## The Merry (and Busy) Month of December Kicks Off

As usual, December will be a VERY busy month. Beginning on November 29 with the kickoff of Rev. Ralph's Annual Tacky Tie and Sweater Contest and culminating on Christmas Eve with the traditional worship service, there is something in December for everyone.

On Thursday, December 3rd, 10th and 17th, at about 5:00 pm (after Choir), Rev. Ralph will lead a 30 minute prayer service in the Sanctuary. 

## **Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought**

"Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it Holy." Exodus 20:8



#### "A Very Merry Commercialized Formerly Pagan Holiday!!"

A couple of years ago while standing at the cashier's counter at a local chain restaurant, I witnessed a couple berating the young cashier for her employer having only "Happy Holiday" gift cards and no "Merry Christmas" gift cards. They were almost yelling at the poor young lady who had no more say in regards to her employers gift card policy than I do, "We're Christian and want Christ in Christmas!!"

I felt badly for the young lady — if she wasn't feeling the warmth and witness of Christian love at that point I could hardly blame her!

However, following that scene, I was led to ponder a few questions surrounding the yearly celebration we affectionately refer to as Christmas.

To begin with what is wrong with referring to December 25th as a "Holiday"?

The word "Holiday" comes to us from the old English and originally meant "Holy Day". Personally with all the commercialization that now fills all our senses from now until the big day I personally would like to see a little more "Holiness" surrounding the day.

I understand there are those who object just as strongly to the term "X-Mas in reference to the day associated with the birth of Christ, however perhaps we have forgotten that originally our "X" was the Greek letter Chi and for the early church was one of the universally accepted symbols for "Christ". Personally I would like to see a little more "Christ" associated with the day most commonly associated with gifts and love.

Perhaps then, before we accost any more teenage cashiers in the name of Christ, we should consider a few facts that are generally not known or considered.

To begin with December 25th was originally a pagan holiday and not a Christian one. A majority of scholars believe Christ was born in the spring, not in winter. However early in the life of the church, as Christianity grew, a Pope decided to take the holiday, make it a Christian one and tone down the party. While the pagans and populace were willing to give up the day they were completely reluctant to give up the party, much to the chagrin and complaining of the Pope.

Therefore a few thoughts to consider: it is perhaps time for us again to take back the December 25<sup>th</sup> event in our own lives – to again make the day Holy by centering our lives and day on the joyous gift we have been given in the gift of the Christ and, through his cross, the new life we all now have received and celebrate in Christian love, every day of the year.

A very blessed and Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you all!

### Wendy's Window

In the Christian church, the time before Christmas is ADVENT, a season of preparation for Christmas. ADVENT begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on Christmas Eve. Traditionally, the colors of ADVENT are purple and pink.

During ADVENT, Christians prepare for celebrating the birth of Jesus by remembering the longing of the Jews for a Messiah. In ADVENT, we are reminded of how much we ourselves need a Savior, and we look forward to our Savior's second coming, even as we prepare to celebrate his first coming at Christmas.

The word ADVENT comes from the Latin word ADVENTUS, which means "coming " or "arrival." The focus of the entire ADVENT season is the celebration of the birth of Jesus the Christ in his FIRST ADVENT and the anticipation of the return of Christ the King in his SECOND ADVENT. Christians affirm that Christ has come, that he is present in the world today and that he will come again.

ADVENT is marked by a spirit of expectation, of anticipation, of preparation, of longing. There is a yearning for deliverance from the evils of the world, first expressed by Israelite slaves in Egypt as they cried out from their bitter oppression. It is the cry of those who have experienced the tyranny of injustice in a world under the curse of sin and still have hope of deliverance by a God who has heard the cries of oppressed slaves and brought deliverance!!

May we celebrate God's deliverance as we await the return of Christ the King.

### Mission/Outreach

Our fall projects are in the books and I want to thank you for your wonderful generosity and support. I am constantly amazed at your generosity and faith and pray that we can build upon our work for years to come.

We collected 216 pairs of shoes during the shoe drive. This was a few more than last year and will help many who lack shoes to wear. We will probably do this activity a bit earlier in the year next year so start saving shoes now!

The CROP Walk raised nearly \$5,000 this year. Our congregation was responsible for nearly 20% of that total. Thanks to all who walked and to those who supported our walkers.

We had a goal of 125 shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child and we fell just one short. Gloria Reynolds and her helpers, Paul Reynolds and Liz Larsen delivered 124 boxes to Calvary Chapel on Monday, November 23<sup>rd</sup>. Yes, for the second year in a row, we were ONE box short of our goal. Although we didn't quite meet our goal this year, we'll be looking to collect 150 boxes next year. You don't have to wait until next October to start shopping, either. After Christmas and back to school sales are great times to pick up a few items and put them away for next year.

Now that we've reached the end of the year, we'll be deciding on the local charities that will receive donations and the amounts of those donations. I'll have information on that in the January newsletter.

Finally, we had a great visit with Ellen and Al Smith, our Mission Co-Workers for Russia on November 22<sup>nd</sup>. They led our Adult Education class and answered many questions about Russia and our relationship with Pastor Sergei's congregation. They also presented a Minute for Mission and thanked the congregation for their continued support of our mission. We thank Ellen and Al for coming to visit us in St. George and look forward to having them back soon!

November's Soup and Fellowship hosted a speaker from outside our congregation, Kristyn Decker, who most graciously agreed to tell us about her life as a polygamist. Kristyn was born into the sect and lived it for fifty years with a deep gnawing feeling that what she was told to believe was not how she wanted to live. She took us inside the lives of polygamist families, related a history of FLDS and her branch called AUB (Apostolic United Brethren) led by her father, a prophet, Allred. She was the twelfth of his twenty-three children.

A mother of seven, she views the abuse, molestation, poverty, depression and loneliness she endured for fifty years as her good fortune, each one raising awareness for the necessity for change. She gradually pulled herself out with EDUCATION – she became a teacher. She quotes Eckhart Toli, " Love, joy and peace cannot flourish until you have freed yourself from mind dominance."

Today, this lovely woman lives in New Harmony with her husband of several years. She is not a Mormon, nor a polygamist. She lives in most humble GRATITUDE for nature, life, love and the freedom to choose. Kristyn volunteers to help end human rights abuses due to polygamy and other forms of abuse through a program she founded: Sound Choices Coalition. She is the author of several books on leaving polygamy. You can find more about her on www.kristyndecker.com.

#### Jesus, the Light

Are you waiting for something that seems to be too long in coming? Maybe it's a job promotion or a raise. Maybe it's just employment of any kind! Perhaps you've been praying for someone's salvation, and you don't see any sign of God's working in that person. It's difficult to wait. People in Jesus' day were waiting for a Messiah. It seemed to many that his coming was long overdue, but Paul writes in Galatians 4:4-5, *"When the time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under law, to redeem those under law, that we might receive the full rights of sons."* Our waiting is over! The Light has come into the world!

Simeon was one who knew that *"the time had fully come,"* and *"moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts"* (Luke 2:27). There he saw the child whose parents brought him there to fulfill what the Law required of them. Simeon knew Jesus was the light. He proclaimed, *"For my eyes have seen your salvation . . . a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel"* (Luke 2:30, 32).

Unfortunately, not all who were waiting for the Messiah recognized him when he came. In John 1:4-5 we read, *"In him was life, and that life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it."* Still today the darkness misunderstands the Light. Yet he continues to shine, and, as he shines, he dispels darkness.

And he calls upon us to shine also. Jesus, in the Sermon on the Mount, described a lamp that is put on a stand so that it lights up the whole house. Then he said, *"In the same way, let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in Heaven"* (Matthew 5:16).

The only way to dispel darkness is to fill it with light. As stewards, it is our joyous task to be reflections of Christ's light. So we are "prepared in season and out of season: [we] correct, rebuke and encourage – with great patience and careful instruction" (2 Timothy 4:2). We are always prepared "to give an answer to everyone who ask [us] to give the reason for the hope that [we] have. And we do so "with gentleness and respect keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against [our] good behavior in Christ may be ashamed of their slander" (1 Peter 3:15-15). In this way we proclaim that the waiting is over! Jesus, the Light, has come into the world!

### **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years totaling more than \$100,000 that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through November 22<sup>nd</sup>, we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling \$41,845 and additional cash donations of \$12,300 for a total of \$155,371 or about 45.4% of the way to our \$342,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
