Easter Season Comes to Good Shepherd

The season of Lent and our celebration of Easter are always busy times at Good Shepherd and 2016 will be no exception.

We began our observation of Lent in early February with our annual Ash Wednesday Services which saw amazing attendance.

This year, for the first time, Rev. Ralph also is leading a small group prayer service following choir practice each Thursday through March 17th. This is a very intimate service and is modeled on one that Rev. Ralph and Chris Schleter participated in during their trip to Russia last July.

On March 20th, Palm Sunday, Rev. Ralph and his team of men will serve us a hearty breakfast beginning at 8:30 am in Conklin Hall. This event is always well attended and we appreciate the efforts of all who provide food for us. Our service on Palm Sunday will be filled with music by our choirs.

On Maundy Thursday, March 24th, we will hold an Agape Dinner beginning at 6:00 pm in Conklin Hall. This dinner is notable because the room is lit oil lamps. If you have one or more lamps you can bring to the dinner, we would certainly appreciate it.

The following day, Good Friday, will be kicked off at 10:30 am by the annual Procession of the Cross and closed with an Ecumenical Service at 7:00 pm at New Promise Lutheran Church. Barbara McConnell will lead the combined choir.

We will not have an early service or adult education on Easter Sunday, March 27th, so we can all prepare ourselves to celebrate our Risen Lord. After the service, we hope you will join us for Easter Brunch in Conklin Hall.

We hope to see you at as many events as you can attend.

With Easter Comes One Great Hour of Sharing

Of course, with Easter, comes the annual One Great Hour of Sharing. Here is some history on this offering.

Following World War II, Protestant churches in the United States made appeals for the relief and reconstruction of devastated areas, primarily in Europe and Asia. In 1949 the leaders of several denominations formed a committee to organize an appeal to support their churches' separate campaigns. The next year, the offering was repeated, for the first time using the name "One Great Hour of Sharing,'

The offering always has been an ecumenical effort and, while each denomination allocates its gifts differently, all use their funds for ministries of disaster relief, refugee assistance, and development aid.

A radio program called "One Great Hour" was broadcast on March 26, 1949. The broadcast closed with a request that listeners attend church the following morning and make a sacrificial contribution. No exact measure of receipts was possible, but it was estimated that more than 75,000 churches participated.

One Great Hour of Sharing is one of our major church-wide offerings and does so much good for so many people. Please consider making a donation to this most worthwhile offering.



Sometimes what seems like extra information in the story of Jesus actually tells us a lot about what kind of people Jesus developed and how he went about it.

For example, the first verse of Luke chapter 8 tells us Jesus went through cities and villages proclaiming the good news and in the fourth verse the story narrows to the gathering of a great crowd as the setting for the famous parable of the sower.

However, in between those two verses we read, "The twelve were with him, as well as some women who had been cured of evil spirits and infirmities: Mary, called Magdalene, from whom seven demons had gone out, and Joanna, the wife of Herod's steward Chuza, and Susanna, and many others, who provided for them out of their resources." Luke 8:1b-3

The twelve disciple-apostles often get all of the attention as the followers of Jesus as well as the focus given on the "inner three," Peter, James and John. Yet Luke teaches us that women were as close to Jesus as men.

Mary, Joanna and Suzanna had been healed in some way by Jesus, all of them helped finance his work, and two of them, Joanna and Susanna, were present when the tomb of Jesus was discovered empty and heard the incredible words, "He is not here. He has risen."

Every single one of us is invited to believe in and follow Jesus. Jesus invites you to follow him, to place all aspects of your life in his service and to know the wonder and joy of this Lord who lives!

Philippians 4: 4-7 says:

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

I have been keeping these verses in front of me as I complete my seminary courses and prepare for the next step on the journey. In *Lent and Easter: Wisdom from Henri J.M. Nouwen,* Judy Bauer suggests that, "Lent is often portrayed as a journey, from one point in time to another point in time, from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday." Scriptures, psalms, prayers, rituals, practices, and penance are all components of the Lenten journey. Bauer says that "each component, tried and tested by years of tradition, is one of the engines that drives the season and which brings the weary spiritual traveler to the joys of Easter."

I pray that this Lenten journey has been a process of spiritual growth for you that has allowed you to move from one state of being to another state. For example, Bauer says, "some people may find themselves troubled and anxious at the beginning of Lent as a result of a life choice or unanswered question, and, at the end of Lent, they may fully expect a sense of peace, or perhaps simply understanding and acceptance. Lent can be a movement from one point of view to another or, perhaps, from one interpretation of life to a different interpretation."

Peace and blessings as we continue the Lenten journey toward our Easter celebration!

Parish Nursing Ministry

On Wednesday, February 17th, Michele Baker, Assistant Program Coordinator with the Washington county Council on Aging and Jeanie Johnson, Center supervisor of the St George Senior Center provided a very informative and interesting presentation on what's new and exciting at the Senior Center. There are now three Senior Centers, St George, Hurricane and Enterprise plus a meal site in Springdale. Anyone 60 or older is welcome to take part in all of the activities plus meals. The St George Center is open from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm Tuesday through Friday with lunch served Tuesday through Thursday from 11:30 am to 12:45 pm and Brunch on Friday from 10:30 am 11:45 am. Each meal carries a suggested donation of \$3.00.

The three main services provided at the Senior Center in St George are Activities, Meals on Wheels and Dial-A-Ride. You will find a listing of all of the offered February activities listed on the Parish Nursing Ministry bulletin board in the hall between the Narthex and Conklin Hall. They are also listed on their web site which is www.coa.washco.utah.gov.

Meals on Wheels is available to those 60 and older, are unable to prepare adequate meals due to a mental or physical condition, homebound and unable to walk. Dial-A-Ride provides transportation to Medical appointments, Pharmacies for prescription pick up, various shopping locations and lunch at the Senior Center. The fare is a suggested donation of \$3.00 for one way and \$5.00 round trip with a restriction of ONE trip daily. Clients may now shop on a daily basis Tuesday through Friday between 10 AM and 3PM. Call Tonya at the Center at 634-5743 (Option #1) to schedule your ride at least 3 days in advance.

The St George Senior Center has opportunities galore to improve your mind, enliven your body and lift your spirits in a safe place to try new things, to reach for help and keep involved and busy.

The Senior Center will hold a Wellness Fair on April 8, 2016, beginning at 9:00 am. Admission is free and vendors will be there giving away goodies, entertainment and medical checks like blood pressure and blood sugar levels. Come and enjoy the fun!

On Wednesday, April 6th, at 9:00 am, in Conklin Hall, we will be offering a CPR/AED course for the non-professional. The class is open to both those who have never been certified or those who need to update a previous certification and will last between two and three hours. Come in casual dress and the cost is \$25.00 per person. Please contact Charlotte Phipps (410-628-8808) to register.

Another date for your April calendar is Friday, April 15th, when we will be sponsoring our semi-annual Red Cross Blood Drive in the Education Building. If you are a regular donor, you may give blood every 56 days. Kathie Greear (207-240-0994), is the contact person for registration or you may go to the Red Cross website to sign up.

Stewardship

Thanks to all of you who have pledged and/or donated. As of February 14th we have pledged \$128,954, only \$1,611 from reaching our goal of \$130,565 for pledges for the general fund. The loose offerings to the general fund are also within three dollars of last January's. The building fund has 22 pledges totaling \$42,577 of our \$75,000 goal.

We were asked a question about how to include the church in your estate planning? Have an attorney, who speaks Utah "legalese" draw it up. We are also working on having attorney Katie Woods come to do a talk on this topic.

On March 13th we will kick off the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. One Great Hour of Sharing, started in 1949, is a long standing ecumenical effort aimed at raising the funds necessary to provide relief and reconstruction for communities in the aftermath of disaster. What started as an hour long radio appeal has evolved over the years from eight to twenty-nine participating denominations. There are currently programs in over 100 counties.

Stewardship, continued

Funds from the offering are divided approximately in thirds among three programs:

- Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) Works within communities as they recover and find hope after the devastation of natural or human caused disasters.
- Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP) Takes action to alleviate hunger and its systemic causes and helps create access to healthy food for entire communities.
- Self- Development of People (SDOP) Partners with people and communities with tools for development and education to alleviate poverty, oppression and injustice.

Thank you for your continued support of our church and mission.

Worship and Music

We could possibly call this month "March Madness" because of all the activities and significant dates that occur in the next few weeks. The season of Lent began on Wednesday February 10th (Ash Wednesday), and it will end with Palm Sunday. You will notice that the sanctuary candles are not lit during this time—if you want to know why, ask Rev. Ralph. He will be glad to tell you the reason. Note that Lent is 40 days long (we of the Reformed Faith do not count the Sundays during Lent), perhaps a reflection of Jesus's 40 days in the wilderness, after which He was tempted by the devil (see the Gospels of John and Matthew). Lent is a time for reflection, prayer and preparation for Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Resurrection Sunday. During Lent, on Thursdays at 5:15 pm, a prayer service will be held following choir practice. These services involve prayer in small groups, praying for particular things, such as the world at large, our community, the church, etc. Bring a snack to share afterward. Please consider attending these meaningful services on March 3rd, 10th, and 17th. You will be amazed at the power of intense prayer.

Palm Sunday is March 20th this year. We will have palms, of course, and great music during worship!

Maundy Thursday is on March 24th, and we will hold out traditional Agape Dinner and service in Conklin Hall at 6:00 pm. This is a lovely light meal commemorating the Last Supper and Christ's order to "do this" (break bread and drink wine, or in our case, juice) in remembrance of Him. Please bring bread (already sliced), fruit, or cheese (already sliced or in chunks—help our set-up folks in this way) to share. We will also have our usual hand washing at each table (in place of foot washing, which is not usually popular for some reason).

Good Friday is on March 25th, and a service will be held this year at New Promise Lutheran Church at 7:00 pm. This is a solemn and sorrowful time when Jesus was crucified and died.

Resurrection Sunday (Easter) is March 27th, and we will celebrate Jesus's resurrection with a joyful worship service and music, and a luncheon afterward hosted by Fellowship. There will be an opportunity to buy Easter lilies prior to Easter Sunday. Please note, Ralph will be on vacation the week following Easter.

We hope all of you will join us for as many events as you can. Easter is really what we, as Christians, are all about.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through February 14th we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling \$42,577 and additional cash donations of \$15,383 for a total of **\$159,186** or about **46.5%** of the way to our **\$342,000 goal**.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
