Restroom Upgrades Planned

Over the last few weeks the Building Team has been busy. In addition to our normal maintenance activities we purchased a new commercial quality vacuum cleaner for use by our cleaning crew, Jim Horvath worked with an electrical contractor to resolve an HVAC problem in Conklin Hall and Guy Schultzman coordinated refinishing of the handrails in the front of church.

Over the last year, we have been working with Session to put in place a long term financial plan that addresses the need for major repairs and updates as our church buildings age and wear. As part of that plan, Session just approved a project to renew the two restrooms in the church.

The restrooms in our main building have not been updated for nearly 20 years and, to be honest, they're not very inviting.

The upgrades that are planned will include:

- Replacing the flooring with ceramic tile in an earth tone pattern with dark grout.
- Replacing the sidewalls with Wainscot panels painted to match the room.
- Replacing all toilets with high-efficiency, single-flush, high-seat, elongated bowl units of good quality.
- Refurbishing Men's Room urinal, all privacy stalls, and all wall fixtures.
- Replacing the Countertop/Sinks/Faucets with new laminate countertop, ½ cabinets, sinks, and faucets to blend with overall appearance. We will also replace the Utility Room sink/faucet.
- Outfit each Rest Room with Christian posters and document holders for Church Bulletins. Replace chair in Women's Rest Room and refresh paint and trim, as required.

We will **start** with a demolition day the morning of **May 23**rd and hope to finish in two or three weeks. Our plan is to utilize some volunteer labor to help minimize the cost. You will hear more about this during Sunday announcements.

This project will not be inexpensive but we hope you will enjoy the end result.

We'll gather for morning worship at 2450 East Park (south of the church on 2450 East) at 10:30 and follow up worship with a Picnic in the Park. We'll have sloppy joes and all of the fixings. It's been several years since we've had this wonderful spring activity and look forward to worshiping our Lord in the beauty of his world. See you there!



In August I will traveling by myself to Russia to visit our sister church in Derogobuzh and to participate in their annual summer Bible camp. From there I will be in Smolensk training a group of Russian pastors in the principles of lay caregiving ministry.

To be honest I am, in part, very excited about the opportunities for growth that are ahead, and, at the same time, I am hesitant to be away from all of you and the pulpit after eleven years of continuous service to you, and a ministry that is now thirty-three years old.

A number of you have offered suggestions of places to go, trails to take and parks to explore. Some of you are planning trails to take me on and show me. And some of you have asked, 'just what is a sabbatical anyhow?"

Our Elders and Worship committee have been working hard in preparation for my absence, making sure the pulpit will be filled every Sunday and that any pastoral needs will be covered; I am anticipating an efficient and quiet summer.

For most of you this will be a brand new experience, as it will be for me; although, I have been told our church's founding pastor Rev. John Mahon had a sabbatical during his ministry here twenty-five years ago.

You will be in my thoughts and prayers, please keep me in yours.

Greetings from Arctic Alaska! On March 25, 2016, I moved from Princeton, New Jersey to Barrow, Alaska where I am working for the North Slope Borough Health Department while I continue to be involved in the Presbyterian Church USA ordination process. On May 21, 2016, I will graduate from Princeton Theological Seminary with a Master's Degree in Divinity. The next steps will be to pass ordination examinations, to be determined to be certifiable for ordination by the Utah Presbytery and then to seek a call to ordained ministry as a teaching elder.

It has been interesting to be back in the Arctic! Barrow, a community of 4,500 primarily Inupiat residents, is the northernmost city in the United States, approximately 300 miles north of the Arctic Circle and accessed only by air. The nutrition program I manage provides services to 6 smaller villages which we will visit during May and June called Anaktuvuk Pass, Atqasuk, Kaktovik, Nuiqsut, Point Lay and Wainwright. The opportunities for ministry are abundant! I am attending the Utqiagvik Presbyterian church, playing the piano for the Sunday evening 7:30 pm service and 9:30 pm radio broadcast on KBRW radio.

The scripture I have embraced during this transition is Psalm 118:24 that says, "This is the day that the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it." I pray that you are all doing well and look forward to again having an opportunity to spend some time in St. George. I would love to hear from you!

News from the Russia Mission

While we in the Western Christian church celebrated Resurrection, or Easter, Sunday on March 27th, our sister congregation in Dorogobuzh will celebrate Easter this year on May 1st. Why is that Christians celebrate this most holy of days on different dates?

Easter is not only a movable holiday but a multiple one: in most years Western Christian churches and Eastern Orthodox churches celebrate Easter on different dates. In 2016, for example, Easter was celebrated on March 27th by Western churches and May 1st by Orthodox churches. But in 2017, the two celebrations occur on the same date, April 16th. Because of the influence of the Orthodox Church throughout Russia, Russian Baptists follow the Orthodox calendar.

The formula for Easter – "The first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the vernal equinox" – is identical for both Western and Orthodox Easters, but the churches base the dates on different calendars: Western churches use the Gregorian calendar, the standard calendar for much of the world, and Orthodox churches use the older, Julian calendar.

That much is straightforward. But actually calculating these dates involves a bewildering array of ecclesiastical moons and paschal full moons, the astronomical equinox, and the fixed equinox— and that's in addition to the two different calendar systems. The two churches vary on the definition of the vernal equinox and the full moon.

The Eastern Church sets the date of Easter according to the actual, astronomical full moon and the actual equinox as observed along the meridian of Jerusalem, site of the Crucifixion and Resurrection. The Eastern Orthodox Church also applies the formula so that Easter always falls after Passover, since the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Christ took place after he entered Jerusalem to celebrate Passover. In the Western Church, Easter sometimes precedes Passover by weeks.

The Western church does not use the actual, or astronomically correct date for the vernal equinox, but a fixed date (March 21). And by full moon it does not mean the astronomical full moon but the "ecclesiastical moon," which is based on tables created by the church. These constructs allow the date of Easter to be calculated in advance rather than determined by actual astronomical observances, which are naturally less predictable.

So, Happy Easter to our Russian brothers and sisters.

If you have an interest in what is taught in Adult Sunday School, come to our meeting on Sunday, May 1st, following the worship service in the Christian Education building (where else??). If you like children, you might be interested in volunteering in our nursery or in teaching young people about God and Jesus. If you like to teach, there will be opportunities to use your talents, especially during Rev. Ralph's three-month (June, July, & August) summer sabbatical. Hope to see you on May 1st!!

We **CANNOT ACCEPT** ski boots, heavy winter boots, roller skates, rollerblades, ice skates, **flip-flops/crocs**, bedroom slippers or single shoes. Last year, we collected 208 usable pairs of shoes (and received \$104 for our efforts). Let's beat that this spring!

Our pill bottle collection also continues and we've filled one box! Please remove the labels from your empty prescription bottles, wash them out and place them in the box in Conklin Hall. By supplying pill bottles to those who need them, we provide a safe means for them to dispense needed medications to their patients and keep those bottles out of our landfill.

Parish Nursing Ministry

On April 20th, we were pleased to have Brad Stapley, Pharm D, as our Brown Bag Luncheon speaker. He is a second generation pharmacist from the local Stapley family. The focus of his talk was to describe ways your local pharmacist serves as an important member of your health care team. Your local facility can provide personalized care, as opposed to utilizing mail order sources for medications, by procuring reliable and safe medications; preparing them for you; processing the method of payment, including insurance; and protecting your well-being by searching database information and offering personal consultation. Different pharmacies do not share databases so it is important, if possible, to patronize the same pharmacy for your medication needs.

Brad elaborated on the top recommended Neutraceuticals it is suggested we take in addition to prescribed medications. (Neutraceuticals are products such as nutrients, dietary supplements, herbal products, specific diets and processed foods.) Recommended are:

- Multivitamin
- Enzyme CoQ10
- ALA (Alpha-lipoic Acid)
- Probiotics
- Magnesium (either amino acid chelate or glycinate

- Omega 3
- Vitamin D3
- Zinc
- Ashwagandha

We were warned about using the popular Prescription Discount Coupon cards. They usually are only a means for the provider of the card to gather your personal information and, in most instances, offer no credible service to the customer. Brad did state that often great financial return can be realized by searching the websites of reputable drug manufacturers for their offers for medication reimbursement.

As we know, there are various insurance drug plans available and research will indicate the best one for your individual needs. Prices of co-pays charged for such plans are not determined by an individual pharmacy but by other outside agencies.

Throughout his talk, Brad emphasized the need for us to be informed and to trust that our local pharmacist can be a supportive partner in helping us maintain optimum health and wellness.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through April 17th we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling \$42,577 and additional cash donations of \$17,538 for a total of **\$161,341** or about **47.2%** of the way to our **\$342,000 goal**.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
