

## Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life. For God did not send the Son into the world to judge the world, but that the world might be saved through Him."

John 3:16-17



At the conclusion of my annual Christmas Education Series, "Christmas 101, Bah Humbug", share with the class that the above citation from the Gospel of John is my favorite Christmas scriptural passage.

Now do not jump to the conclusion that I thoroughly enjoy the Christmas season, the gaiety, the lights, the singing of carols, the hearing again of the stories we have marveled as since childhood of stars, angles and shepherds. I do!

However sometimes in all the excitement I believe we miss the greatest of announcements, not about a babe in a manger being born but instead God's greatest gift being delivered to us all. Sometimes I believe our focus at this time of year centers entirely on the past rather than the present and future.

In fact in terms of seasons in the church year, the season of Advent is entirely separate from Christmas. In the oldest of church traditions the celebration of Christmas came much later than Advent. What we have lost is the fact that Advent started with Christmas, remembered Jesus coming and looks forward to the second coming, with hope and expectation.

So yes, I will be joining you all in the festivities, as a professor said to me many years ago, "If you try to fight Christmas you will lose!" I would much rather celebrate and focus my faith and life not on the tree but rather on the gift of our present hope and future day that God has given us in the Son, our salvation. Now there is something to celebrate!

#### Mission/Outreach

We now have final results for our fall-season activities.

Our goal for Operation Christmas Child was 150 shoeboxes. Once again, we fell a bit short, collecting 141 boxes. It's not too early to start on next year's boxes. If you want to get an early start (and shop the after-Christmas sales), please see me and I'll get you some boxes to fill.

The CROP Hunger Walk on November 12<sup>th</sup> was a great success. After an encouraging sendoff by Washington City Mayor Ken Neilson and St. George Mayor Jon Pike, more than 140 walkers covered the six-mile course (roughly the distance that people in the developing world have to travel EACH DAY to obtain food and water) and, together, we raised more than \$5,000 to feed the hungry. Twenty percent of the total raised will be donated to the Soup Kitchen and Solomon's Porch with the remainder being distributed around the world. Start getting in shape for next year when the walk will be on Veteran's Day, November 11<sup>th</sup>.

As usual, we will be making year-end donations to several local charities. I'll let you know who they are and how much we will donate next month.

Jim and Sue Ann Roberts from the Soup Kitchen joined us for worship on November 13<sup>th</sup> to thank the congregation for their continued generosity. In addition to hearing from Jim, we made a couple of announcements:

First, our own Gloria Reynolds will be retiring as the head of our Soup Kitchen team at the end of the year. Gloria and Paul have served the Soup Kitchen for more than 18 years and I want to extend our thanks to them for the great work that they have done to help feed the hungry in our community. Carolynn Thomas and Ruth Ann Horvath will take over for Gloria beginning in January.

Second, Jim will be retiring as Director of the Soup Kitchen at the end of the year to concentrate on his position as a board member at SwitchPoint. We thank Jim for his tireless service and look forward to working with him in the coming years.

In honor of Gloria, Paul and Jim, we are going to forego our usual Soup Kitchen Sunday in December and, instead, collect canned food all during Advent. Please bring your cans of food any Sunday between November 27<sup>th</sup> and Christmas day and place them in the box in the Narthex. At the end of the year, we'll present the donations to the Soup Kitchen and Food Bank to be used to feed the hungry. I can't think of a better way to say "Thanks" to Gloria, Paul and Jim than to feed those in need.

Thanks to your generosity, we are able to help those in our community and world who need help so badly.

## **Parish Nursing**

Many thanks to all who volunteered to donate blood during our Fall Blood Drive on November 18th. The Red Cross team was able to collect nine, life-saving, units of blood.

We are in the process of planning our January Brown Bag Luncheon and are very excited about the program. We will be showing the film, "Moonshot Through the Double Helix," which documents the HOPE genomic medicine can offer to cancer patients who may have been without hope. Genomic sequencing, being conducted in St. George at the Intermountain Precision Genomics lab under the direction of Dr. Lincoln Nadauld, employs innovative technologies to study a cancer patient's DNA, searches for mutations causing the cancer and identifies drugs, not previously known, to target the mutations. The documentary is the creation of students from the Dixie State University Digital Film Program and was presented as part of this past summer's DOCUTAH series. Save the date – Wednesday, January 25<sup>th</sup> at Noon. Come, bring neighbors and friends, and learn about this wonderfully exciting and groundbreaking medical history being created in our midst.

Charles Spencer, of the Heartland Presbytery wrote:

The psalmist reminds us to "give thanks to the LORD, for God is good" (107:1). Generally I think of my stuff as mine: my car, my house, my money. Our faith calls us to a different perspective. As a believer, I am to be mindful that all good gifts come ultimately from the loving and generous hand of God. In the Sunday service, I am invited to present my tithes and offerings in the same spirit of love and generosity with which God meets me. This time is to be one of joyous thanksgiving, an opportunity to "let the redeemed of the LORD say so" (Ps. 107:2) and demonstrate our gratitude. Writing to the Thessalonians, the apostle notes that he and his co-laborers had conducted their ministry "so that we might not burden any of you while we proclaimed to you the gospel of God" (1 Thess. 2:9). There are costs in following the commands to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, extend fellowship to the lonely, comfort the bereaved, and act as faithful disciples. There are costs in ministries of nurture and education that communicate the faith from generation to generation. There are costs in maintaining worship and proclaiming the gospel. While expensive, the work of the church need not be a burden. Where is the burden in joyously returning a portion of the gifts God provides to be used in the work of Christ through the church? The invitation of Stewardship Commitment Sunday is to consider the rich blessings God has bestowed upon us. It is an invitation to make a Christian witness of our gifts and a faith statement in our generosity.

## **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through November 20<sup>th</sup> we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$43,227** and additional cash donations of **\$21,875** for a total of **\$166,328** or about **48.6%** of the way to our **\$342,000 goal**.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
