2018 Pledge Drive Begins

We want to personally thank you for your generosity and commitment to the life, mission and ministry of our congregation. 2017 has been a truly blessed year!

Due to your support of the financial life of our congregation we were able this past year to train more Stephen Leaders and Ministers in the service and care of those whose lives are in times of crisis.

Due to your support, we have been able to reach out with the love of Christ not only to the homeless and hungry in our area through our CROP Walk and area social ministries, we were able as well to extend our love to the children of the world including children of Dorogobuzh, Russia, through the Bible Camp ministry of our sister congregation.

Due to your support, we have been able to support our witness and worship of our Lord and Savior Jesus by offering to our community each Sunday a joyful fellowship and meaningful worship that welcomes all with the love and grace of Jesus Christ.

In other words, due to your commitment to our Lord, lives have been changed in His name.

Pledge forms and a copy of the proposed budget for 2018 were mailed to everyone this week. If you didn't receive yours, please see Bob Moeller or Chris Schleter and they will see that you get one.

While our budget is about \$7,500 higher than last year (mainly due to electricity cost increases and deferred maintenance on the buildings), we've seen our loose offerings grow by more than \$4,000 this year so we're asking for about \$3,500 more in pledges for 2018 to cover our expenditures. Every pledge, no matter how big or small, puts us closer to our goal.

You can pledge by dropping your pledge form in the offering plate on any Sunday or by returning it to the church office.

You can also pledge online by going to our website, hovering over Stewardship in the menu and clicking Pledge Support. On the Pledge Support page, click on General Fund Pledge on the right then fill out and submit the form. Our Financial Secretary, LaVerna Metzger, will receive an email with your pledge.

If you have any questions, please speak with Bob Moeller, Carolynn Thomas or Chris Schleter, members of your Stewardship Committee.

We will dedicate our pledges during worship on December 17th.

We look forward to the year ahead and continue to grow and expand our ministries and mission partnership with you..




Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

Parish Nursing

At our Brown Bag luncheon on October 19th, we were privileged to have Karen McMullin, Investor Education Coordinator, Division of Securities for the State of Utah as our speaker. Karen was a font of interesting information, education and insight into the world of scamming and deception to which each of us is exposed every day. Though you, personally, may not have been scammed, statistics indicate someone known to you has been. A scammer is out to obtain one thing and that is your personal information. Karen reviewed the most usual types of scams employed to accomplish this.

IMPOSTER SCAMS: Through a call or email, you may be told you have won something or, the caller, having obtained personal information from social media, may impersonate someone you know, such as a grandchild, in order to get you to wire money to pay taxes or fees. NEVER wire money because it cannot be tracked. Also know that the "real" IRS never seeks payment by telephone.

CHARITY FRAUD: Someone calls and says they represent a charity, the name of which may sound familiar, and pressure you to donate money but may refuse specific details of how it will be used. Do not promise money until you have had time to research the validity of the request. Stick with legitimate charities, which must be registered with the State of Utah.

HEALTH CARE SCAMS: Health Care scammers intent on obtaining Social Security numbers are especially active in the Fall during Medicare open season or when health care is in the news. People may feel obligated to give personal information in order to "comply" with supposed regulations. Check it out before sharing information!

PAYING TOO MUCH: Keep close track of unusual charges on your bills, especially those for fees or services. Be sure costs have not been escalated improperly and never hesitate to try negotiating for a lowering of ongoing charges or interest rates. Research credentials and references of any contractors employed to work for you.

"YOU'VE WON" SCAMS: The old "you're a winner" trick -- You may be told you have won something but must pay a fee to receive it and then are asked for your credit card number to make this happen. Either way, you don't win. You only lose!

Karen spoke about the EQUIFAX breech and referred us to the Utah government site: IDTHEFT.utah.gov. to learn about our credit standings and be directed to the proper sources for information. You may also call Division of Securities at 801-530-6600, for personal answers to specific questions. A packet of pertinent material, including a list of Dept. of Commerce regulating agencies and their contact information, is available by calling either Mitzi Rak (435-674-1204) or Alicia Kitzman (435-272-4614). Bottom Line - you can never be too cautious or protective of your personal information. Never give out your Social Security number or banking information to a stranger. And - If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!!

Session held their regular monthly meeting on October 15th. Here is a synopsis of the actions:

- Approved the tentative 2018 Budget for distribution to the congregation with the pledge campaign letters.
- Approved to present to the congregation at the Annual Meeting in December, 2017, the following Terms of Call for the Pastor for 2018: Salary \$35,017.12, Housing \$36,326.00, Pension \$7,847.74, Dental Insurance (estimated) \$950.00, Medical insurance \$17,479.07, Disability Insurance \$713.43, Reimbursable Expenses \$7,000.00, Total=\$105,333.36.
- Approved the upgrade of the projection screen and permanent mounting of the video projector in Conklin Hall at a cost not to exceed \$1,000.00, to be paid from the Memorial Fund.
- Approved to permit Althea Haworth to make and sell Christmas wreaths from her own supplies with all proceeds to be given to the Building Fund.
- Approved (by E-Vote on September 24, 2017) to hire Arlene Prinselaar for the Executive Secretarial position at Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church.

What does the Stewardship/Personnel Committee do?

The personnel portion is pretty much what it sounds like, care of our one full time and several part time employees. What is the Stewardship portion?

Stewardship, continued

We are managing or supervising the financial aspects of our Church. Our team takes in the money, signs the checks to pay our debts and analyzes and recommends the budget to Session. Remember the Story of the Talents (Matthew 25: 14-30) or (Luke 19:12-27) A master who was leaving his house to travel entrusted his property to three servants, two did well increasing their master's wealth, and were counted Good and faithful. The third, who hid his master's money, not so much. Our job is to be "Good and faithful" servants.

You should have received, or will receive in the next couple of days, a packet concerning our pledge drive for next year. The packet includes a pledge form and a copy of next year's proposed budget. Please review it carefully and prayerfully consider making a pledge.

What are the different ways we can give? (This is one of the most frequent question I receive.)

- Give your Time.
- Pledge an amount for the year. (See the enclosed documents)
- Loose offerings, put something in the plate.
- Online giving, using a credit card or your bank account.
- Have your bank do a direct deposit, say a monthly gift.
- Leave a gift when you are gone, put something for the church in your will or Trust. Some methods even have tax advantages. (Check with an Attorney.)

How much should you give? A full tithe is 10%. Look in your heart, look at what you can afford, pledge and give what you can.

Matthew 6:19-21 says, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys, and where thieves do not break in and steal; for where your treasure is there your heart will be also."

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through October 22nd we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$31,808** for a total of **\$178,391** or about **52.2%** of our **\$342,000** goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
