

### Building Fund Pledge Update

As you all know, we have a mortgage payment of \$1,343.51 due each month. The mortgage has a principal of \$184,117 and a 15 year term.

Through the end of September, we had received pledges totaling \$65,456.00 and cash donations of \$19,449.45 towards retiring the mortgage. We hope to maintain the tradition of paying off our mortgages early.

### Rev. Ralph's Food for Thought



This text, which is commonly referred to as "The Great Commission", comes to us from a time in the early church when the fledgling Christian community was facing a crisis of identity and purpose in the face of changing and challenging time.

Recently having found itself divorced from the Jewish community and facing persecution from without and heresy from within the body of Christ had to discern where our Lord was calling them and as what he desired them to be.

The response was a matter of choice, do they withdraw unto themselves, circle the wagons or bar the doors, so to speak, and take care of themselves or instead hear the words of our Lord, and "go therefore!". (The original Greek is in the command form.)

Matthew's early Christian church determined that they were being called to be, and become a mission community. Their identity was that of being the body of Christ and their purpose was to serve him in the service of all humanity, locally, nationally and internationally, in the declaring of the good news of the Gospel and loving neighbor in His name.

It is clear Matthew's church discerned correctly and were far more successful than they could of ever dreamed.

We as well now find ourselves in changing and challenging times of our own and again are asked to consider who we are and why we are here. Another way of considering these questions is to ask ourselves, to whom do we belong and who do we serve?

I believe we are again being commanded to "Go and do"! That we are body of Christ and we exist to be a mission community serving in Christ name and as we begin our annual Stewardship campaign that each and every one of us prayerfully consider these important questions and answer the call as faithful disciples in the offering our gifts, abilities and time as if our very purpose and future depended upon it. ## Parish Nursing Ministry

On Wednesday, September 18, Anita Stiens of the Alzheimer's Association of St George kicked off our new year of Brown Bag Lunches with an excellent presentation in understanding the difference between the normal aging process (mild cognitive impairment) and Alzheimer's. She said that memory loss can be caused by medication, poor diet, lack of sleep, Thyroid problems, certain infections, depression and excess alcohol. It is important that the individual be checked by a doctor to determine if Alzheimer's is present.

There are ten characteristics of someone with Alzheimer's:

1. Memory loss that disrupts daily life-One of the most common signs of Alzheimer's, especially in the early stages, is forgetting recently learned information. Others include asking for the same information over and over. Typical age-related changes is sometimes forgetting names or appointments but remembering them later.
2. Challenges in planning or solving problems-Alzheimer's patients may have difficulty in keeping track of and paying bills, performing tasks such as following a recipe. Typical of age-related changes is making occasional errors balancing a checkbook.
3. Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work or at leisure-An Alzheimer's patient might go shopping with a list and forget to buy anything on the list. Typical of age-related changes would be occasionally needing help to use the settings on a microwave or to record a television show.
4. Confusion with time or place-An Alzheimer's patient can lose track of dates, seasons and passage of time. Sometimes they may forget where they are or how they got there. Typical age-related change might be getting confused about the day of the week (especially while on vacation) but figuring it out later.
5. Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships-an Alzheimer's patient may have difficulty reading, judging distance and determining color or contrast which may cause problems in driving. Typical age-related changes could be vision changes related to cataracts.
6. New problems with words in speaking or writing-an Alzheimer's patient has trouble joining conversations, can't find the right word or call things by the wrong word. Typical of age-related changes would be sometimes having trouble finding the right word.
7. Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps-a person with Alzheimer's disease may put things in unusual place. They may lose things and be unable to go back over their steps to find them again and may accuse others of stealing. This may occur more frequently over time. Typical age-related changes is misplacing things from time to time, and retracing steps to find them
8. Decreased or poor judgment-People with Alzheimer's take longer to make decisions, use poor judgment when dealing with money becoming victims of scams and pay less attention to grooming or keeping themselves clean. Typical age - related change is making a bad decision once in a while.
9. Withdrawal from work or social activities-a person with Alzheimer's may not want to go to places that they have always gone to such as church, lunches with friends complaining of too much noise, light or crowds and can't pay attention. Typical age-related changes are sometimes feeling weary of work, family and social obligations.
10. Changes in mood and personality-The mood and personality of people with Alzheimer's can change. They can become confused, suspicious, depressed, fearful or anxious. They may be easily upset at home, work or with friends or in places where they are out of their comfort zone. A typical age-related change is developing very specific ways of doing things and becoming irritable when a routine is disrupted.

On Wednesday, October 16<sup>th</sup> at Noon, Anita will return to talk about "When Memory Changes Affect Your Life - Resources & Coping Strategies." She will discuss the importance of early evaluation and treatment, what resources are available to you in this area, how to take action, and the importance of a healthy lifestyle.

Bring your lunch, and we will provide a beverage and a yummy dessert!

## Stewardship

### ***Bearing Fruit for Jesus!***

In the next couple of weeks, you will hear a lot about bearing fruit because our stewardship theme for this year is **Bearing Fruit for Jesus!: His Grace and Power at Work within You.**

Fruit trees are one of the many wonders of God's creation. To see the beauty of the tree and its fruit, to enjoy its taste, and to realize that it all came from a tiny seed is almost beyond our comprehension. An apple seed is planted in the ground, and, with water and sun as nourishment, miraculously a seedling surfaces that develops into a fruit tree. After a period of time, the apple tree fulfills its mission by bearing apples.

We, as Christians, are like that apple tree. We, too, have been fed and nourished by God so we can bear fruit. *"You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit—fruit that will last"* (John 15:16). Jesus tells us *"I am the Vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing"* (John 15:5). The life and power of any plant is found in its vine. The vine uses the branches to produce its fruit. The branch is simply a growth of the vine, produced by it and appointed to bear fruit. The branch exists only because the vine makes it possible.

Fruit characterizes the life of the Christian steward. When we stay firmly connected to Jesus, we are told that we *"will bear much fruit."* Christ has given us the task of ministering to the needs of others and spreading the Gospel. As we stay connected to him through his Word and Sacraments, we discover God's perfect will for us, and we are empowered to please him by bearing fruit (Colossians 1:9-10). God has created us to bear fruit (Ephesians 2:10), but only through Christ is it possible for us to do so.

*"Since we live by the Spirit,"* Paul exhorted, *"let us keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other"* (Galatians 5:25-26). As children of God, we have this fruit because his Spirit lives in us, not as a result of our own efforts. We do cease to bear fruit when we give in to our sinful natures, becoming, in Paul's words, *"Conceited, provoking and envying each other."* We are to *"Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness"* (Ephesians 5:11a), but are to *"Live as children of light (for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth) and find out what pleases the Lord"* (Ephesians 5:8b-10).

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### ***Go and bear fruit!***

The Stewardship Committee looks forward to studying and growing with each of you as we learn how to *"Bear Fruit for Jesus"* through newsletter articles and Bible Studies in October and November. Please be in prayer as you consider your pledge contributions for the coming year and the Stewardship committee as we plan the 2014 budget.

We are also looking for your help in prayer and in giving over the next few months to help us to end our financial year strong and fulfill all of our mission and administrative commitments. Your giving has tremendously blessed our Building Fund! We are well ahead of where we need to be to fund our mortgage payments. However, the General Fund is down from where we need to be to meet our budget obligations for the balance of the year. Please help us to continue to Bear Fruit!
