Special Request from "Management"

If you can create your insert using Word and send it to her, that is even better. Dawn works on Tuesday and Thursday mornings and she prints the bulletin on Thursday morning. If she doesn't have the information you wish to have included before the bulletin is printed, it is very unlikely that your item will make it into the bulletin. 

Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

Therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you at the proper time, ⁷casting all your anxiety on Him, because He cares for you. ⁸Be of sober spirit, be on the alert. Your adversary, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. ⁹But resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same experiences of suffering are being accomplished by your brethren who are in the world.

1 Peter 5:6-9



Recently I heard it reported by medical professionals that in our current environment it appears there is a lot of anxiety that is being reported and treated. I guess there is no denying we are, for whatever reasons, living in and through anxious times.

It is an important question, just how, as Christians, do we live and profess our faith in the face of national or personal anxiety?

It is our nature to worry and fear but it is as well in our nature to love and trust. This is where faith steps in and reminds us of who we are and to whom we belong.

And it is in our faith we learn to trust Christ with our anxiety and fears but as well our joys in the best and worst of times.

Yes, we are living in and through anxious times, but as Christ's people, not anxious ones.

News from the Russia Mission

We continue our preparations for the August visit by Rev. Ralph, Dawn Angarone and Kathie Greear to our sister church in Dorogobuzh. If you would like to make a donation to help defray the cost of the trip, please place your check in the offering plate and mark it "Russia Trip."

This fall marks the 100th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution in Russia and the subject of this year's Russia Mission Network Conference will be the revolution, the implications for the church during the Soviet period and the revival of the church in the Post-Soviet period. We have discussed many of these topics with Pastor Sergei and his congregation and it will be interesting to re-visit those subjects. Rev. Ralph and Chris Schleter will be attending the conference in Pittsburgh, in preparation for our hosting the conference in September or October of 2018.

We have quite a number of unsung heroes in our church, people who work tirelessly behind the scenes. Each month, the Growth Committee will spotlight one of our own in the hope that we can get to know each other better.

Nancy Higgins is one of those special people. "I don't have any," she laughs, "unless you count sending cards and making phone calls to connect with people." What a wonderful asset she is to our church!

Congregation News

Flowers among the Crosses (by Russell W. Estlack)

In a tiny corner of Belgium, crimson poppies dance like ballerinas in the breeze among the limes of white crosses in a place called Flanders Fields. World War I is a memory, but nearly a hundred years after the "Great War" ended, these flowers endure as a symbol of the men who paid the ultimate price. Thanks to the haunting verses of "In Flanders Fields," the poppy is a nationally recognized symbol of sacrifice and is proudly worn to honor the men and women who died for their country in all wars.

The world's most famous war poem was composed by Major John McCrae at the battlefront during the second battle of Ypres, Belgium on May 3, 1915. A surgeon assigned to the 1st Field Artillery, Major John McCrae spent seventeen days treating injured men from the battle raging in the Ypres salient. He described the battle as a nightmare. "For seventeen days and seventeen nights none of us has had our clothes off, nor our boots even, except occasionally. In all that time while I was awake, gunfire and rifle fire never ceased for sixty seconds ... And behind it all was the constant background of the sights of the dead, the wounded, the maimed, and a terrible anxiety lest the line should give way." Major McCrae had seen enough blood and heard enough screams of the wounded and dying to last him a lifetime.

He was particularly affected by the death of his close friend, Lieutenant Alexis Helmer. The Lieutenant was killed by an exploding artillery shell on May 2, 1915, and buried in the cemetery outside McCrae's field hospital. In the absence of a Chaplin, McCrae performed the funeral ceremony.

The next day, while sitting in the back of an ambulance, McCrae saw the wild poppies blowing in the wind among the white crosses of the nearby cemetery. To vent his anguish, he took out his pad and wrote a poem to honor his friend.

Sergeant Major, Cyril Allison, was delivering mail when he spotted McCrae. The Major looked up as Allison approached then returned to his writing. The young soldier stood quietly waiting for him to finish. He vividly recalled the moment, "McCrae's face was very tired but calm as he wrote. He looked around from time to time, his eyes straying to Helmer's grave." Five minutes later, McCrae finished writing. He laid down his pen, took his mail, and without saying a word, handed the poem to the NCO. Allison was deeply moved by the words he read and committed it to memory.

Christian Education

Some changes are coming for the summer:

- Sunday morning classes will switch to 9:15 a.m. as of June 4, as there is no choir practice until September.
- New classes to begin the first Sunday in July!
 - o Jeff Clingan will be teaching 9 lessons on "Christianity in the Roman Empire".
 - Gloria McGilloway will be teaching several lessons on the books of the Apocrypha. These books are not considered part of the canon by many Christian denominations, including ours, and are not found in every Bible. Roman Catholics DO consider them part of their Biblical canon, and you will find these books in a Catholic Bible, usually located between the Old and New Testaments.

These new Sunday morning classes will run concurrently in the CE Building, beginning July 2nd. They promise to be extremely interesting. There is so much to learn about the time & culture in which Jesus lived and carried out his ministry, a culture dominated with a heavy hand by the Roman Empire. And the Apocrypha—who knows much about them? Are you curious? Come and LEARN!

The nursery needs more help. With several young people attending youth classes now, we need an extra person to help on Sunday. Please see Charlotte Phipps or Cathy Overkamp if you would like to be a part of leading our young people to a closer relationship with Jesus.

Soup and Fellowship:

On May 3rd, Soup and Fellowship hosted Alan and Sandy Paige who entertained us with some of their favorite activities while stationed in Germany. Sandy, using her community college teaching background, was a Germany speaking tour guide for military families for eight years. One of her tours was to a pottery factory in Poland. It took an overnight ride to arrive at the factory at opening time, all day to shop and a return with a bus full of pottery. If you have been to the Polish pottery shop in St. George, you know what I mean about the beauty. Sandy had some examples and explained how the market has changed since she was there.

I submit a quote by Sandy to explain the second and more important part of their program: "We will never know just how many victims of the Holocaust there were. Recent credible sources say upwards of twelve million died at the hands of the Nazis. In 1995 a German artist, Gunter Demnig, quoting from the Talmud, declared "A person is forgotten only when his or her name is forgotten". He set out to place a "stoplerstein" – wherever a victim of the Holocaust was taken. More than 56,000 of these small brass plaques have been placed in 18 countries, and that number is steadily increasing. Sandy and Alan met a Dutch family who lost 17 family members in concentration camps and followed the placement of the little brass plates embedded in the street where this family lived. These are done with private donations at \$160.00 each plate.

Alan presented facts about the military: i.e., since 1995, a 10% reduction in force over all the armed forces is noted. He asked our audience how many were related to those who have and/or are serving and most everyone raised their hands. Since this is the month of remembering the sacrifices made for peace, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, we recognize, honor and humbly, respectfully thank our Veterans. We have our own stoplersteine. Thank you Alan and Sandy for sharing your story with us. It was awesome.

Creating Hope for Today and Tomorrow:

Pentecost Offering Helps Teen Mothers and Their Children Flourish

As a high school student, Lily Jones had a beautiful 18-month-old daughter and a strong desire to finish school. Lily knew the importance of education to her future and that of her daughter Sophia, but day care posed a problem. Family had been helpful caring for Sophia, but they could no longer provide the day care Sophia needed. In Ligonier, Indiana, a town with a population of 4,400, child care choices are limited, particularly for those in challenging financial circumstances.

Fortunately, Lighthouse Ministry Daycare, a provider housed in and supported by Ligonier's First Presbyterian Church, had a spot for Sophia.

Stewardship, continued

Parents like Lily and children like Sophia are top concerns for Lighthouse. "Our first priority is to provide child care so teen parents can get through high school," says Rachel Bales-Case, director of Lighthouse. Sophia and most of her 20 classmates at Lighthouse receive care at a reduced cost. Lighthouse serves not only children whose parents are students, but also a number of children whose parents work at low-wage jobs.

One of the funding sources of Lighthouse is the Pentecost Offering that First Presbyterian receives each year. This Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) church-wide offering serves youth, young adults, and at-risk children. Congregations retain 40 percent of the Offering for local causes, while

60 percent is sent to the national church to support Young Adult Volunteers, ministries with youth, and work on behalf of children at risk.

Thanks in part to the generosity of First Presbyterian and other local supporters, the future looks bright for Sophia and Lily. Sophie is now four and is flourishing in the preschool curriculum that Lighthouse teaches. Lily is enrolled in college studying to be a teacher when she graduates. She works at her old high school as an assistant for special-needs students and has two other part-time jobs. She is also a board member at Lighthouse.

Without Lighthouse, finishing high school would have been challenging for Lily, and college likely would have been unthinkable. She is grateful for the opportunities she has received and for a safe and nurturing place for Sophia to stay during the day. "You know and trust the people there at the church," she says.

John Lersch, pastor of First Presbyterian, considers Lighthouse a ministry of the church, and he notes the congregation's support of Lighthouse, which started in 2008, is indicative of its concern for others.

"In this church, the people have good hearts," John shares. "It is not just about ourselves. It's about others. That is the sign of a healthy church."

First Presbyterian's Pentecost Offering is another example of its good-heartedness. Through the Offering, the church helps youth, young adults, and at-risk children in its own community and also reaches out across the country through ministries of the national church that serve children, youth, and young adults.

Please give generously to this Offering, and support the future of our young people.

Grant them lives filled with hope and promise. Help us to reach out to them and extend the embrace of your loving arms.

Flanders Fields was the most popular poem of its era. McCrae received numerous letters and telegrams praising his work when he was revealed as the author. The poem was republished throughout the world, rapidly becoming synonymous with the sacrifices of the soldiers who died in the First World War. It was translated into numerous languages and its appeal was nearly universal. Soldiers took encouragement from it as a statement of their duty to those who died while people on the home front viewed it as defining the cause for which their brothers and sons were fighting.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row
That mark our place; and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly
Scarce heard amid the guns below
We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through February 19th we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$29,141** for a total of **\$175,498** or about **51.3%** of our **\$342,000** goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
