## **Easter Season Comes to Good Shepherd**

The season of Lent and our celebration of Easter are always busy times at Good Shepherd and 2018 will be no exception.

We will began our observation of Lent on February 14<sup>th</sup> with our annual Ash Wednesday Services.

As he did last year, Rev. Ralph will be leading a Bible Study on Monday evenings during Lent. The series kicked off on February 19<sup>th</sup> at 5:45 pm and will be held every Monday through March 26<sup>th</sup>. The topic this year is the Book of Revelation.

On March 25<sup>th</sup>, Palm Sunday, Rev. Ralph and his team of men will serve us a hearty breakfast beginning at 8:30 am in Conklin Hall. This event is always well attended and we appreciate the efforts of all who provide food for us. Our service on Palm Sunday will be filled with music by our choirs.

On Maundy Thursday, March 29<sup>th</sup>, we will hold an Agape Dinner beginning at 6:00 pm in Conklin Hall. This dinner is notable because the room is lit oil lamps.

The following day, Good Friday, will kick off at 10:00 am with the annual Procession of the Cross and close with an Ecumenical Service at 7:00 pm in our Sanctuary.

We will not have an early service or adult education on Easter Sunday, April 1<sup>st</sup>, so we can all prepare ourselves to celebrate our Risen Lord. After the service, we hope you will join us for Easter Brunch in Conklin Hall.

We hope to see you at as many events as you can attend.

## With Easter Comes One Great Hour of Sharing

Of course, with Easter, comes the annual One Great Hour of Sharing. Here is some history on this offering.

Following World War II, Protestant churches in the United States made appeals for the relief and reconstruction of devastated areas, primarily in Europe and Asia. In 1949 the leaders of several denominations formed a committee to organize an appeal to support their churches' separate campaigns. The next year, the offering was repeated, for the first time using the name "One Great Hour of Sharing."

The offering always has been an ecumenical effort and, while each denomination allocates its gifts differently, all use their funds for ministries of disaster relief, refugee assistance, and development aid.

A radio program called "One Great Hour" was broadcast on March 26, 1949. The broadcast closed with a request that listeners attend church the following morning and make a sacrificial contribution. No exact measure of receipts was possible, but it was estimated that more than 75,000 churches participated.

One Great Hour of Sharing is one of our major church-wide offerings and does so much good for so many people. Please consider making a donation to this most worthwhile offering.



## Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

I found it rather ironic that this year the Season of Lent begins on "Valentine's Day" and Resurrection Sunday (Easter) falls on "April Fool's Day". We begin our Lenten journey giving our hearts away and great the day of our Lord's rising with laughter, hmmmm, perhaps not so ironic after all.

In that the season of Lent is not about us but about the journey Christ took to the cross and for whom. It is a time for us to journey with him in these forty days and again remember his words from Mark that in order to gain the new life He offers us we must let go of our old lives, ourselves to as Mark puts it, "to gain our souls". This calls us to refocus and reexamine what it means to live lives that reflect the living Christ within our hearts and with our hands.

In that I am this year I am always reminded of the tradition of the Eastern Orthodox Church, that includes the Russian Orthodox, that a part of the liturgy on Easter Sunday is that when the priest announces that "Christ is Risen" the congregation responds with laughter. That with the Resurrection death has become powerless, the victory won, death now is laughed at, and death has become the fool.

So perhaps it is very fitting for Lent to begin with hearts given away and Easter morning greeted with holy laughter. It is my hope that indeed you will all join me in this journey and with April 1st, laugh with our hearts and soul.

A very happy and blessed Resurrection Sunday to you all.

#### 2018 Visit to Dorogobuzh

As of now, Gloria McGilloway and Chris Schleter will be visiting our sister congregation in Dorogobuzh sometime in August. They expect to be helping Pastor Sergei and his congregation complete an addition to their church building.

#### **Russia Mission Network Conference**

Planning for the Russia Mission Network Conference is well underway. The theme of this year's conference is "Twinning from the Russian Perspective" and we will examine how our Russian Brothers and Sisters see the twinning program and how we can enhance our relationships with them.

We hope to have Pastor Sergei and at least one other Russian from a twinned congregation, the Chaplain of the Moscow Protestant Chaplaincy, our Mission Co-Workers Ellen and Al Smith and, hopefully, their daughter Emma join us as a part of the program. We expect to have 40-50 representatives of other "twinned" congregations with us for this most interesting and exciting conference. Since Presbytery meets in St. George on the day after the conference, they, too, have been invited to attend the conference.

If you are already certified in CPR for the Non- Professional, you must take a class every two years to maintain that certification. We last held the class at Good Shepherd Church in April of 2016. We were unable to have Dr. David Grygla, Hospitalist, from Dixie Regional Medical Center as our **BROWN BAG LUNCHEON** speaker in December as announced, but have been able to re-schedule his talk for **Wednesday**, **April 25**<sup>th</sup>. Plan to come and learn about the role of the Hospitalist in current medical care.

This has been a challenging year for seasonal illness and flu. Flu activity can last into May and it is not too late to get a flu shot, if you have not yet done so. Should you get the flu, an antiviral medication, like Tamiflu, might be given and has been shown to be effective even if administered past the recommended second day of sickness. Our best defense, however, is proper hand washing after using the bathroom, before eating and before touching our eyes, nose or mouth, the common entry routes of germs into our bodies.

**BRAIN STUFF:** P. Murali Doraiswamy, M. D., a professor of psychiatry and medicine at Duke University of Medicine and coauthor of "The Alzheimer's Action Plan" says, "Considering cognition, the benefits of correcting hearing loss are twice as large as the benefits from any cognitive-enhancing drugs now on the market. It should be the first thing we focus on, HEARING REHABILITATION, or simply aids." It is strongly recommended that you choose an audiologist rather than a hearing aid dispensing facility if you should consider the above recommendation.

#### Senior Ministries, continued

Buying a hearing aid is like buying shoes. One size does not fit all. The new technology with hearing aids is amazing. Mostly, they are less obvious, sometimes hidden, lighter and more comfortable and they can filter out background noise. They also can have a built in telecoil that lets you listen to services in our Sanctuary or to presentations in Conklin Hall directly through your hearing aids. One very important fact is that you must wear them, all day every day, to get use to them. They don't work well for you in the drawer.

## **Stephen Ministry**

The events that took place last month in Parkland, Florida sparked feelings of compassion all over our country. Interestingly enough, the word compassion literally means "to suffer together." Synonyms that come to mind are understanding, care, concern, brotherly love, kindness, consideration, or mercy. Yet compassion goes one step further in that it also drives a feeling within us to help – to share the burden of the one suffering.

While cynics may dismiss compassion as touchy-feely or irrational; scientific research has shown that when we feel compassion, our heart rate slows down, we secrete the bonding hormone called oxytocin, and regions of the brain linked to empathy, caregiving, and feelings of pleasure light up, which often results in our wanting to approach and care for other people.

Is it any surprise then, that one of the most important characteristics of a Stephen Minister is compassion? This is exactly what the ministry is all about. A one-on-one Christian connection with someone who is suffering. According to the old Swedish proverb: "Shared joy is a double joy; shared sorrow is half a sorrow."

If you feel a pull at your heartstrings for the sufferings of a fellow being, perhaps you should consider the program of Stephen Ministry. Talk with Rev. Ralph or your Stephen Minister Leaders, Anne Patten or Karen Kirkland.

## **Building Fund Update**

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although, with your help, we hope to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have a number of major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$100,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise \$342,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through December 24<sup>th</sup> we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$40,694** for a total of **\$187,277** or about **54.8%** of our **\$342,000** goal.

If you have pledged to the building fund, thank you. If you have not yet made a pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help us to pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to perform needed maintenance and make other improvements in the future.
