Project to Reduce Electrical Demand Underway

Each month, St. George Utilities charges us for two separate items on our electric bill. The first is our usage of electricity – the same thing we members as residential customers are charged. The second is a charge based on our "Electrical Demand" or how much peak power we used during the month.

The church is considered to be a "Small General Service" customer by St. George Utilities. Under this billing structure, the Church is charged not only for how much electricity it uses each month, but also for the highest peak usage during a given month. Electrical utilities bill this way, because they must maintain electrical generating capacity to support peak demands.

Demand charges amount to approximately one-third of our total electrical bill throughout the year (\$2,000), and peak in the hottest months of the year due to air conditioning loads. Air conditioning, in total, represents one-half of the total electrical usage of the Church during the year (about \$3,000).

Large savings in electrical costs (about \$1,000 per year) can be realized through effective control of electrical demand, even without reducing our electrical usage. More importantly, the church must avoid slipping into the electrical customer category of "Large General Service", since charges would increase by \$1,400/year, without any increase in our usage. Last year, GSPC was very close to being billed as a "Large" customer, solely based on our demand during the months of June and July.

The key to reducing demand at the church is to avoid situations where all seven of our air conditioning (A/C) units are operating at the same time. And this can be done, without meaningfully affecting our comfort, by programming the proper sequencing of the A/C units. But to do so, we must also respect that sequencing, by providing security against inadvertent changes.

The Building Committee recommended, and Session approved, the following actions to reduce electrical demand.

• Restrict access to several of our thermostats to authorized personnel only. However, two of our seven thermostats will remain accessible for "local" short-term adjustments: Conklin Hall and the Church Offices in the Church Education Building.

• Establish "prime" and "backup" A/C units for the two zones that have multiple air conditioners: Sanctuary and Conklin Hall. In this fashion, the air conditioners can be programmed to control on only one A/C unit, unless the heat demand necessitates the operation of both A/C units.

• Program A/C operation on Sunday to sequence the cooldown of each zone consistent with the flow of Church Services: CE Building first, Sanctuary and Narthex second, and Conklin Hall last.

• Maintain two temperature setpoints for each zone. Cooldown each zone only before its normally scheduled use. Allow "local" control for only two zones (Conklin Hall and the Church Offices), to allow for unscheduled activities.

We need your help and cooperation to make this happen without adverse impact to the enjoyment of our outstanding Church facilities. Please be patient as we deploy these measures during June, July, and August. If you notice difficulties, please communicate those issues by placing a note to the Building Committee in the offer plate.



Treasurer's Report



Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought

Cease striving and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth."

Psalm 46:10 New American Standard Bible (NASB)



Years ago, having just completed the first half of my first year here as your pastor, after having celebrated all the high Holy days, Christmas, Easter and Mother's Day, with the departure of the "snow birds", meeting with area and experienced colleagues I posed the question, "What happens here in Saint George during the summer?'. Their came readily and quickly, "nothing" was their uniform response.

Now at the beginning of my 13th summer here I can confirm and deny that here in in St. George "nothing' happens during the summer. It is true the church calendar does suddenly go almost blank after being a sea of ink for several months. All the festivals, races and games have suddenly left town and things, for the moment become quiet.

What we miss is the opportunity and gift we have been given, time. The time to catch our breath in a world that simultaneously can be both busy and frightening. A flurry of events locally, nationally and internationally that cause our vision to blur and minds and hearts to wonder, where is God.

That our lives might become clearer in purpose and direction if and when we remember this and place our lives and each other in God's gracious care and love for us, to trust our Lord with our leading, serving and loving in His name.

Bill and Carol Somplatsky-Jarman

Carol was born in Washington (City) in Washington County, Pennsylvania, and now lives in Washington (City) in Washington County, Utah. Over the years, she has lived in ten states. Bill was born in Kansas City, Missouri, and grew up in Champaign, Illinois.

They met at Bethany College in West Virginia and Bill followed with a degree at Yale Divinity School. One of their earliest positions was as Fraternal Workers assigned to the French Protestant Industrial Mission in Paris, France working in working class and immigrant neighborhoods. Upon returning to the United States, they lived in Brooklyn and Carol pursued a degree at Union Theological Seminary. Both are ordained ministers. Bill held several positions before working for thirty-two years with the Presbyterian Church, starting as staff with the Mission Responsibility Through Investment (MRTI) program and with the office of social policy. While in New York City, Carol worked with National Council of Churches' Interfaith Center on Corporate Responsibility (ICCR), focusing on International Justice issues such as the South Africa divestment campaign, the international debt crisis, worker rights for Guatemalan workers and women in computer manufacturing among many others. Bill and Carol often worked together as the PC(USA) was an active member of the ICCR and NCC.

When the church headquarters moved to Louisville, both Bill and Carol worked for the Presbyterian Church.

Bill continued staffing MRTI and launched the Caring for God's Creation program. Other duties for social welfare networks were added before he retired as Coordinator for Social Witness Ministries at the end of 2016. Highlights included the Rio Earth Summit, attending United Nations Climate Change negotiations, leading study trips to Appalachia, the United States/Mexico border and the Brazilian Amazon, and working with hundreds of creative, committed people in the United States and globally.

Carol served with several PC(USA) offices, including, PRESBYTEL (the information office); the Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy; Evangelism and Church Development, working with the Mission Program Grant programs for New Church Development and Redevelopment, etc.; and World Mission, itinerating mission co-workers during their U.S speaking itineration assignments. She was part of the team responsible for the Mission Challenge 2009, where 40 mission co-worker teams itinerating for four weeks in virtually every PC(USA) presbytery. Mission co-worker Ellen Smith was graciously part of this effort, speaking virtually every day for the month throughout the country.

Now in retirement, Carol enjoys traveling, hiking, quilting, reading and studying Italian. Bill looks forward to exploring the West, continued travel, making new friends and keeping up with old ones.

They are pleased to be living in southern Utah, and to be part of the Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church community and we welcome them to our church family.

Parish Nursing

April Brown Bag Luncheon

On April 25th, we were pleased to welcome Dr David Gryglia from Dixie Regional Medical Center as our speaker. Dr. Gryglia practices as one of eighteen Hospitalists at Intermountain, who staff various medical and surgical specialties including Emergency Medicine, Pediatrics and Obstetrics. Hospitalists may be, professionally, a DO, MD, Nurse Practitioner or Physician's Assistant and each must stay current with training in their chosen area of practice. While an in-patient at Dixie Regional Medical Center, your doctor will be a Hospitalist. All Saint George physicians entrust care of their hospitalized patients to the Intermountain hospitalist staff and, local pharmacies are online to the medical center, allowing responsible caregivers access to the patient's medication history. The Hospitalist communicates with the patient's personal physician and, upon discharge, the patient receives a packet of information about the hospital stay including care notes, results of lab tests and medical orders.

Although there are benefits to be realized by the usual model of in-patient care being administered by a physician familiar with an individual patient, studies have shown that the role of the Hospitalist offers added value by:

- providing timely access to in-house medical care upon admission
- improving resource utilization
- easing the time burden of private physicians
- educating through both formal and informal learning processes
- improving patient safety and quality of care because of being able to address issues or test results as soon as they are known
- maximizing throughput and improving patient flow in the hospital system
- assuring care for patients who have no assigned doctor

The Hospitalist serves as director of the multi-disciplinary team of pharmacists, nurses, medical assistants, dietitians, social workers, discharge planners, chaplains, and family members, whose common goal is providing the best patient-centered care and restoring optimum health as soon as is possible.

Improved Auditory Clarity in the Sanctuary and Conklin Hall

We have been working diligently to improve our ability to hear 100% of Rev. Ralph's inspiring sermons each week as well as our heavenly sounding choir and other announcements. Those who have trouble hearing and don't want to admit it, and don't wear hearing aids, should be pleased to know our hearing system is just for you.

We have new receivers for our hearing aid loops in both the Sanctuary and Conklin Hall. If you would like to try one out, here's what you need to do. Ask an usher to show you the drawer where the receivers are located.

In order to work correctly, the receivers must be kept vertical – they WILL NOT WORK if they are placed in your lap or on the seat next to you. To make this easier, each receiver has a lanyard that you can put around your neck which keeps the receivers upright. Men can put the receiver in their shirt pocket.

We also have both ear buds and headphones for each receiver. Just ask the ushers for the type of device you prefer or, if you prefer, you can bring your own. Any regular stereo headphones or ear buds will work.

Once you have your receiver around your neck or in your shirt pocket and have your headphones or ear buds plugged in, turn the receiver on using the knob on the top. This knob also adjusts the volume. You should hear well from both speakers and you will hear everything that is happening on the PA system. You must take out your hearing aids if you do not have a built in T-Coil. Of course, if your hearing aids have a T-Coil and you can activate it, that is a better alternative. These receivers work only in the sanctuary and Conklin Hall. As soon as you walk out of these two rooms, the receivers don't work. Ask for help from an usher if you have problems. It's worth it.

Good Hearing is essential to hearing the word of God. Need I say, please return the receivers to the drawer after the service.

Session News

Session held their regular monthly meeting on May 6th. Here is a synopsis of the actions:

- Voted to receive new members: Michael and Connie Milford. They were received into membership on May 13, 2018.
- Received a report from Guy Schultzman and the Building Committee: Evaluation of a Potential Benefit of a Solar Electric System. Guy does not recommend the installation of a Solar Electric System at this time. Session encouraged Guy to pursue measures to reduce the electrical demand during the summer months and to continue his research.
- Session approved by e-votes on May 11 & May 17, the purchase and installation of 5 locking shrouds for thermostats, the purchase and installation of 1 additional thermostat for the sanctuary and labor for rewiring costs in Conklin Hall for a total of \$450 to reduce electrical demand to maintain our rates at the "Small General Service" level.
- Accepted with regrets the resignation of Ed Haworth as Ruling Elder.
- Approved one week of vacation, August 20 to 26, 2018 for Rev. Ralph Clingan.
- Approved the trip to Dorogobuzh, Russia by Chris Schleter and Gloria McGilloway for two weeks during July and August with the allocation of up to \$1,000 for each traveler from the Russia Mission fund to defray expenses.
- Approved to purchase a Blu-Ray player and small amplifier or soundbar for the CE Building video system at a total cost not to exceed \$150 to be paid from the Memorial Fund.
- The Presbytery of Utah has approved our grant request of \$3,000 for our hosting of the Russia Mission Network Conference, September 26 to 28, 2018.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we expect to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have several major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$145,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise a total of \$384,000.

Our first campaign produced \$101,226. Through May 20th we have received pledges towards our second campaign totaling **\$45,357** and additional cash donations of **\$47,935** for a total of **\$194,518** or about **50.7%** of our new **\$384,000** goal.

We have also received pledges for our third campaign totaling **\$44,100**. Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to cover maintenance and make other improvements in the next three years.
