# What is Shrove Tuesday? Why Do We Eat Pancakes?

On February 13<sup>th</sup>, Rev. Ralph will be hosting a Shrove Tuesday breakfast. You might be wondering, just what is Shrove Tuesday and why do we always have pancakes?

Shrove Tuesday occurs on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. It officially ends the season of Epiphany and is the vigil for the starting of Lent.

Traditionally viewed as a day of repentance, Shrove Tuesday has become the last day for celebration and feasting before the period of fasting required during the Lenten season. The name "Shrove Tuesday" is derived from the word "shrive", which means to confess and receive absolution. The name denotes a period of cleansing, wherein a person brings their lusts and appetites under subjection through abstention and self-sacrifice.

The concept behind this practice is found in 1 Corinthians 9:27, where the Apostle Paul states: "I buffet my body and make it my slave..." Ironically, Shrove Tuesday has evolved into a day of frivolity and indulgence, during which people participate in as much pleasure and self-gratification as they can before Lent begins.

Shrove Tuesday originated during the Middle Ages. As in contemporary times, food items like meats, fats, eggs, milk, and fish were regarded as restricted during Lent. To keep such food from being wasted, many families would have big feasts on Shrove Tuesday in order to consume those items that would inevitably become spoiled during the next forty days. The English tradition of eating pancakes on Shrove Tuesday came about as a way to use as much milk, fats, and eggs as possible before Ash Wednesday began. In France, the consumption of all fats and fatty foods on this day coined the name "Fat Tuesday" or Mardi Gras.

Shrove Tuesday has a variety of customs that have derived from different regions around Europe and the Americas. As previously mentioned, England began the tradition of serving pancakes, and for this reason the day is known as "Pancake Day". In addition, there are the annual Pancake Day Races, where contestants dress in aprons and scarves and race down a course flipping a pancake in a frying pan or skillet.

In Eastern Europe, the Carnival celebrations include boisterous processions where people in large masks parade around and play jokes on bystanders. The masks are often caricatures of individuals from traditional folklore.

Perhaps the most prominent customs are the balls and pageants in New Orleans and Rio de Janiero. Like Eastern European celebrations, participants wear masks and costumes, many of which are quite flamboyant and elaborate. Rio has a parade which includes hundreds of dancers dressed in costumes decked with feathers, all dancing the samba. In New Orleans, Mardi Gras includes a variety of parades featuring grand floats and giant effigies of eccentric characters. There is much eating, drinking, and dancing, as well as practical jokes and humorous street plays.



# Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

For much of the Christian world the church season of Lent will begin this month, of all days, on Valentine's Day, February 14<sup>th</sup>, and end of all days, April 1<sup>st</sup>, April Fool's Day. I will say more about that in my next newsletter article. However, it is ironic that we begin the season of Lent on the day of hearts and love. It almost is an elaboration of John words, 3:16: "For God so loved the world.."

What you may not be aware of that the season of Lent is one of the oldest traditions of the Christian Church, a season of 40 days, symbolic of Jesus forty days in the wilderness in spiritual preparation for his mission that comes to its fulfilment with the dawn of

Resurrection Sunday, Easter Morning. Church seasons are primarily twofold in purpose, for our spiritual growth and education. Our time of preparation to hear again those wondrous words, "He is Risen, He is Risen indeed!", and experience the renewal of our own life, faith and hope, not only as individuals but as well as the body of Christ, His Church.

The question then for us now as we approach this time is just how? While some traditions encourage a temporary sacrifice of something we love to eat or do, I tend to believe a far better approach is to add to our lives and routines some activity that will lead to growth such as a Bible study or class, attend a service that you have not attended before, and of course follow those traditions and activities that lead you closer to Christ but as well closer to your brother and sister in the Lord.

Throughout this month's newsletter you will find many opportunities to do just that. I invite you to prayerfully look and see prayerfully what different you may take through this year's journey of Lent. It is my hope and prayer you will be led to join with me on this journey of preparation and celebration.

#### Senior Ministries

Dr. Ka-Wai Yu was the honored guest speaker at our January SOUP and FELLOWSHIP event on Wednesday, January 17<sup>th</sup> (he packed the room). Spending his lunch hour with us, he began his program by playing a composition he wrote called "Momma, You are the Best" on his cello. This is a variation on several Chinese tunes which set the mood for his very well presented program. Born in Hong Kong to a musically talented and Christian mother and father, he grew up with two brothers who also play instruments, are professional and living on the east coast. His mother teaches piano and is a mezzo soprano. Ka-Wai met the cello at age two but didn't start lessons until he was five. He has a beautiful selection of slides showing his family as he grew up. He speaks five languages: Cantonese, spoken at home, Mandarin, spoken in school and the official language of China, some French, and, oh yes, English, but Music is his favorite language. He was a member of the Hong Kong Opera Society and also played his cello with a chamber music group.

In 2003, he won a scholarship to the Aspen Music Festival Training Camp. This was one of several trips to the US before moving to Atlanta, Georgia in 2004. In 2005 he went to college where he was involved in musical productions as well as choir. He earned his master's degree in Indiana and then moved, in 2012, to Illinois for his doctorate degree.

In 2015, he sent out his resume to see what was available around the country and Dixie State University Skyped with him, then brought him for an interview and now he is a Trailblazing Professor, as he calls himself, at DSU so we know how the interview went. He has a full schedule teaching students and an active life with the Cello Society of Southern Utah which he started, entertains at nursing homes, is often seen playing for celebrity concert events, weddings, and our church services. He played for us at the Presbyterian Women's Tea in May and I'm sure the list goes on.

He joined God in 2012 and joined us in 2016. When pressure gets to him, he takes a hike (he's certainly in the right place to do that). We are blessed to have his friendship and talent, voice and cello, in our congregation. His voice and cello are the spirit singing. Thank you Ka-Wai.

# **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through December 24<sup>th</sup> we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$36,839** for a total of **\$183,422** or about **53.6%** of our **\$342,000** goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
