Rev. Ralph to Take Sabbatical Leave in 2016

Our Presbytery's Policy manual states: "The Presbytery of Utah recommends to the sessions of its churches that Ministers of the Word and Sacrament be granted a compensated sabbatical of at least three months in the seventh year of ministry to an individual church.

A sabbatical enables the Minister of the Word and Sacrament to be renewed through the vital pursuit of continuing education, extended time spent in spiritual formation, and fresh mentoring by respected teachers. A sabbatical enables a pastor to return to the responsibilities of the church with new energy, spiritual vision, and effectiveness."

Having just entered my eleventh year of serving our congregation as your pastor you can see my sabbatical leave is overdue and I have determined that since I am now ten years away from retirement, this would be the time to take a sabbatical. To be honest with you I have resisted taking a sabbatical in that I can't imagine being away from you all for an extended period of time; however in hearing this concern a former Executive Presbyter of our Presbytery counseled me for this very reason to take one, for your growth and mine and for my renewal.

Therefore I have decided to take the months of June, July and August of 2016 as my sabbatical leave. In that I have lived in this area of magnificent beauty of God's creation for eleven years and have only visited Zion, once, my leave will be focused on exploring the natural wonders of our area and I will be basing my experiences on several sources:

- The Solace of Fierce Landscapes, by Prof. Belden C. Lane
- Backpacking with the Saints: Hiking as Spiritual Practice, by Prof Belden C. Lane
- The Sayings of the Desert Fathers; Benedicta Ward, SLG and Metropolitan Anthony.

During these experiences I will be keeping a journal, sections of which will be posted regularly to our website for our shared experience and insight.

Also during this sabbatical leave time I will be traveling to Russia for an extended visit of one week with our sister church in Dorogobuzh and two weeks at a retreat center in Smolensk training Russian pastors on how to organize and train their lay people to provide pastoral care.

Please keep me in your prayers as I prepare for this journey with our Lord.



Mission/Outreach

2016 has arrived. Thanks to everyone who supported our Mission activities in 2015. Here's an overview of what Mission-Outreach will be doing in 2016.

If you take prescription medications, I'm sure you have LOTS of empty plastic pill bottles. If you're wondering what to do with them once they're empty, don't toss them – donate them! Beginning this month and continuing through the year, we'll collect empty bottles (please remove the labels and wash them out) and send them to The Malawi Project for use in Africa. Pill bottles are in short supply in Africa so doctors have to dispense pills in whatever containers they can find. By supplying them with pill bottles, we provide a safe means for them to dispense needed medications to their patients and keep all of those bottles out of our landfill. Bring your bottles to church and put them in the box in Conklin Hall.

As always, the first Sunday of each month will be designated Soup Kitchen Sunday. We ask you to donate nonperishable food, supplies and cash to help feed the hungry in our community.

Mission-Outreach, continued

The first Sunday in February we will again participate in the Souper Bowl of Caring. For this event, we ask you to bring donations of non-perishable food which will be donated to the Soup Kitchen. Any donated food that the Soup Kitchen cannot use will be passed on to the Utah Food Bank.

Our shoe drive will be in April and May so as you clean out your closets next spring, please keep your usable shoes to help those in need.

Bike and Build will be here in July and Rev. Ralph will be visiting Dorogobuzh in August to help with their Bible Camp.

October and November will see our usual activities: Operation Christmas Child and the CROP Hunger Walk. It's never too early to start shipping for items to place in the OCC shoeboxes so watch those sales and stock up on small toys and other items for the children.

Finally, our Change For Change collection for 2016 will go to the Children's Justice Center.

Parish Nursing Ministry

Our December Brown Bag Luncheon speaker was Karen Schlieter, Gerokinesiologist, from Intermountain LiVe Well Center, who talked about how we can reduce the incidences of our falling. She stressed that falling does not have to be a consequence of growing older and elaborated on the five keys steps to reduce our falling risk:

- Learn your fall-risk factors
- Get appropriate fall-risk screening including balance assessment
- With your physicians, learn to manage your medications
- Learn how to make sure your environment is safe
- Stay physically active

She demonstrated five simple things we can do to improve our balance and stability such as how to properly arise from a seat while maintaining balance. Karen also made the interesting observation that as we age, we lose the skill of being able to get ourselves up off the floor. We are presented fewer and fewer instances when we need to transfer from the floor to upright position and she suggested that, if we are able, we should practice doing it.

You may find the audio of Karen's presentation and the complete content of the information she presented on the Church website, gspcsg.org and we post copies on the Parish Nursing bulletin board.

The Tip of the Month: If you have medications you no longer need or which are outdated, they should not be discarded in the trash or flushed down the toilet, which could impact the environment. Ask your pharmacist the location of the closest take-back facility. Additionally, there are yellow take-back boxes at each police station in the area and the Intermountain hospital pharmacy.

Setting Goals

It is a common and helpful practice to use the start of a new year as motivation to set goals and make plans to attain those goals. As Christians, what is our ultimate goal? What did Jesus tell us in Matthew 6:33? "*But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.*" Certainly this is a worthy and all-encompassing goal for us as Christians.

We're also told that goals should be detailed and specific and measurable. How do we satisfy that criteria in light of our main goal to seek God's kingdom?

Let us remember that all we say and do and are should strain toward seeking God's kingdom. That means we'll be busy in the study of his Word and in regular attendance in church where we can hear his Word and receive his sacraments. It means that we'll be busy about his work of seeking and saving the lost. How is that accomplished?

The Apostle Paul wrote, "You show that you are a letter from Christ . . . written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts" (2 Corinthians 3:3). Jesus put it this way, "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in Heaven" (Matthew 5:16). This is what we are – God's letters who reflect the light of Jesus to a world trying to find its way in darkness.

The psalmist commanded, "*Sing to the Lord, praise his name; proclaim his salvation day after day. Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples. For great is the Lord and most worthy of praise"* (Psalm 96:2-4). In all our words, this should be our goal: to proclaim the goodness, the glory, the greatness of our God.

Stewardship, continued

Then our acts should follow up our attitudes and words. Again Paul's words speak to us: "*Bless those who persecute you; Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn. Live in harmony . . . Do not repay anyone evil for evil . . . If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone . . ." (Romans 12:14ff.). Throughout his letters, Paul urges us to share with those in need, to support those who preach and teach the Word, and to give as we have received.*

These are goals worthy of setting and ones we can carry out by "the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, [who] though he was rich, yet for [our] sakes he became poor, so that [we] through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9).

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years totaling more than \$100,000 that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through December 20th we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling \$41,845 and additional cash donations of \$12,910 for a total of **\$155,981** or about **45.6%** of the way to our **\$342,000 goal**.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
