have developed a deeper understanding of the ways in which his thoughts have been extremely influential both within the Christian church and wider society.

In 2013, Donald K. McKim, a prolific Presbyterian theologian and author, wrote a Calvin devotional book called <u>Coffee with Calvin: Daily Devotions</u>. Each morning as I am sipping (or gulping) my coffee, I read one of eighty four practical devotions which look into the enduring theology of John Calvin. Each day's devotion presents a short excerpt from Calvin's Institutes of the Christian Religion, followed by a topical reflection by Donald K. McKim. According to the publisher, "readers will come away seeing Calvin as an eminently practical theologian with timeless insights into the Christian life." Whether you drink coffee or not, I recommend this devotional book.

First, I want to thank everyone who has donated to the Soup Kitchen. I continue to be inspired by the generosity of our congregation in helping those in need.

Please join us in our efforts both to bring the Gospel to needy children around the world through Operation Christmas Child and to end hunger through the CROP Hunger Walk. Every donation touches lives.

Finally, Ellen and Al Smith, our Mission Co-Workers for Russia, will be with us on November 22nd to share their thoughts on our relationship with our sister congregation in Dorogobuzh. They will be leading our Sunday Adult Education class and presenting a Minute for Mission during worship. Please join us and make them feel welcome.

Parish Nursing Ministry

Christie Benton, dietician, from LiVe Well Center at Dixie Regional Medical Center provided the Brown Bag attendees an excellent presentation on making it easier to cook for one or two. She noted that as we get older it is a challenge to meet the nutritional demands with fewer calories. It means those fruits and veggies and lean meats, fish and chicken are necessary to provide this. Here are some pointers that she shared with us:

- Shop with convenience in mind
- Take advantage of your freezer
- Cook a batch and freeze single portions- be sure to write contents & date
- Prepare one-dish meals like stew or casseroles
- Use extras wisely so you can use the extras in new dishes
- Hit the cookbooks for ideas
- Try to include foods from 3 food groups
- Set a pleasant table
- Think healthy snack, humus or fruit
- Go out or invite friends over for occasions
- Enjoy community supplied meals on occasions
- Cook ahead- use your crock pot

Looking ahead to Thursday, December 3rd at Noon, we will welcome Karen Schlieter, MS, Gerokinesiologist (someone who studies the mobility, fitness and rehabilitation of the older adult) as our Brown Bag Luncheon speaker discussing: "5 Steps to Reduce Falls."

It's time to get your flu shot. This year, the effectiveness of the inactivated virus strains contained in the vaccine is predicted to be in the 50-60% range as opposed to last year's 13%. Although you have the shot, you still may contract the flu but the severity of your illness and your risk for side effects (such as pneumonia) will be less than if you had not had the vaccine at all. Supplies are not limited and people of all ages are encouraged to be immunized. It will take about two weeks to develop maximum protection so get your shot soon!

Session held their regular monthly meeting on October 13, 2015. Here is a synopsis of the actions:

- Approved installation of shut off valve, pressure relief valve and expansion tank in Church Building at a cost of \$312.69.
- Approved payment up to \$600 for airfare for Ellen & Al Smith to come to Good Shepherd in November.
- Regretfully accepted the resignation of Harold Wylie as visitation pastor.
- Accepted the nominations of 2016 deacons: Shirley Fromknecht, Jeff Clingan, Dawn Angerone, and Mary Contreras. Accepted nominations of 2016 Nominating Committee at-large members: Amy Craig, Nancy Higgins, and George Linden
- Approved 2016 Budget without Terms of Call.
- Approved presenting By-Law amendments regarding Called Congregational Meeting in November or December and Annual Congregation Meeting in January and to clean up other inconsistencies in the By-Laws.
- Set Stated Congregational Meeting for December 6, 2016 for the purpose of receiving the report of the Nominating Committee and acting upon it, presenting the 2016 Budget and Terms of Call of the Pastor, and considering By-Law Amendments.
- Set a Pulpit Exchange for November 8, 2015 [Ed note: This has been postponed until early 2016].
- Authorized Carolynn Thomas, Treasurer, to transfer funds between various church accounts at State Bank of Southern Utah and to pay credit card bills.
- Allowed Mary Starrett to conduct no-cost dance lessons in Conklin Hall.
- Approved the establishment of a new checking account at State Bank of Southern Utah for Russian Mission Funds.
- Established a long range Russian Mission Committee to review and set long and short term goals, to be led by Rev. Clingan and include Mission/Outreach Elder, Chris Schleter and 1-3 other members from the congregation.

In November, Stewardship is welcomes "Brother Steward" as our Steward thought for the month and monthly bulletin insert. We hope you will enjoy and learn from this new program.

Can I Be Trusted with Much?

Brother Steward

Oswald Chambers wrote, "Not every man can carry a full cup. Sudden elevation frequently leads to pride and a fall. The most exciting test of all to survive is prosperity." This quote provides a clear warning: Those who become prosperous are also very likely to become filled with pride. Pride can cause inflated egos and self-worthiness. Agur, a writer of proverbs, gave us this warning: ". . . give me neither poverty nor riches but give me only my daily bread. Otherwise, I may have too much and disown you and say, 'Who is the Lord?' or I may become poor and steal and so dishonor the name of my God" (Proverbs 30:8-9). When our bills are paid and we have money in the bank, we may feel secure and depend only on ourselves. In speaking about the curse of success, someone once said, "Ninety-nine people out of 100 can handle adversity whereas only one out of 100 can handle prosperity." The wealth that many seek can be more of a curse than a blessing.

Stewardship, continued

God blesses us with work and the ability to earn our incomes. Unfortunately, we may foolishly begin to believe that we are solely responsible for the success we've achieved. As Moses wrote, *"You may say to yourself, 'My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me.' But remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth . . ."* (Deuteronomy 8:18). We should understand that only by God's grace are we able to have a place to call home, a savings account, and a retirement plan. God's Word is clear that we are managers, not owners. *"The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it"* (Psalm 24:1).

Even though it is difficult to pass the test with money, the Holy Spirit, working through the Word, enables us to understand that all we are and have are gifts from God. Joseph provides us a good example of stewardship. Separated from his home and family, he still trusted God and feared him, refusing to give in to the temptations that came with the position God enabled him to fill. As second in command in Egypt, one of the most powerful kingdoms of his day, he retained his humility, realizing that he was only the manager of Egypt's resources. But he managed those resources well, working at it *"with all [his] heart, as working for the Lord, not for men"* (Colossians 3:23). Just as God empowered Joseph in his stewardship, so he does for us today, whether our resources are vast, as were Joseph's, or small.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years totaling more than \$100,000 that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through October 18th, we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling \$39,745 and additional cash donations of \$6,465 for a total of \$147,436 or about 43.1% of the way to our \$342,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
