# **In Memoriam**



Dawn Robin Angarone August 8, 1960 – August 6, 2017

Our church family is saddened by the sudden death of our friend and valued member, Dawn Angarone. Her passing was a traumatic event for all who knew her. As part of the mission to our sister church in Dorogubuzh, Russia, Dawn, Pastor Clingan, and Kathy Greear attended their Sunday morning worship service. As she was singing a solo for the congregation, she collapsed and suffered an aneurism that took her life on August 6, 2017.

Born on August 8, 1960, in Brookfield, Illinois, Dawn was one of the three children of Peter and Lois Thas. Her sister, Pamela, describes their walking a mile to school each day where they attended High School. Dawn graduated with honors in Business and Music. After High School Dawn took classes in Accounting and English at North Central College in Naperville, Illinois. Not long afterwards, Dawn married Jim Angarone and they moved to the Chicago area. She and her husband established a business that provided secretarial and accounting services for small to medium sized companies.

After a career in Kentucky's local government legal field, Dawn and Jim moved to St George soon after her husband was diagnosed with cancer. When he passed away in 2014 under hospice care, Dawn's Chaplain was our own Rev. Ralph. His invitation to attend Women's Bible Study and Sunday services brought Dawn into our fold. She found our Chancel Choir and had been singing like an angel until the day she passed away. Her lilting soprano solo voice will be a vivid memory for all of us.

Dawn served in so many ways – Financial Secretary, Deacon, and Church Secretary. Her remains have now been returned to her family. Dawn was preceded by the death of her husband, father, brother, and uncle. Her Mother, Lois, and Sister, Pamela are very grateful for our prayers and the love we shared with Dawn during her years at Good Shepherd Presbyterian.



#### It is good to be home!

A trip that began with anticipation and hope turned tragic. The death of Dawn Angarone was both shocking and unexpected. What followed that terrible event was, at the same time, both unexpected and heartwarming.

As most of you know, following Communion, in which I was honored to participate, Al Smith introduced Dawn for her solo. Quoting from Kathie's blog,

"She began, unaccompanied, got her key on the piano and began singing 'For God So Loved the World', John 3:16, with the voice of an angel. A little over half way through she reached for the podium and just fell forward. She was caught before hitting the floor." CPR was administrered, paramedics were called but to no avail.

What followed was, I think, an expression of the true meaning of our relationship with the Word of Life Church: they prayed. They prayed for Dawn. They prayed for Kathie and me. They prayed for our congregation. Even as Dawn's body was being removed and put into the ambulance, the church's oldest member, a 92-year old woman who survived the Bolsheviks, the Nazis and the Communists, stood by the ambulance and prayed. I would like to think that our faith is as strong as what they all demonstrated in this most stressful circumstance.

I was prepared to preach a sermon during that service but didn't actually preach it until the day before we left Dorogobuzh. In between Kathie and I had a fun and fulfilling experience assisting with the church's annual Bible camp. Kathie assisted the ladies with the cooking and cleaning and I was in charge of the Bounce House (among other things). The kids kept trying to get me to bounce with them but I just kept telling them "Слишком старый" (Too old!). During the camp we met and interacted with a large number of Christians both from Dorogobuzh and from other parts of Russia and I continue to be impressed by their devotion to God and our Savior.

We all miss Dawn – her friendly smile, her compassion, her wonderful songs, her ability to light up a room. What we know is that she is with her God and for that we are thankful.

### **News from the Russia Mission**

With Rev. Ralph and Kathie safely back home, we turn our attention to upcoming events in the life of the Russia mission. Rev. Ralph and Chris Schleter will be attending the annual Russia Mission Network Conference in Pittsburgh from September 28<sup>th</sup> to September 30<sup>th</sup>. This will be our last chance to observe and participate in a conference before we host the event next year.

Al and Ellen Smith will be with us for worship on October 15<sup>th</sup>. We will be talking about next year's trip to Russia and doing some preliminary planning for next year's conference while they are here. We are also planning to hold a potluck dinner in their honor on the evening of the 15<sup>th</sup>. More details on that next month.

Below are some excerpts from Rev. Ralph's sermon in Dorogobuzh:

This week marks my third summer visit to you, our brothers and sisters in Christ at the Word of Life Church. I would like to say that in that time my ability to speak the Russian language has improved, maybe a little, but I have been working on it! You might be interested to know that not long ago a study was conducted to determine which language in the world was considered the hardest to learn. It was not Russian, or even Chinese, it is the English language. So Pastor Sergei I will give you a pass on your English language skills. But you are doing much better!

I can say in complete honesty that I have thought about and prayed for you all every day of this past year. On my office wall is a picture of the all the sisters that you presented me last summer. Framed and on my office desk is picture of the children and volunteers from last year's Bible camp. Throughout my wife's and my home are mementos of our past visits to you. Throughout our church are pictures and magnets of you and from you. I can in complete honesty repeat to you the words of Paul to the Corinthians, "All the saints greet you."

"Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brothers to dwell together in Unity" the Psalmist declares

As you may know this year has been a troubling time for my nation and I might say the world as well. In these troubling times as I listen to my radio I would shake my head and despair the future, but then I would remember you and the days, words of comfort and support our churches have shared and I am filled with hope. Because if we can come together in the same service of the same Lord, by the same baptism, in the same faith there is great hope not only for ourselves but the world we have been called to bear witness to as well. We bear witness that while miles and oceans separate us we are never divided. Together we are the body of Christ, the Love for our Lord and love of the Lord unites us. As Paul tells the Corinthians and us; "We rejoice, we are complete, we are comforted, we are like minded, the God of Love and peace is with us. I am reminded of the words when I rejoice in the good news of the Gospel we share "Men shall come from North and South, East and West and sit together in the Kingdom of God.

The nature of my church is as Pastor Sergei introduced us to the nursing home years ago as church being "full of babushka's". He was accurate. A few on occasion have lamented that we don't have many children attending. Last summer after having been here for Bible camp my response has been, "We do have children, many children, and they speak Russian.

The text from Matthew [attached to Rev. Ralph's Food For Thought] is referred to as the Great Commission". What happened next in the life of the church after this event is Pentecost. On that day, the day of the Holy Spirits coming, Parthians, Medes, Romans, Greeks, Cappadocian's, Libyans, maybe even Americans and Russians, heard the Good News of the Gospel and the mighty acts of God in their own language. How can this be? What does this mean?, all who witnessed this asked.

We know, because we have heard the Great news of Jesus Christ. We know His saving grace because we have been saved and now are charged by his love and called by His grace to bear witness to him by living this new life we share and are called to share.

It is in our common commission, Great Commission, to follow Jesus to all His disciples, to go to all the nations making disciples, Baptizing, teaching all that we have been commanded to do. Which is why we have traveled from the other side of the world, to do just that, with you as His body in Christ name and service, serving not as Americans, but as brothers and sisters in the Lord. And again I praise God for this time to be with you, for myself a family reunion. Yours and ours.

Last year shortly after my return home to Saint George I was at a social function of my congregation of about 30-40 members of my church. In conversation I was asked about my time with you, half way through my answer I noticed that all the other conversations in the room had ceased and everyone was listening to my answer and my experiences in visiting you. Your brothers and sisters in Saint George enjoy listening to your stories, hearing all about you and your faith, your witness and ministry. We have been praying for you all every day, at every Bible study, at every worship service you have been lifted up in prayer. The Lord has been hearing much about you this past year, in English.

### **Christian Education**

There is a lot going on right now with Christian Education.

With the Fall Festival's theme this year being "Getting to Know You", the Christian Education Committee will be displaying our favorite collections. Come and see our display on October 8<sup>th</sup>.

Jeff Clingan will continue teaching Adult Sunday School this fall. He has put together nine (yes, NINE!) classes on "Christianity in the Roman Empire of the East". Sunday morning classes in September will switch back to 9:00 am, so that choir members can get to their practice session on time. Jeff has done a great job this summer with his classes on Christianity & Roman Empire, and we look forward to his new sessions. Gloria McGilloway has done a wonderful job with her teachings on The Apocrypha. When you see these two people, please thank them for their hard work!

The Christian Education Committee is planning to put together an Advent Devotional Booklet for this year's Advent Season. This will be similar to the Lenten Devotional we did this past spring. ## **Congregation News**

#### **Church Property Damaged by Storm**

On Saturday, August 12<sup>th</sup>, a "microburst" hit our church property. It blew down four trees: one in the Memorial Garden, one on the southwest corner of the main church building and two on the south side of the north driveway. The tree in the Memorial Garden hit the roof of the gazebo and broke off the cross. We also had roof damage to the CE Building, main building and storage shed.

The rooves of the main and CE buildings have been repaired. The downed trees were removed the last week in August and the one near the main building and the one in the Memorial Garden were replaced with 24-gallon size ash trees. They grow quickly and will eventually replace those trees that were lost.

The total cost of the repairs and new trees is about \$4,000. The good news is that all but \$1,000 will be covered by our insurance.

## **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through February 19<sup>th</sup> we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$31,191** for a total of **\$177,774** or about **52%** of our **\$342,000 goal**.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
