Easter Season Comes to Good Shepherd

The season of Lent and our celebration of Easter are always busy times at Good Shepherd and 2017 will be no exception.

We will begin our observation of Lent on March 1st with our annual Ash Wednesday Services at 11:00 am and 7:00 pm.

As he did during Advent, Rev. Ralph will be leading a Bible Study on Tuesday evenings during Lent. The series will kick off on March 14th at 5:45 pm and the topic this year is the Gospel of John.

On April 9th, Palm Sunday, Rev. Ralph and his team of men will serve us a hearty breakfast beginning at 8:30 am in Conklin Hall. This event is always well attended and we appreciate the efforts of all who provide food for us. Our service on Palm Sunday will be filled with music by our choirs.

On Maundy Thursday, April 13th, we will hold an Agape Dinner beginning at 6:00 pm in Conklin Hall. This dinner is notable because the room is lit oil lamps.

The following day, Good Friday, will kick off at 10:30 am with the annual Procession of the Cross and close with an Ecumenical Service at 7:00 pm at Shepherd of the Hills United Methodist Church. Barbara McConnell will lead the combined choir.

We will not have an early service or adult education on Easter Sunday, April 16th, so we can all prepare ourselves to celebrate our Risen Lord. After the service, we hope you will join us for Easter Brunch in Conklin Hall.

We hope to see you at as many events as you can attend.

With Easter Comes One Great Hour of Sharing

Of course, with Easter, comes the annual One Great Hour of Sharing. Here is some history on this offering.

Following World War II, Protestant churches in the United States made appeals for the relief and reconstruction of devastated areas, primarily in Europe and Asia. In 1949 the leaders of several denominations formed a committee to organize an appeal to support their churches' separate campaigns. The next year, the offering was repeated, for the first time using the name "One Great Hour of Sharing."

The offering always has been an ecumenical effort and, while each denomination allocates its gifts differently, all use their funds for ministries of disaster relief, refugee assistance, and development aid.

A radio program called "One Great Hour" was broadcast on March 26, 1949. The broadcast closed with a request that listeners attend church the following morning and make a sacrificial contribution. No exact measure of receipts was possible, but it was estimated that more than 75,000 churches participated.

One Great Hour of Sharing is one of our major church-wide offerings and does so much good for so many people. Please consider making a donation to this most worthwhile offering.



It's hard to believe but in the week ahead the season of Lent will be upon us again.

Those forty days of preparing our hearts and souls to hear that great and wondrous announcement, "He Is Risen!"

And while Lent is a time for prayer and preparation one would never know it from the world in which we share. One might come to believe it is all about bunnies and colored eggs.

That is unfortunate, for there is so much more to these forty days than just getting ready for Easter, it's all about getting ourselves ready for the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior.

The day is not a celebration of life as it is the demise of death. Not only physical death but as well the death of hopelessness and fear.

Lent really is a gift, the gift of time to, as the Psalmist cries, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast sprit within me."

Whether it be on a personal or national level, these words speak to us as well and remind us that God is with us, unconditionally and eternally, and remind us importantly not to fear and as well to stop trying to be God, and let God be God.

Jesus echoed that same promise at the end of the Gospel of Matthew with the words, "And Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

I believe that this hymn is gift for all time, and with the gift of each day and night needs to be sung with our hearts and lives, that we might remember and live in Hope.

News from the Russia Mission

The Russia Mission Steering Committee met on Sunday, February 16th, to map out our plans for the coming year. Again this year, a group from our congregation will be visiting our sister congregation in Dorogobuzh. Rev. Ralph will be joined by Kathie Greear and Dawn Angarone when they travel in August to assist with this year's Bible Camp. Ellen Smith will be joining them during the visit. This is an expensive trip and the travelers would welcome any financial assistance you may wish to provide. If you would like to make a donation, place a check in the offering plate and write "Russia Trip" on the memo line. You are also welcome to contribute directly to Rev. Ralph, Kathie or Dawn.

Each year, the Russia Mission Network holds a conference to gather the churches that participate in the twinning program to examine issues facing our sister congregations. Last year, Jan Dunham and Donna Beasley represented us and returned with glowing reviews, not only of the conference, but of the mission, itself. This year's conference will be in Pittsburgh at the end of September and the committee approved Rev. Ralph, Chris Schleter and Jan Dunham as our representatives. As you may be aware, we will be hosting the conference in 2018 so we will be gathering ideas for next year.

If you have suggestions for the Russia Mission or would like to participate, please let Chris or Rev. Ralph know.

Building Team Update

The Building Team works closely with Scott Florence, Grounds Elder, Chris Schleter, for technology needs, and Bob Moeller, Stewardship Elder, to maintain a five-year forecast of major expenditures. A few examples of this would include, carpet replacement, HVAC replacement, and resealing of the parking lot. This financial planning is done to avoid surprises, avoid spikes in spending needs, and to maintain our assets in line with our needs.

Your Building Team is happy to announce that at the January Session meeting two important projects were approved by Session. The first project is a maintenance item. There are two wooden exterior circular vents in the Church. One of them has "weathered" to the point of having missing parts. We are going to replace them with aluminum vents that will be painted to match the exterior color.

The second project that was approved was to construct a food service prep and clean up area in the CE Building. This will be a 10 foot Formica countertop with double sink and cabinets above and below. It will also include a microwave and under cabinet refrigerator.



Just as we did with the Church bathroom renovation, we will use Church volunteer labor in concert with contracted labor. Guy Schultzman will act as the project manager for this project. When completed, this will provide our employees and building users with an organized area to use for light snacks and a place to clean utensils and dishes. We expect this project to be complete by the end of May.

Another item soon to be investigated is the CE Building cooling HVAC. We know there's a problem but it's not totally defined. Jim Horvath is leading this effort with a contractor. We'll find out more by April.

FEBRUARY BROWN BAG LUNCHEON — On Wednesday, February 22nd, we were privileged to be able to show the documentary, <u>Moonshot through the Double Helix</u>. Phil Tuckett, producer of the film and Director of the Digital Film class at DSU, introduced the film and gave us a bit of background about how it was first proposed as a student project. The film documents the innovative cancer research being done by Drs. Lincoln Nadauld and Derrick Haslem and their teams to identify the mutations in a tumor's DNA and learn which therapeutic agents might target those tumors, specifically. The network for exchanging this new information is worldwide and the genomic laboratory here in St George is at the forefront of exploration.

APRIL BROWN BAG LUNCHEON -- When was the last time you brushed up on your driving skills? Do you believe you know everything there is to know about how to avoid having an automobile accident? Our Brown Bag speaker for April, Spencer Anderson, a local Doctor of Chiropractic, sees patients who have been in car crashes and suffer painful physical conditions as a result. He will present tips on how we can avoid having to seek his or another medical provider's services. DID YOU KNOW??? Facts about the SHINGLES VACCINE:

- The vaccine, Zostavax, is given as a one-dose shot and has been available since 2006. It reduces the risk of developing shingles by 51%. You are more at risk if you ever had chickenpox or you have a first-degree relative who has had shingles. One in five people will develop the disease.
- There is no maximum age for receiving the shot but people aged 60 and older should receive it even if you have had chickenpox or shingles because it may help prevent your getting shingles again. (If you had the vaccine before the age of 60, check with your healthcare provider regarding whether you may need a second shot.)
- Some people should not receive the vaccine—those with compromised immune systems due to steroid use, chemo or radiation, certain cancers, HIV, allergy to gelatin or neomycin or other severe allergies.
- Possible side effects from the vaccine are minimal but may include redness, soreness, itching or swelling at the injection site, or headache.
- There are no documented cases of anyone contracting chickenpox from someone who has had the vaccine but any severe reaction should be dealt with by calling 911.
- Medicare Part D pays for the vaccine but, depending on your plan, you may have a co-pay. Private insurance plans will cover it for those aged 60 and older. The vaccine is available at most pharmacies and through your healthcare provider, with whom you should discuss any questions you may have.

Session News

Session held their regular monthly meeting on January 8th. Here is a synopsis of the actions:

- Approved a policy to clarify when compensation shall be made to church employees and those who receive non-employee compensation from the church.
- Approved extra mortgage principal payments of \$800 per month to pay off mortgage up to 5 years sooner.
- Authorized the Building Team to proceed with the CE Building break area project as outlined in the Executive Summary, with an expected cost of \$5,000.
- Authorized the Building Team to purchase a shelving unit for use in the Conklin Hall closet. The cost is not to exceed \$225.
- Authorized the Building Team to proceed with the contracted replacement of the two exterior wooden circular vents in the church at a cost not to exceed \$450.
- Elected Carolynn Thomas as Treasurer for 2017.
- Elected Ruth Ann Horvath as Clerk of Session for 2017.
- Elected David Patten as Commissioner to the Presbytery for 2017.
- Elected Anne Patten as Alternate Commissioner to the Presbytery for 2017.
- Approved scheduling Stated Session meetings on the second Sunday of each month following worship service in the Christian Education Building of Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church in 2017 and January 2018.
- Approved 2017 Communion Dates: the first Sunday of each month, Early Prayer/Communion Services, Maundy Thursday Agape Service (April 13), and the first Sunday of January 2018.
- Approved Rev. Clingan and Clerk of Session, Ruth Ann Horvath, as a commission to approve the 2016 Annual Statistical Report.

March is Per Capita Month for Good Shepherd. You may have noticed the envelopes in the pews, in the narthex, marked "per capita." Like many Presbyterians, you may have wondered, "Exactly what does per capita do?"

Per capita is an amount of money per member (this year, \$38.) that our congregation pays to the larger Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). This money is part of the glue that holds Presbyterians together. It is the money that

enables us to work with other Presbyterian churches in our presbytery and across the country. It is also money that allows us to work with other churches to further the mission of Jesus Christ around the world.

How important is per capita? Here are some examples:

- Our congregation benefits from relationships and cooperation with other Presbyterian churches across the country. Your per capita pays for the General Assembly meeting every two years where Presbyterians gather together to worship and discern the mind of Christ for the church.
- Our congregation is involved in mission work throughout the world, sharing the gospel in all parts of the earth. In many places in our world, it is difficult to "do mission" except by working ecumenically with other churches. Your per capita helps to pay for meetings of Presbyterians with people of other Christian churches, allowing us to maintain those ties for mission.
- We benefit from helpful Presbyterian resources such as the Book of Order and The Book of Confessions. Your per capita pays for producing these basic resources, including in Spanish, Korean, and Braille.
- We want future generations to learn about our congregation's present work (e.g., anniversary celebrations, membership rolls, session actions). Your per capita helps to fund the Presbyterian Historical Society – preserving and sharing the Presbyterian experience.
- We want pastors who are well prepared to lead our congregations? Your per capita funds the preparation, administration, and grading of standard ordination examinations for seminary students.
- We want well-trained leaders for our presbyteries and more. Your per capita pays for annual training events for presbytery executives, stated clerks, and others who help lead our work and mission.

In addition, our per capita pays for the travel expenses of the Moderator and Vice Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) as they make their way across the church to share with and listen to folks like us about the exciting things God is doing in our midst.

By contributing your portion of per capita, you have freed up dollars in our regular budget for the work of our congregation in this community. Our per capita payment for Good Shepherd is over \$10,000 for 2017. If you haven't yet contributed, we hope you will consider doing so.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through February 19th we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$25,251** for a total of **\$171,834** or about **50.2%** of our **\$342,000** goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
