2019 Pledge Drive Begins

We want to personally thank you for your generosity and commitment to the life, mission and ministry of our congregation. 2018 has been a truly blessed year!

Due to your support, we have been able to reach out with the love of Christ not only to the homeless and hungry in our area through our CROP Walk and area social ministries, we were able as well to extend our love to the children of the world including children of Dorogobuzh, Russia, through the Bible Camp ministry of our sister congregation.

Due to your support, we have been able to support our witness and worship of our Lord and Savior Jesus by offering to our community each Sunday a joyful fellowship and meaningful worship that welcomes all with the love and grace of Jesus Christ.

In other words, due to your commitment to our Lord, lives have been changed in His name.

Pledge forms and a copy of the proposed budget for 2019 were mailed to everyone this week. If you didn't receive yours, please see Susan Holecheck, Carolynn Thomas or Chris Schleter and they will see that you get one.

While our budget is about \$8,750 higher than last year (mainly due to increased mission spending, salary increases, and inflation), we've seen our loose offerings grow by almost \$3,500 this year so we're asking for about \$5,200 more in pledges for 2019 to cover our expenditures. Every pledge, no matter how big or small, puts us closer to our goal.

You can pledge by dropping your pledge form in the offering plate on any Sunday or by returning it to the church office.

You can also pledge online by going to our website, hovering over Stewardship in the menu and clicking Pledge Support. On the Pledge Support page, click on General Fund Pledge on the right then fill out and submit the form. Our Financial Secretary, LaVerna Metzger, will receive an email with your pledge.

If you have any questions, please speak with Susan Holecheck, Carolynn Thomas or Chris Schleter, members of your Stewardship Committee.

We will dedicate our pledges during worship on December 16th.

We look forward to the year ahead and continue to grow and expand our ministries and mission partnership with you..



** Pastor's Note Regarding Hospital Visitation **

Please keep in mind that with the federal laws that went into force several years ago, hospitals are no longer allowed to give out any information regarding patients to visitors, including clergy. Unless a visitor requests a specific name, the hospital desk is not allowed to give out any information, including religious affiliation.

So, if you or a family member is hospitalized please alert the Pastor, your Deacon, or the church office. Otherwise, we will not be informed of your presence there and unable to assist or offer pastoral care.

Water Leak Damages CE Building

On Sunday, October 14th, a water leak under the sink in the kitchenette caused a flood and significant damage to the Christian Education building. While we are awaiting a final determination on damage from ServPro, we can say that the CE Building will be out of action for several weeks or more. At the very least, all of the carpet and some of the sheetrock walls in the building will have to be replaced. The offices in the building were not affected.

Until repairs are completed, Sunday Adult Education will be held in Conklin Hall and Children's Sunday School will be in the Chapel. Most other events normally held in the CE Building will also move to Conklin Hall.

We expect that our insurance will cover most, if not all, of the damage and an improved space will rise from the waters.

Brown Bag Luncheon

On Wednesday, November 7th, we look forward to again welcoming David Grygla, DO, Hospitalist from Dixie Regional Medical Center speaking to us about DIABETES. Those attending his previous talk remember him as an engaging and educational speaker. As before, we invite you to bring a friend, a sandwich and your questions and join us for an interesting, informative hour. We hope to see you at Noon in Conklin Hall.

Are You Worried About Losing Your Independence?

We are all familiar with the phrase "I've fallen and I can't get up". There is a way to get help for falls and so much more, immediately, which is especially important if you live alone. Just the touch of a button either on your wrist or on a necklace can reach a response center for help. This device is a called a Medical or Rescue Alert.

Parish Nursing, continued

Do you hear noise of a possible intruder, smell smoke or are the smoke alarms ringing or do you have a health issue? The center doesn't just call public emergency services for you but also places calls to any designated family members, friends or caregivers on your list who have asked to be notified of an incident. Family members frequently worry about the health and welfare of loved ones who may be at risk. Knowing that help can be summoned with the touch of a button, that you are wearing and not by having to get to a phone, provides peace of mind for you as well as those who care about you. The service can be provided over landline or by your cell phone. There are many questions to be answered when choosing the best provider for your needs but basic to each should be:

- Do I have to sign a contract, which may limit my flexibility to cancel or change my plan?
- Will I use a landline or a cell phone?
- How far from the console does it cover me? Can I go into the yard?
- Will it cover me if I go to the grocery or elsewhere?
- Can I wear it in the shower or bathtub--is it waterproof?
- What are the logistics to setting it up? Does someone come, personally, to install it or is it mailed for me to set up?
- What is the battery life and how would I know if the battery is low?
- Most important, how much would it cost??? There are a wide range of costs depending on the sophistication of the system and which options for service you choose. An average, basic system could cost \$30 per month for a landline or \$40 per month for a cell phone, plus installation fees, which are dependent on whether you have the system installed or have it mailed for you to install. The ultimate cost really depends on what are your personal needs or desires.

The alert system can be a key to prolonging your independence. There are a number of different providers, both national through the Internet and local by personal representation, which can cover Washington County. Handouts containing information on Medical Alert Systems, through both national and local companies, can be found on the Nursing Ministry bulletin board in the hall between Conklin Hall and the Sanctuary. Stewardship

The Treasurer's report from September 30th appears on page 2 and our Building Fund report is on page 11. We are doing quite well so far this year, but a lot of our income comes from contributors who make their entire year's donation in December or January.

We are kicking off our General Fund pledge campaign for 2019 on November 4th. Look for a letter and pledge card in the mail.

Please note that the budget included with the letter has estimates for the required contributions for Rev. Ralph's insurance and pension. Since that budget was prepared, we have received the actual costs for 2019:

Medical Insurance	\$ 18,370.95
Disability Insurance	\$ 734.84
Reimbursable Expenses	\$ 7,000.00
Total Pastor	\$ 108,577.70

While insurance did increase by 3% (the amount of Rev. Ralph's proposed increase in salary and housing), the numbers above are a reduction of about \$750.00 from the numbers shown in the budget you will receive with your letters and reduces our total pledge needs for 2019 to \$145,683.70. If you have any questions about the budget please talk with Carolynn Thomas or Chris Schleter.

Please consider making a pledge as your generous contributions allow us to fulfill God's mission for our church. We will dedicate our pledges for 2019 on December 16th.

Building Fund Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15-year term which means that if it goes for its full term (although we expect to pay it off early), we will pay a total of \$241,831.80. We also have several major maintenance items over the next several years, totaling more than \$145,000, that need to be funded in addition to paying off the mortgage, meaning we need to raise a total of \$384,000.

Our first two campaigns produced \$195,063. Through September 23rd we have received pledges towards our third campaign totaling **\$54,100** and additional cash donations of **\$10,099** for a total of **\$259,262** or about **67.5%** of our new **\$384,000** goal.

Thanks to everyone who has made a pledge to the third campaign. If you haven't pledged, please prayerfully consider making a pledge to help us pay off the mortgage early and have sufficient funds to cover maintenance and make other improvements in the next three years.
