## Annual Shoe Drive Underway

Our shoe drive is underway and will end on Sunday, May 28<sup>th</sup>.

As you do your spring cleaning, please gather up shoes that you no longer need or want, bring them to church and place them in the box in Conklin Hall. We'll send them off and they'll be re-sold at very low prices to those who need them.

As a reminder, we can only accept WEARABLE (no holes in the soles, or shoes that need cobbling or mending) PAIRS (either tie them together or place a rubber band around them) of men's, women's and kids shoes.

We CANNOT ACCEPT ski boots, heavy winter boots, roller skates, rollerblades, ice skates, flip-flops/crocs, bedroom slippers or single shoes. Last year, we collected about 150 usable pairs of shoes (and received \$75 for our efforts). Let's beat that this spring!

## New CE Building Break Area Ready for Action



Under the direction of Project Manager Guy Schultzman, the Building Team completed construction of a food preparation and cleaning area in the CE building. Prior to this project there was no place for food service supplies, and no place to clean something as simple as a coffee cup without using a bathroom or the mop closet.

The design of the project was interactive with input solicited from many people including our project coordinator at Lowe's. Lowe's did the cabinet, countertop, flooring, and new circuit installation. Guy Schultzman did the plumbing and led the effort to install the sink, microwave, garbage disposal, and refrigerator. Great job Guy!

Through careful selection of materials and a discount given by Lowe's, we were able to achieve a reasonable cost. In addition, we were able to get a military discount because one of our team members is retired military. We would also like to thank the Women's Guild for contributing \$300 to this project.

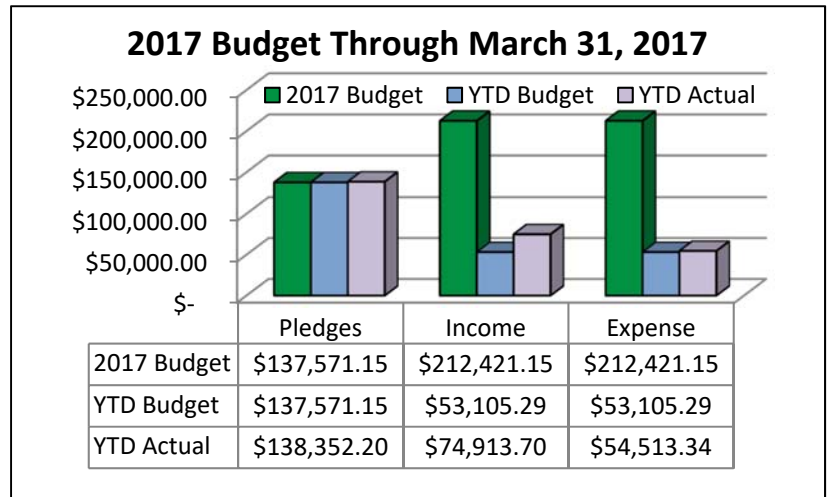

### **A Recipe to Try**

Following Bob's memorial service, Louise Routh asked me to share this recipe with you:

#### **Cheesecake Cookies**

Ingredients: 1 c. flour  
1/3 c. brown sugar  
6 T. butter, softened  
1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese, softened  
1/4 c. sugar  
1 egg  
2 T. milk  
1/4 tsp. lemon peel  
2 T. lemon juice  
1/2 tsp. Vanilla  
2 T. walnuts, chopped

In large mixing bowl, combine flour and brown sugar. Cut in butter until mixture forms fine crumbs. Reserve 1 c. for topping.

Press remainder over bottom of ungreased 8x8x2 baking pan. Bake at 350 F. for 12-15 min.

In mixer bowl, thoroughly cream together cream cheese and sugar. Add egg, milk, lemon peel, lemon juice and vanilla. Beat well. Spread batter over partially baked crust. Combine walnuts with reserved crumb mixture. Sprinkle over top. Bake at 350 F. for 20-25 min. Cool. Cut in squares. Makes 16 cookies. (Good even served warm!)

## Parish Nursing

### **Brown Bag Luncheon**

On Wednesday, April 12<sup>th</sup>, Dr. Spencer Andersen of The Whiplash Center of Utah made an excellent presentation on how to reduce your risks on the road. There are eight to ten car accidents each day in Southern Utah. The more lug nets (the bigger the car), the safer the car but no matter the size car you can be safe. Buckle up, adjust your head restraint so that it is 1-2 inches from your head, be sure that it is centered on your head and not your neck, adjust your seat so that you are at least 10 inches from the steering wheel and place your hands on the steering wheel at 4 and 8 o'clock.

Other important things to remember are, don't tailgate, keep a safe distance from the car ahead of you, be aware of your surroundings and anticipate the other car's move. If you expect a crash, brace yourself with your head against the restraint, hold arms on the steering wheel in lower position and press the brake as hard as you can and hold it.

### Brother Steward

Oswald Chambers wrote, 'Not every man can carry a full cup. Sudden elevation frequently leads to pride and a fall. The most exciting test of all to survive is prosperity.' This quote provides a clear warning: Those who become prosperous are also very likely to become filled with pride. Pride can cause inflated egos and self-worthiness. Agur, a writer of proverbs, gave us this warning: "... give me neither poverty nor riches but give me only my daily bread. Otherwise, I may have too much and disown you and say, 'Who is the Lord?' or I may become poor and steal and so dishonor the name of my God" (Proverbs 30:8-9). When our bills are paid and we have money in the bank, we may feel secure and depend only on ourselves. In speaking about the curse of success, someone once said, 'Ninety- nine people out of 100 can handle adversity whereas only one out of 100 can handle prosperity.' The wealth that many seek can be more of a curse than a blessing.

God blesses us with work and the ability to earn our incomes. Unfortunately, ~~we~~ we may foolishly begin to believe that we are solely responsible for the success we've achieved. As Moses wrote, "You may say to yourself, 'My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me.' But remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth . . ." (Deuteronomy 8:18). We should understand that only by God's grace are we able to have a place to call home, a savings account, and a retirement plan. God's Word is clear that we are managers, not owners. "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it" (Psalm 24: 1).

Even though it is difficult to pass the test with money, the Holy Spirit, working through the Word, enables us to understand that all we are and have are gifts from God. Joseph provides us a good example of stewardship. Separated from his home and family, he still trusted God and feared him, refusing to give in to the temptations that came with the position God enabled him to fill. As second in command in Egypt, one of the most powerful kingdoms of his day, he retained his humility, realizing that he was only the manager of Egypt's resources. But he managed those resources well, working at it "with all [his] heart, as working for the Lord, not for men" (Colossians 3:23). Just as God empowered Joseph in his stewardship, so he does for us, today, whether our resources are vast, as were Joseph's, or small.

## Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through February 19<sup>th</sup> we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$28,126** for a total of **\$174,709** or about **51.1%** of our **\$342,000 goal**.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
