

## News from the Russia Mission

September is coming. As many of you know, we will be hosting the annual Russia Mission Network Conference from Wednesday, September 26<sup>th</sup> through Friday, September 28<sup>th</sup>. We expect to be joined by between 30 and 40 representatives of other churches that participate in partnerships with Russian churches, as well as Pastor Sergei, another representative from Russia, Rev. Michael Zdorow, the Chaplain of the Moscow Protestant Chaplaincy and, of course, Mission Co-Workers Ellen and Al Smith. In addition, Presbytery will be meeting at Good Shepherd on September 29<sup>th</sup> and all members of Presbytery have been invited to attend the conference, as well.

The program will begin with dinner on the 26<sup>th</sup> with an evening program to follow. The 27<sup>th</sup> will be filled with presentations from our Russian friends as well as Ellen and Al Smith and representatives from Presbyterian World Mission and breakout sessions on various topics. There will be additional breakout sessions on the 28<sup>th</sup> and the conference will officially end with lunch. After lunch, we are thinking about taking those who wish to join us to Zion for a bit of sightseeing with dinner in Springdale.

Since most people will probably fly in to Vegas or St. George, we will need help with organizing transportation. Meals will need to be organized and served. We will coordinate a block of rooms at a local hotel and will need help with organizing accommodations. Some attendees will prefer to stay with one of our members, so we'll need volunteers to host one or more attendees. We want to have a hospitality area in the CE Building and will need snacks and baked goods. As you can see, this is going to be a big job and we will need everyone's help to make it happen.

The Russia Mission Steering Committee will meet in January to begin planning the event and we will be asking for your help. If you are interested in helping, please get in touch with Chris Schleter.

## **Parish Nursing**

Welcome to 2018! In this year, as always, we will continue to offer information and programs intended to assist you in maintaining your best health.

The first program, which our committee is pleased to host, is a FREE workshop offered by the Five County Association of Governments titled, "Self-Management of Chronic Diseases". Content of the workshop, co-taught by Good Shepherd member Pebble Mowery and DaCota Terry from Five County, originated from Stanford University. Evidence based findings from a Stanford University study showed those taking the workshop realized measurable increases in the quality of their health. By definition, a chronic disease lasts longer than six months or may be a recurring disease. The workshop is for anyone suffering from chronic disease or for their caretakers and is open to the public. It is funded by a government grant and each of the six sessions (once weekly) builds on the previous one, thus it is hoped that participants will attend all six sessions.

## **Stewardship**

In this time of transition, I want to tell you thank you, for your generous contributions of time and money. It has been my pleasure to work with you, and a special thank you to Chris Schleter, Carolynn Thomas, Dawn Angarone and LaVerna Metzger, for their hard work.

#### **Brother Steward**

A steward is one who manages the resources and affairs for someone else. On behalf of the owner, a steward is given the latitude to make far-reaching decisions. As God's stewards, we recognize that we are managers, not owners, of all that God has entrusted to us.

Perhaps the best example of stewardship the Bible gives us is in the life of Joseph. We know about his youth ... that he was the favored son of his father, but hated and resented by his brothers whose bitterness led them to sell him into slavery. Throughout the account of Joseph's life in the book of Genesis, the words, "God was with Joseph" are repeated.

Joseph recognized God's control over his life. When Potiphar's wife tried to seduce him, he rejected her, saying, "How then could 1 do such a wicked thing and sin against God?" (Genesis 39:9) And he fled from evil, trusting in God to protect him. Although the result of this encounter was that Joseph landed in prison, he still relied on his God. When the cupbearer finally remembered Joseph's ability to interpret dreams, and Pharaoh called for Joseph, it was his chance to build himself up and get back into good standing. Instead, Joseph answered, "1 cannot [interpret your dreams], but God will give Pharaoh the answer he desires" (Genesis 41:16).

As second only to Pharaoh and with the wisdom God had given, Joseph saved not only Egypt from starvation but surrounding nations as well. When Joseph's brothers came to Egypt, seeking to buy grain so they wouldn't starve, Joseph had the right and the power to punish them. Instead he saw God's hand in all the events of his life and forgave his brothers, saying, "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good ... " (Genesis 50:20).

As stewards, we work and serve under God's direction. We use our gifts wherever he places us and we work for him, not for Earthly bosses. We acknowledge that he is the one who gives us our gifts and enables and equips us to use them. And we thank him, giving him the credit, for it is his due.

# **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through December 24<sup>th</sup> we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$36,548** for a total of **\$183,130** or about **53.5%** of our **\$342,000** goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
