What is Shrove Tuesday? Why Do We Eat Pancakes?

On February 28th, Rev. Ralph will be hosting a Shrove Tuesday breakfast. You might be wondering, just what is Shrove Tuesday and why do we always have pancakes?

Shrove Tuesday occurs on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. It officially ends the season of Epiphany and is the vigil for the starting of Lent.

Traditionally viewed as a day of repentance, Shrove Tuesday has become the last day for celebration and feasting before the period of fasting required during the Lenten season. The name "Shrove Tuesday" is derived from the word "shrive", which means to confess and receive absolution. The name denotes a period of cleansing, wherein a person brings their lusts and appetites under subjection through abstention and self-sacrifice.

The concept behind this practice is found in 1 Corinthians 9:27, where the Apostle Paul states: "I buffet my body and make it my slave..." Ironically, Shrove Tuesday has evolved into a day of frivolity and indulgence, during which people participate in as much pleasure and self-gratification as they can before Lent begins.

Shrove Tuesday originated during the Middle Ages. As in contemporary times, food items like meats, fats, eggs, milk, and fish were regarded as restricted during Lent. To keep such food from being wasted, many families would have big feasts on Shrove Tuesday in order to consume those items that would inevitably become spoiled during the next forty days. The English tradition of eating pancakes on Shrove Tuesday came about as a way to use as much milk, fats, and eggs as possible before Ash Wednesday began. In France, the consumption of all fats and fatty foods on this day coined the name "Fat Tuesday" or Mardi Gras.

Shrove Tuesday has a variety of customs that have derived from different regions around Europe and the Americas. As previously mentioned, England began the tradition of serving pancakes, and for this reason the day is known as "Pancake Day". In addition, there are the annual Pancake Day Races, where contestants dress in aprons and scarves and race down a course flipping a pancake in a frying pan or skillet.

In Eastern Europe, the Carnival celebrations include boisterous processions where people in large masks parade around and play jokes on bystanders. The masks are often caricatures of individuals from traditional folklore.

Perhaps the most prominent customs are the balls and pageants in New Orleans and Rio de Janiero. Like Eastern European celebrations, participants wear masks and costumes, many of which are quite flamboyant and elaborate. Rio has a parade which incacludes hundreds of dancers dressed in costumes decked with feathers, all dancing the samba. In New Orleans, Mardi Gras includes a variety of parades featuring grand floats and giant effigies of eccentric characters. There is much eating, drinking, and dancing, as well as practical jokes and humorous street plays.



News from the Russia Mission

Each month, Rachel Yates, Presbyterian World Mission's Director of Program, publishes a column, called Mission Matters, about one of the many missions or mission co-workers at work in the world. In January, the column featured Al and Ellen Smith, and US!

Mission Matters - January 2017—The Americans are coming!

U.S.-Russian relations occupy the news. Diplomatic tensions are rising, along with concerns about resurgence of the nuclear arms race. In some respects, this political rift is not new. For decades, these two superpowers have flexed their geopolitical muscle, often seemingly divided along irreconcilable ideological grounds.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), however, has chosen to bridge that divide with a twinning project that pairs U.S. and Russian congregations that commit to work, pray and worship together. Regional Liaison Ellen Smith leads the Russia-U.S. twinning program for Presbyterian World Mission. Now more than ever, she urges Presbyterian congregations to deepen their ties with Christians in Russian through our global partners. She works hard to pair similar congregations to minimize power differentials or theological friction.

Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church in St. George, Utah, joined the twinning program two years ago and was paired with Word of Life Church in Dorogobuzh, Russia. After several email exchanges, the U.S. partners traveled to Dorogobuzh to meet their Russian counterparts. They politely exchanged greetings and information during worship and over tea, all in good diplomatic fashion.

The meeting, however, took a turn after an evening prayer meeting when one Russian summoned the courage to ask these new U.S. partners what they meant by the oft-used term "partnership." Smith shared what happened next. "We talked about praying for one another, helping one another and encouraging one another. We talked about our need for one another, for fellowship across the boundaries the world creates, and that we had come to them not as Americans, but as Christians.

"That comment changed the tone of the conversation. [One Russian church member] Volodya looked up, understanding completely what we had just shared, and said, 'And we were waiting for Americans.' In some way this different understanding of our purpose allowed Volodya to ask the hard questions — asking about race relations in the U.S. and the Supreme Court decision on marriage equality. They asked about church growth, and somehow we ended up in a conversation about infant baptism and confirmation. They weren't challenging us, but we were challenged. They wanted to understand and we wanted to help them understand. We talked for hours that night, and somewhere along the way a hidden barrier fell away."

As we engage in international mission, whether in Russia or elsewhere, we may rightly question whether we go as Americans or Christians. Do we reach out as a people imbued with privilege and power? Do we export our wealth and appetite for progress? Or do we empty ourselves, cloaked only in the servant leadership of Christ?

The latter is hard work. It eschews quick fixes and efficacy in favor of respect, mutuality and interdependence, shared grace and thanksgiving, open dialogue and transparency, and sharing of resources, all values that define our model of partnership. Today, that model of partnership frames our work. More than words on paper, it enables us to move beyond a colonial model of mission to a place of deep Christian relationship. Whether mission takes us across town or across continents, may our identity be found first in the unity of God's grace that extends across all boundaries.

Please look for them then! We have worked hard, and we want your comments. Special thanks to Jan Hirschi, who designed the booklet cover and typed all the entries. Thanks to committee members who did the proof-reading, collating, folding and stapling! Thanks to Amy Craig, who will do the printing!

The positive response to Rev. Ralph's Advent lessons on the book of Revelation has led to the decision to hold 5 lessons on Tuesday evenings during Lent. Beginning on Tuesday, March 14th at 5:45 pm. (to allow working folks to attend), Rev. Ralph will teach us about the Gospel of John. This will again be a potluck, so bring your favorite food item for everyone to enjoy! Come, eat, learn and enjoy wonderful fellowship during this contemplative church season! Mark your calendars for these dates: March 14th, 21st, 29th, April 4th & 11th!

- What is a Per Capita fee? It is a per-person, Presbytery administrative fee we pay for each member. This is about \$38 per member per year (approx. \$10K).

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through January 22nd we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$24,876** for a total of **\$171,459** or about **50.1%** of our **\$342,000** goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
