

Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

¹⁰ "Cease striving and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." The Lord of hosts is with us; The God of Jacob is our stronghold.

Psalm 46:10-22 NASB

⁴ Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice! ⁵ Let your gentle spirit be known to all men. The Lord is near. ⁶ Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Philippians 4:4-7 NASB



The 10th verse of Psalm 46 of the Revised Version of the Bible translates these words as being "Be still and know that I am God". The NASB, however, I believe is the better translation and in laymen's terms says, "Cease trying to strive to be God, for I am God."

I prefer the latter because I believe it speaks to common trait or failure of ours which is to try to be God in our lives and living. We tend to want to take charge and be in charge of the various aspects of our lives and living. And very often at the least it can lead to sleepless nights and at the worst unfortunate consequences that lead to even more sleepless nights.

Soon as a nation and community we will enter the seasons of Thanksgiving, Advent, Christmas and so on. Life will suddenly become very busy, and we will find ourselves rather than being drawn to God instead being drawn away from listening to God or walking with our Lord because, well, we haven't the time!

To the shame of us all, instead we should cease striving to be God and instead seek to walk behind where our Lord is leading us. Years ago a colleague of mine made the statement in regards to the famous work "God is My Co-Pilot", if God is your co-pilot you're in the wrong seat.

Instead before the seasonal obstacle course begins let us instead take heed of Paul's words to the Philippians: "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

News from the Russia Mission

Rev. Ralph was joined by Chris Schleter in Pittsburgh for this year's Russia Mission Network Conference. This event, which we will host next fall, brings together churches in the US that have twinning relationships with a church in Russia. This year's conference recognized the 100th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution in Russia. The speakers and guests brought their perspectives to the revolution, the implications for the church during the Soviet period and the revival of the church in the Post-Soviet era. We look forward to hosting the group in 2018 and will be looking for the congregation to pitch in to make next year's conference a big success.

Meet the Member Chris Schleter

From computers to sound to budgets and even a newsletter and website thrown in for good measure, Chris Schleter provides a variety of needed services to our church. How did he come to be among us and to be able to do all of the things he does? He explained it this way:

I was born in the Washington, DC, area in 1955. My father was a scientist with the government and my mother was an administrative assistant in one of the many divisions of Hewlett-Packard. She also had worked for a couple of radio stations and with Willard Scott at WRC in Washington when he was a low-level employee of the station. I was an only child so I had to learn early how to entertain myself and be self-sufficient.

When I was in high school, I wanted to play baseball, even though it was pretty obvious (then and now) that I wasn't very athletic. When I didn't make the team as a sophomore, the coach asked me to be the team manager (more gofer than manager). I guess I did a good job because my junior year I was asked to be the head football manager, as well. That began my career in sports.

After I graduated, I enrolled at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, majoring in Broadcast Journalism. I was also given the opportunity to be one of the managers of the football team, which actually paid for my education. By the time I graduated in December of 1977, I was a four-time letterman as a manager, something no one else in the history of the school had done.

I went on to earn an M.S. in Computer Science from Carolina in 1981 and went to work for the Athletic Department at Carolina. That job lasted more than 14 years. I was responsible for filming games and practices, managing the computers in the department, stage managing basketball and football games and so many more things that I don't remember all of them. The more I did, the more they found for me to do.

In 1995, during the lead up to the Atlanta Olympic Games, a friend with whom I had worked at Carolina offered me the chance to be the results manager for baseball for the Games. I couldn't turn that down, so I left Carolina and began my Olympic odyssey. While the Olympics look glamorous on TV, it takes a LOT of work to pull them off and as we left the stadium after the Gold Medal baseball game, I commented to one of my colleagues, "If anyone EVER suggests I do this again, please shoot him – and me if I say yes." That November, I was offered a job in Sydney, Australia, doing sport technology planning for the 2000 Games. I thought about it (for about a minute) and decided to accept. Sydney led to a job in Salt Lake City which led to a consulting job in Athens, Greece, which led to an offer from Swiss Timing to be their onsite project manager for the Torino and Vancouver Winter Games. I took the Swiss Timing job and worked both the Athens and Beijing Games while managing my own projects. I retired after Vancouver and, although I still do some work with the summer Paralympic Games and a couple of PGA tournaments, here I am.

People in the east always ask me why I live in the desert in Utah. It's simple – I HATE HUMIDITY. And, besides, the golf here is wonderful.

I love the area. I love the church and its family feel. I love the weather. I love being able to go to Zion whenever I want and hike in the beauty that God has given us. In short, I can't think of anywhere I would rather be. This is home.

Christian Education

Christian Education at Good Shepherd is alive, well, and kicking! We have children consistently in Sunday School Class; we have eight to ten people attending Jeff Clingan's Adult Sunday School Classes on "Christianity in the Roman Empire of the East" (we are learning things we NEVER knew about the early Christian church!); and the five weekly Bible Studies (all in public venues except for Sunday evening at Rev. Ralph's house) are consistently well attended and act as a witness to the community about the importance of studying and discussing the Bible and its meaning for us in today's world. And we have Rev. Ralph's "Bah Humbug! 101" Advent classes to look forward to after Thanksgiving!

We continue to ask, no, we BEG! for everyone's contributions to the Advent Devotional booklet. There are still many empty days in Advent that need filling with your thoughts, insights, stories, prayers, readings, etc. PLEASE consider adding to this delightful work. **DEADLINE: SUNDAY NOVEMBER 12**!!!

We are again planning to have Advent Lessons & Potluck Suppers on Monday evenings at 5:45 pm beginning on Monday, November 27th, and continuing on December 4th, December 11th, and December 18th. Rev. Ralph will be teaching us all sorts of things we never knew before! Please come and bring food to share. It is always interesting to find out "What's For Dinner".

Mission/Outreach

BROWN BAG LUNCHEON – Our next speaker, Karen Mc Mullin, comes well recommended as an expert on what one might call, the 'Art of Scamming.' Karen is employed by the State of Utah as an Investor Education Coordinator for the Division of Securities. Unfortunately, scammers prey on the unsuspecting and un-informed. We invite you to become one of the Informed on **THURSDAY**, October 19th at Noon in Conklin Hall as Karen speaks about "How to Avoid Fraud." As has been suggested, we don't want you to become sick because of being scammed! Mark the date, make a sandwich and come to Brown Bag on the 19th at noon. Bring your friends and we'll have a beverage and sweets waiting for you.

FLU VACCINATIONS – According to the CDC, "getting an annual flu vaccine is the best way to protect yourself and your family from getting the flu." The more people vaccinated reduces the numbers of children, the elderly, pregnant women and those afflicted with long term illnesses who will die from the flu. The recommendation has again been made NOT to use the nasal spray flu vaccine. This year, flu vaccines have been updated to better match circulating viruses.

Parish Nursing, continued

Because it takes about two weeks after vaccination for your body to develop protective antibodies, the optimal time to have your flu vaccine is between now and the end of October so that you are ahead of the usual beginning of flu season activity.

People under the age of 65 are to receive the standard flu vaccine. Those 65 and older are to receive a FLUZONE High-dose or a FLUAD shot. Both contain a component in addition to the standard vaccine and the newer, FLUAD, has an additive (or adjuvant), which increases the ability of the vaccine to induce immune responses in older people.

BOTTOM LINE— Be part of ensuring a healthier community and a healthier you by getting your flu shot ANYTIME Now! As always, consult your medical provider if you have special concerns regarding receiving immunizations.

Session News

Session held their regular monthly meeting on September 10th. Here is a synopsis of the actions:

- Approved to increase Clerk's 2017 budget line from \$250 to \$425.
- Approved the purchase of 14 yards/19 tons of 3/4 inch Apache Gold rock from Rowland Stone to uniformly cover the rest of the community garden area including delivery at a cost of \$694.50 to be paid from the Memorial Fund.
- An August 24, 2017, E-vote approval to authorize Arbor Tech to replace two (24 gal) trees and one (15 gal) tree at a cost not to exceed \$2,220 to be paid from the Contingency Fund. This was due to storm damage on August 23, 2017 with \$1,000 deductible insurance.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through February 19th we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling \$45,357 and additional cash donations of \$31,808 for a total of \$178,390.71 or about 52.2% of our \$342,000 goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
