February and March saw the deaths of three of our long-time members.

Ginny Sullivan passed away on February 20th. Ginny and Jim joined the church in 1997 and, although they hadn't been able to attend regularly for a while, were always with us in spirit. We will hold a memorial service for Ginny at 11:00 am on May 12th in the Sanctuary.

We were shocked by the passing of Deacon, Elder and Church Secretary Amy Craig on March 10th. Amy had been suffering with asthma for several days prior to her death. Amy and her mother, Shirley, joined our church in 1998. We will certainly miss Amy's kind and loving spirit and her ability to keep all of us organized. Amy's memorial service will be at 4:00 pm on April 8th in the Sanctuary.

Finally, on March 16th, Deacon, Elder and long-time Head Usher Bob Routh passed away after a short illness. Bob and Louise joined our church in 1989, less than a year after its founding. He was on the committee that built and landscaped our church building and crafted several of our stained glass windows. His friendliness and willingness to help were always an example to all of us. 

News from the Russia Mission

For the first time since 2014, both we and our sister congregation in Dorogobuzh will celebrate Easter on the same Sunday, April 16th. Next year we will celebrate Easter on April 1st (no fooling) and Orthodox Easter will be April 8th. Normally, Orthodox Easter (as celebrated in Russia) is later in the year than our Easter. Why is this?

Easter is not only a movable holiday but a multiple one: in most years Western Christian churches and Eastern Orthodox churches celebrate Easter on different dates.

The theological inconsistency of two Easters has remained a thorny problem for the Christian Church. "It has long been recognized that to celebrate this fundamental aspect of the Christian faith on different dates," states the World Council of Churches, "gives a divided witness and compromises the churches' credibility and effectiveness in bringing the Gospel to the world."

The formula for Easter—"The first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the vernal equinox"—is identical for both Western and Orthodox Easters, but the churches base the dates on different calendars: Western churches use the Gregorian calendar, the standard calendar for much of the world, and Orthodox churches use the older, Julian, calendar.

That much is straightforward. But actually calculating these dates involves a bewildering array of ecclesiastical moons and paschal full moons, the astronomical equinox, and the fixed equinox — and that's in addition to the two different calendar systems.

The two churches vary on the definition of the vernal equinox and the full moon. The Eastern Church sets the date of Easter according to the actual, astronomical full moon and the actual equinox as observed along the meridian of Jerusalem, site of the Crucifixion and Resurrection. The Eastern Orthodox Church also applies the formula so that Easter always falls after Passover, since the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Christ took place after he entered Jerusalem to celebrate Passover. In the Western Church, Easter sometimes precedes Passover by weeks.

So, this year we celebrate on the same day the resurrection of our Lord and Savior. Happy Easter to everyone.

Spotlight on Mission Elder Pebble Mowery

I was asked to tell how Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church came to be my home church and how it strengthens my Christian walk.

About 10 years ago I found myself suddenly without a church home.

I was "unchurched".

Right now in America it is trendy to be "unchurched", but I had been a "churched" person from the time I was four years old.

As some of you know, I grew up in a family that was isolated and on the fringe of society. But when I was four years old a stranger, a Christian woman, came to our family's door to invite us to church.

The result of this Christian woman's effort was that my mother allowed me to go alone to church with this stranger.

I am forever grateful to my mother for allowing me to go to church.

On my first visit to that EUB church, as a four year old, I realized in a flash that church was the place to be for me. I loved everything about it. Soon that stranger who took me there disappeared from the scene, but I was now introduced and recognized in the small community of worshipers as "the little girl who needs a ride to church," and other church members provided rides for me. I was "in", and I had never been "out" of church until about 10 years ago when I found myself needing to shop for a church. Eventually my efforts brought me here to Good Shepherd Presbyterian.

The first thing I noticed about Good Shepherd was there was Freedom of Worship here. I could come and go as I pleased. I would miss weeks in between visits to this church, yet each time I came back, it was like I had never left.

Soup and Fellowship:

This month, Soup and Fellowship introduced a new member to our congregation, Jim Robinette. Jim is one of our Navy veterans. He served as aircraft maintenance officer in a jet fighter squadron, then spent 30 years in the software business and, for the last 15 years was founder and operator of Aloha Island Coffee Company on the Big Island of Hawaii. Pulling from his experiences of living on the family farm in Oregon in his youth, he bought undeveloped land on the Big Island, where the conditions for growing coffee are ideal. He developed a 14,000-tree coffee plantation on this land formerly owned by the King of Hawaii. With a drip irrigation system to deliver water and fertilizer to each tree, Jim was able to achieve higher than average yields. Coffee trees are related to the gardenia family. When blossoming, the scent of gardenias fills the countryside. Each tree becomes loaded with "cherries" that must be HAND PICKED. Jim thanks the Latino workers who were employed to plant and pick on his plantation. Kona coffee sells for 40 plus dollars a pound and even more as gift packages. Kona and Jamaica Blue Mountain historically are judged the world's best coffee; both are available only in very limited quantities. A slide showing at least 9 health benefits of drinking coffee was interspersed among beautiful pictures of his plantation in various stages of development. The qualities that make Kona Coffee unique are very low acid, smooth, a complex flavor profile, and no bitter aftertaste. Hawaiian music and scenes from the islands completed his most interesting lunch time presentation. Thank you, Jim, for sharing your story with us and relating fascinating facts about Kona coffee. Welcome to the congregation.

I would also like to thank my super committee who helped feed 58 people in attendance. I must admit we had fun using the Hawaiian theme. Sherry Kretschmer's stunning centerpiece of edible palm trees surrounded by fruit, Hawaiians' favorite soup (Portuguese Bean Soup from a recipe provided by Jim), Barbara West's Irish Potato Soup, Chicken Noodle Soup by Sherry, seven dozen goodies, Joyce Otness's delicious cookies and fruit ambrosias and cornbread hand made by Jane O'Donnell. It was all good.

Brain Health News: A study of 900 men and women with an average age of 71 found that those who had exercised moderately or vigorously over five years, e.g., jogging, hiking, swimming, dancing - performed on a par with someone 10 years younger on tests of memory and other brain skills. These studies support the prevailing theory that heart health and brain health are linked. Bottom Line: Hit the gym – lead a physically active lifestyle, get 150 minutes a week of moderate intensity aerobic exercise, incorporate strength training two or more times a week, exercise with friends to keep motivated. And, oh yes, DRINK MORE WATER. (If you are taking medication to reduce water retention, listen to your doctor about how much you can safely drink per day. It will be somewhat less).

One Great Hour of Sharing

You ask yourself, self: What is One Great Hour of Sharing? It is a once a year offering for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. What started in 1949 as an hour long radio appeal is a long standing multi- denominational effort to provide relief and reconstruction for communities in the aftermath of disaster. It has grown from 8 participating denominations to 29. Currently there are programs in over 100 counties.

What does the money go for? Ahh! Thank you for asking.

Here are a few examples:

In Liberia West Africa One Great Hour dollars helped fight the Ebola virus.

In Nepal the aftermath of the 2015 earthquakes was devastating. Half a million homes were destroyed, 280,000 more were damaged. Nearly 9000 people died. We distributed to more than 200,000 people items like:

Food, both Ready to eat and longer term. Family water treatment, and personal hygiene kits. Tarps for emergency shelters. Basic survival items like kitchen utensils, baby kits and guilts.

In El Salvador there is a drought and we are involved in getting native drought resistant seeds to over 400,000 subsistence farmers.

Here in the USA I'm sure you remember Hurricane Sandy we helped

Even closer to home, The Navajo Nation, has a radioactive contamination problem. Let me go back to 1979 in New Mexico an earthen dam gave way Dumping a 1000 tons of radioactive waste and 90 millions gallons of acidic and radioactive liquids in to the near by river. The waste traveled across 9 Navajo Chapters and reached Gallop as a large green Wave flooding the land and covering people. Of 250 abandoned uranium mines sites only about 130 have been cleaned up. The San Juan Basin, lacks the rights to electricity or running water due to the contamination of land air and ground water. The medical results are high rates of miscarriages, pancreatic and liver cancers, Lymphoma, and breathing problems including children with asthma and bronchial problems.

Brother Steward - Jesus, the Light

Are you waiting for something that seems to be too long in coming? Maybe it's a job promotion or a raise. Maybe it's just employment of any kind! Perhaps you have been praying for someone's salvation, and you don't see any sign of God's working in that person. It's difficult to wait. People in Jesus' day were waiting for a Messiah, It seemed to many that his coming was long overdue, but Paul writes in Galatians 4:4-5, "When the time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under law, to redeem those under law, that we might receive the full rights of sons." Our waiting is over! The Light has come into the world!

Simeon was one who knew that "the time had fully come," and "moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts" (Luke 2:27). There he saw the child whose parents brought him there to fulfill what the Law required of them. Simeon knew Jesus was the light. He proclaimed, "For my eyes have seen your salvation ... a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel" (Luke 2:30, 32).

Unfortunately, not all who were waiting for the Messiah recognized him when he came. In John 1:4-5 we read, "In him was life, and that life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it." Still today the darkness misunderstands the Light. Yet he continues to shine, and, as he shines, he dispels darkness.

And he calls upon us to shine also. Jesus, in the Sermon on the Mount, described a lamp that is put on a stand so that it lights up the whole house. Then he said, "In the same way, let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in Heaven" (Matthew 5:16).

Stewardship, continued

The only way to dispel darkness is to fill it with light. As stewards, it is our joyous task to be reflections of Christ's light. In this way we proclaim that the waiting is over! Jesus, the Light, has come into the world!

Spotlight on Mission, continued

I saw something else here. People were focused on feeding the hungry. There are hungry people today in St. George and I began to feel uneasy about my food storage. I began giving it away to hungry people because of the example set before me in this congregation. Doing that deepened my faith and lightened my load.

There is so much unsung humanitarian aid given by people who worship here. One example: I am deeply impressed that sitting among us is a woman in her 70's who goes down to the Red Cross to donate her blood every 8 weeks. Her blood is so free of antigens that it is preferred for newborns when blood is needed. Not only does this wonderful woman in her 70's donate her blood every 8 weeks but she donates two units of blood at a time. As a nurse, I am awed, absolutely awed, at her outreach and sacrifice for humanity.

Good Shepherd is an ecumenical church. Ecumenical was a concept I did not know. Jeff Clingan taught me to say the word correctly and Jeff taught me that ecumenical means we honor the faith traditions of all Christians. I became aware that Christians of several other faith traditions often worshiped here, and with an ease that is remarkable. For the first time in my personal life I was seeing Christian unity made visible through honor.

Good Shepherd Presbyterian is interfaith.

I discovered the Jewish Community of southern Utah meets in our CE building! The leadership here in this church protects the Torah for them under lock and key. Because of that interfaith honor, it was my privilege to be invited to the Jewish Celebration of Passover, a dream of mine since childhood, fulfilled when I was 70 years old. The path to that Jewish celebration was down the hallway to our Fellowship Hall. I attended Passover, saw the empty chair at the table reserved for Elijah, the door left ajar, so that if Elijah came he would know he was expected. I watched as the children scampered about the room with their balloons, peace and joy abundant.

In that same interfaith spirit, I have been able to attend Friday Muslim Prayers with a group of devout people of the Muslim faith here in St. George. Nowhere have I felt a closer walk with Christ than when I am on the Muslim prayer rug, praying my own Christian prayers silently as I am welcome to do with other worshipers reciting prayers of Islam. One gentleman of the Muslim faith reminded me, the first time I went to the prayer rug, that during prayers they are facing Mecca but I am facing Jerusalem. Bowing with people of the Muslim faith to pray has been an unexpected privilege I never dreamt of.

Christ loves them, you know. And I want to grow to know and love them also. Here at Good Shepherd Rev. Ralph helped pluck me back from living in the future. When I first came here rattling on about Armageddon and the Apocalypse, Ralph said, "Pebble! You are using those words incorrectly. They do not mean what you think they mean!" And so I slowly began to learn.

One of the great strengths here at Good Shepherd is we have a pastor who is an educated theologian. We could appropriately call him Dr. Clingan, but he prefers to be called Ralph.

Ralph slowly taught me to be more fully present in the Present, where joy and peace reside. Armageddon and the Apocalypse are not the only way we can get trapped trying to live in the future.

It is easy as an aging person to worry about when that other shoe is going to drop. And it is not just we older folks. That kind of anxiety about the future can afflict children, teenagers young adults, middle age people.

Yet Christ told us to be not anxious for the future, but to rejoice in this day. Christ calls us to prayer and to fellowship, both being places where we are fully in the present where peace and joy reside. The present, where the Kingdom of God is, and is accessed.

Each time someone reaches out to me or I reach out to somebody, I am drawn fully into the present and I am strengthened for the challenges of my life. Prayer and Christian fellowship work miracles and remind me to be of good cheer. That good cheer is about Jesus Christ.

Most importantly, I was won over to become a "churched" Presbyterian when I attended communion here for the first time. When Rev. Ralph said during that service of communion, "Our table is an open table", I choked up and started to cry. Even now five years later every time Ralph says "our table is an open table" something deep inside me weeps in gratitude.

Yes!

I am happy to be here and I am happy you all are here, too.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through February 19th we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$27,086** for a total of **\$173,669** or about **50.8%** of our **\$342,000** goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
